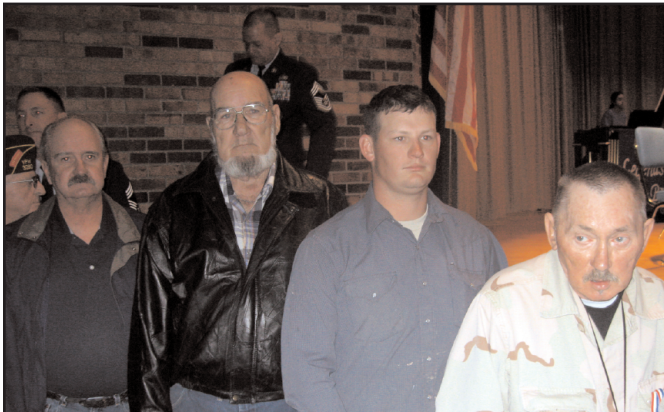

The sailor homeward bound

I have come to believe that every American should get the chance to live for at least one year in Miami.

The best part is meeting people from all over the world. Every day, you meet another person who's here because they LOVE the U.S. enough to have risked everything, some even their and their family's lives, to have gotten here.

One woman I met began trying to get into the U.S. from Cuba in 1960, just after Fidel Castro took over. She managed to get to Venezuela, and then it took her another 27 years, striving month in and month out, to receive an American visa.

Think about what 27 years means in anyone's lifetime, chasing one goal. When she got that visa and finally landed in the Miami terminal, she got on her knees and kissed the floor, literally. When she sings "God Bless America," to this day, the tears pooling in her eyes come from the depth of her soul.

One very good friend in Miami had been a Venezuelan Navy captain, the son and grandson of Venezuelan admirals, whose family had prospered in Caracas since the days of the

Conquistadors.

But the values of God and country are being attacked by the dictator in Venezuela by their leader Hugo Chavez. Being a man of honor, forced to choose between his principles and his own safety, he chose his principles. The captain said he read his Scripture and the question that hit him, "Who shall I try to please, man or God" seemed to be written just for him.

He chose to try to please God, despite the threats of his senior officers, and would not join the Chavez party. And late one night he got a phone call, his father urgently telling him that the Chavez goon-squad was on the way to his house, he had to get out, and get to the airport. His father had purchased the service of a small plane to get him to a Caribbean island.

The captain threw some clothes in his sea-bag, slipped out the backdoor into the night, and threaded his way through the alleys to reach the airport. He got to Miami the following month, leaving all that he had possessed behind. When the captain says he loves America, he says it with authority and faith and integrity.

A neighbor and I shared putting up Christmas lights each year. He was from an old family in Croatia, threatened by the growing surge of Islamic terrorism in Europe. He and his wife filled their home here with crosses and other Christian devotions. They told me it was gratitude for their Lord delivering them to this country. When they

say they love America, it's with all their heart.

The gardener who cuts grass for the many retirees on our street originally came from Haiti to escape all its violence. He and his family began each day in Haiti with a prayer that they would all be alive that night for the family devotions.

Then the chance came to escape. They sold everything they owned to purchase passage on a smuggler boat late that night they kissed their parents and brothers and sisters goodbye, knowing they would never see them again. They took their infant and joined other Haitian families, boarding a wooden fishing boat that was dangerous to take to sea with just the crew, much less dozens of passengers.

Two weeks later, they came ashore near Fort Lauderdale in the surf as they paddled with their baby aloft through the night from the boat on inner tubes. The police detained them since they were illegals and the judicial process took months, but he got his Green Card.

Cutting yards and tending gardens, he makes more in a day than he could in a month in Haiti, His house is simple but secure, and he feels as if God has granted his family a taste of Heaven on this side of the Jordan. When that family prays over dinner each night and they thank God for the blessings of that day, it is much more than just words.

This week, as I was about 14th in line at the post office to mail a package to my wife (now in Farwell!), an elderly

gentleman got his turn at the counter and no post office employee there just then could speak Spanish with him (which almost never happens in Miami!)

