



Dry windy conditions induced significant stress on local crops which limited their ability to develop normally, thus delaying crop development. Many crops had to be replanted as a result of harsh environmental conditions. These replanted crops are maturing later than normal due to delayed replant dates.

Silage harvest is in full swing. It also is later than usual. Wet field conditions have made harvest difficult and hard on equipment in many fields. Preliminary yields have been pretty good with reports ranging from 22-30 tons per acre.





Farwell gives fire dept. \$50,000 for equipment

The Farwell City Council last week agreed to spend \$50,000 of the city's contingency fund for fire department equipment.

Three Farwell volunteer firemen attended the meeting – Lee Hutchins, Mike Camp and Henry Garcia.

Hutchins told about Farwell, plus three other fire departments, fighting the fire the previous weekend in the tunnel at AGP Grain's elevator at Lariat.

Hutchins said they found that their fire equipment had major definiciencies and it became dangerous for them to go into the tunnel.

So the firemen presented a "wish list" to the council for equipment, totaling more than \$50,000.

The list, with the top three items cited as priority, included:

1. Six high pressure air packs.

2. Ten spare high pressure bottles for the air pack bottles.

3. Minimum of eight 2-way radios – multi-channel and water resistant.

4. Several pair of new fire boots (some boots from the 1960s were still being used).

5. Several new personal protection equipment bunker sets.

6. Portable tank mount for the tanker truck.

7. Fire hose roller.

8. Repairs to tanker truck (or buy a new one or one in excellent shape).

The council also was told that Farwell used Trevor Coker and Dallas Cox had QB sacks. Kyler 180,000 gallons of water at the Lariat fire. The city will bill AGP for it.

In other business, the council:

-- Approved building permits for Bill Pennington, 411 8th St., a carport; and Dovie Sears, 607 2nd St., a porch.

-- Heard Jerry Whitney, an area resident who organizes "42" events, say he wanted to run a "42" tourney at the Farwell Community Center with all proceeds going to the Farwell senior citizens. He asked that the city waive its fees for using the community center for this event.

Mayor Jimmie Mace noted there were no senior citizens present to support this project. Councilwoman Ysleta Kittrell, the council's liaison to the senior citizens meal site, said she will check into it and report back.

The next day, Whitney told the Tribune that Mrs. Kittrell had given him the go-ahead and, after checking with Mace, was told the community center fee

The Texico Wolverines sustained their victory status, beating the Clovis JV Wildcats, 23-6, on Sept. 18.

The Wildcats kicked off, and Jose Posada returned it to the 21. Mario Posada ran for 10. Seth Bailey caught a pass for 9 more, but Texico was held. Mario Posada punted 47 yards to the Clovis 1.

The Wolverine defense was strong, with a good tackle by Mario Posada and excellent defensive play by Mark Rivera. Clovis punted.

Posada took the punt 13 yards to the 39. With good blocking by Rivera and Jonathon Montano, Mario Posada ran for 7. QB Brett Anderson snuck for a first down; and Bailey gained another 10 yards on a slant pass from Anderson, behind the tough Wolverine pass-blocking offensive line.

Edgardo Meza took the ball left behind Matt Vasquez, Jairo Lozano, and Bailey for a 5-yard TD. Clovis broke up Texico's pass play for extra points.

With only a few seconds left in the first quarter, Lucas Walthers, Rivera and Eli Morgan applied a 5 yard loss to the Wildcat offense. The Wolverines held the Wildcats mid-field until 3rd and long. Clovis punted to the Texico 20.

Bailey picked up a first down on a 10-yard pass. Meza ran for 9 on a draw play. Bailey gained another 13. The Wolverines continued their offensive drive with an 18-yard pass from Anderson to Walthers with the help of excellent pass blocking by the entire offensive line: Garrett Garrison, Vasquez, Morgan, Rivera. Montano.

Mario Posada returned the punt to the Wolverines' 45, where the offense was held to 3 and out.

A good punt by Mario Posada had the Wildcats starting on their own 15. On 3rd and 1, Bailey busted through and held Clovis at the line of scrimmage, forcing another punt.

Behind the hard, smashing blocks of Bailey and Walthers, Jose Posada broke free for an excellent punt return to mid-field. With 40 seconds left in the half, the Wildcats intercepted a deep Anderson pass on their own 9. Mario Posada intercepted on the next play, returning it for a TD. The extra point kick made it Texico 16, Clovis JV 0, at the half.

The 3rd quarter started with Texico kicking off and executing tough defense, led by Morgan, which halted the Wildcats again. Clovis punted to the Texico 6.

Texico then marched downfield to the Wildcat 5 behind a 14-play series. Behind the excellent blocking of the offensive line, with a mixture of running and pass plays, the quarter ended with Texico on the 5.

Anderson opened the 4th guarter with TD run. Mario Posada's extra point kick was good, and it was Texico 23. Clovis 0.

Warren Faircloth made a hard stop during the Wildcats' ensuing return. Morgan and Montano sacked the QB for a loss of 12, and Rhett Martin made hard contact with a receiver to break up a pass play. Continuing the brick wall defense, Rivera, Morgan, Vasquez, Bailey, Kevin Visser, Anderson, and the Wolverine secondary, forced the Wildcats to turn the ball over after an unsuccessful 4th down attempt.

