Christmas Celebrations Set By Area Churches

For their congregations, friends, and others interested in observing religious aspects of the coming holidays, area churches have scheduled special Christmas services, programs, and cantatas, in celebration of the Christmas season.

The Methodist and Baptist churches of Oklahoma Lane have not planned any special services for Christmas or Christmas Eve, as both congregations will be taking part in that community's annual Christmas Tree program on Christmas Eve. The event is set for 7:30 p.m. at the Oklahoma Lane Community Center, and everyone is invited.

Pastor Charlie Martinez of the San Jose Catholic Church in Texico said that the church will observe Midnight Mass at 12 p.m. MST on Christmas Eve.

On Sunday, Dec. 18, members of Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church will meet at the church at 5:45 p.m. CST to go caroling throughout the Twin Cities. Following the period of caroling, they will return to the church fellowship hall for refreshments.

Also at Hamlin Memorial, a special candlelight Christmas Eve communion service will be held at 5 p.m. CST. Everyone is cordially invited to go on the caroling tour and to attend the communion service.

The church also announces that there will be no choir practice on December 21 or December 28.

St. John Lutheran Church of Lariat will have a candlelight service on December 24 at 6

p.m. Regular worship services will be conducted on Christmas Day.

The adult choir of First Baptist Church, Farwell, will present a Christmas cantata entitled "Down From His Glory," starting at 7 p.m. CST on Sunday, Dec. 18. Everyone is invited to hear this musical presentation.

A special Christmas service will be held at the Farwell Baptist Church from 10:30 to 11:30 a.m. on Christmas Day, Dec. 25.

New Directors Elected For Appraisal District

Five directors were named to the Parmer County Appraisal District in an election in November with final results being tabulated last week.

Three new directors on the board are Alfred Hicks of Lubbudie, Thomas Rhodes of Bovina, and Mark Williams of Farwell. Returned to the board for another term each were David Goddard and David Grimsley, both of Friona.

Outgoing members of the board are D.C. Herring, Lawrence Jameson and Gilbert Kaltwasser.

Directors of the Appraisal District are nominated and selected by the governing bodies of the voting taxing units in the district, including county, city, town, and certain school districts within the Appraisal District. Special entities such as hospital districts, utility companies etc. do not vote in the director selection process, nor does the general public vote on directors.

To be eligible to serve on the district board, a person must be a resident of the Appraisal District and have established a residency in the district for at least two years immediately preceding the date he or she takes office.

There are no established requirements as far as knowledge is concerned to be eligible for election. However, knowledge and expertise in such areas as accounting, management, personnel administration, and real estate knowledge are helpful with the directors' duties.

Appraisal District directors serve a two-year term beginning on January 1st of even numbered years. Through its policies, the board of directors determines the goals of the Appraisal District, and it operates as the decision-making body of the Appraisal District. It also evaluates the effectiveness of the chief appraiser, and is over all the appraisal process in reaching the final product.

The Board of Directors has the following primary responsibilities:

1. Establish the appraisal office for the Appraisal District.
2. Adopt the annual operating budget for the district.
3. Contract for any necessary services.
4. Hire the chief appraiser.
5. Appoint the appraisal review board members.
6. Make general policy regarding the operation of the Appraisal District, such as re-appraisal programs, rules, procedures, etc.

According to the State Property Tax Board, the effectiveness and smooth operation of the Appraisal District requires planning and cooperation by the Appraisal District directors, chief appraiser, and appraisal staff. The groundwork, however, begins with the policies and goals established by the board of directors. The quality of the tax system at the local level depends to a great extent on the actions taken by the members of the Appraisal District board of directors organization and operation of the

Funeral services are scheduled for Saturday, Dec. 17, at 11 a.m. CST at Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church in Farwell for Joe Elvert Caywood, 75, of Texico who died Tuesday night at Farwell Convalescent Center. Burial will be in the Texico Cemetery with Steed-Todd Funeral Home of Clovis in charge.

Mr. Caywood was born August 10, 1908 in Duncan, Okla., and on November 3, 1928 in Farwell he was married to Mildred Maurine Bell.

