

**WATCH FOR SOBs**

The Quay County Sun of Tucumcari recently reprinted an article from the Valley Morning Star of Harlingen, Texas, which I think is worth passing on to you:

There was a man who wanted to become rich so he searched for a way to reach his goal.

He finally came up with an idea for a contraption which would eliminate roaches and other bugs. After several years of experimentation and hard work, he perfected the contraption.

"You are going to make millions," his friends said.

So, he borrowed the money to build a small factory, set up his production line, hired employees and put salesmen here and there to sell the contraption. Things were going fine until one day when a man walked into the office carrying an attache case and announced he was from OSHA - the organization set up by the federal government to harass businessmen.

The OSHA man inspected the small plant and filled two legal size pads with things that did not meet OSHA specifications. He told the owner all there must be corrected or he would be shut down.

The owner borrowed more money and used it for the things the OSHA agent said had to be done. "Now," said the owner, "I can really go into production."

His next visitors were from EEOC who told him he did not have a sufficient number of minority employees. He had problems in finding qualified persons or anyone who really wanted to work. But he did.

Then along came a group from the EPA and they issued warnings that if he caused the environment to be polluted, he would indeed be in trouble.

Next was a man from the CPSC who told him that his bug killing contraption had to be modified because it was dangerous to humans. He modified the contraption as best he could.

Then there were Internal Revenue Service people, state, county and city tax officials, all of whom informed him that he would owe them money at the end of the year.

By the time these and numerous other government agencies had paid him a visit, his small office was so filled with government forms he had to fill out that he had to build another office.

But his bug killing contraptions were coming off the assembly line and he was paying his employees good wages and he was reasonably happy, particularly after he hired two clerks to keep up with all the government forms.

Even when the unions organizers moved in and told him they were there to enroll his employees, he was not greatly disturbed because he was already paying well above the union scale.

And then came the cruelest blow of all. A group came to his plant and announced they were SOBs - members of the Save Our Bugs organization and told him that his contraption could cause all bugs to become extinct. They set up a picket line and called television stations and informed the stations what they were doing.

Very soon, there were more television people than SOBs around the plant. They broadcast the plight of the world's bugs and the noble work of the SOBs throughout the world. They had the SOBs posing in front of their cameras and carrying signs depicting the plant owner as the monster who wanted to destroy the ecology.

The SOBs, aided and abetted by the television cameras, won.

The plant owner sadly told his employees he would have

## Investigation Continues Into Missing Texico Funds

The New Mexico State Auditor's Office is investigating an alleged discrepancy in the accounts of the City of Texico. According to Harry Patton of Clovis, Texico city attorney, the alleged shortage of \$27,500 is based on an incomplete audit which shows that the funds in question were paid in but not deposited in any of the city's accounts.

In an effort to clarify the situation the city officials have sent letters to all Texico residents asking them to bring their sewer and water receipts for the months of January and February to compare with city records.

Ribble Holloman, a Clovis CPA, is currently conducting a regular audit for the city for

the fiscal year of 1976-77 and a stub audit for 1977 until March 10, 1978, when former city clerk Clara Wehl resigned her post. It is a state law that an audit must be completed any time an employee resigns who had access to the city's money.

The letters sent to Texico residents are a part of the

audit, according to Patton. He explained that the State Auditor's Office requires an annual audit and that the City of Texico engaged Holloman to perform the audit upon the authority of the state office.

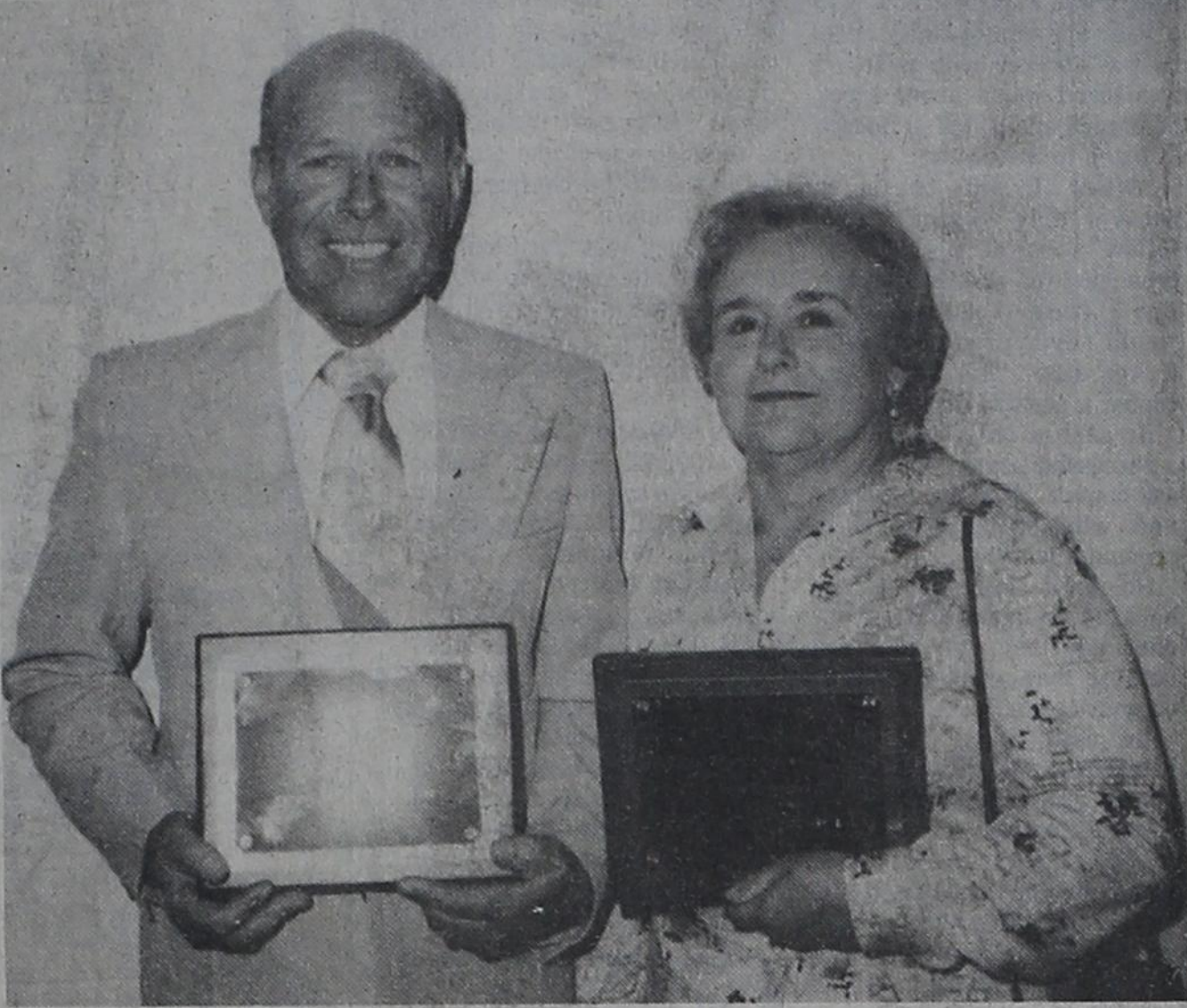
Patton further explained that any information regarding the audit will be forwarded to the State Auditor's Office

first and that that office in turn will present the finished report to Texico.