The post office employee announced, "Can someone help me here?" and everyone in the line rushed up to translate. His transaction was taken care of in a few minutes, mailing something back to his family in Mexico, but before he left he turned to our line and in his best English said simply, "Thank you, I love Americans." And you could see in his face, he meant it.

I could write pages and pages about my new friends here, filled with stories like this, and every one of them brings tears to my eyes. These people love this country; they risked it all to get here. They often seem to feel the spirit of this nation more dearly than people who lived here all their lives.

Which is the gift they

give me as I come back to Texico-Farwell. Many of you know that I am finally coming home after 36 years. And as I look on those streets and those fields in the years to come, at least part of me will see them through the eyes of people who would have given everything, even risked their lives, to be there themselves.

The Navy tells me that I can hoist my sea-bag ashore on Jan. 31, and I'm on the road home. As the old sea chanty goes, the farmer's heart is filled with joy when his crops spring from the ground, but who can know the happiness of the sailor homeward bound?

You cannot imagine.

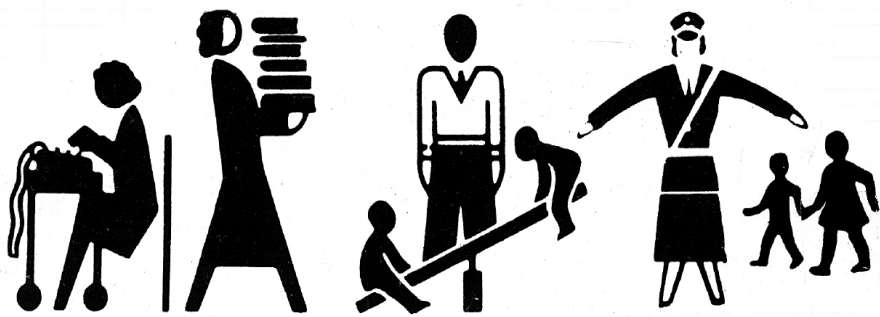

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

For the past five years, I have helped sponsor purchasing "Sweat Suits for Seniors."

Soon I will be asking donations from local businesses; and if local residents would like to help they can call me and I will let them know what they can purchase to help out on the is wonderful project. I can be contacted at (806) 251-1385 or (575) 693-2506.

This year, we will be sponsoring three nursing homes.

If anyone would like to give a monetary donation or donate a sweat suit, medium is the most popular size of sweat suits we purchase.

Here's some background on our project:

About 11 years ago, we placed our grandmother in a nursing home. She was so loved that all our family would bring her lotion, tissue, snacks, night gowns, socks, etc., which would eventually overflow her small closet and dresser, forcing the staff to ask us to remove many of her clothing items.

We did not have a need for these items, so I asked if anyone could use the extra clothing. I was told there were many people who lived in the home who were not as fortunate as my little grandma (that was what we called her), who had so many loved ones to visit as well as the gifts that were brought to her. The staff would be more than happy to distribute her clothing to other residents who were in need.

I learned during the time that sweat suits were the perfect outfit for her. Because of her stroke, she was not able to walk or stand alone so she used a wheel chair. The sweat suits kept her warm.

Also, she was able to maneuver her wheel chair with her one good leg and not have to worry about a blanket getting caught up in the wheels. The clothing needs no special care and if they need to be replaced, they are not expensive.

A few years after her death, God placed a mission on my heart to continue to help others. In December 2003, the employees of Cummins Natural Gas Engines donates enough money to give every resident a sweat suit for Christmas. We included a Christmas picture for each resident that was colored by my daughter's elementary school and hand delivered the presents to the home in late December.

Over the years we have had many fundraisers, including raffles, burrito sales, bake sales, and individual donations to earn enough to help more than 80 residents each year. We have an even bigger challenge this year.

United Methodist Church of Bovina has asked to help for a second year and Farwell 4-H has also volunteered to help support the Farwell Convalescent Center this year. This will be our second year to support both Clovis and Friona. This will be our first year to support Farwell. This is a huge challenge, but I know we will be blessed and together we can accomplish this great feat.

Please remember this is not only about giving from your wallet, but more importantly about giving from your heart. This visit from the children and volunteers who help deliver the gifts may be the only visit some residents receive all year long.

