In UIL, he competed in science, computer science and number sense. He has been Academic All-State in football and basketball.




Texico Athletic Honors

Wolverines are State runner-up

The Texico Wolverines are state runner-up in baseball after losing to Loving in the state Class 1A-2A championship game in Albuquerque on Saturday, a crop year as many counties have seen in a long

Texico finished the season with a superlative 17-5-1 record.

The best chance for the Wolverines to score big was in the 5th inning when Seth Bailey hit a long ball that went foul with two runners on.

Meanwhile, Loving scored in the 1st, 3rd, 4th and 6th innings.

The Wolverines managed 4 hits off Loving's Leo Gonzalez: singles by Jonathan Hill, Anderson, Bailey and Jose Posada.

The Wolverines won their state semi-final over No. 1 ranked Eunice, 4-3, on Friday.

Brantley: Parmer County dryland values will increase significantly

From Curby Brantley, Parmer County Appraiser Each year, Parmer County Appraisal District is required to send out Appraisal Notices of Value.

The notices for 2009 will soon be mailed. The only significant changes that will be noticed are in ag values of dry cropland and some homes.

Certain homes in our District will see changes in value due to having central heat and air, fireplaces, and certain roof coverings. This should be the only change in home values unless you have added on to or changed the home.

Agricultural dry land values will increase very significantly due to the drastic increase in 2007 yields.

Irrigated land values will show a slight increase. The values for land are figured on a 5-year average by dropping a year and adding a year and bringing the value forward. This year we drop the 2002 year, which was not a very good year, and add the 2007 year, which was a great crop year. 2007 was as good

By losing a bad year and gaining a good year our net to land average has drastically increased. The calculation that is used is developed by the State Comptroller's office and is used statewide. Chief appraisers have very little leeway in determining productivity values.

The Texas Property Tax Code Chapter 23, Brett Anderson pitchd a complete game, allowing Subchapter D sets out the method for determining productivity values for land. A copy of that law can be obtained from the Appraisal District







- ODD addresses water only on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. **EVEN** addresses water only on Wednesday, Friday and Sunday.



Memorial Day's history

Americans came to realize the Civil War was the most devastating event in the history of the United States. It is estimated some 620,000 Americans were killed. Nearly everyone in the country had known someone that was killed during the war. While the Union side came to be known as the victor, both sides came away feeling devastated.

Memorial Day was originally conceived as a day to memorialize the solidiers who lost their lives in the Civil War. It was first called "Decoration Day", in reference the decorations that were laid on tombstones, and hung from buildings.

The earliest known evidence of such observance goes back to various women's auxillary groups in the North and South, when ladies organized events to honor their war dead by decorating graves. The earliest recorded event took place on April 25, 1866 in Columbus, Mississippi when a group of women formed an association to decorate the graves of civil war soldiers, starting with those who died in the Battle of Shiloh.


President Lyndon Johnson issued a proclaimation in 1966 naming Waterloo, New York to be the official pirthplace of Memorial Day, despite almost 30 towns claiming the right.

The origins of Waterloo being the birthplace of Memorial day goes back to Henry C. Welles, a town druggist, who apparently conceived the idea in the summer of 1865 by mentioning it to a friend. Sometime later, he mentioned it again to General John B. Murray, a civil war hero, and plans were finally put in place to organize an event, which was held on May 5, 1866. A similar event was held again a year later on May 5, 1867.

On May 5, 1868, General John A. Logan, the first commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, proclaimed May 30, 1868 as the official day for decorating the graves of civil war dead. Why Logan chose May 30th as the official day is interesting, since the prior Decoration days in Waterloo were held on May 5, and the earlier Decoration event in Carbondale was on April 29. A possible explanation to this goes back to a french emigrant woman named Cassandra Oliver Moncure, who in 1866 organized a Decoration event in Virginia and picked May 30th. She explained that May 30th is the "Day of Ashes" when Napoleon's ashes were returned to France from St. Helena.

By the end of the 19th Century, cities all over the country were celebrating Decoration Day on May 30. In 1971, Congress and the President passed a law that coined the name, "Memorial Day" and marked the last Monday in May as the official day.


Water levels drop again

Annual depth-to-water level measurements made in early 2009 by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in Lubbock show an average decline of -1.18 feet in the groundwater levels of the Ogallala aquifer during 2008 within the district's 6.8 million acre service area.

In comparison, the 2008 depth-to-water level measurements previously indicated an average decline of -0.20 of a foot during 2007.

The district 10-year average annual change rose from -0.82 of a foot for the 2007 report to -0.72 of a foot for the current report. The district five-year average annual change declined from -0.46 of a foot for the 2007 report to -0.42 of a foot for the current

Depth-to-water level measurements indicated an average annual decline of more than two feet in Castro, Hale, Lamb, and Parmer Counties.

National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP)

The National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) is often called the "Nation's Report Card" because it allows the comparison of student performance across states and for the nation as a whole. NAEP does not replace the Standards Based Assessment (SBA) that students take every year, which measures student performance according to New Mexico curriculum standards. All students in New Mexico are required to take the SBA, while the NAEP selects representative samples of students. The sampling method does not allow for reporting results by district, much like a political poll does not sample and report by neighborhood. NAEP assessments have been given in subjects such as reading, mathematics, science, writing, U.S. history, geography, the arts, and others. Reading and mathematics are assessed every two years at grades 4 and 8. Science is assessed every four years. Results presented here are from 2007 (reading and mathematics), and from 2005 (science)

State Assessment Results for District (excluding charter schools)

Students in New Mexico schools are assessed in Reading, Mathematics and Science in the 3rd through 8th and 11th grade by the Standards Based Assessment (SBA) and the NM Alternative Proficiency Assessment (NMAPA) for Students with Disabilities. These assessments were developed to measure the NM Standards and Benchmarks that educators and the public determined are important for our students to know and be able to do. The assessment results reported are for ALL students enrolled and participating in the testing during the 2007-08 school year. The assessments were administered during March 2008.
