# Tornadoes hit **Parmer County**

Tornadoes tore through **Curry and Parmer counties** on Friday night, causing severe damage.

Fortunately, no injuries were reported.

Some tornadoes swept through at tree-top levels.

More than 4 inches of moisture fell on the Twin Cities on Friday, about half an inch that morning and the rest that night when was

the storms struck.

In Clovis, 35 persons were injured and about 100 buildings damaged as this community received the brunt of the storm.



Power was out in the community from 9 to 11:36 p.m. Since this didn't allow the sirens to be sounded, Bovina firemen went up and down the streets in their trucks, using those sirens to warn residents of impending danger.

After power went out, several residents went to the EOC for shelter. One thing city officials learned from this emergency was that since power went out at City Hall, they could not use the siren -- it needed its own generator. This will be corrected, said Terry.

City officials did have a generator for City Hall use.







Texico Schools held a special assembly March 23 for the Texico Lady Wolverines basketball team that captured the state title in Class 2A.

The team presented its trophy to the school board.

Some of the highlights from the program were:

-- Lady Wolverines' Coach Keith Durham thanked the girls for their great work ethic and morals. He appreciated the parents, Booster Club, assistant coaches, staff and administration for their support, too.

He noted how the Texico JV boys practiced against the Lady Wolverines and how this helped strengthen his team. For example, Texico took on Penasco in state title game. Penasco was taller at every position. But Texico out-rebounded Penasco by 17.

-- School board member Charlie Vannatta was the main speaker. He complimented the team for their work ethics.

For example, before the state championship game, he said Penasco players were waving to the fans and posing for photos; meanwhile, the Texico players were shooting baskets and working on rebounding.


Vannatta said operators of two restaurants called the school this year to say that when the Texico players stopped there for meals during their game travels, "our kids were the best ever."



Position 1 incumbent Jerry Roberts defeated Jared Blankenship. Robert lives in Deaf Smith County and has served on the Deaf Smith board for 29 years.

Some highlights from the 2006 report of Steve Louder, Deaf Smith president and general manager: -- The co-op set record sales at 501 million kilowatt-

hours. Its TIER (times interest earned ratio -- an indicator used by lenders) is at 21.64, ranking Deaf Smith among some 820 co-ops nationwide.

-- There are plans to build two new substations to meet demands.

-- The co-op installed 21 miles of underground wure and constructed 30 miles of overhead distribution lines to serve 322 new services.

-- Irrigation load added included 250 new services totaling 6,670 horsepower.

In other business:

-- \$1.5 million in capital credits were returned to co-op members.

-- It may have been the largest crowd ever for a co-op annual meeting, with more than 1,500 persons present.

-- The net margin for 2006 was \$5,774,184, up from \$4,820,923 in 2005.

# Don't get hit with a penalty! "Render" your taxable property by April 16th.

A "rendition" is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you owned or controlled on January 1st of this

# Who must file a rendition?

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property that is used to produce income - such as the inventory and equipment used by a business. If you render late, don't render or file an incomplete or false rendition, a 10% to 50% penalty may be

## Are there any advantages to you?

The advantages of filing a rendition are:

- · You give your opinion of your property's value. The appraisal district must notify you in writing of any value to the appraisal review board.
- · You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments
- · You can also file a "report of decreased value" to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation of the value of your property in 2006. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 2007.

# What's the deadline?

The last day for filing 2007 renditions is April 16. You can get an automatic extension to May 15 if you ask for it in writing on or before the April 16 deadline. The chief appraiser may grant an additional 15 days after May 15 for an owner who shows good cause in writing.

#### 3-23-07 LIVE CATTLE: Most of the cattle contracts have yet to recover from last weeks break. The market was flat for most of the week with some support coming in late. Long term trends are once again at the point of turning down, but no confirmation yet. The USDA report released today was called neutral. A close below \$96.00 would turn long term trends down and confirm a top.

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeder prices have continued to drift off their contract highs with one eye on fed cattle prices and the other on corn. Although the nearby April contract has breached an uptrend line, the market is still nolding just above the long term moving averages. Strong support lies below around the \$103.25 level basis the April contract.

CORN: The July contract was able to turn it's short erm trend up this week, but the market isn't expected to do much until after next weeks USDA Planting's report. Technically, the market seems to be struggling at current levels, but it will depend heavily on USDA numbers and the power of the Funds who have been driving this market for the last few months?

SOYBEANS: Beans have continued to hold up better than corn prices as we move closer to next weeks USDA Planting Intention report. There remains some fear that high corn prices into the December 2008 contract may continue to draw bean acres away into next season. There seems to be fairly strong resistance around the \$7.75 level basis the nearby May contract.

WHEAT: The July KC Wheat contract has stabilized since dropping below major support levels at the \$4.98 with some support coming in around last weeks low at \$4.79 basis the July contract. The planting report may not have much impact on wheat other than driving corn and bean prices significantly higher or lower? Odds are good that wheat will continue to follow the rest of the complex.