He worked for the Santa Fe Railroad for 19 years, and for the Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees until his retirement in 1973. He also worked as a private investigator for the BM of WE and also was a realtor affiliated with Byrnes Southwest Real Estate of Clovis. He was a New Mexico state legislative representative for the BM of WE, was a member of Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church, and member of the Clovis District Board of Trustees of the New Mexico Conference of the United Methodist Church.

Mr. Caywood was a member and past worshipful master of Vaughn Lodge #43 AF&AM, Vaughn, N.M., and a member of the Scottish Rite Consistory of Santa Fe and the Curry County Scottish Rite Club.

He was past worthy patron of Rowena #36, Order of Eastern Star, Vaughn, N.M., and was a member of Keystone #27, OES, Clovis.

A past president of Railroad Retirees, he was the first director for the Texico-Farwell Senior Citizens, was a member of the Texico Chamber of Commerce, and member of Gideons International.

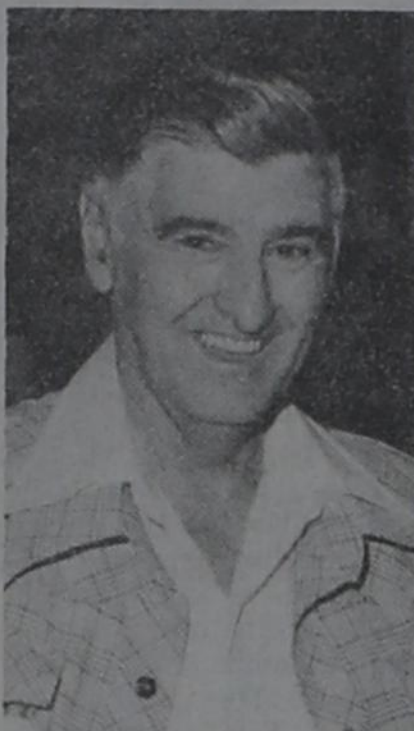
The Caywoods lived in Kenna,

Sheriff Warns Residents: Possible Insurance Fraud

Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan this week issued a warning to residents of the Farwell and Bovina areas of possible fraud in connection with insurance policies sold in the area since the first of June 1983.

The sheriff said that the policies were sold by a couple from Lubbock representing a Lubbock firm and that the insurance included all types from automobile to household.

Sheriff Morgan said that a warrant has been issued for the arrest of two persons involved in the alleged fraud and that all citizens should check their insurance policies and talk to their companies to make sure the policies are legitimate.

"If in doubt, contact the sheriff's office or the district attorney's office," Sheriff Morgan said.

Three Thefts Reported To Sheriff's Department

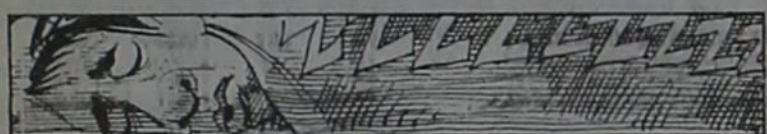
Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan reports that the following incidences are being investigated by his department this week:

Guilty Pleas Heard In District Court

In Farmer County 287th District Court presided over by District Judge Jack D. Young on December 9, six persons pled guilty to charges and results of the court were as follows:

Larry Haney, 27, of Farwell pled guilty to a charge of theft, a felony. Charge was reduced to misdemeanor theft. He was fined \$100 plus court costs and was given one year probation.

Rojelio Reyes, age 29, of Friona pled guilty to a charge of burglary and had it reduced to misdemeanor criminal trespass, was given one year probation, was to make restitution of \$64, and pay court costs.

Larry Gentry, 33, of Friona pled guilty to charge of burglary, had it reduced to misdemeanor criminal trespass, was given one year probation, ordered to make restitution of \$64, and pay court costs.

Barbara Ann Williams, 25, of Dimmitt pled guilty to charge of passing forged prescription. She was given four years pro-

bation and had to pay court costs.

Dario Hernandez, 18, of Farwell pled guilty to a charge of burglary of a building. He was sentenced to four years probation and ordered to pay court costs.

Jose Adam Gomez Jr., 18, of Bovina, pled guilty to charge of forgery and passing. He was ordered to make restitution of \$2,673.28, pay court costs, and sentenced to three years probation.

