Area EMT members assist with hurricane search and rescue

Three members of the Bailey County EMS Department recently

were assigned to help with search and rescue, and to assist local authorities in the aftermath of damage from Hurricane Ike in the Beaumont - Port Arthur area.

They were Curby Brantley, Parmer County Appraiser; Chad Nickels, of Lazbuddie, and Jackie Burris, of Muleshoe.

Brantley, an EMT intermediate, said the trio was assigned to a rescue team from Indiana, which totaled 25 ambulances. The group was called Task Force Ike T-F-1 Strike Team 7.

They were sent to housing complexes where they found some folks who had decided not to evacuate before the hurricane struck or who had been left behind. Some had been without food, water and electricity for as high as three days.

During their stay, the ambulance crew lived and slept in their ambulance, receiving canned food packages from the

state. As for when a bathroom was needed, you either found one ... or a tree, said Brantley.

They also helped build a large first aid station outside the local hospital, which had been closed. That station was the primary care source for the area - 113,000 people.

Since the hospital was closed before the hurricane hit, it had to undergo inspection procedures before officials would allow it to reopen - thus the need for the first aid station.

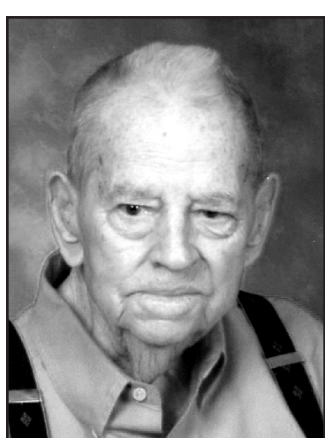
Jerry W. Herington, 62, of Farwell, died Monday at home.

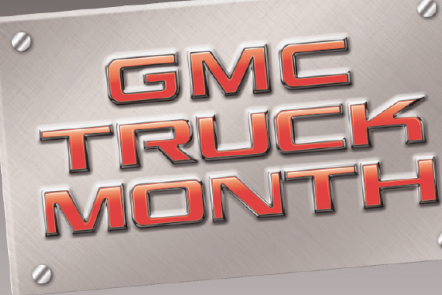

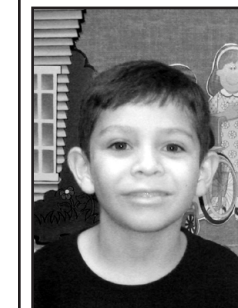

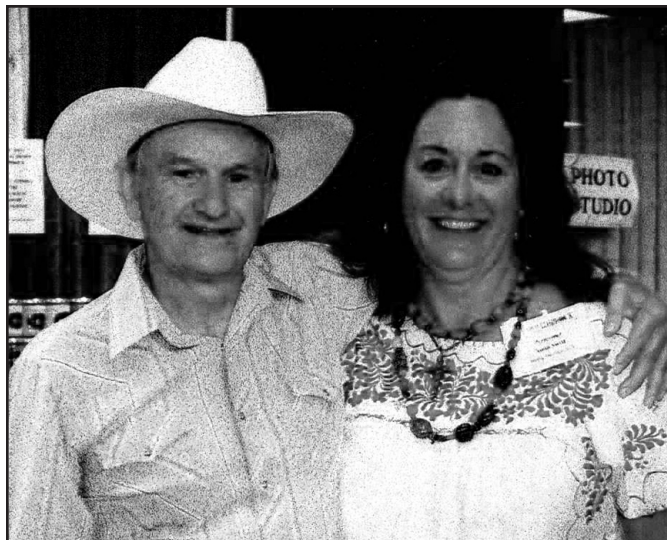

She received the ENMU Alumni Association's Distinguished Service Award in 1983 and the ENMU Foundation's Philanthropist of the Year Award in 2002, according to the latest issue of "The ENMU Effect."

She provided scholarships for students, and shared art and music resources with the schools.

Jason Douglas Crume, who died in a recent accident near Farwell, descended from pioneer settlers of this area.

His father, Donald, graduated from Farwell High School.

His grandparents were Joseph Allen Crume and Capitola Lunsford Crume. Joe was the manager/owner of Kemp Lumber Co. in Farwell for

34 years and later worked in Colorado.

