The big housing project, which will be known as the Hillcrest state line and Second Street, below Avenue G.


An area large enough to accommodate 70 homes has been purchased by the Clovis contractor, but 25 residents will be the initial project. "We fully intend to build more if demand proves to be adequate," said Curtis. Williams of the firm.

Paving, curbing, and guttering will be installed in the new addition, and this work will be taken care of before the homes start going up, which is expected to be about the first of June.

The residences are of a modernized Spanish style, similar to others which Stagner has erected in Clovis. In fact, the contractor now has two "model homes" on display at one of his Clovis building sites which he will show persons interested in finding out what the homes planned in Farwell will look

like, Prices for the homes will range from \$8000 to \$10,000, says Williams, and financing will be avail-

Jesko Starts First Of Planned Units

Harry Ray Jesko, a veteran returning to Farwell after four years in the USAF, began work this week on the first of what he hopes will be several homes in Farwell.

Jesko, making his first try at home development projects, says he is proceeding with caution, but is hopeful for the future of his plans. He is presently building a four-bedroom frame home between First Street and the paved farm-to-market road going south out of Texico.

Jesko has purchased 370 feet from Bud Peyton, and his first home is being built on the northern part of this tract, between the present residences of Dr. Mary McNeff and Clay Henson.

"I plan to build one house at a time," he says. "If we sell this one, we will go ahead with other projects.'

Jesko is hiring labor for his development, which will be finished in what he calls a "move-in style." That is, a buyer will find the home to be complete with everything ready for occupancy,

Pain Comes with Progress; It's Always Been that Way

When looking through back issues of newspapers or magazines which are many years oldperhaps a 100 years or more-many things which we see will amuse us. The costume of former generations, what our grandparents did for entertainment, and the general passing scene are cause for much laughter when we see these things in retrospect.

Sometimes, however, little lessons jump right out at us before we scarcely realize it. Such was the case, when we came across a copy of an old, old handbill which was reproduced by the weekly news letter of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

In horribly bold type that fairly screamed for attention, spine-chilling words in this handbill told the dreadful calamity which was about to be risited upon the peaceful community of Philadelphia: a RAILROAD was being brought in!

"Mothers, look out for your children!" warned the handbill. A grotesque scene portraying the entry of the train through the streets of Philadelphia followed, to give graphic emphasis to the point. Carriages were being overturned as horses ran away, and people were fleeing for their very lives. The business houses on the street adjoining the line were all vacant and had "to let" signs in their windows.

The jet black horse was pictured with an evil expression on its face as it bullied its way across town, making money for millionaries. "MONOPOLY" was emblazened on its side. "Rally, people in the majesty of your strength and forbid this OUTRAGE," screamed the circular.