When the audit was conducted for the 20-month period the apparent shortage was revealed.

When the city clerk resigned after 15 years on the job, the Texico Board of Trustees took over management of the city's records with Trustee Marie

Christian acting as city clerk. The city currently maintains several accounts, including those for senior citizens, water and sewer. When District Attorney Bill Bonem, chief prosecutor for the Ninth Judicial District, was contacted by the Tribune Wednesday he said, "I cannot discuss the matter at this time."

Carrie (Mrs. R.W.) Anderson is considered to be a "transplanted Texan," a native of Oklahoma and a Texan by adoption. She was born in Comanche, Okla., and attended elementary and high school in Purcell, Okla. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Scott Levins of Ruidoso, former longtime residents of Texico and Farwell.

Mrs. Anderson began her college education at Gulf Park

College in Gulf Port, Miss., and completed her education as a "Sooner" at the University of Oklahoma. She was a member of Kappa Alpha Theta sorority.

During World War II she served with the Woman's Army Air Corps, attaining the rank of First Lieutenant. She moved to Farwell in 1946, and was employed as a legal secretary for Aldridge and Aldridge, attorneys. She was married in 1949 and has four children, Bob Scott, Meredith, Will and Caroline.

The 1978 Woman of the Year has served the citizens and needs of the community in countless ways. She is an active member of the First Baptist Church in Farwell and currently is librarian of the church.

Mrs. Anderson is past president of the Woman's Golf Association of the Farwell Country Club. She was also honored as one of the outstanding women of the High Plains by West Texas State University in 1975. She is a charter member and one of the most energetic workers of the Auxiliary of the Farwell Convalescent Center.

She was one of the original directors of the Farwell Development Corporation and later was a member of the Board of Directors and Secretary of the Board of the Farwell Hospital District. ## Western Artist To Speak At Texico CofC Banquet

"Where Edges Meet" is the theme of the 1978 Texico Chamber of Commerce banquet scheduled for Tuesday, Apr. 25, at 7:30 p.m. MST at the Texico Schools cafeteria.

Guest speaker for the annual banquet will be Kenneth Wyatt of Tulia, Tex., a well-known western artist.

Wyatt says he is a lucky man because "I get to make a living doing exactly what I like to do. I get to meet the nicest people."

Two questions often asked of Wyatt are, "When did you get started?" and "Why Do You Paint The West?" He answers, "When I was born, and I paint the West because it's here."

Wyatt works everyday averaging about 12-14 hours at the easel. In his spare time he likes to play golf and fish, and occasionally does after-dinner speaking. He and his wife Veda have a son Mark and a

daughter Jill.

Much of Wyatt's work is western oriented. He says he "paints real cowboys, real horses and even real dirt storms." He works in all media: pencil, ink, watercolor, pastels, oils and bronze sculpture.

"People who like to see a cowboy on a horse, windmills and sunsets, the rain, the snow, touches of lonesomeness, work and sweat and laughter - they're the people who own my work," Wyatt says.

A special highlight of the evening will be the presentation of the Man and Woman of the Year awards. They will be presented by last year's winners - Louise Engram and Bill Thigpen.

Jim Pierce, outgoing Chamber president, will serve as master of ceremonies. He will

also introduce the 1978 Chamber officers and directors.

Burford Schwarz of the United Pentecostal Church in Texico, will give the invocation. Bill Christian will introduce the special guests and Joe Caywood will introduce the guest speaker.

A.D. McDonald will give the progress report. Dinner music will be provided by Mr. and Mrs. Ed Hardage.

New Chamber officers include Tony Mendoza, president; Caywood, vice-president; and Louise Engram, secretary. Directors are McDonald, Christian, Thigpen and Pierce.

out his 40-minute talk several humorous references to his size and weight which he listed as "one hundred and plenty."