On December 12 Francisco Montalva, 25, of Clovis was charged with violation of probation and had his probation continued.

Also on that date Carolyn McDonald, 32, of Dimmitt was charged with passing a forged prescription and on a plea of guilty received 10 years probation.

Jack D. Young, district judge, also presided at the December 12 hearings.

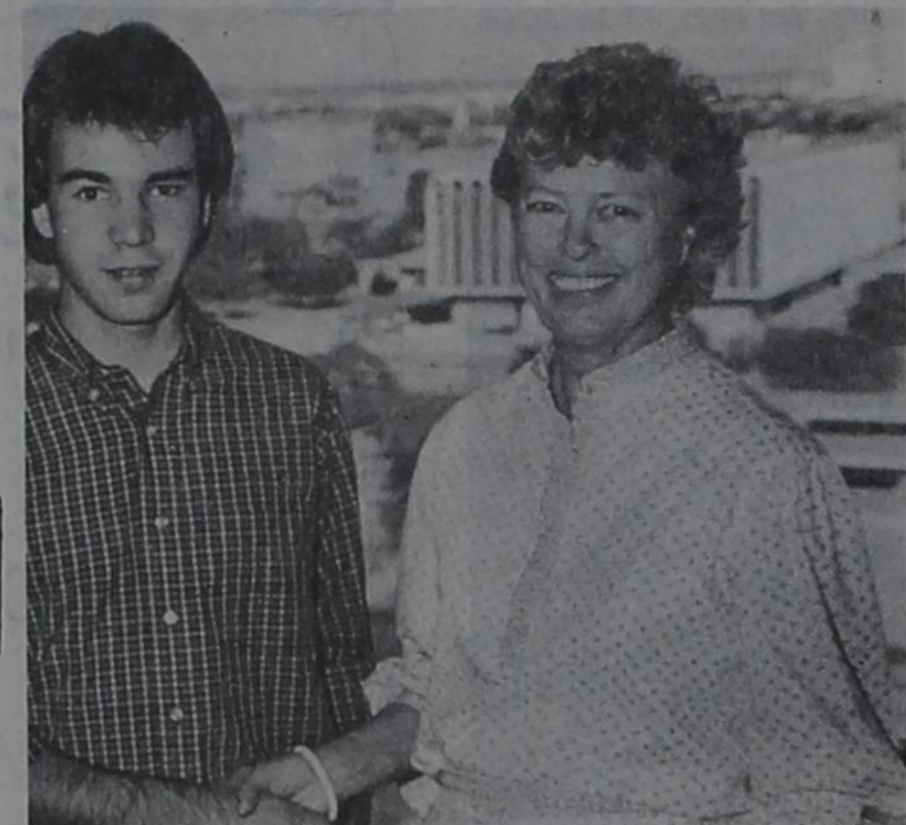
State Rep. Here Wed.