Powell expands on 9-1-1 vote

Elvis Powell, the county commissioner from the Lazbuddie area, stopped by the Tribune this week to give more information on the emergency 9-1-1 controversy.

Last month, the Parmer County Commissioners voted 3-1 (Kirk Frye, Friona area) to move the 9-1-1 system from the Friona police department to the county sheriff's office in Farwell.

But in order for that to be done, the city councils of Friona, Bovina and Farwell have to agree with it.

Powell emphasized that it is not just Lazbuddie supporting this move; that Bovina and Farwell both voted in 2006 for it, too.

"I would like to put the 9-1-1 system at the jail which belongs to the whole county, not just a city," said Powell.

He also announced that the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission will be funding new 9-1-1 equipment for Parmer County soon.

Longhorns playoff chances dashed

Farwell's Jon Beaubien recently competed in the Texas Undergraduate Moot Court Association competition in Fort Worth.

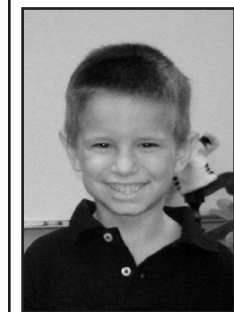
The Howard Payne University team of Beaubien and partner Jennifer Middleton competed against 41 teams from across the state and progressed to the quarterfinals.

This is a late report from the New Mexico State Police (an earlier story is on Page 12):

Agents with the State Police Investigations Bureau and Crime Scene Team are processing evidence, gathering information and continuing their investigation into the Saturday pursuit of a Clovis man through Curry and Parmer counties.

Thus far, investigators have determined that near State Road 108, Parmer County Deputy Steve Bartley fired shots in an attempt to disable or stop Jawayne Helfferich's Explorer.

Should Texico stay in Ute project?

At Monday's Texico City Council meeting, Fire Chief Lewis Cooper, Texico's representative to the Ute Water Project, brought the proposed legislation to set up a water authority. The legislation formalizes the project and is necessary to secure the state and federal funding needed.

This is also the last chance for Texico to leave the project.

The council went over the fine print with City Attorney Ty Rutter, and came up with a couple of questions they want answers to before they sign off on the paperwork.

The legislation calls for a board of seven members. Four are from Clovis, two from Portales and one position would rotate between the other entities -- Texico, Melrose, Elida, Grady and Curry County.

Councilman Oran Jay Autrey said Texico would only get a say in the proceedings when the last seat rotated to a local member every five years.

He asked Cooper to see if they could make the board 11 people, one from each of the smaller communities and then Clovis and Portales. He said if the small towns saw a need, they could work together to get changes made.

Clovis will use over half of the water that is

brought down, and it will be distributed through the New Mexico Water Authority, the company that currently handles Clovis' water.

Autrey questioned the overall price of the project. The price tag is set at \$432 million, which is supposed to include adjustments for inflation. He wondered if it costs more, who would pay for the overages.

The current plan asks for Texico to pay 2% of the cost. If the state and federal governments pledge money, they will probably not offer to increase their support if the costs of the project increases.

Autrey asked if the costs do go over the current estimate, would Texico still be responsible for 2% of the costs, or would the overage be split by the cities involved. His hypothetical situation asked if the costs went up to \$700 million, for example, how much of the overage would Texico be responsible for, and where would Texico find the money.

Councilman Doug Scioli also asked that they look into a one-way valve for the Texico water. His concern was that Texico could be paying for water that was actually going to another city.

Cooper said that he

would get answers before the city had to sign off on the legislation.

In other news, the council:

- Agreed to waive the fees for the Community Center for the senior citizens to hold a domino tournament. It will be Jan. 24 and proceeds will go to help the senior citizens.

- Allowed the Cemetery Association to buy a new memorial stone. There have been several new names of people buried in the cemetery that don't have markers found since the last stone was erected.

- Approved buying a new memorial stone for KKR Park. The other stone was stolen, and this one will be secured. The memorial stone being displayed in the park was part of the agreement with the Runnels family.

- Heard that the city was working on fixing the streets around the intersection of Avenue F and College Street. The street is bumpy and the city asked the company who recently worked on the road to look at it again.

