County reports huge surplus

The report from Parmer County Kirkland, Kirkland CPA Commission firm dealing with the county's financial status in Monday. Last year, the county 2006 was received by the showed a profit of

\$482,662. Numbers showed that the county received \$4,536,534 in revenue, and had expenses of \$4,053,831.

Despite this, some county residents will be paying higher county taxes. Here's why:

The commissioners opted to keep its tax rate the same as last year -- at .5258 cents per \$100 assessed valuation. The commissioners could have lowered it, kept it the same, or raised it.

But keeping it the same does not mean the average homeowner will pay the same taxes as last year -- because appraised valuations have gone up on some residences. The combined valuations and tax rate will bring in \$214,234 new money to the county, said Curby Brantley, Parmer County appraiser.

The legal notice in last week's Tribune explaining this was headlined "Notice of Public Hearing on Tax Increase."

The Tribune was present at the county commissioners' meeting on Monday to ask the commissioners to explain their vote (which was unanimous) on maintaining the same tax rate as last year despite having a huge surplus.

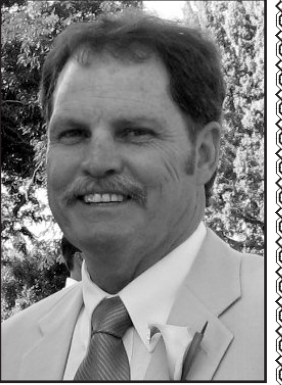

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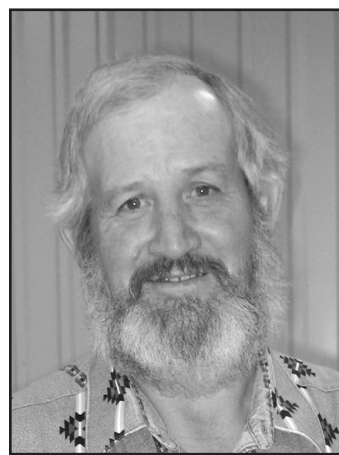

Texico council deals with water problems

The Texico City Council on Tuesday discussed mounting problems with the city water supply.

The Brown well has recently received work to get it pumping again, but problems have arisen. After having the well air-blasted to remove sediment from the underground filter, it is still not pulling up water consistently.

The council voted to try a final measure of using a company that will stretch the grill out to allow more water and sediment to be pulled out of the ground. If this doesn't work, the well will have to be abandoned.

City Street Manager Darrell Stanton pointed out that the well at KKR park is also having problems. The well is pumping air.

The city has bought two additional wells, but they will have to be tested by the state and then tied into the city water lines before they can be used.

Councilman Oran Jay Autrey stated that they

need to do everything they can to save the wells because it will help when they apply for state grants later in the year.

In other news, the council:

- Approved a resolution for the wastewater project the city is working on. The legislative grant the city has received required the resolution for paperwork. The council is working on bringing the wastewater system up to code.

- Discussed garbage rates. Right now most residents pay \$14.13 per month, but Duncan Disposal has asked to raise rates up to \$15.78. The council worked to get an incremental rate increase from Duncan, but will vote on an increase at the Sept. 25 meeting.

- City Clerk Carolyn Johnson asked that a public meeting be held at 6 p.m. on Sept. 25 for input on the CDBG grant the city is working on.

- Set the Oct. 9 meeting to discuss the PERA and Social Security options open to city employees.

There will be a deputy director for PERA to answer questions. All city employees are encouraged to attend.

- Councilman Doug Scioli brought up the city's surplus of vehicles. Currently there are five police vehicles and only three officers, plus there is another city vehicle that is not in use. The city will look at selling two of the vehicles.

Russell resigns

The Lazbuddie School Board on Tuesday received the resignation of board member Clint Russell.

He had served on the board more than a year, said Supt. Karl Vaughn. It is too late to have a special election so the board will appoint a replacement.

In other business, the board:

- Approved two substitute teachers -- Shelly Ivy and Darla McBroom.

- Heard that a new state law mandates schools to reduce their electrical usage by 5 percent a year, starting this year.

