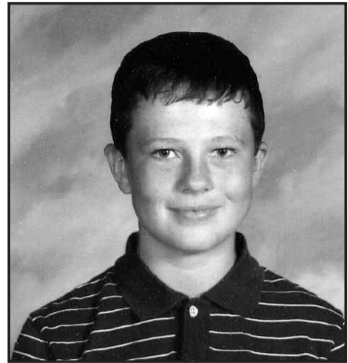

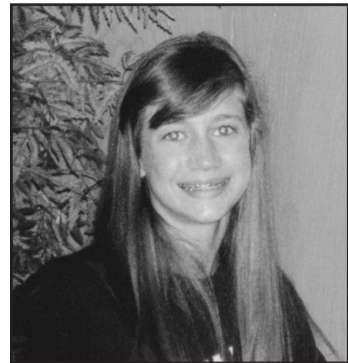
Dear Rob and Becky:

Major development planned for Bovina

The Bovina City Council on Tuesday received major news of a planned development about to take shape at Bovina's northern edge.

Developer Joey Spicola Jr., in partnership with Bruce and Patty Hartline, of Muleshoe, plans to purchase 190 acres from Dan Fortenberry and build 150 homes on the tract along with about half a dozen businesses.

Spicola also had purchased a home in Bovina along with business property in Friona. He spends part of his time in Bovina, the rest in Florida.

According to Bovina City officials, Spicola has agreed on having the property voluntarily annexed to the city. What the city will need to do is expand water lines to the property (by tunneling under U.S. Highway 60).

The triangular tract is bordered on the east by Western Street, on the north by County Road 1381 and on the south by Hwy. 60 (with about 8-10th of a mile of highway frontage for planned businesses). Spicola is buying the entire area except for a small triangular property at the intersection of Western and Hwy. 60.

Businesses along the highway frontage may include a truck wash (2-bay, self-service and cleanout for cattle trucks); a major truck stop; a general store, a restaurant and a supermarket.

The homes will be between 1,500 and 1,800 sq. ft. and

affordable, Spicola told the council.

Spicola said he hopes to close soon on the property purchase. He thanked city officials for their assistance in moving the project along.

Asked by Marie Venable, what brought him to the Bovina area, Spicola said he is a close friend of the Bellamy Brothers, who got him into the seed business and he has been in this area for a few years.

And Mrs. Hartline complimented Bovina on being a great town.

Why the need for more housing in this area? Cargill Meat Solutions, of Friona, recently has expressed a need for more close-by housing for its employees. Plus, an egg-production facility is planned nearby by Cal-Maine, and Clovis is seeing continued growth.

In other business, the council:

-- Heard several residents comment on the recent controversy involving Jim Bob Swafford, former volunteer Bovina Economic Development Coordinator.

It was due to a possible conflict of interest. He has formed his own wind corporation that might be construed in competition with the BEDC plans to generate development in that area.

Norma Whitten said there has been too much division in the town and "we don't want to lose the wind farm

project because we can't work in unity." She supported Swafford who has "made Bovina a better place."

LaJuana Renfro said the allegations against Swafford for improprieties were very harsh. What she has heard, she said, was supported by "hearsay and innuendo ... not hard evidence." She suggested Swafford was owed an apology.

Mindy Neal, Bovina Chamber of Commerce president, said the squabbling over the affair had to stop, and support shown for continuing the wind farm project. It was announced that Larry Hodnett became the new BEDC coordinator, effective May 1. Mayor Stan Miller said this should continue continuity on the plans.

Councilmen Radford Venable and Lance Teague thanked Swafford for what he has done for Bovina.

A bit of history

From Donalita Hawkins:

John Hastings came from England to North Carolina in 1670. His son was my great-grandfather Hastings. He settled first in North Carolina, then moved to Tennessee. This where my grandfather, William Wallace Hastings, met and married his wife, Margaret Ann Philpott. They had 13 children.

The family moved to Wise County, Texas, then to Clarendon, and on to Tulia. They both died while living in Tulia and were buried in Clarendon.

About 1909, one of their sons, Frank Hastings, moved to Bovina and started a grocery and mercantile store with Luther Barnes. Frank met and married Leora Tidenberg, who had moved to Bovina with her family. They had two daughters and several grandchildren.

The post office was in the same building as the grocery store. My mother, Pearl Dean, was the postmaster. This is where she met Tom Hastings, as he had moved to Bovina to work in the store for his brother Frank.

Pearl and Tom married in 1917 and had two sons and two daughters, Dean, Gordon, Imogene and myself.

My father was killed in a car accident in 1926 when I was 3 years old. In the years they were married, they acquired a quarter section of land, a house in town, a new car.

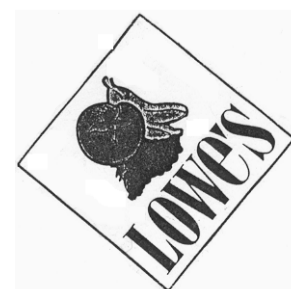