COTTON: The market has continued to edge down over the last couple of weeks and even though most traders below that acreage losses could support prices eventually, the overwhelming supplies up front may continue to hold the market down over the near term? At this time it would take a close above \$54.75 basis the May contract in order to turn long term trends higher.



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

# Who was Martin Parmer?

There it is ... the third signature under Sam Houston's ... the signature of Martin Parmer, one of the signers of the Texas Declaration of Independence on March 2, 1836 at Washington-on-the-Brazos.

He's the man Parmer County was named after when it was created Aug. 21, 1876. He was not a native Texan, but rather a Virginian by birth and rearing having been born there on June 4, 1778 as Martin Palmer (frontier usage changed the spelling and pronunciation of the last name).

By the time he was 20, he had ventured into Kentucky and then on to Tennessee where he married his first wife Sarah Hardwick with whom he would have 10 children. She died in 1826. (He would remarry 3 more times, being widowed twice more and would father 7 more children).

While in Dickinson County, Tenn., he was superintendent of the Montgomery Bell Iron Works. This company made, among other things, cannonballs which were used by Andrew Jackson at the Battle of New Orleans. He, himself, being the son of an American Revolutionary War Veteran, Martin entered the service in the War of 1812 where he attained the rank of colonel.

Always in search of a new frontier to tame, he moved to Missouri in 1816 at the age of 38. Here he became interested in politics and served as a delegate to the Constitutional Convention of Missouri in 1821. He later served as both a state representative and as a state senator for Missouri.

By the time he came to Texas in 1826, he had quite a reputation for being an Indian fighter and evidently quite a talker, always attracting an audience with his war stories and Indian tales. His own personal battle cry was that he was a 'ring-tailed panther from Missouri' i.e. quite a scrapper and never one to run from a fight -- especially one he had started.

So after coming to Texas it wasn't long before he found the fighting. Col. Parmer fought with the colonists against the Mexican authorities in the Fredonian Rebellion in March 1827, overthrowing Samuel Norris, the alcade or mayor, and his attorney Jose Antonio Sepulveda, and placing Nacogdoches under martial law. The rebellion failed, however; and he and his cohorts crossed the Sabine River into exile.

But he was back in Texas for the Consultation of 1835 representing the city of Tenaha and then serving as a delegate from San Augustine to the Constitutional Convention at Washington-on-the-Brazos in March 1836.

It was here that 58 year old Parmer, the oldest delegate present, became one of the 59 men to sign this important document. He served on the committee to draft the declaration

In a letter to his wife dated March 6, 1836 he states: "Texas has been declared free, but unless we have a general turnout and every man lay a helping hand, too, we are lost. Santa Anna and his vassals are now on our borders, and the declaration of our freedom, unless it is sealed with blood, is of no force."

His son, Isom, served in the Texas army, the only one of his sons to do so, and was Sergeant at arms for the Convention. He had purchased a fine horse for the sum of \$400 Mexican dollars and when Sam Houston was appointed Commander-in-chief of the Texas forces and was in dire need for a new mount, Isom sold Houston the horse. It was this same horse that was later shot out from under Houston at the Battle of San Jacinto.

In 1839 Parmer was appointed Chief Justice of Jasper County. He died there March

2, 1850, at age 72.

Parmer was buried in Jasper County on the A.C. Parmer survey where a sandstone headstone marked the grave until it became illegible. In 1936 during the Texas Centennial, his remains were removed from Jasper County and re-interred in the State Cemetery in Austin where a granite marker preserves and honors his memory.

# What the best of America is really all about

During World War II, when Hop Graham was the State Line Tribune publisher, it would take weeks or even months for the newspaper to get across the Atlantic and to finally catch up with wherever my father's Airborne units might have moved in their operations.

Dad laughs when he tells about any mail call in the field that would contain his copy of the hometown newspaper because his whole outfit seemed to look forward to it.

He recalls that one of his fellow soldiers was a lawyer from New York City named Hollander, who was fascinated that there could really be places like Texico-Farwell, so far removed and different from the bustling streets and towering skyscrapers he knew.

Hollander would stand on a chair in the mess tent and the platoon would gather to listen. When the soldiers were assembled, Hollander would adopt his lawyer's demeanor and in his heaviest New York accent, and for however long it took, he would read the newspaper from front to back to the soldiers from cities and farms all across America. They were a rapt audience to hear his narration of the news items from Parmer and Curry counties..

I've always tried to picture those mail calls -- an Army tent in some nameless field in some distant part of France, a somber New York City accented report of all the news from our corner of the High Plains, and the soldiers rolling in laughter at the stories that might be newsworthy in a small town newspaper.

I suspect that while the stories must have seemed funny and unimportant, at the same time in the midst of a war, it was important to hear from an America where stress was on weather conditions and stock shows, church activities and high school athletics, marriages and births and deaths, county administration and city councils, and all the other little bits and pieces that make up an agricultural community.

I know that has been my experience in all the places the government has sent me the last 30-plus years. When mail bags would finally be delivered to my ships at sea, or in whatever embassy I might be working, my copies of the Tribune would get passed around by friends who had never been to the High Plains in their life.