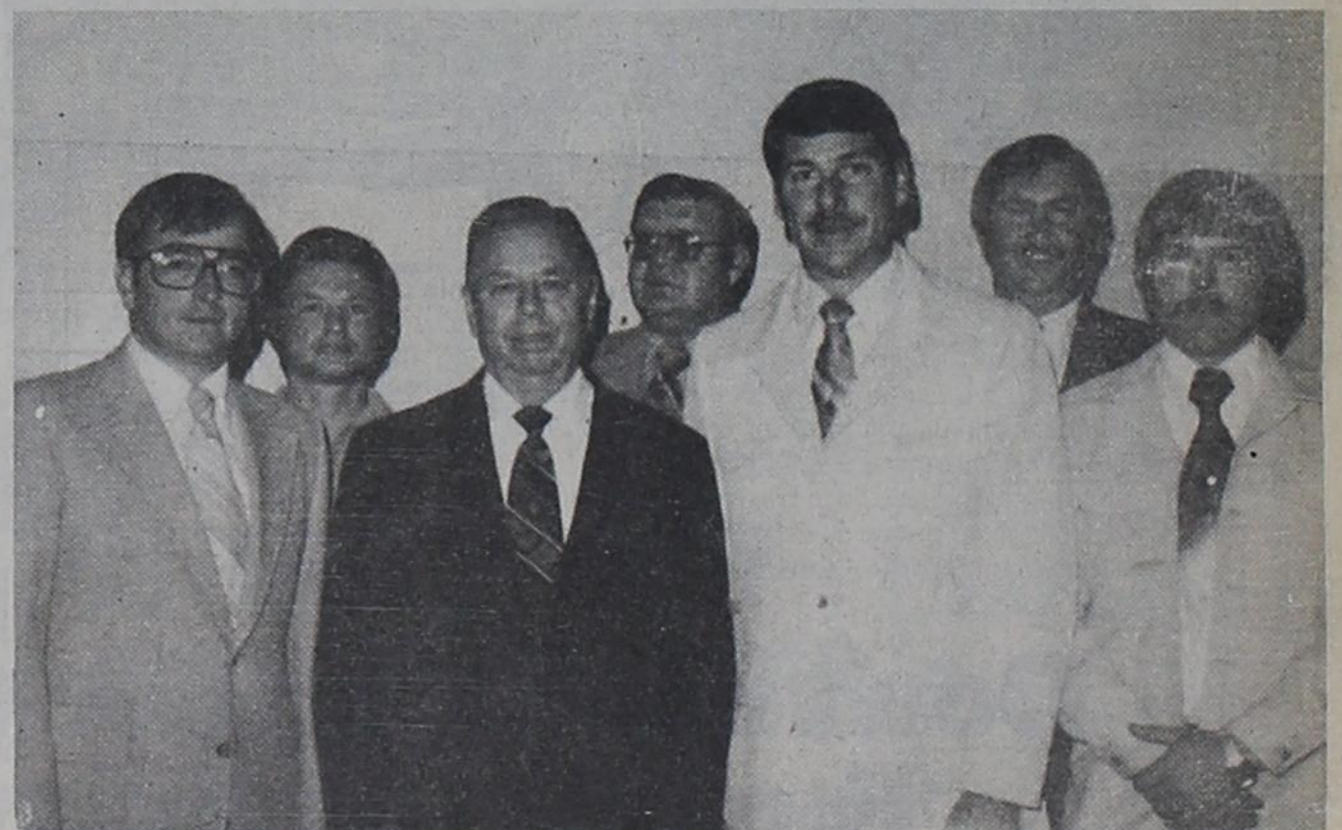

"I learned one thing from that experience," he said. "A quitter never wins and a winner never quits."

(Continued from Page 1) to close down because of the SOBs, by this time, had attracted the attention of all the government agencies, including some nobody ever heard of, who are against free enterprise. They sent agents to the plant and the agents found more things the owner must do.

He did not have the money to carry out the edicts from big brother in Washington. The SOBs shouted with joy and the plant employees joined the ranks of the unemployed to be taken care of by big brother.

The owner filled a truck

with all the government forms that by this time had filled his second office. He took the forms to a remote piece of property he owned, piled them up and set them on fire.

He was arrested and charged with air pollution.

He sold the piece of property to get enough money to pay his fine for polluting the air.

Finally he decided there was no way free enterprise could survive in the face of all the weird environmental kooks and all the federal agencies. So, he joined the growing ranks of the unemployed.

And big brother was happy.

Mrs. Anderson's hobbies include golf, swimming, jogging, skiing, tennis, sewing, music, cooking and art.

Williams was born Dec. 28, 1928, at Hollis, Okla. He and his family moved to the West Camp Community in 1930 when he was but two years old. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Willie Williams of Farwell.

He graduated from Farwell High School and attended Texas Tech University. He was considered to be a great athlete during his school days.

Williams served in the U.S. Air Force — spending most of his time in Alaska where he married his high school sweetheart Maxine Ford. They have two children: Deanna, a graduate of Farwell High

School and a freshman at Texas Tech, and Clay who is a freshman in high school here.

His hobbies include dominoes and snooker and he is reported to be "a good player." At one time Williams joined the Jolly Boys Poker Club with the winnings being donated to the Farwell cemetery.

The 1978 honoree is a charter member of the First Baptist Church in Farwell. He is also past president of the local Chamber of Commerce, hospital District Board and Board of Directors of the old San Francisco Steakhouse. He is also serving as a member of the Board of Directors of First Federal Savings and Loan Assn., Clovis.

Williams has long been involved with community activities and projects and is considered to be one of the most important forces behind securing and building of the Farwell Convalescent Center.

(Continued from Page 1) his three-fold plan for dealing with failure.

"First, never let it get you down," he said. "Don't think of it as either final or fatal but as a stepping stone to other things."

He related stories about how great people like Madam Curie, Babe Ruth and Thomas Edison never quit or gave up on their goals in life.

"Babe Ruth and I have one thing in common," Kyker said. "We both struck out the most times at bat."

A second approach to failing is never to give up, according to Dr. Kyker. "That's the only way to overcome failure," he said.

Several years ago when Kyker was a young man with a wife and family to support he was stricken with polio. "I was told I would never speak or preach again, but I refused to listen to the doctors."

"When I did begin to recover they wanted me to follow a strict plan of no preaching for at least a year. But I knew if I did that I would never preach again," Kyker said. "Instead I accepted a position at Midland."

He said in order to become a successful person one has to ask oneself "Why am I a loser and what will it take to become a winner?"

His third suggestion is "to be kind to your critics but don't pay them any attention because they won't put beans on your tables."

He said that "if I had listened to my critics I would not be where I am today."

Dr. Kyker said he was glad to be back in Farwell; however, he confessed he wasn't sure why he had been given the honor of speaking at the chamber banquet. "A speaker is usually supposed to tell people how to improve their community," he said, adding "but you have all done such a good job of building the community of Farwell that I could not possibly tell you how to do it better."

He is the head of the Department of Communications at Abilene Christian University. He has been a member of the faculty for 34

years and was named "Teacher of the Year" in 1975.

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The walls of the cafeteria were decorated with western scenes which the Theta Rho members had traced and colored with chalk. The tables were covered with red and white checked cloths and centerpieces were small cowboy boot flower holders filled with prairie flowers.

Centerpieces for the special guest table were cowboy hats filled with arrangements of fresh flowers. A straw cowgirl added the finishing touches to the western scene.

Dinner music was provided by Ed and Juanita Hardage of Farwell.

Atkinson presented a roundup of the Chamber's activities for 1977. He pointed out that the Chamber backed the project to install new tennis courts next to the ones at the high school and that the work was to be completed in the near future.