In other business, the board:


-- Heard Supt. Larry Gregory report enrollment had increased to 519.

Texico City Council, cemetery board at odds over cemetery control

Tempers flared at the Texico City Council meeting on Tuesday as members of the cemetery association board and city council argued about a road that is between the two sides of the cemetery.

At issue are two plots that were sold based on the cemetery map. According to the map, the plots sold are correct, but the map apparently has mistakes. It turned out that the two plots actually are under the road and that is where at least one body was buried.

Councilman Oran Jay Autrey made a motion to close the road and sell all of it as plots. The council did not approve the motion.

Cemetery Board member Teresa Curry said the road is necessary, and removing it would make moving around the cemetery difficult. During the meeting, she said she was resigning from the board.

A suggestion was raised to move the graves. City Attorney Marion Rutter said it was legal as long as the families agreed.

City Clerk Carolyn Johnson had earlier suggested at a cemetery association meeting to narrow the road from 20 feet wide to 18 feet. This would allow all of the graves to stay where they are, and still allow access to move around the cemetery.

The council approved narrowing the road.

Council members and board members then discussed the role of the cemetery board and aired out their feelings. Autrey suggested abolishing the association and cemetery board member Marcia Leavell asked if the council wanted the board to resign. At issue were commu-

nication and funding for dairy cattle, so there the cemetery.

The association board brought up several instances that they felt the council did not respond to their requests. The council took issue with comments made on a letter sent to council members by the association board.

Councilman Doug Scioli pointed out that all city groups including the fire and police departments have to go through the council for funding. He also asked that the cemetery association be put on the next council agenda to discuss the issues further.

The council agreed that the cemetery is in great shape.

In other news, the council:

- Discussed the water treatment upgrades with Jerry May, an engineer.

The council had previously looked at several different methods of dealing with wastewater from the city. Currently, the city produces around 90,000 gallons of wastewater a day.

May believed that there would be too much water coming out of the sewage plant once the work was done to be put out using ground application.

The city would need around 30 acres to be approved by the state **Environmental Depart**ment. The city only has 10 acres available.

One idea was to pump the water to the Farwell Country Club golf course, but May said that water quality would be too low. Even if it was higher, the city would have to test the water weekly as long as they were sending it out.

aren't that many places it could be used.

An idea was raised to look into farms about 2 miles away that grow alfalfa.

May suggested the council put in a mechanical system that would clean the water to a higher standard. This system would cost Texico close to \$2 million. It would also require more testing than the current system.

The council agreed to start soil testing to find out how much water they will be able to apply to city lands before they make any decisions.

- Adopted a resolution setting the council's priorities over the next several years.

- Received an update on the water situation in town. The Brown Well is now working, but the **Tower Well by Lions Park** has had electrical problems and is being fixed.

 Heard from Fire Chief Lewis Cooper that the **Ute Water Project Board** is starting negotiations with property owners between Ute Lake and the Clovis area. He also said that New Mexico American Water, the company that runs Clovis' water, has asked that the water be moved to the east side of Clovis before the pipe branches to Texico.

Scioli pointed out that Texico should look into it before the city approves of the move.

Approved Street Supervisor Darryl Stanton to buy a chipper capable of cutting 5.5 inch branches.

LIVE CATTLE: Cattle prices were so volatile last week that itis been difficult to determine whatis next? Basically, the market has traded from \$1-2 higher or lower each consecutive day of the week similar to what weíve seen in the Dow Jones. Emotions are high, cattle numbers remain tight and the packer has been unwilling to bid the cash higher. Trends remain down at this time.

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeder cattle dropped down into new lows this week with the November contract actually reaching one of itis long term targets around the \$103.00 level. The market was able to recover into Fridayís close, but there still seems to be much uncertainty surrounding the U.S. financial markets which seems to have had an impact on all commodity prices across the board.

CORN: Corn prices ended the week on an up note while trading down the 30 cent limit on Tuesday folowed by limit up on Wednesday and limit down on Thursday before closing higher on Friday. Again, the financial markets, the falling U.S. Dollar and rising energy markets have all played a role in the grain complex. These markets remain extremely volatile.

SOYBEANS: Soybeans have remained somewhat more stable than the corn and wheat markets, but outside influences coming from the financial markets have had some impact. Soybeans have basically been the leader for the rest of the grain complex and there are currently signs that soybean prices may turn back up for a short term? This would help to support the grain complex.

WHEAT: Wheat prices also saw large swings in both directions over the past week along with the rest of the grain complex. There are few indicators to move the market, but soybeans continue to lead. Unstable financial markets seem to be the culprit at this time. With a falling U.S. Dollar, prices may be able to rally back higher over the short term.

COTTON: Cotton prices have seen some uncertainty because of all the financial turmoil last week, but with investors loosing some confidence in the U.S. Dollar, prices may be able to move back to the upside for a minute. Lots of volatility across the board, but keep in mind that some long term targets have been hit around the \$58.50 level basis the December contract.