I believe the reason for that is the same as it was in my Dad's era. For all its flaws, America is still the "shining city on the hill" that draws the rest of the world to it. And for all its simplicity and insignificance, little towns and family farms like ours may be, at their core, what the best of America is really all about.

# A bit of **Texico** history

Editor's note: Area historian Don McAlavy, now living in St. Petersburg, Fla., sent us this article he said was written by Bob Maddux in 1938.

From Don McAlavy:

Texico was a wide-open town with 18 saloons and a gambling joint in every one of them back in 1905 and 1906, but those times were not nearly so perilous as the later years when the country was supposed to be "civilized."

Bob Maddux was a barkeeper for the first year after he landed in Texico in 1905, but later became a prominent merchant. He was there and saw it all, or most of it.

"There were fist fights going on almost all the time, but we had only two killings in the early days," he recalled. "And one of those was a hoss thief. Later, when the town had settled down and was supposed to be civilized, we had a number of killings."

In the rip-roaring days of 1906 and 1907, when settlers and speculators were coming to this country in droves and between 500 and 700 railroad workers were being paid off in Texico, the state line city looked like the busiest place on earth. It was always jammed full of people and every day looked like Saturday.

The reckless spirit of adventure was in the air, for a land rush that had all the aspects of gold rush was on in full blast. Money was made and spent freely, and the noisy saloons were the busiest spots in town.

Maddux remembers the many impromptu horse races staged on Main Street at the peril of life and limb of the riders and pedestrians alike.

But despite the hubbub and the brawling, most of the people were friendly and good-natured and tried to get along. The knowledge that many men went armed constantly probably had something to do with this.

Being a bartender of the school. Maddux old deplored the fact that women and children can enter now saloons. Nothing like that in the good old days!

A native of Georgia, Maddux moved to Florida in 1892 but left there soon because "it was too dang hot." He arrived in Roswell, N.M., in 1894 and stayed there until July 7, 1905, when he came to Texico.

At that time, Texico had only three saloons, a post office, an express office and a railway depot which was housed in a wheelless boxcar with Sam King as agent.

Among the farmers in the vicinity when Maddux arrived -- or who came shortly thereafter -- were T.S. Randol and his sons, Sam and Ebb; Ira Taylor, Perry Owens, Billy Phillips, George W. Paul, J.F. Vinyard, Albert Means and Frank Avery.

**Baylor and Bill Triplett** were farming there then and also running a mercantile store in Texico. They are still in business today (1938) and are operating Curry County's oldest store. Of course, it wasn't Curry County then, for not until 1910 was **Curry County split off from** Quay and Roosevelt counties.

Incidentally, Ira Taylor was the first section foreman at Texico and was

there in 1902 and 1903 before there was a town. Before that, it was just a flag stop on the old Pecos Valley & Northeastern (called Railway Peavine), which ran from Amarillo to Roswell. Taylor was succeeded by Louis Durr in 1904.

Maddux recalls the Peavine was built by J.J. Hagerman in 1898 and was purchased by Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railway the very next year. The line then went southwest from Texico to Portales instead of going from Portales to Clovis as it does now.

The Santa Fe started building west of Texico in

1905 toward Belen, and the boom was on in Texico. It slacked sharply in 1908 because the railway shops were located 10 miles away in Clovis and because a drought picked that particular time to hit. The town fell away to a shadow of its former self. Scores of buildings were moved to Clovis and others sold out to the insurcompanies. Residents got used to awakening at night to see buildings going up in

Today, Texico, one of Curry County's three incorporated towns, has a population of over 700 (the 1930 census showed 569),

and is showing steady progress. Texico is soon to have its first City Hall, under an \$11,000 WPS project. A string of old concrete buildings on the main street are are to be entirely remodeled and combined into a combination city hall and fire sta-

The first killing in Texico, Maddux recalled, was in 1902 or 1903. A horse thief whose name has been forgotten was killed right on the state line by Sheriff Ross, of Hereford.

Maddux wasn't there then, so all he knows of the case is hearsay. He was told that Ross, on the

New Mexico side of the line, was standing where **Thomas Hardware Store is** now located, and brought down the main with a .30-.30 Winchester. It wasn't a bad shot, either -- 200 yards or better. The victim. who was attempting to escape on horseback, had gotten down off his horse to unfasten a gate in the state line fence, and was shot as he started to remount.

In 1906 there was another slaving, which attracted wide attention because both principals were officers. Bryon Parish, a constable at Portales, had gone by railway through Texico to Fort Sumner, then called Sunnyside, to arrest a man who had stopped at Texico on his way back.

Bill Tipton, a deputy sheriff, claiming that Parish had exceeded his authority in going outside his precinct to arrest a man, disarmed Parish, but the latter in turn grabbed Tipton's gun. A shot rang out an Tipton lay dead. Parish was acquitted.

So both of Texico's early day killings involved officers, and the rough and ready pioneers and cattlemen, though rugged individuals and ready to defend their rights against all comers, were rather a peaceable lot, after all.



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