Vaughn said the focus will be on: (1) buying energy-rated appliances; (2) using more efficient lighting; and (3) taking energy efficiency into account in purchases.

- Vaughn announced that Lazbuddie Schools have received a \$40,000 state grant for its 2005-2006 TAKS high results.

These funds will be used for stipends for teachers and staffers after taking into account future TAKS results.

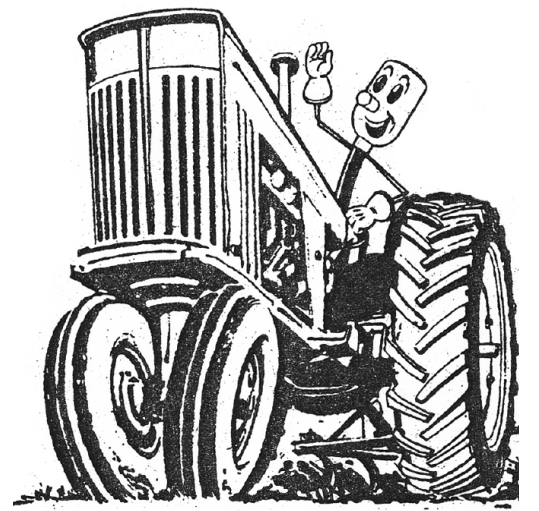

Dimmitt blanks Steers

The Farwell Steers lost to the Dimmitt Bobcats on Friday, 35-0.

Penalties by the Steers and big plays by Dimmitt sealed Farwell's fate. On the opening kickoff Jonathan Edwards had a nice 15 yard return but the offense was 3 and out. Dimmitt got the ball and promptly marched to the 2 yard line on runs of 40 and 13 yards.

At this point the Farwell defense made a good goal line stand with excellent tackles by Bryce Howard, Daniel Cantu and Logan Carpenter. However, on 3rd and goal from the 1 Dimmitt scored. The extra point was good and the score was 7-0 with 7:12 left in the 1st quarter.

Ramon Quezada returned the ensuing kickoff to midfield but the offense was called for holding and could not advance the ball. Aaron Warren registered a good tackle on the punt return. The Farwell defense then showed excellent strength, as Dimmitt was 3 and out. On 1st down, heavy pressure from Carpenter caused an incomplete pass. On 2nd

down Edwards and a host of Steers stuffed Dimmitt for a loss of 1. On 3rd down Max Bermea, Colby Read, and Roper Ledbetter stuffed the sweep for a loss of another yard.

The Steers offense took the field again and good runs by Edwards and Quezada yielded Farwell a first down. Two penalties in a row stalled the drive.

The 2nd quarter was full of penalty flags and neither offense was able to move the ball. Defensively, good plays were recorded by Danny Brown, Ledbetter, Carpenter and Miguel Ortega.

In the 2nd half, Dimmitt exploded for 4 TDs while the Steers couldn't move the ball and were hurt by penalties. The defense played tough but was hurt by big plays which were usually on 3rd down and long.

Throughout the second half good defensive plays were recorded by Mason Howard, Colton Christian,

Bo Mitchell and numerous others who have already been mentioned. The big hit of the night had to be by Ledbetter as he met a Bobcat right on the goal line and hit him so hard his helmet came off and they both ended up in the long jump sand pit.

Gruben reports county jail is operating well

"We've been so blessed. Everything is running great!"
Who would have thought Parmer County Chief Deputy Wayne Gruben would have been talking about a jail facility when he said this? Well folks, it's true.

In April 2004, the new Parmer County Jail opened for operation and, according to Gruben, has been going strong ever since.

The new jail was built with the hope of better accommodating the Parmer County law enforcement as well as the inmates of Parmer, Bailey, Curry, and even Roosevelt County. Today, that hope has become a reality.

The jail no longer holds just 18 inmates and only a few staff members. The maximum capacity is now for 48 inmates, and 41 of those spots are filled at the moment.

"It's split about 50/50 between Parmer and the other counties' inmates we hold," Gruben says. "They come from all over the area."

The inmates in the jail are most often put there for alcohol, drug, or theft-related crimes as well as other felonies and misdemeanors. There have been six inmates convicted of murder in other counties held in the Parmer County Jail.