Jason's great-grandfather, Charles Elmer Crume, also of Farwell, served as precinct chair of the Democrat Party for 20 years and was honored in the dedication of "A Texan at Bay," an interesting book written by his eldest son, Paul, and published by McGraw-Hill of New York.

His great-grandparents, John Henry Crume (1853-1923) and Margaret Maples Crume (1853-1929) are buried in Pleasant Hill Cemetery.

Dr. Hudnall found his niche at Louisiana State University for 25 years and retired as professor emeritus in the Department of Agronomy and Environmental Management. H returned to Texas Tech in 2004.

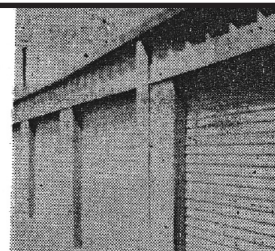

LIVE CATTLE: Cattle prices remain under pressure as the financial crisis has created fear across the board. Long term targets were around the \$97 level basis the nearby October contract and those levels were hit this week. As the Dow Jones moves, so do the cattle and this could continue until there is some sign of stability in the marketplace.

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeders are similar to the rest of the complex and have also met their downside targets around the \$97-98 level. Feeders continue to follow the Live Cattle prices and has also been impacted by the financial crisis taking place. Could see things settle down and many analysts believe that feeders will have value at these levels with falling feed costs.

CORN: Corn prices also hit long term targets this week around the \$4.25 level, but prices close at this level down their 30 cent limit. If the Dow Jones can find support, then the grains will most likely follow. Otherwise, there seems to be some psychological support between this levels and \$4.00 basis the December contract.

SOYBEANS: Soybean prices far exceeded their \$10.35 support level basis the November contract. It is now hard to pinpoint the next major support level, but chart support would come in around the \$8.00 level. Most of the pressure is coming from the financial crisis.

WHEAT: Wheat prices remain under pressure and support levels between the \$6.00-6.25 level should provide some short term support basis the December KC Wheat. Most of the markets are trading on fear and uncertainty at this time. If the financial crisis stabilizes, then prices should as well.

COTTON: Cotton prices also remain under pressure as we have seen taking place across the board. There really isn't much to tie to fundamentals into this picture aside from the fact that there is a panic taking place. Once financial markets can stabilize, so should the market.

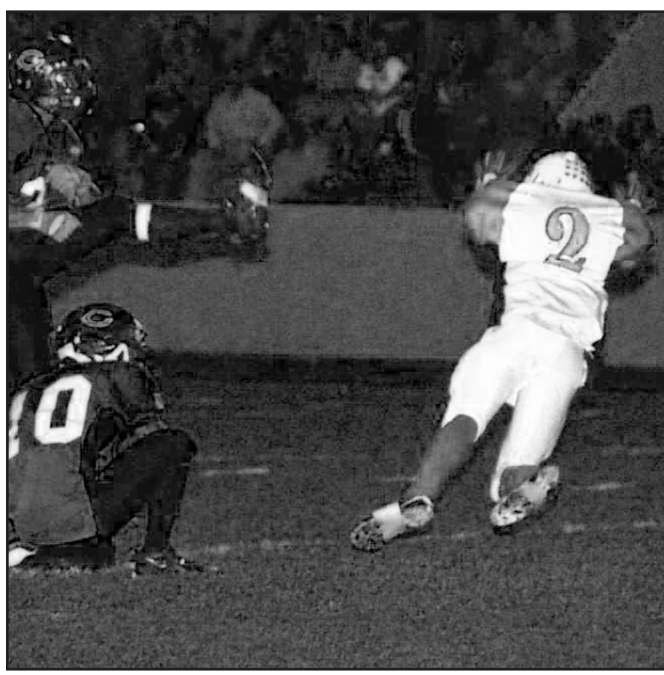
Farwell was stopped on four downs. Caleb Christian intercepted a pass and gave Farwell great field position.

However, the Steers were unable to move the ball effectively.