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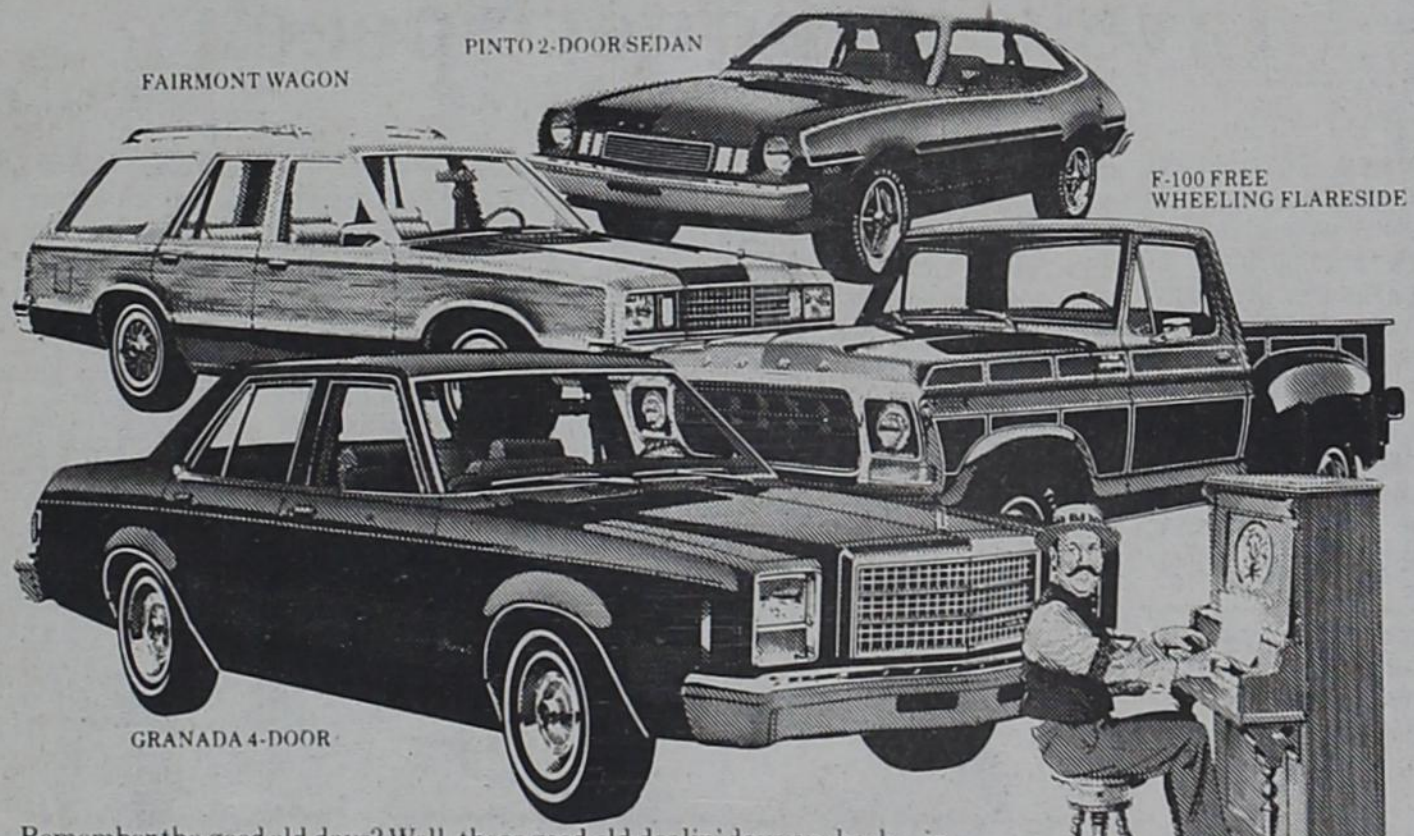
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# Five Area Residents Receive Probation

Farmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace reports that several area residents received probated sentences earlier this week in district court.

Wickie Yruegas received five years probation for two counts of forgery, Sheriff Lovelace said. She was ordered to pay court costs and make restitution.

Robert Pesch was given four years probation for selling a controlled substance - marijuana.

Joe Segovia also received four years probation for forgery. Alvin Hernandez was given five years probation for selling marijuana.

Fred Salinas received four years probation for burglary.

Richardo Flores' earlier probation in connection with the assault of a Bovina peace officer was revoked earlier this week. The original probation was for four years, but Lovelace said it was revoked after Flores violated the terms of the agreement. Flores was returned from Dumas for the hearing and in the near future will be taken to the Huntsville penitentiary where he will serve his sentence.

In other law enforcement activities Lovelace said they were investigating a break-in of a Lazbuddie farmhouse.

Filemon Gusman was living in the home at the time of the theft but the owner is Aubrey Heathington. Approximately \$250 in cash and a color TV, stereo and digital clock radio were taken from the residence. Lovelace said Gusman was away from the home changing irrigation water at the time of the theft.

An attempted burglary occurred at the John Neal Agee place two miles from the Heathington house where Gusman lives, but nothing was taken Lovelace said. The back door of the home was damaged in the attempted break-in.

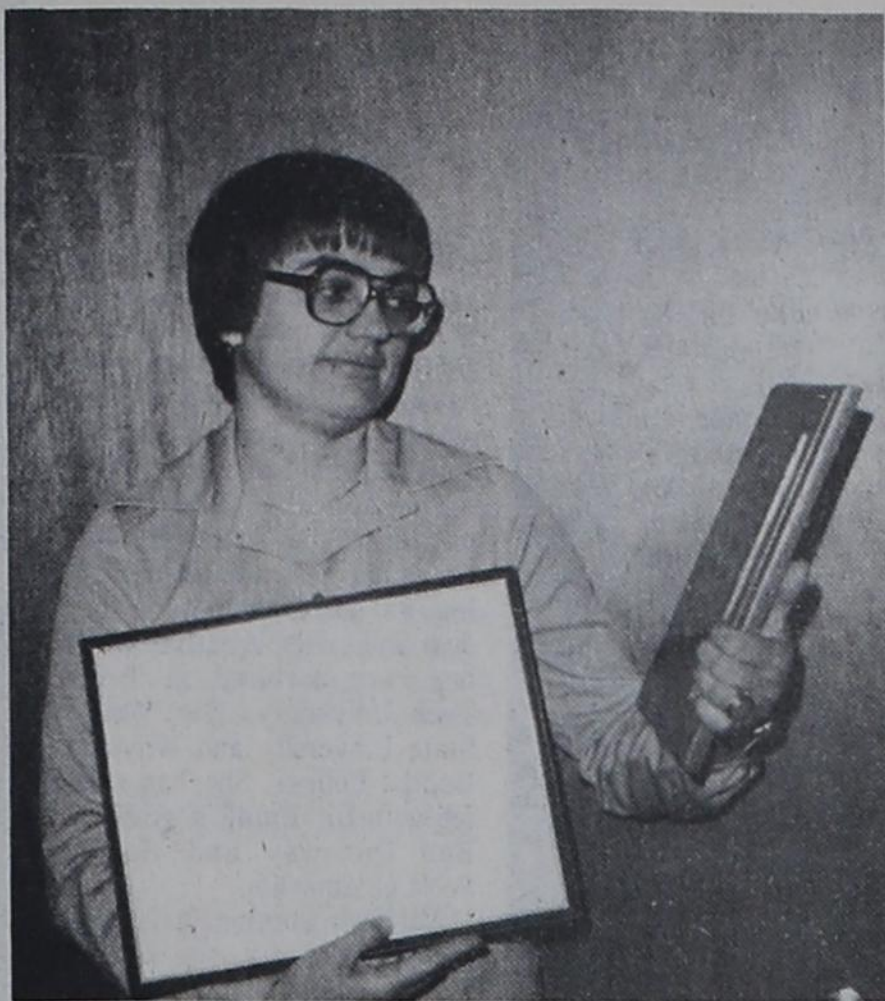
Lovelace said they were also investigating a theft at the Benger Airport in Friona. An undetermined amount of cash, plus credit cards, personal checks, and travelers checks were taken. He reported that they discovered no signs of a forced entry into the building.