"We get everything from minor traffic citations to major felonies," Gruben says. "It keeps us busy."

Ninety-nine percent of violators are eligible for bond, but if they aren't, an inmate will stay in jail, on average, 14-60 days. Each inmate is classified according to the nature of

his/her crime before they step foot in the jail so that hardened criminals are not put with minor traffic violators. Male and female inmates are also not allowed to be kept together.

During their jail time, inmates are given 20-minute visitations on Tues. and Sat. of every week. The time allotted was previously an hour, but because of the dramatic increase of inmates in the jail, the time had to be cut to allow everyone equal visitation.

So far, the inmates have not caused any major problems in the jail.

"Occasionally someone will get angry and do damage to their cell or something, but nothing too extreme," Gruben says.

The laundry room fire that happened last year when one of the dryers sparked flames has been the closest call to a jail disaster. Fortunately, the sprinkler system installed within each room of the jail worked perfectly and put out the fire quickly. No one was injured and the only thing destroyed was some of the laundry.

As of now, the staff at the Parmer County Jail

has corrected the many problems that the old jail had. Security is increased now with 10 jailers on staff plus extra supervisors to secure the safety of the inmates and the rest of the jail staff.

"We monitor everything," Gruben says. "Inmates are not allowed to work outside the facility, but we do have trustees that work out of their cells under strict supervision."

Everything is running smoothly at the jail, and the state has nothing but good things to say about the facility.

"We are inspected every year by the state, and they have never had any problems with the way we run things," Gruben says. "We've been very pleased with the way things are going."

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Cubans are enslaved

Fidel Castro's fan clubs of useful idiots in America have always insisted that Cuban communism is a success, pointing to the "spontaneous rallies" in Havana chanting Marxist slogans and to the "free elections" that periodically turn in almost unanimous support for Fidel.

These useful idiots don't seem to blush while they're ignoring that enslaved people throughout history have always found it healthier to kiss their masters' boots rather than to be crushed beneath them.

Useful idiots make movies like "Sicko" trumpeting a Cuba universal health care system that provides almost 600 doctors per 100,000 people, compared for example to Texas, with only about 212 doctors per 100,000 people.

These useful idiots don't care that Cuban doctors fail the most basic qualification tests in any other country and that Fidel himself has never used Cuban physicians; he's imported doctors from Europe for his own treatments. (Just because he's a tyrant doesn't mean that he's dumb!)

These same useful idiots ignore that Cuba's proclaimed low death rates come largely from the huge percentage of the people born in Cuba who don't ever get the chance to die in Cuba because they escaped (and continue escaping) to other countries since Fidel took over. That's one sure way to improve your mortality statistics!

Some useful idiots insist that the mean old USA's "crushing embargo" on Cuba all these years is what prevented communism there from achieving a heaven on earth (or whatever equivalent term that state-mandated atheism would use.)

In a quick summary of this embargo, Fidel's communism began by expropriating about 25 billion dollars worth of property and infrastructure investments in Cuba from foreign companies and countries like the U.S.

Pres. Eisenhower implemented a partial embargo in October 1960, expanded by President Kennedy in 1962 to include almost everything except food and medicine.

Every U.S. administration since then, Democrat

or Republican, has continued the embargo to one degree or another.

Through the years, Fidel Castro has used that embargo as the excuse for every problem he has inflicted on the island. Food rations were slashed and it was the embargo's fault. Harvest goals were not achieved and it was the embargo's fault. Cuban baseball players defected and it was the embargo's fault.

But that has never held water (for anyone except the useful idiots) because Fidel's communist utopia should have been celebrating its isolation from the poisonous influence of American capitalism, right?

It has been, after all, an American embargo, not a blockade from the rest of the world. Other countries can and do invest in Cuba and they always have.

These countries and their native companies have done so at their own risk, of course, because corruption and inefficiency flourishes in Cuba just like they've flourished in every other communist regime.

That's the reason that companies have regularly discontinued operations in Cuba, cut their losses, and just pulled out (like several companies from Europe did earlier this year.) But that has had nothing to do with the American embargo. Foreign-flagged ships that pull into Cuba may not call into an American seaport for six months after, only a minor inconvenience to maritime shipping, and one that has no effect on Cuba's trade with third countries either.