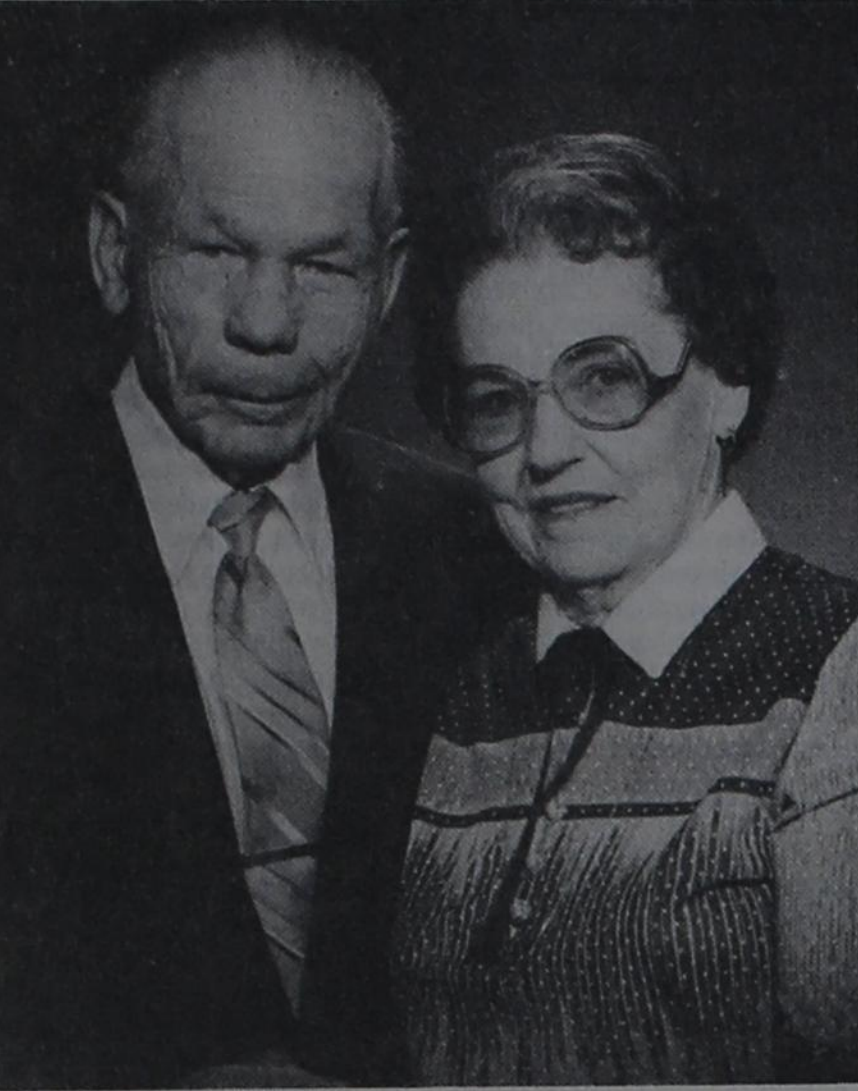
The students were chosen from among all the junior, senior, graduate, law and medical students at Texas Tech and the Texas Tech Health Sciences Center.

"Mistakes against Friona cost us the tournament," said Steerette Coach Larry Gregory. "Friona is a good team and they capitalized on our mistakes and

