Highlights of the Day included:

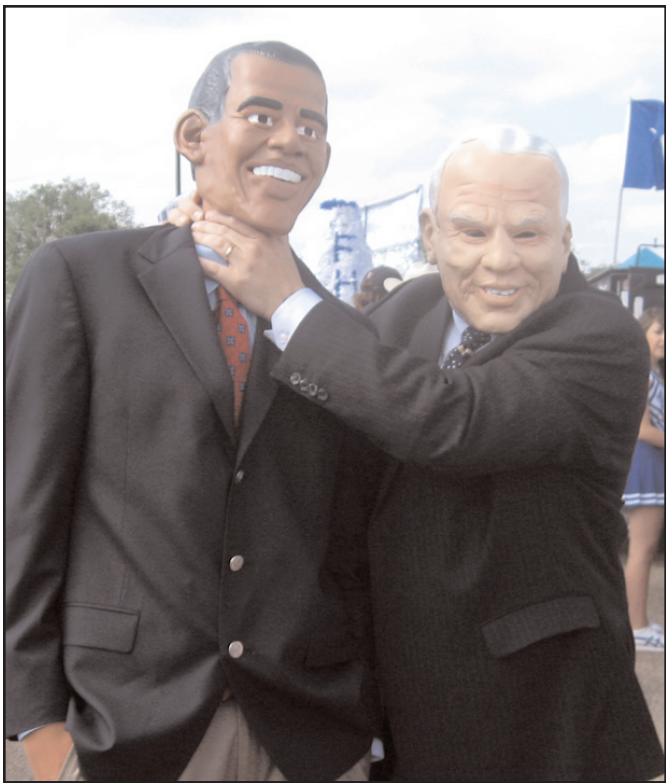
Floats -- The parade's theme was "Tribute to Education." Cash prize winners were:

Antique Vehicles -- Winners of the \$25 cash prizes in this category were: Oldest, Chad County 4-H, 4th, \$25.

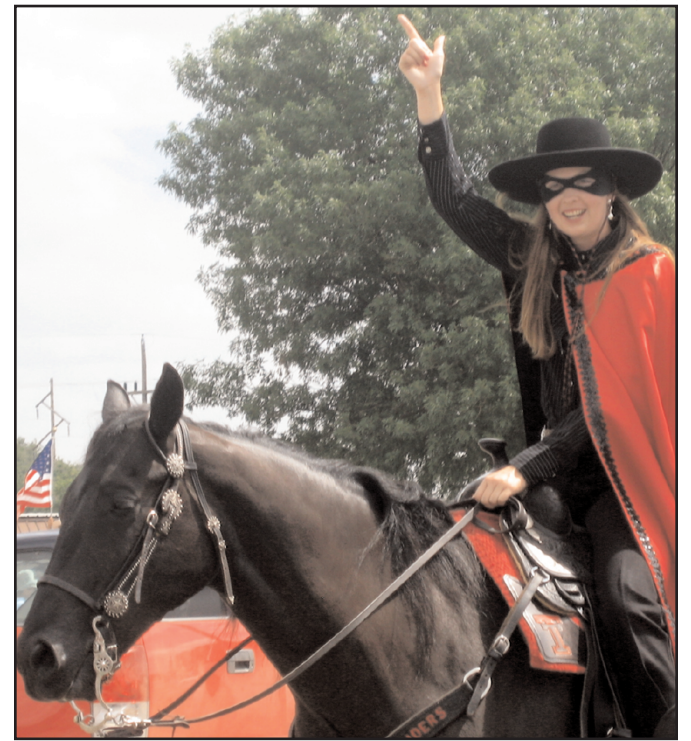

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

This article is a means for the board of Muleshoe Area Hospital District (MAHD) to report to the citizens of our district. It is designed to be informative and thought-provoking. In return, we need feedback from you about your hospital and your nursing home.

MAHD has several exciting things in the works. The most exciting is the board we currently have. We are a united team whose goal it is to serve the district to the best of our ability. Through examining our district's current issues and future needs, we have made a strategic plan for the future.