## UT researchers study the retarded

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) - A small part of humanity - those with IQ's below 19 who exist at levels just a little above the animals - is the focus of studies by two University of Texas special education researchers.

Drs. Charles Cleland and William Rago are studying the emotional life of the profoundly mentally retarded (PMR) in the hope of discovering ways of relieving the boredom of the victims' existence.

The researchers say they have to remain open to facial expressions, grunts, gestures, tool usage and other types of behavior to try to reach some meaningful interpretation of PMR's needs.

## Rabbit Processing Company Purchases Plant At Anton

Pel-Freez Rabbit Meat, Inc., the nation's largest packer of domestic frozen rabbit meat, has purchased Rabbit Industries, Inc. of Anton, Tex., according to a recent announcement made by Paul Dubbell, president of the Rogers, Arkansas-based companies.

The processing plant at Anton will continue operation in Anton and will be expanded gradually, Dubbell said.

Pel-Freez has more than 67 years experience in the business of growing and selling domestic rabbit meat and by-products. The company began national distribution when it moved from California to an expanded plant in Rogers in September, 1951. The frozen rabbit meat is packed under strict U.S. Department of Agriculture inspection. In addition to national distribution, Pel Freez rabbit meat is also shipped into many foreign countries where U.S. Armed

Forces are stationed.

In order to meet the Texas growers, and others interested in establishing rabbitries, Pel-Freez representatives will hold a meeting on April 24, at 7:30 p.m. in the Anton School Cafeteria, Dubbell said. It will be open to the public. Jim Secker, field manager for Pel-Freez, will be in charge of the meeting.

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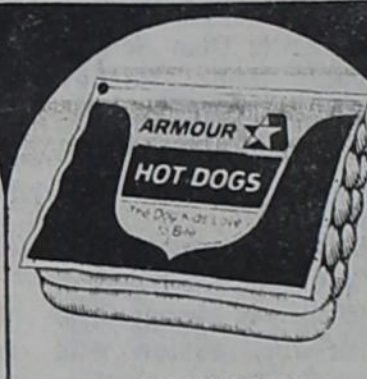
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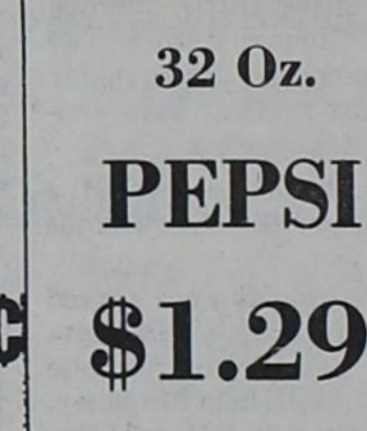
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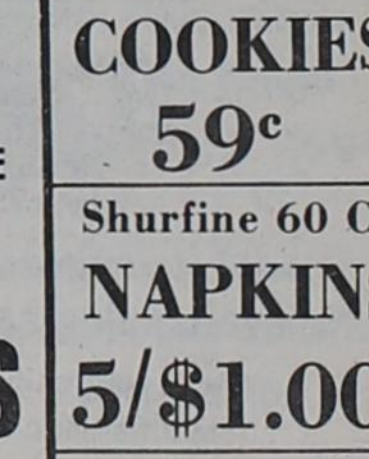
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# This I Know - - -

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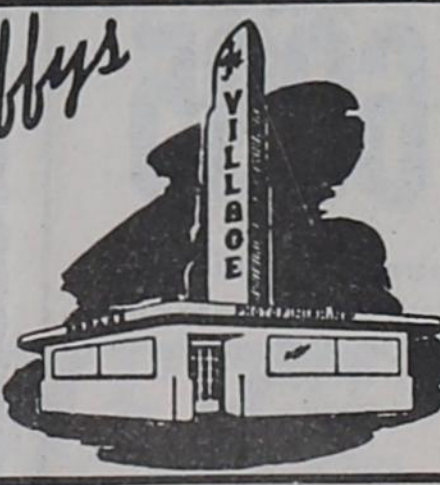
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**Convalescent Center

