

Directors of the Appraisal District are nominated and selected by the governing bodies of the voting taxing units in the district, including county, city, town, and certain school districts within the Appraisal District. Special entities such as hospital districts, utility companies etc. do not vote in the director selection process, nor does the general public vote on directors.

To be eligible to serve on the district board, a person must be a resident of the Appraisal District and have established a residency in the district for at least two years immediately preceding the date he or she takes office.

There are no established requirements as far as knowledge is concerned to be eligible for election. However, knowledge and expertise in such areas as accounting, management, personnel administration, and real