First, a little background: MAHD is a taxing entity that operates two facilities: Muleshoe Area Medical Center and Park View Nursing Home. It is a challenge to manage two facilities under one organization and one taxing base.

Over the past year, under Ronnie Dent's leadership, we separated the two entities to make each easier to manage financially, at the suggestion of our auditors. This has created more accountability within each facility and has allowed us to get a more accurate picture of each facility's financial standing and operational feasibility.

In doing this, we broke down the tax base of .40 into three categories: debt service (Park View bond payments), nursing home operating, and hospital operating. This allowed us to take the debt rate off the top for the bonds and allocate the balance of the tax base to the operating of both facilities. This was accomplished through budgeting for each facility.

With that said, it is then up to each administrator to function on their allocated operating tax base.

Services for Pam Bernier, 51, of Farwell, were held July 25 at Steed-Todd Funeral Home in Clovis. She died July 23 at

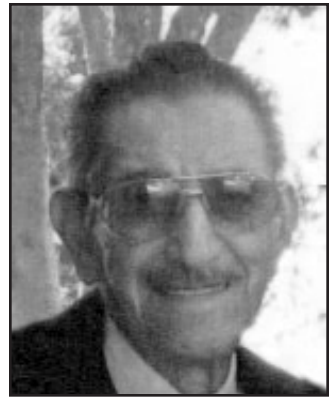
Amarillo. She was born Oct. 31, 1956, in Lake View, Calif., to Clem and Henny Bernier.

When this oil price bubble breaks, we are going to find some very criminal behavior by energy traders, oil companies etc. Because of the declining production from mature oil fields and the increase in demand from Asia, this lends itself to a situation where the energy traders can artificially raise the price of crude.

We bear the brunt of this because we are paying much higher gasoline prices than is justified by the demand/supply position. This is the same thing that happened during the recent housing bubble. The traders were buying and flipping houses into a demand situation that finally cooled dramatically.

The same is happening now. Traders are buying gas and selling it the next moment to another trader. The oil never gets delivered until several traders have bid it up and then it is sold on the market to the entity that eventually gets it to the consumer.

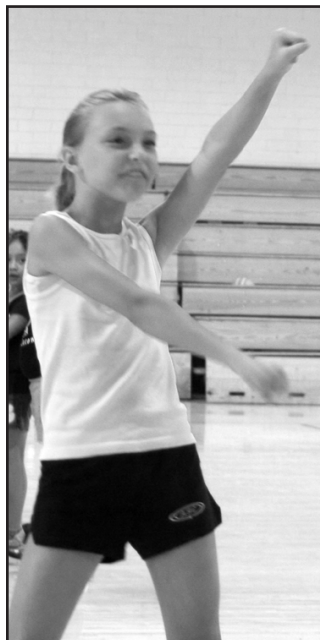
The best way to break this up is to change the rules to prevent this type of abuse of the consumer. We should eliminate the trading of oil futures. We would soon see \$1.50 per gallon gasoline.