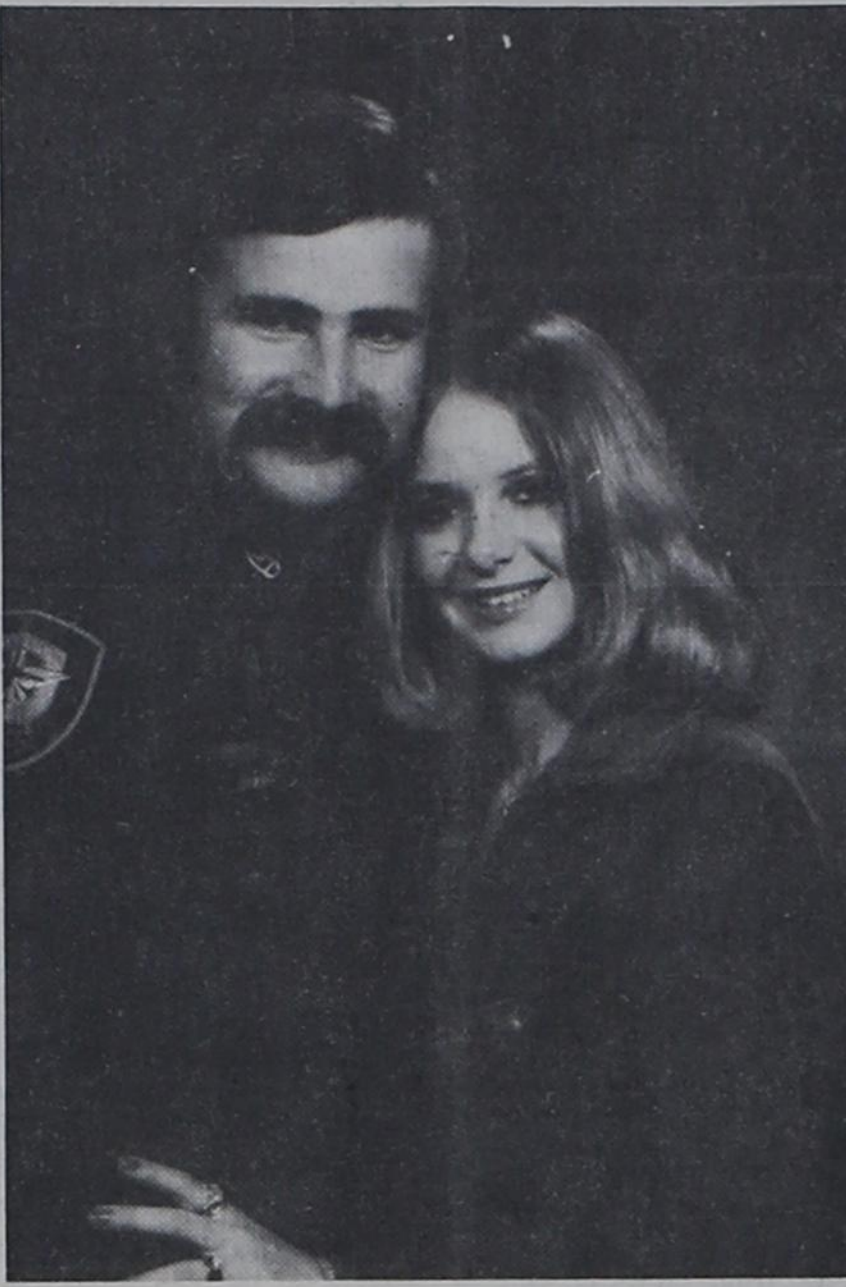

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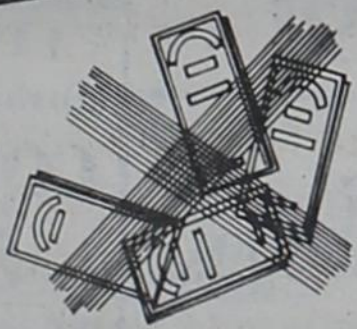

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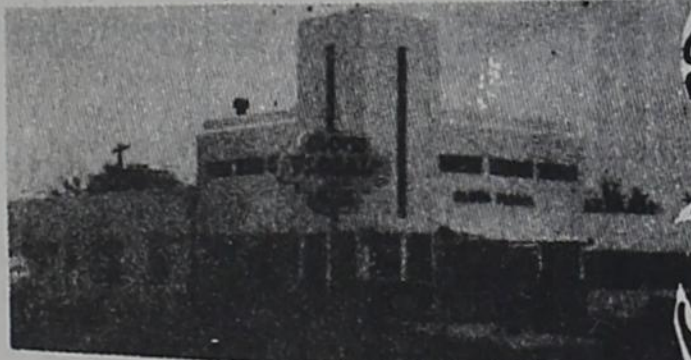

Sandra White placed fourth in the shot put and sixth