## Corn yields reported

Fen-IPM:
Cooler temperatures and chances of precipitation have moved into the area. A good general soaking rain would be a great benefit with the exception of those Preliminary corn silage.
33 Preliminary corn silage yields are ranging from 22 to 33 tons per acre. Corn damaged by hail and/or produced with marginal irrigation capacity are, as expect-
ed, those at the lower end of the yield range, 22 to 25 ed, those at the lower end of the yield range, 22 to 25
tons per acre while fully irrigated corn yields have been in the 28 to 33 ton per acre range. Generally it appears that the early planted corn may out yield the later plant ed corn.
The early planted corn was able to take advantage of the cool wet conditions early in the growing season while the later planted corn has been subjected to hot, dry and windy conditions during the critical pollination period. When looking at the growing seasons of early and late corn, a greater percent of the late corn's season will be exposed to the harsh environmental conditions. Corn that was "double cropped" behind wheat appears to be particularly impacted

"We know that as the availability of something goes down, the price goes up. That's evident at the gas pump. It's the nature of supply and demand, so conserCooperative Board Chairman Darrell Stephens also gave a report looking to the enrgy future. As part of it, he said:
"The fact that our non-renewable energy and natura resources are becoming more and more difficult and costly to maintain is the harsh reality we all face. Large oil companies, electric co-ops as well as local merchants and farmers feel the trickle down effects of this increasing cost.
"A recent article in the State Line Tribune by Will Anderson clearly emphasized this fact by referring to the problems of energy driving our economy along with the necessity of addressing energy that will also of the Panhandle of Texas, we have great hope ... wind and bio fuels."
The cooperative gave a breakdown on how cus tomers' dollars are spent: wholesale power costs, 79 percent; taxes and interest, 4 percent; depreciation expenses, 4 percent; operations and maintenance expenses, 7 percent; administrative and general expenses, 4 percent; and consumer accounts and customer service expenses, 2 percent.
And where did the revenue come from? Irrigation accounts, 72 percent; commercial accounts, 17 percent, and residential account, 11 percent.