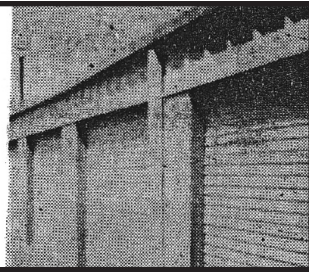

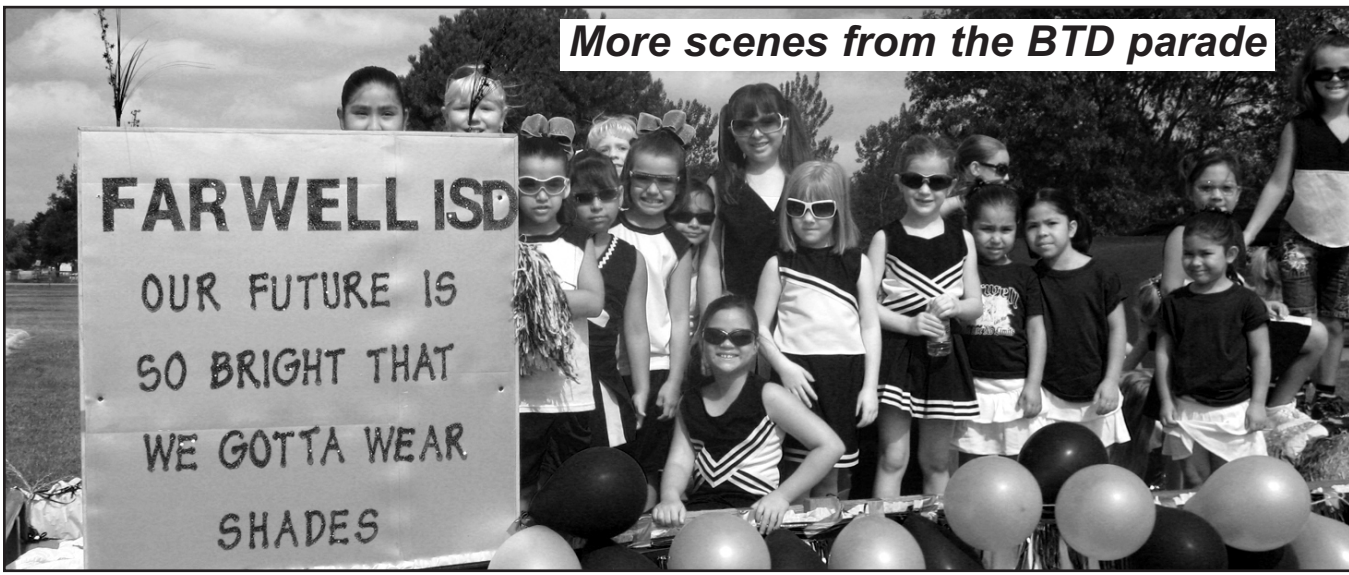

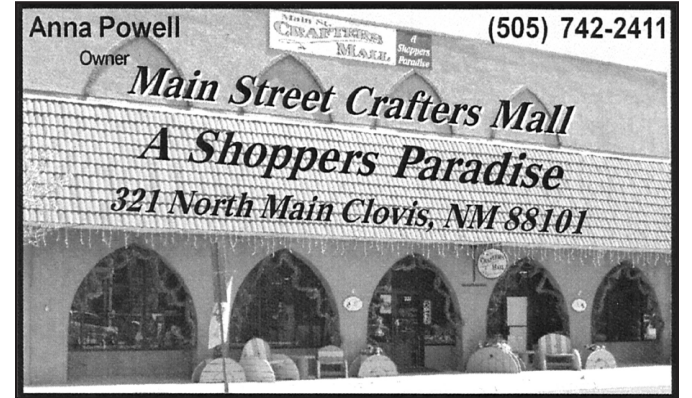
The 2008 Parmer County Stock Show Dinner is set for Aug. 23 at 7 p.m. at the Farwell Community Center.

About 1,100 persons attended the special event, with the gym dedicated with many enlarged photos of school groups from the 1940s to the present. It was professionally decorated.

