At this writing we do not know what will happen to the recently Senate enacted farm bill. We do have a story that says that President Carter will probably veto it because it is estimated that the legislation will add a hundred dollars a year to the food bill of a family of three

We don't know who made the estimating on that hundred buck figure, but if the percentage the farmer actually receives is anywhere close to what we have been given in the past as the farmers' take it sounds much too high to us. If you tripled the farmers bit on a loaf of bread you are looking at another couple of pennies, and so it is with all grain-related foodstuffs.

President Carter seems to be disturbed at adding a hundred dollar bill to the family food cost if it goes to the producer, but apparently not if it goes to a union coal miner. When the coal mine settlement costs are finally reflected in the cost of living that \$100 will be "peanuts."

Do not delude yourself that the rest of the unions will sit by and let the coal miners walk off with the pay raise prize for the year. By the time the Administration settles all the future wage disputes, by threatening to confiscate the

You can tell where a person's heart is by seeing where his pocketbook is and you can tell whose vote a politician favors by what legislation he espouses. President Carter is writing a record of union appeasement at the

We received an enlightening release by the Texas LP-Gas Association concerning the Consumer Safety Commission (CPSC) proposed ban on unvented gas heaters. Since the vented heater would cost at least \$170 more than the unvented and use from 20% to 35% more fuel it would be to the economic advantage for the LP-Gas boys to encourage the CPSC proposal. However, such is not the case as the LP-Gas release demonstrates once more the heavy hand of federal bureaucracy at work making life more expensive and complex for the citizenry.

The LP-Gas report says that in the first place the expense of installing vented heaters would fall on those least able to afford the additional expense of installation and future fuel costs.

It also says that the CPSC reports that it has documented at least 50 deaths from unvented space heaters since January 1, 1973. CPSC acknowledges some 10 million unvented heaters in use. This sure figures out to a mighty small percentage. In fact, 50 people were killed in 1976 alone when their parachutes failed to open. Many common items are of a far greater statistical danger to the pub-

Well, once again we see an "industrial ogre" as they are painted by the White Knights of consumerism, fighting against their self-interest in behalf of the buying public.

Believe me, friends, you will not find many reports of industry's good side in federal commission reports or consumer magazines. Unfortunately this also applies to the mass media.





# Consumer Food News

COLLEGE STATION - Grocery features include processed fruits and vegetables, spices, tuna, and pasta and dairy products at Texas markets this week.

Also, several fresh vegetable items, poultry and frozen fish may offer economy prices, according to Mrs. Gwendolyne Clyatt, a consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Price and quality trends are as follows:

DAIRY - Features include milk, cheese, yogurt and butter, along with half-andhalf, sour cream and whipping

cream. FRESH VEGETABLES -Best buys are carrots, and reasonable prices appear on Texas cabbage and peppers from Mexico and Florida. Asparagus prices are a bit lower, but onion prices are higher due to field losses and transportation problems.

Pricewise, also consider broccoli, collards, mustard greens, turnips, rutabagas and potatoes.

POULTRY - Some fryerchicken features appear on whole birds and parts. Many markets offer turkey parts at bargain prices, and eggs have attractive prices.


FISH - Several promotions are underway on frozen fish, but compare prices according to style, type and package

FRESH FRUITS - Grapefruit has high quality and economical prices.

Strawberry supplies are limited, but expect them to increase. Some cantaloupe has moderate price levels, and pineapple has lower prices.

BEEF - Prices continue to trend upward.

Chuck cuts are the most-often featured items. For real economy, buy the less expenthem at home. Other features include boneless roasts, round and sirloin steak and beef



St. Paul opens his Epistle to the Romans by stating that the Lord Jesus Christ was "declared to be the Son of God with power," or "powerfully declared to be the Son of God...by the resurrection from the

In Psa. 2:6, we have Christ, in prophecy, saying, "I will declare the decree: the Lord hath said unto me, Thou art My Son; this day have I begotten Thee." Our Lord was, of course, eternally one with the Facomes from Israel's laws, referring to the time when the child was officially declared to be the father's full-grown son.

But what day was He referring to? On what day did the Father officially declare, "This day have I begotten Thee"? The answer is found in Acts 13:33, where the apostle states that God "raised up Jesus again; as it is also written in the second Psalm: Thou art My Son, THIS DAY have I begotten Thee." So our Lord was officially declared - and powerfully declared to be the Son of God at His resurrection from the dead. But what did Paul mean in II

Tim. 2:7,8, where he said: "Con-

sider what I say; and the Lord give

thee understanding in all things.

Remember that Jesus Christ, of the seed of David, was raised from the dead according to my gospel." The answer is that the twelve had proclaimed Christ as the Son of David, to sit on David's throne. Theirs was "the gospel of the king-

But when the King and His kingdom were rejected, God raised up another apostle, Paul, to proclaim "The gospel of the grace of God" (Acts 20:24).

Christ was, indeed, raised from the dead to sit on David's throne, and this will yet come to pass, but Paul has a message for us, here and now: that Christ was raised from the dead to certify our justification and to become the Head of "the Church which is His Body.'