in the discus. Fifth place went to Polly Turner in the 660 yard run and the 80 yard low hurdles.

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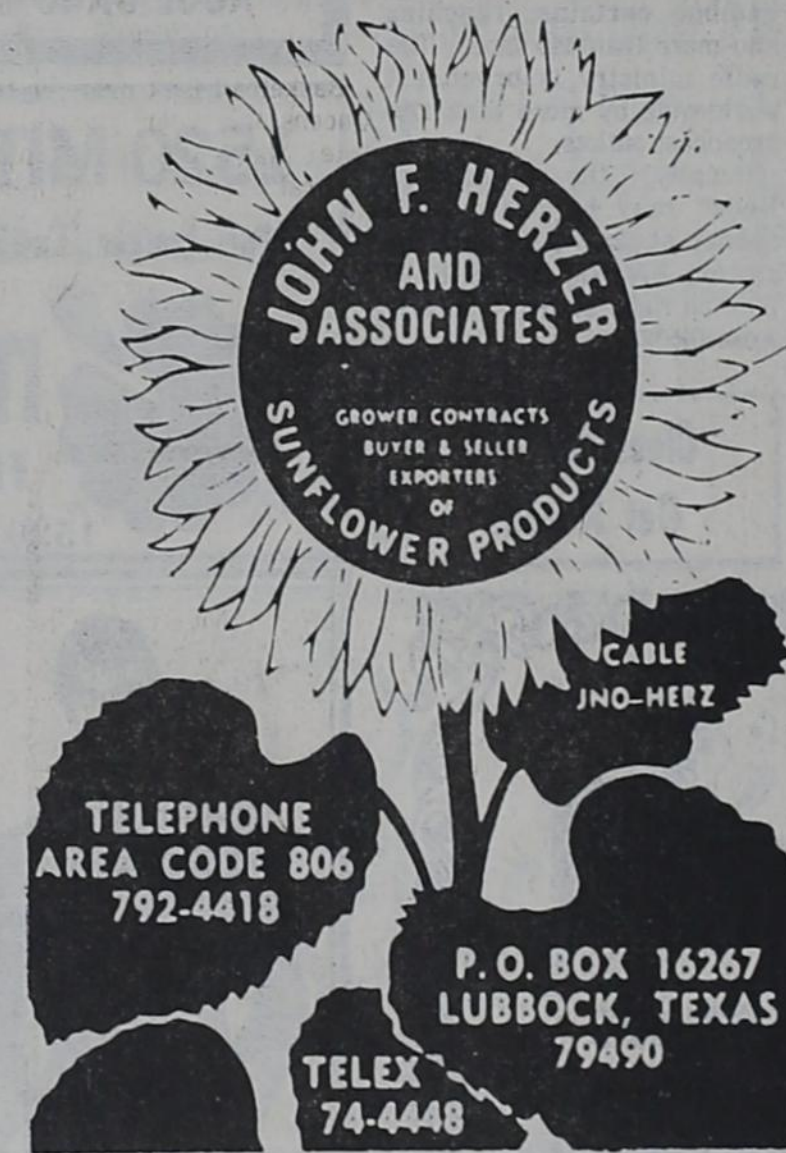
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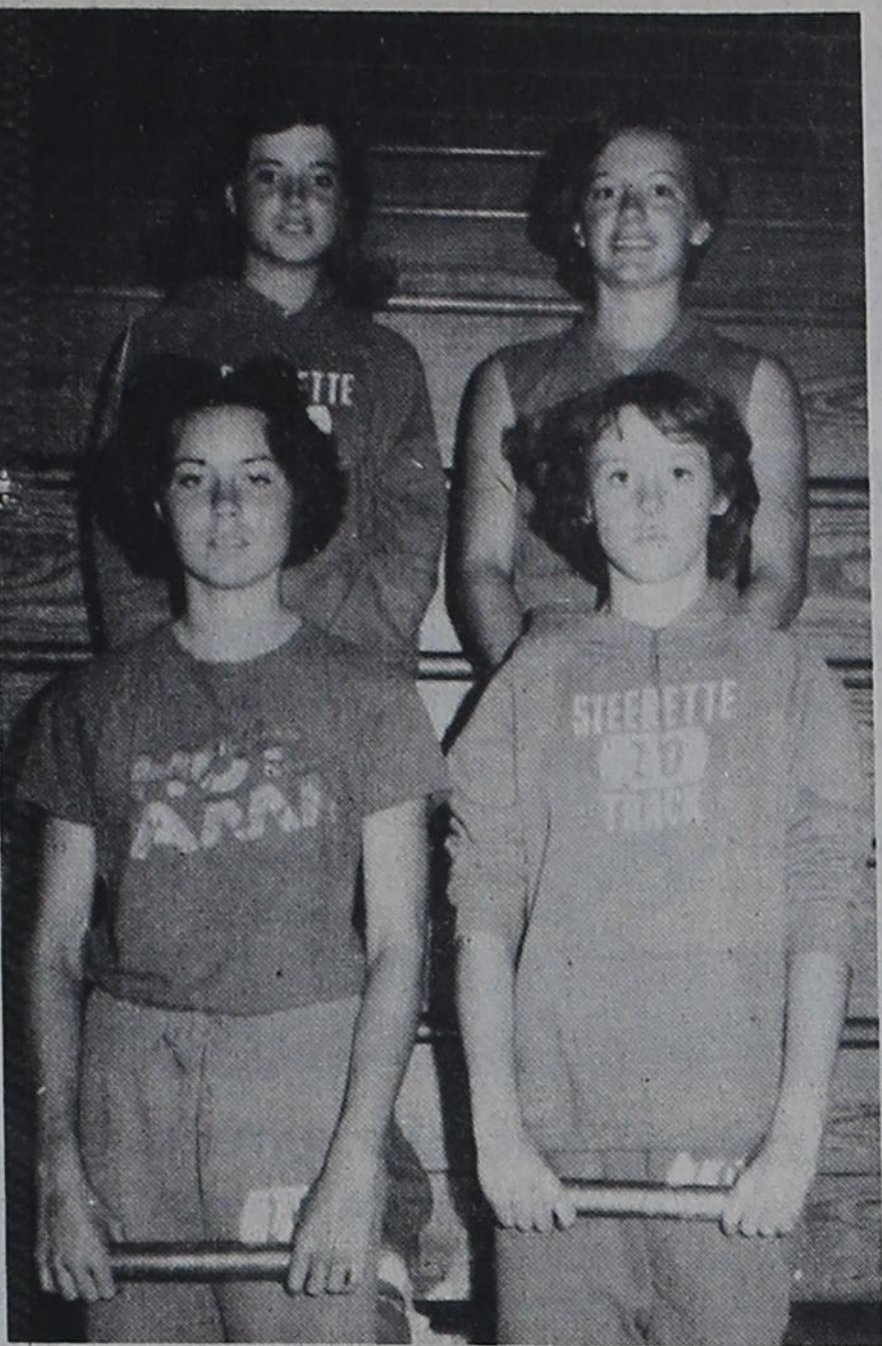

