In other business, the committee:



Incensed over the action of the court and more a judge and less a politician, only two men claiming an innocent man had been condemned, would have been crucified last Friday. the eminent counselor referred to the following five improper actions of the court:

The jurist claimed that he refused to vote for condemnation at the trial. Among other obvious reasons, he stated that he is convinced that Jesus of Nazareth is actually the promised Messiah, the Hope of Israel! For this reason he made the new sepulcher in his spacious garden available for the burial of the Nazarene. He also stated that for the same reason, Nicodemus, a respected teacher of religion, assisted in the final rites for Jesus in the garden late Friday afternoon.

The centurion, who was in charge of the crucifixion of Jesus of Nazareth and responsible for preserving law and order, gave what may be considered the most eloquent testimony of all in regard to the person who was crucified on Calvary's hill.

He had been a silent witness to all that happened. When questioned soon after the events of Friday, he spoke with conviction. He stated that there had been a great miscarriage of justice, since the words and actions of the man crucified were not those of a man guilty of crime. When asked who he thought the crucified man

was, he replied, "To the best of my knowledge, He was, as He Himself said, the Son of God." Sensing that the crowd would be satisfied with nothing less than blood, the judge compromised justice and ordered the innocent prisoner scourged. Dripping with blood, disheveled and thorn-crowned. Jesus was presented to the crowd as Pilate announced: "Behold, I bring him forth unto you that you may know that I find no fault in him. Behold the Man." Again the crowd would not be pacified. The Governor finally reconciled himself to the fact that neither compromise nor reason would satisfy the mob.

It was then that the opposition took command calling out: "If you release this man, you are not the emperor's friend." Was this a veiled threat? Would Pilate's past misdeeds be reported to Caesar? Reluctantly but deliberately, he washed his hands before the mob, saying: "I am innocent of the blood of this just Person; see to it yourselves." Reluctantly he signed the death warrant for Jesus of Nazareth. Justice finally had been trampled into the dust. Pilate had sold out to the opposition

This raises some interesting questions: Will Rome condone such action in its courts? Can Pilate continue as Governor? What, in fact, does the future hold for Pilate? Time alone will tell.

APPLICATION AND PRELIMINARY DECISION. City of Bovina, P.O. Box 720, Bovina Texas 79009-0720, has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for a new permit, Proposed Permit No. WQ0014730001, to authorize the disposal of treated domestic wastewater at a daily average flow not to exceed 250,000 gallons per day via surface irrigation of 63 acres of non-public access pastureland. This permit will not authorize a discharge of pollutants into waters in the State. TCEQ received this application on July 11, 2006.

The wastewater treatment facility and disposal site will be located approximately 0.75 mile northeast of the intersection of State Highway 86 and East Street, to the south of State Highway 86 in Parmer County, Texas. The wastewater treatment facility and disposal site are located in the drainage basin of White River Lake in Segment No. 1240 of the Brazos River Basin.

The TCEQ executive director has completed the technical review of the application and prepared a draft permit. The draft permit, if approved, would establish the conditions under which the facility must operate. The Executive Director has made a preliminary decision that this permit, if issued, meets all statutory and regulatory requirements. The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit comments or to ask questions about the application. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. After the deadline for submitting public comments, the Executive Director will consider all timely comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. Unless the application is directly referred for a contested case hearing, the response to comments will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments and to those persons who are on the mailing list for this application. If comments are received, the mailing will also provide instructions for requesting a contested case hearing or reconsideration of the Executive Director's decision. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in a state district court.

TO REQUEST A CONTESTED CASE HEARING, YOU MUST INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING ITEMS IN YOUR REQUEST: your name; address, phone; applicant's name and permit number; the location and distance of your property/activities relative to the facility; a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the facility in a way not common to the general public; and the statement, "{I/we} request a contested case hearing." If the request for a contested case hearing is filed on behalf of a group or association, the request must designate the group's representative for receiving future correspondence; identify an individual member of the group who would be adversely affected by the proposed facility or activity; provide the information discussed above regarding the affected member's location and distance from the facility or activity; explain how and why the member would be affected; and explain how the interests the group seeks to protect are germane to the group's purpose.

Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the Executive Director will forward the application and any requests for reconsideration or for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

The Commission will only grant a contested case hearing on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission will only grant a hearing on issues that were raised in timely filed comments that were not subsequently with-

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ACTION. The Executive Director may issue final approval of the application unless a timely contested case hearing request or request for reconsideration is filed. If a timely hearing request or request for reconsideration is filed, the Executive Director will not issue final approval of the permit and will forward the application and request to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

MAILING LIST. If you submit public comments, a request for a contested case hearing or a reconsideration of the Executive Director's decision, you will be added to the mailing list for this specific application to receive future public notices mailed by the Office of the Chief Clerk. In addition, you may request to be placed on (1) the permanent mailing list for a specific applicant name and permit number; and/or (2) the mailing list for a specific county. If you wish to be placed on the permanent and/or the county mailing list, clearly specify which list(s) and send your request to TCEQ Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below.

All written public comments and public meeting requests must be submitted to the Office of the Chief Clerk, MC 105, TCEQ, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, TX 78711-3087 within 30 days from date of newspaper publication of this notice.

Further age divisions will be made if number of team entries is ample. (At least 4 teams per age level)

Finals will be determined by the best record in each division, if there is a tie, there will be a tie breaker game to determine who will go on to the finials.

With the volume of trains up and down those tracks every few minutes, day and night, crossing the flow of cars and trucks up and down U.S.70 / 84, it's really miraculous that we haven't already seen the school bus stopped there late one night by the slow-moving coal train so the three dozen cheerleaders on it can't escape the

Thus it took something more than 1,000 years to accomplish. But the example remains!

Hopefully, Texico can persuade New Mexico state officials on the one side and Farwell can persuade the Texas state officials on the other that the

metaphorical "River Usk" needs to be completed, through one solution or another.

The refreshing winds of innovation and cooperation that swept down the Usk Valley really can be duplicated over our own Staked Plains.

And I bet we can do it in only 400 years or so, 500 at the outside!

As for happy Crickhowell and pleasant inspiration to all of us.

Llangattock, they continue to maintain their respective and jealously quarded village pride with their separate families, separate churches, and separate councils.

But if nothing else, for the last 500 years it has been possible to drink ale on both sides of the Usk without getting your boots wet in between pubs.


In the February/March 2007 group's magazine, he wrote about mentoring his staff and supporting their efforts to become CTAs -- Certified Tax Administrators.

Terry: Bovina shows 'a good example of the American spirit'

From City Manager Ernest Terry:

On March 23, Bovina had a close encounter with one or more tornados. Bovina didn't get the damage that Clovis did. We were very lucky.

Some of Bovina's citizens were unlucky and had storm damage: tree tops twisted off, branches broken, carports blown away, storage sheds destroyed, shingles and roofs damaged, and fences blown down.

Some people outside of Bovina, residents of Parmer County also had storm damage. Thankfully, no one has been reported hurt or injured.

The Guevara's had serious roof damage. Jack Rains lost his garage. Jessie Stone lost roof shingles. The Ellison's lost a tree. Tito Viernes lost a garage. Andres DeLaRosa's house caught the Riddle's carport. Elton and Marie Venable had damage to their store on Highway 60. The Ortiz's had to replace a roof.

And many more had damage. But everyone pitched in and cleaned up and repaired or replaced the damage. No one stood around with their hand out for their government to help them. Unlike what we saw from New Orleans, well ... let's just say I was proud of Bovina's community involvement and attitude. They "got 'r done!"

By Tuesday, Bovina was reaching out to help Clovis, who was hit much harder than we were. Mayor Stan Miller took about 50 Bovina youths to help out there.

The City's Public Works, the Bovina Voluntary Fire Department, the Bovina EMS, the Bovina Police Department, and many nameless volunteers were out that night, surveying the storm damage and assisting people who needed help.

On Saturday, Public Works was out cleaning and clearing up the debris. Anyone who asked for help moving and collecting the debris got help. Everyone was asked to put the debris on the curb or in the alley, and Public Works would pick it up. Our new trash truck got a good workout.

We learned a few things that we needed to correct. The sirens didn't work when the whole town's power went out. City Hall needed emergency lights and flashlights. The radio repeater on the water tower didn't work without power. We had plans for many scenarios, but none for a total loss of power.

Thanks to an assist from the County, we have a system and a plan to operate the sirens when total power is lost. We are looking into getting another siren for the southeastern corner of Bovina. A plan to hook up generators and to operate those generators for power is now in place. City Hall has purchased emergency lights for the Emergency Operations Center, and they work. Spare flashlights are available, now. If we are lucky, we won't have to do this again.

The bottom line it this: Bovina didn't sit down and whine about its problems. Bovina fixed what it could and made arrangements to fix the rest. Neighbors helping neighbors. Friends helping friends. No one was a stranger that weekend.

And that is a pretty good example of the American Spirit!