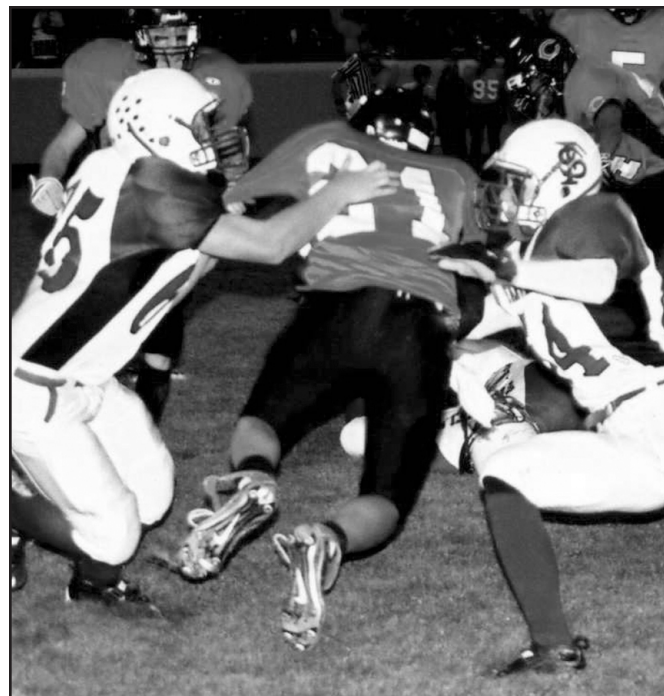

The purpose of GSE is to promote international understanding and goodwill through personal interaction. Teams of young professionals from two different countries exchange visits to their respective countries.

Each team is led by a Rotary Club member from the district. For four weeks, team members experience the way of life, customs, and vocational practices of another country, while sharing information about their home district and country.

The Rotary Foundation pays for round-trip airfare, and Rotary members in the host country provide meals, lodging, entertainment, and group travel in their district. Team members pay for only personal and incidental expenses.

Lifeline Service that makes telephone service available at reduced rates to eligible residential customers and Link Up America, a program that provides a 50 percent discount up to a maximum of \$30 on local telephone service installation, are available to West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative and WT Services, Inc. customers who qualify.

Qualifying Low-Income (Eligible) Customer Criteria for the Lifeline Program

An eligible customer shall be defined as an individual whose annual household income is at or below 150% of the federal poverty guidelines or in whose household resides a person who receives or has a child who receives benefits from at least one of the following programs:

- Medicaid
- Food Stamps
- Supplemental Security Income (SSI)
- Federal Public Housing Assistance (FPHA)
- Low-Income Heat and Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP)
- Health Benefits Coverage under the state Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP)

The Lifeline Program rate reductions will be provided to each eligible customer. The Low-Income Discount Administrator (will provide a list of eligible customers to the Cooperative each month.

Obligations of the Customer

Customers whose annual household income is at or below 150% of the federal poverty guidelines or who participate in FPHA or LIHEAP programs may self-enroll for Lifeline Program benefits by completing an application form and returning it to LIDA. LIDA will send a blank application upon customer request. LIDA can be reached at 1-866-4LITEUP (1-866-454-8387). Current customers receiving benefits under Medicaid, Food Stamps, SSI or CHIP will be subject to the Lifeline Program automatic enrollment procedures as provided by the LIDA unless they provide a written request to the LIDA to be excluded from the Lifeline Program.

A customer who is eligible for the Lifeline Program but does not have telephone service at the time the LIDA provides its eligibility list to the Cooperative, shall be responsible for initiating a request for the Lifeline Program from the Cooperative.

Link Up America

This program provides a 50% discount, up to a maximum of \$30 on local telephone service installation. Customers receiving federal aid benefits or who are at or below 150% of the federal poverty level are eligible for this discount.

Converter Box

After February 17, 2009, a television receiver with only an analog broadcast tuner will require a converter box to receive full power over-the-air broadcasts with an antenna because of the Nation's transition to digital broadcasting. Analog-only TV's should continue to work as before to receive low power, Class A or translator television stations and with cable and satellite TV services, gaming consoles, VCR's, DVD players, and similar products.

DTV Transition should not affect service to your cable service. Analog sets not connected to cable service may need additional equipment (i.e. converter box) or may need to be replaced.