So the legendary "embargo" has become nothing to other countries, and truth be told, it is next to nothing in America anymore. Today, even with the embargo in place, the U.S. is Cuba's 5th largest trading partner. The U.S. is Cuba's biggest supplier of food. Cuba is the 8th largest consumer of American poultry products and the 11th biggest customer for American wheat. Out of all the nations in the world, Cuba is the 25th largest importer of American agricultural products. A country could get rich off an embargo like that if it handled it right!

Despite all this, the United Nations votes almost unanimously every year that the U.S. should lift its "punitive embargo." Fidel's useful idiots in America regularly wail about the inhumanity of it all, bemoaning the shame of the embargo. But it's all so much hot air.

If the embargo were lifted today, it would not bring prosperity or justice to the Cuban people them-

selves.

It would not give any huge boost to the American economy either because really, how much more agricultural products can Cuba absorb? In fact, lifting the embargo would really have only three significant effects right off the bat that I can see.

First, it would be the U.S. freely giving a virtual endorsement and granting a more polished prestige to a Cuban dictatorship. The theft of billions of dollars from honest businesses and free countries would just be written off, rewarding the theft and corruption of a brutal communist regime. American taxpayers would be boosting the economy to at least some degree of an evil bureaucracy that brutalizes its own people.

Second and in the same stroke, a Cuban communism that has refused for decades to adopt the democratic principals and human rights of the civilized world even slightly will have been rewarded for that by the U.S. Every other dictatorship and corrupt government in the world will look at that and take heart, saying that if it works for Cuba, it will work for them. Evil will have won a point, and the United Nations will soil its diapers in joy.

Finally, it will have made a lot of useful idiots in America very happy. Morning talk shows on television will burst a dam of pent-up Marxist sympathies, and American homes and coffee shops will be flooded day after day with the pronouncements on global justice and harmony from every useful idiot in the nation.

As frail as the embargo is today, it really ought to stay in place until the happy day that Cubans will find their feet, get a real democracy, and finally breathe freedom again. And at the same time, Americans can avoid having the milk in their first cup of coffee curdled by even more useful idiots jostling to get on the morning talk shows.

Booster club has fund-raiser

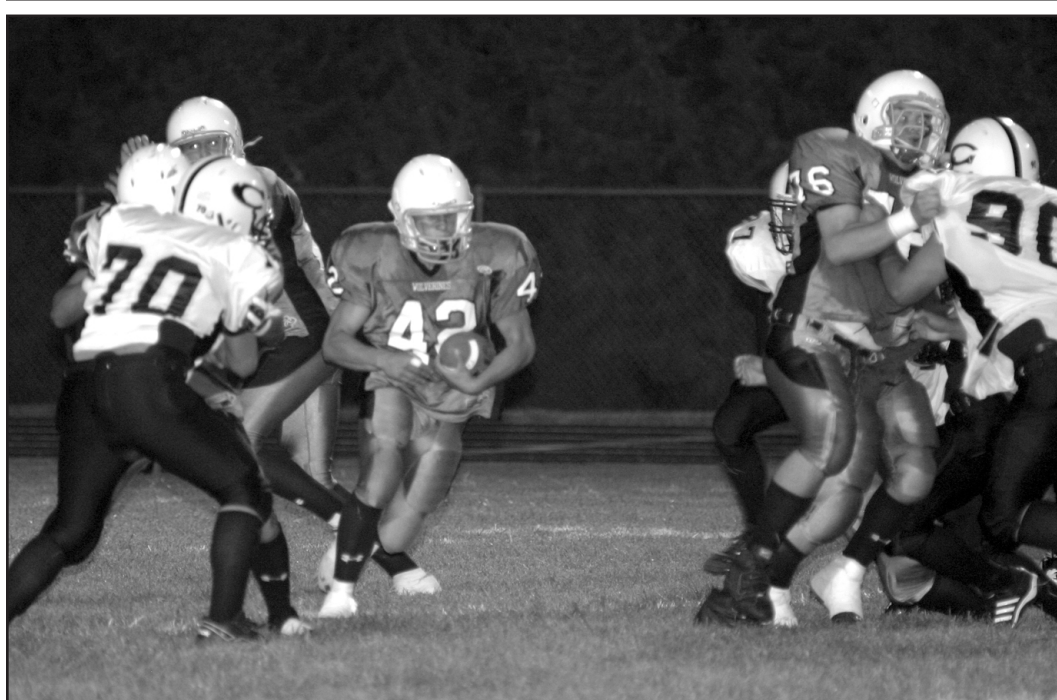
The Texico Booster Club is having a fund-raiser called "\$1,000 Board Bucks."