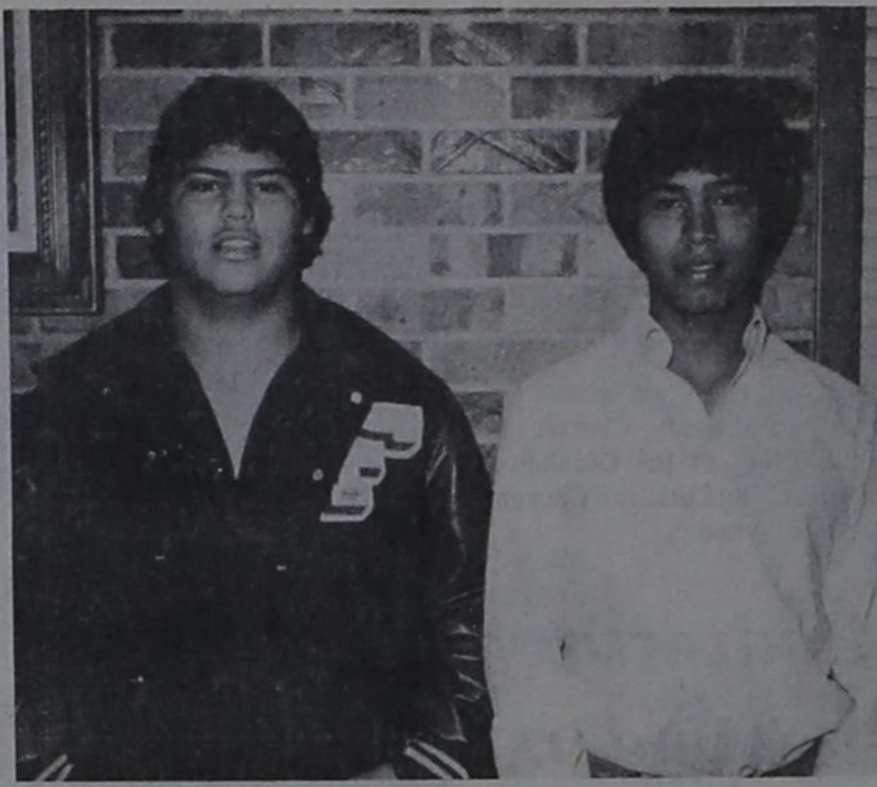

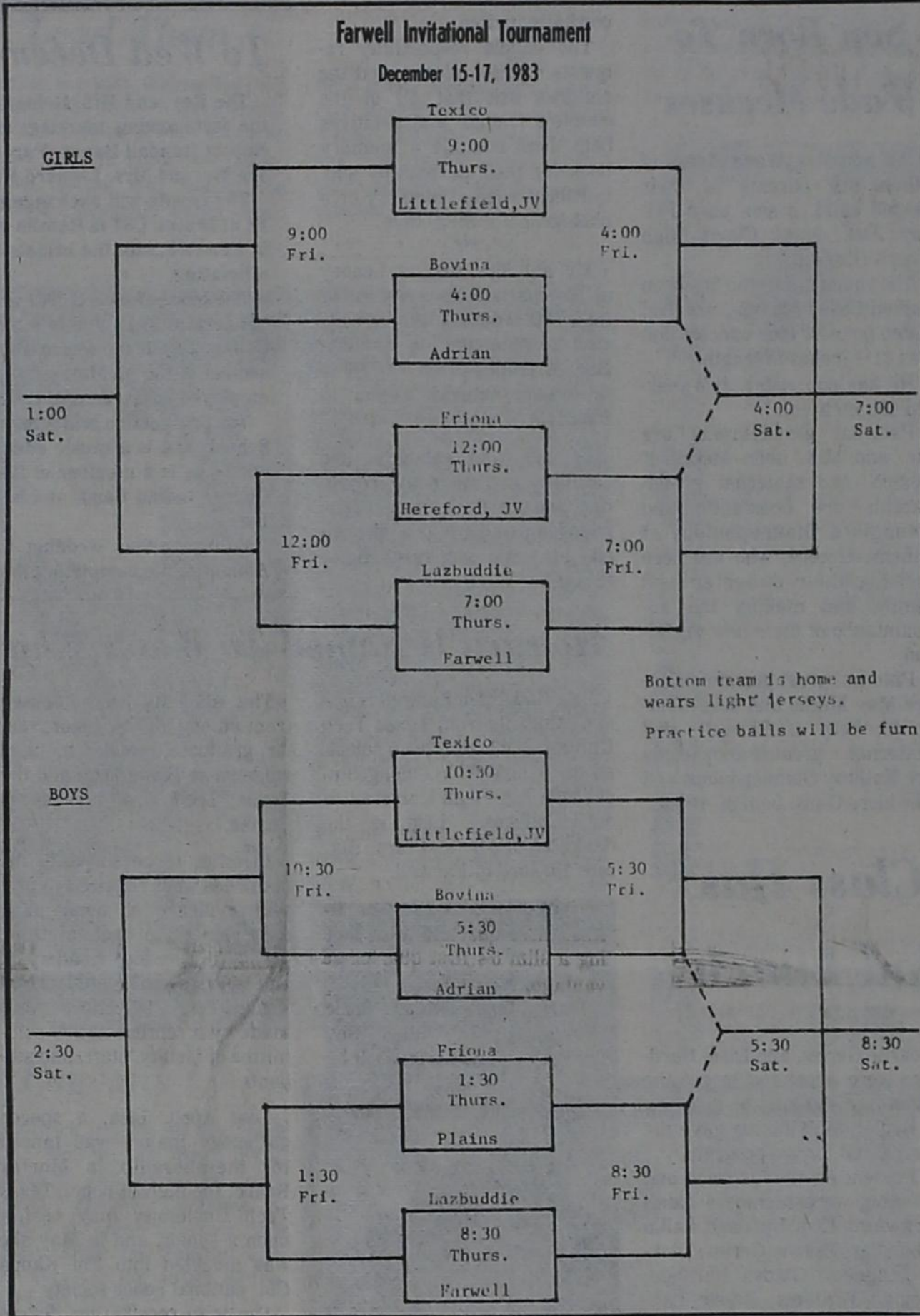

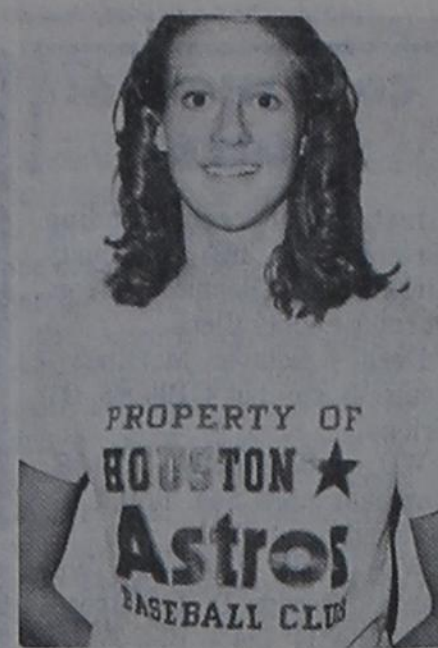
Next action for the Wolverines was to have been at 10:30 a.m. Thursday against the Littlefield JV team in the Farwell Invitational Tournament.

Not Matthew, Mark or Luke; nor Peter, James, or John, but Paul alone writes by divine inspiration: "FOR I SPEAK TO YOU GENTILES [or, OF THE NATIONS] INASMUCH AS I AM THE APOSTLE OF THE GENTILES [NATIONS]: I MAGNIFY MINE OFFICE" (Rom. 11:13).

Note well that Paul did not magnify himself, "but his office, to which he had been appointed by the glorified Lord Himself. In defending his apostleship before the Galatians he wrote: "But I certify you, brethren, THAT THE GOSPEL WHICH WAS PREACHED OF ME is not after man. For I neither received it of man, neither was I taught it, BUT BY THE REVELATION OF JESUS CHRIST" (Gal. 1:11, 12).