The Wolverine girls will also

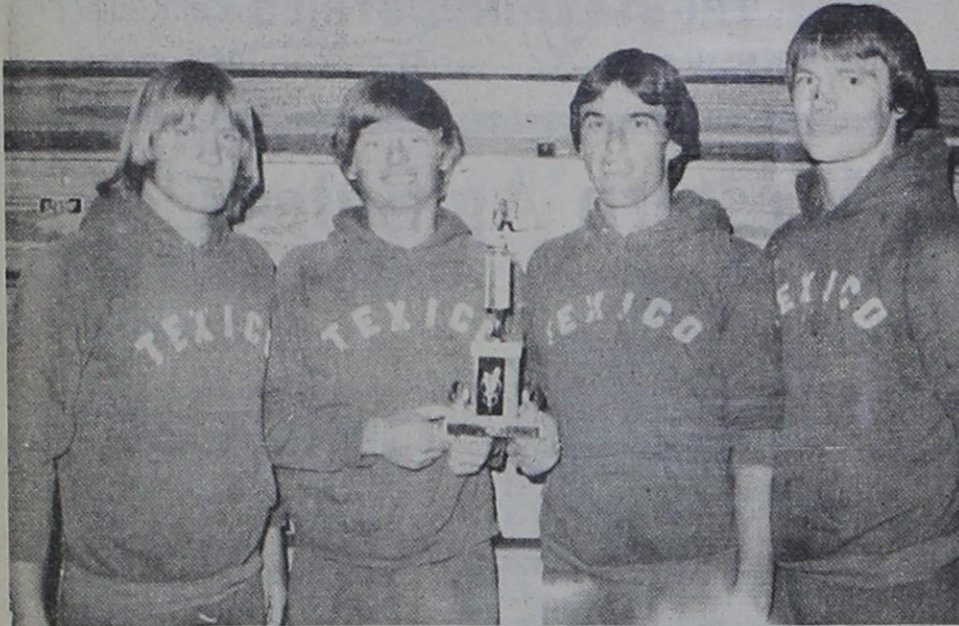

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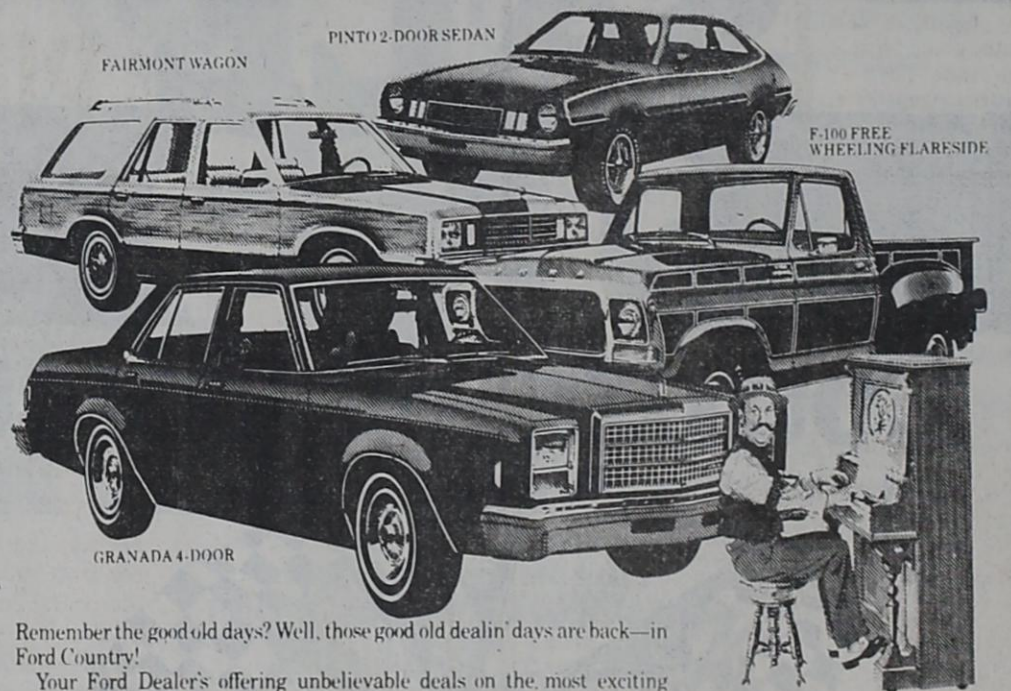
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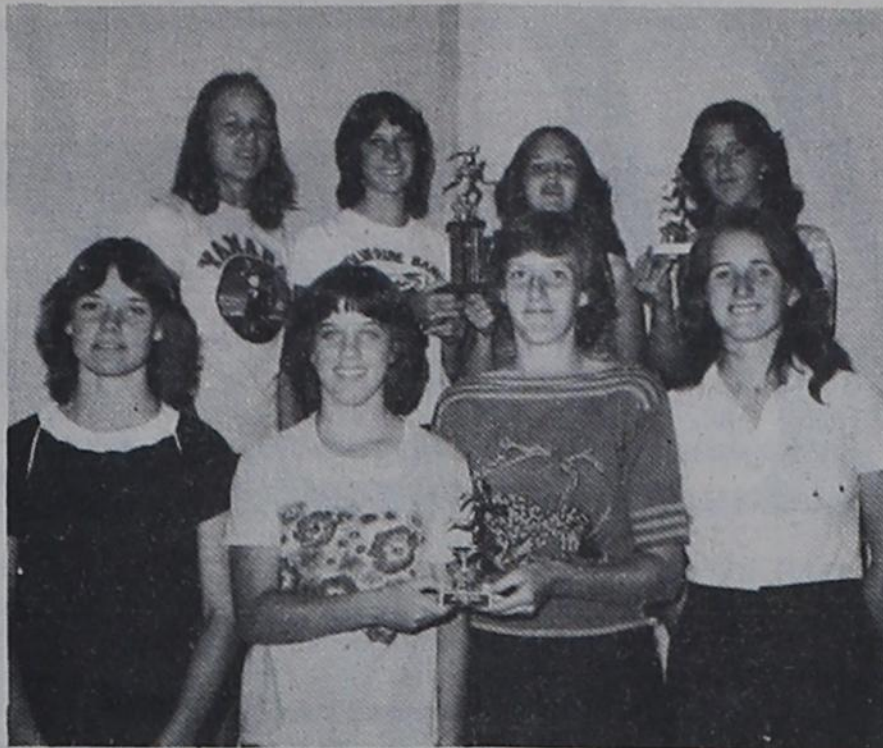
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# Texico Jr. High Girls Finish Second At Tatum

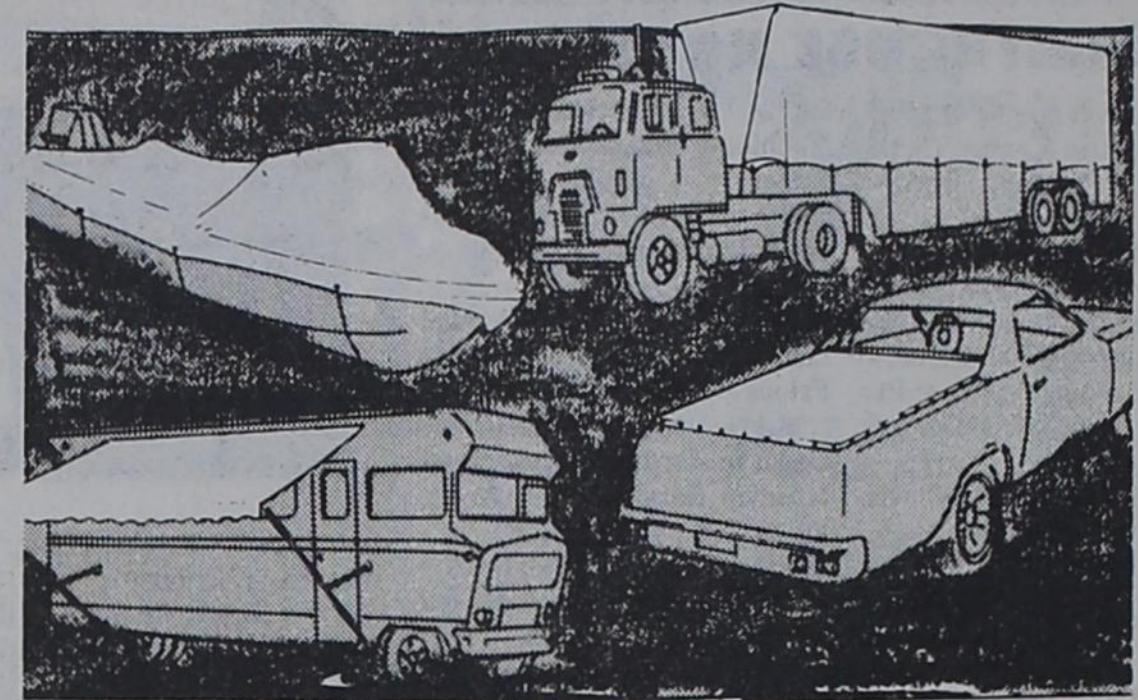

### A TALE OF THREE CITIES

In Thessalonica, Paul reasoned out of the Scriptures for three sabbath days with men who were unwilling to be convinced (Acts 17:1-9). The bigotry of these Thessalonians not only kept them in spiritual darkness, but it moved them to bitter opposition to the truth, so that they persecuted Paul and Silas and even followed them to Berea, stirring people up against them.

Bigotry has the same effect today. Let us never close our minds so as to keep error out, for in doing so we will only shut new light out and close old errors in. Moreover, it is but a small step from shutting out new light from God's Word to engaging in bitter opposition to it.

The Athenians went to the other extreme. They lost interest in what was old and clamoured only to hear new things (Acts 17:21). Yet when Paul came to them with the good news of the gospel of grace, some "mocked" while others, more polite, said: "We will hear thee again of this matter," and turned away (Verse 32).

The Athenian spirit too is still