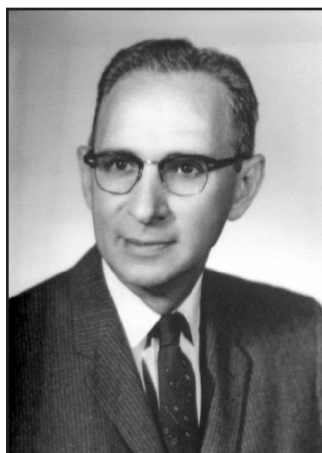

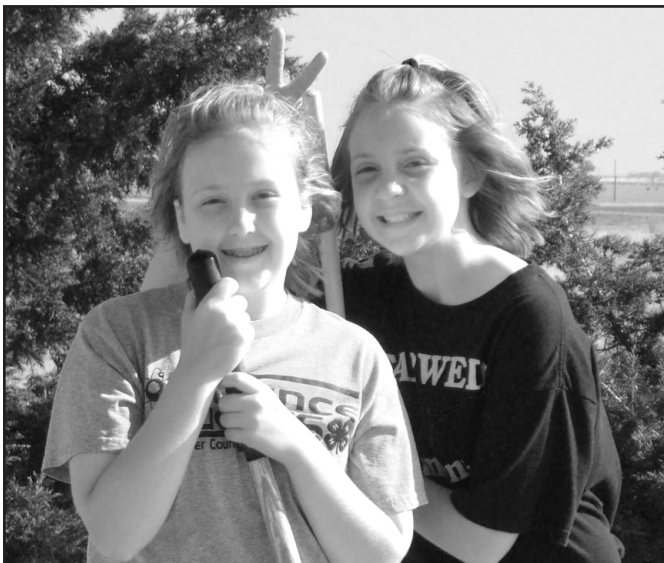

LIVE CATTLE: Live Cattle prices came under pressure as cash traded between \$94-95 and surprised many traders. The market held together fairly well early this week, but there are still some concerns that cash will only trade steady again this week. The market should trade back higher into early August followed by another decline into late August. This is a strong seasonal tendency support primarily by back to school buying in the meat.

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeders also took a hit this week along with Live Cattle prices. Although most of the livestock markets have continued to hold long term support levels, some of these levels are currently being tested and must hold. Most long term charts are turning down at this time, but traders remain hopeful that a rally into August could provide some better selling opportunities..

CORN: Corn prices have turned short term trends back higher over the near term. The December contract will need to see a close above the \$6.08 level in order to trade back into the \$6.25-6.50 area. All long term trends turned down when the December contract closed below the \$7.35 level and has remained down. Again, traders are hopeful that rallies could give hedgers another opportunity to sell at a higher level. Weather will remain a concern, but Funds may have less impact.

SOYBEANS: Soybean prices have continued to move lower alongside the corn. Long term trends are now pointing lower for the time being. Similar to corn and wheat, prices should or could rally over the near term, but odds are good that traders will continue to sell these rallies.

WHEAT: Wheat prices have remained somewhat stronger than the rest of the grain complex, but not immune to price declines along with the rest of the grain complex. Short term trends have also turned higher for the near term. Targets above lie around the \$8.50 level basis the September KC contract. Once again, long term trends are down over the near term.

COTTON: Cotton prices had done a reasonable job of holding support levels while the grain complex has basically collapsed. Prices were able to test short term resistance levels this week, but have been unable to penetrate these levels. Resistance remains around \$75.25 basis the December contract. A close above this level should translate into a fairly good rally? Nothing in the news for support.

Gas grilling tips

What to do if you smell gas

If you think you smell propane in your home, camper, RV or the area around any gas equipment, or if a gas alarm signals the presence of propane, you should IMMEDIATELY follow these suggestions:

- Extinguish all smoking materials and any other open flames or sources of ignition.
- Everyone should vacate the building, vehicle or area.
- Move away without using any electric switches, appliances, thermostats, or telephones.
- Close the gas shutoff valve on the propane tank or cylinder.

- Call your propane supplier and/or your local fire department from a cellular telephone or a neighbor's telephone.
- Even if you do not continue to smell propane, do not open or turn on the propane supply valve. Do not re-enter the building, vehicle or area. Let a qualified propane service technician and/or emergency personnel check for escaped propane.
- Have a properly trained propane service technician repair the leak. The propane service technician or emergency responder needs to determine that the leak situation has been fully resolved. The propane service technician should check all of your gas appliances and re-light any appliance pilots.
- Return to the building, camper, RV or area only when the service or emergency technician indicates it is safe to do so.

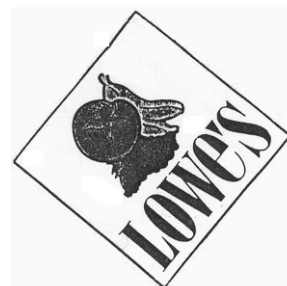