In many other passages the apostle claims to speak as a direct representative of Christ (See I Cor. 11:23; 15:3; Eph. 3:2, 3; I Thes. 4:15; etc.).

"We led in the game the entire way but we got into some foul trouble," Coach Cumpton said. "The kids gave a tremendous effort but just could not hold on at the end."

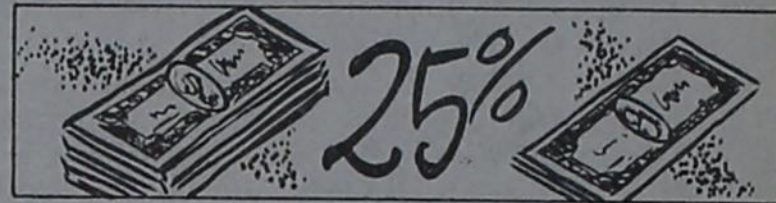
Steerettes Stung By Hornets

Farwell JV Steerettes faced a big and tough Sudan JV team who beat them 55-23 at Sudan, December 13.

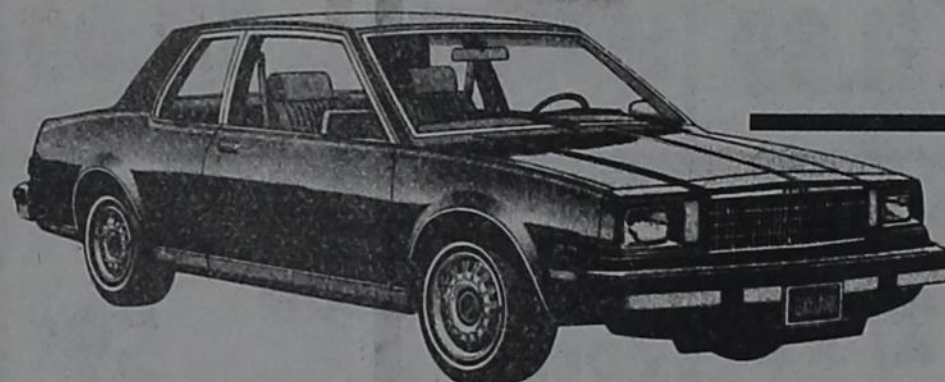
"We played an outstanding JV team and lost, but we learned quite a bit from playing them. The girls are improving with each game," said Farwell Coach Larry Gregory.