Here's how it works: Each of 100 squares can be purchased for the dollar amount printed in the square, such as the square with "47" would cost \$47.

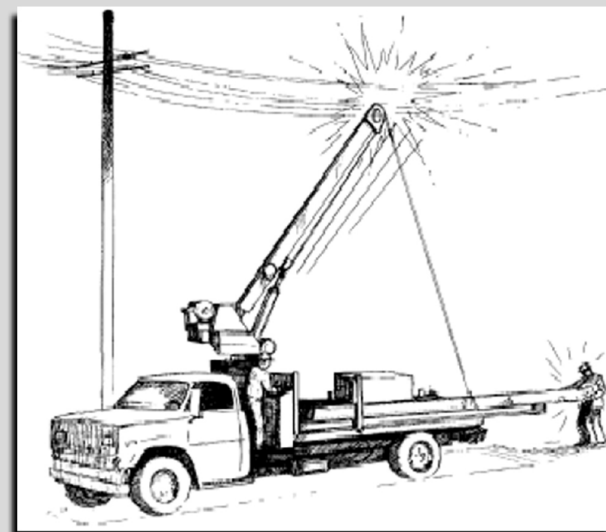

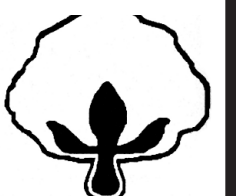

plus. Here are their comments:

Kirk Frye (Pct. 1, Friona area) -- He stressed that "revenue is increasing, not the tax rate." He said the current surplus gives Parmer County nine months of reserves, which is important if something went wrong.

Michael Haseloff (Pct. 3, Farwell area) -- He said "no comment."

Elvis Powell (Pct. 4, Lazbuddie area) -- He said the commissioners kept the tax rate the same as last year. He said they didn't want to decrease the tax rate, then have to jack it up later to make up for any losses.

James Clayton (Pct. 2, Bovina area) -- He said dairies are helping the revenue picture and the county's reserve.

Jack Kirkland, of the CPA firm, added that his advice to the commissioners was not to lower taxes because the county has needs, such as a complete upgrade of its computers, that should be addressed.

County Judge Bonnie Heald had looked into paying off the debt service early on the new jail, but found that legally they can only pay off \$10,000 a year extra starting in 2013.

A precinct by precinct breakdown can be found on Page 13. Precincts are: Pct. 1, Friona area; Pct. 2, Bovina area; Pct. 3, Farwell area; and Pct. 4, Lazbuddie area.

Total assets for Parmer County are \$11,301,687. Total liabilities (including debt service on the jail) are \$3,688,119.

For the year, net assets increased \$952,858. This comes from cash on hand, taxes receivable, property, plant, equipment, what the county owns and funds that are due in.

In other business, the commissioners:

-- Okayed buying a high speed scanner for the county clerk's office to assist in counting ballots cast during an election.

-- Allowed Lazbuddie School to participate in a joint election with the county on Nov. 6 for its rollback election.

-- Rescheduled three meetings due to holidays: From Oct. 8 to Oct. 11; from Nov. 12 to Nov. 13; and from Dec. 24 to Dec. 19.

A bit of history

As most old-timers around here know, Farwell became the county seat in 1907 in a vote that some felt was questionable at best.

Well, I've always accepted the controversy to be the final decision since the State Line Tribune has no records available before 1940.

The story I was told that a youth in 1940 was told to burn some papers ... and managed to burn all the Tribune copies prior to 1940. Thus, no records.