Bowman supports closed campus

The Texico School Board on Monday heard Police Chief Doug Bowman recommend that a "closed campus for lunch" policy be implemented.

He said some students are not driving responsibly when they go to lunch at area restaurants.

After a short discussion, the board tabled it until another meeting.

In other business, the board:

-- Noted that the next school board election will be in February. Signup date is Dec. 16. Posts held by Justin Barnes and Ted Richardson are on the ballot.

-- Approved the bond sale resolution. Local patrons are invited to participate. The minimum amount is \$50,000 and folks at Citizens Bank can provide details.

-- Received a donation of beef to the cafeteria from Mr. Rusk. His family recently moved into the district and he wanted to do something nice for the school.

-- Approved Sandra Beavers as a substitute teacher.

-- Met with vocational teachers Terry Whitten, Kye Thomas and Tod Pinnell about renovations for the current cafeteria building which will be turned into a "vocational career center" when the new cafeteria structure is built.

They discussed long-range plans which would involve four or five career readiness programs.

McCoy resigns as Bovina transportation director

The Bovina School on Monday received the resignations of transportation director Billy McCoy and middle school aide Mario Maldonado.

McCoy has taken another job in the area. A replacement is being sought.

Phoebe Gomez is being moved from the cafeteria to replace Mrs. Maldonado, and Maria Noriega has been hired to be a cafeteria employee.

In other business, the board:

-- Allowed the senior class to take a field trip in May to San Antonio. Robert Knoll and Sandra Ortiz presented the request and noted the class had funding for it.

-- Set the next board meeting for Dec. 8.

-- Approved the annual audit.

-- Received requests from the band for two fundraisers. The board approved the sale of frozen cookie dough, but denied a raffle. The band is seeking funds for a spring field trip.

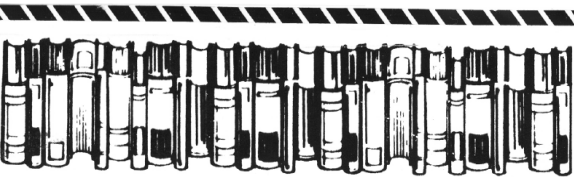

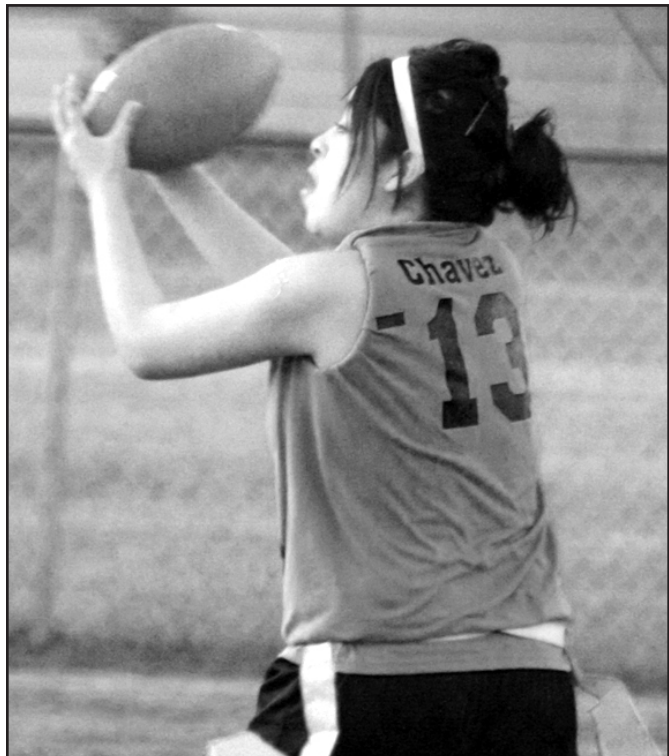

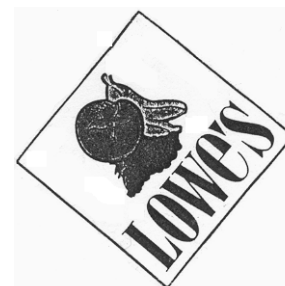