So it fascinated me when I was perusing the centennial edition put out by the Clovis paper last month when I found a story about Parmer County on Page 1 of the Dec. 4, 1928, issue.

The story was headlined "Farwell Keeps County Seat."

The story said: "Farwell retains the county seat of Parmer County following last Thursday's election in which the question of removal of the county seat to Friona was submitted to the people.

"Texas laws provide that in such cases the plan to change must be carried by a two-third majority, and the election failed.

"In the vote, the plan to change received 623 votes, while the vote for Farwell was 627."

Here's a breakdown on the vote to keep Farwell as the county seat:

Farwell - For the change to Friona, 1; against 324.

Oklahoma Lane -- For, 17; against, 119.

Raga -- For, 43; against, 7.

Black -- For, 90; against, 0.

Friona -- For, 380; against, 9.

Bovina - -For, 40, against, 133.

Star Ranch -- For, 52; against, 33.

I wonder where "Raga" was. Should it have read "Rhea"? Dunno.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 2007

PROPOSITION 1 (HJR 103)

HJR 103 would update the constitutional reference to Angelo State University to conform with the statutory transfer of that institution from membership in the Texas State University System to membership in the Texas Tech University System.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the continuation of the constitutional appropriation for facilities and other capital items at Angelo State University on a change in the governance of the university."

PROPOSITION 2 (SJR 57)

SJR 57 would authorize the legislature to permit the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to issue up to \$500 million in general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to college and university students, and to enter into bond enhancement agreements.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of \$500 million in general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students and authorizing bond enhancement agreements with respect to general obligation bonds issued for that purpose."

PROPOSITION 3 (HJR 40)

HJR 40 would authorize the legislature to limit the maximum appraised value of a residence homestead for property tax purposes in a tax year to the lesser of the most recent appraisal valuation, or 110 percent, or a greater percentage as determined by the legislature, of the appraised value in the preceding tax year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide that the maximum appraised value of a residence homestead for ad valorem taxation is limited to the lesser of the most recent market value of the residence homestead as determined by the appraisal entity or 110 percent, or a greater percentage, of the appraised value of the residence homestead for the preceding tax year."

PROPOSITION 4 (SJR 65)

SJR 65 would authorize the legislature to permit the Texas Public Finance Authority to issue up to \$1 billion in general obligation

bonds, the proceeds of which would be dedicated to maintenance, construction, repairs, and equipment purchases, as authorized by the legislature for the following state agencies: the Texas Building and Procurement Commission; the Parks and Wildlife Department; the Department of the Adjutant General; the Department of State Health Services; the Department of Aging and Disability Services; the Texas School for the Blind and Visually Impaired; the Texas Youth Commission; the Texas Historical Commission; the Texas Department of Criminal Justice; the Texas School for the Deaf; and the Texas Department of Public Safety.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of up to \$1 billion in bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for maintenance, improvement, repair, and construction projects and for the purchase of needed equipment."

PROPOSITION 5 (SJR 44)

SJR 44 would authorize the legislature to permit cities with a population of less than 10,000 to hold an election to allow the city to enter into an agreement with a property owner to temporarily freeze taxes on property either in or adjacent to an area approved for funding under the Downtown Revitalization Program or the Main Streets Improvements Program administered by the Department of Agriculture.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit the voters of a municipality having a population of less than 10,000 to authorize the governing body of the municipality to enter into an agreement with an owner of real property in or adjacent to an area in the municipality that has been approved for funding under certain programs administered by the Texas Department of Agriculture under which the parties agree that all ad valorem taxes imposed on the owner's property may not be increased for the first five tax years after the tax year in which the agreement is entered into."

PROPOSITION 6 (HJR 54)

HJR 54 would authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem tax one motor vehicle owned by an individual that is used by the individual for both business and personal use.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional

amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation one motor vehicle owned by an individual and used in the course of the owner's occupation or profession and also for personal activities of the owner."

PROPOSITION 7 (HJR 30)

HJR 30 would allow a governmental entity to sell property acquired through eminent domain to its immediately previous owner at the original purchase price, if the public use of the property has been canceled, if no progress is made toward that public use by a prescribed deadline, or if the property is unnecessary to accomplish that public use.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow governmental entities to sell property acquired through eminent domain back to the previous owners at the price the entities paid to acquire the property."

PROPOSITION 8 (HJR 72)

HJR 72 would clarify home equity loan procedures and protections and make conforming changes to the written disclosure provided to the borrower at the loan closing. The amendment would establish that the status of whether property is an agricultural homestead for the purpose of receiving homestead protection, would be determined by whether it was designated for agricultural use on the date of the loan closing. The amendment would provide that a declared state of emergency (e.g., following a natural disaster) would justify execution of a second home equity loan on the same property less than one year after the first home equity loan. It would provide that non-substantive omissions on a loan application would not affect the agreement. It would require a borrower to receive a copy of all executed loan documents, and a disclosure list of fees and costs at closing. It would prohibit the use of preprinted checks for the use of unsolicited loan advances to obtain a home equity line of credit.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to clarify certain provisions relating to the making of a home equity loan and use of home equity loan proceeds."

PROPOSITION 9 (SJR 29)

SJR 29 would authorize the legislature to exempt all or part of the market value of the residence homesteads of veterans certified as having a service-connected 100 percent

disability rating. SJR 29 would also clarify the progression of property tax exemptions available to veterans who are less than 100 percent disabled.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt all or part of the residence homesteads of certain totally disabled veterans from ad valorem taxation and authorizing a change in the manner of determining the amount of the existing exemption from ad valorem taxation to which a disabled veteran is entitled."

PROPOSITION 10 (HJR 69)

HJR 69 would remove constitutional references to the former office of inspector of hides and animals.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to abolish the constitutional authority for the office of inspector of hides and animals."

PROPOSITION 11 (HJR 19)

HJR 19 would require a vote taken in either house of the legislature to be recorded by record vote, if the vote was on final passage of a bill, other than local bills, a resolution proposing a constitutional amendment, or any other resolution that is not purely ceremonial. The record vote must be archived and available for public viewing on the Internet for at least two years.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to require that a record vote be taken by a house of the legislature on final passage of any bill, other than certain local bills, of a resolution proposing or ratifying a constitutional amendment, and to provide for public access on the Internet to those record votes."

PROPOSITION 12 (SJR 64)

SJR 64 would authorize the Texas Transportation Commission to issue up to \$5 billion in general obligation bonds for highway improvement projects, the proceeds of which will be used to pay for projects, costs, and payments owed under related credit agreements.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds by the Texas Transportation Commission in an amount not to exceed \$5 billion to provide funding for highway improvement projects."

PROPOSITION 13 (HJR 6)

HJR 6 would authorize the denial of bail to a person who violates conditions of release

in a family violence case and permit the legislature to authorize the denial of bail to a person who violates certain court orders in a family violence case.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the denial of bail to a person who violates certain court orders or conditions of release in a felony or family violence case."

PROPOSITION 14 (HJR 36)

HJR 36 would limit a state justice or judge's service to December 31st of the fourth year of the term if he/she is elected to all or part of a six year term, and reaches mandatory retirement age during the first four years of said term.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment permitting a justice or judge who reaches the mandatory retirement age while in office to serve the remainder of the justice's or judge's current term."

PROPOSITION 15 (HJR 90)

HJR 90 would require the legislature to establish the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas, and would provide for its management, duties, and powers. It would authorize the issuance of up to \$3 billion in general obligation bonds to be used for operations and grants for the purpose of scientific research of all forms of human cancer.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment requiring the creation of the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas and authorizing the issuance of up to \$3 billion in bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for research in Texas to find the causes of and cures for cancer."

PROPOSITION 16 (SJR 20)

SJR 20 would authorize the issuance of up to \$250 million in general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board to provide financial assistance to economically distressed areas of the state to help provide adequate sewer and water supply services for residential use.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$250 million to provide assistance to economically distressed areas."

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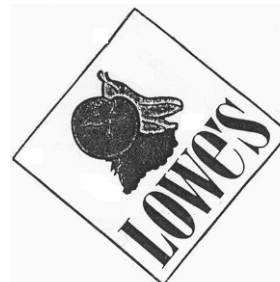
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
