First Graders Need Birth Certificates

Texico elementary school, announces that any child who will attain the age of six years before January 1, 1968 and lives in the Texico school district is eligible to enter school this fall, However, when the student is brought to school (on the first

day) to register he must have a birth certificate (proof of age) and will need to have had all of his immunizations against certain diseases as required by state law.

Any child planning to enter school must be immunized against poliomyelitis (a complete series); smallpox - vaccination within the last five years; diptheria and tetanus series completed, or a booster within the last three or four years. Although measles vaccination is not required, it is recommended if your child has not had measles. Measles albe serious.

Editorial

America Waits For A Reply

If the majority of Negroes in America are really the responsible citizens that it is hoped they are, then they better get busy and publicly condemn America's black Castro, Stokely Carmichael, before he indirectly leads them down the road to ruin. Apparently many things can be tolerated by the American public, including the never ending bleatings of Dr. Martin Luther King, but Stokely is going too far. Call it "white blacklash" if you will, but America will soon lose all compassion for any minority race which embraces an alien philosophy of government, especially a philosophy which denies the existence of God, and which teaches that the sole purpose of the individual is to contribute to the betterment of the state.

I refer, of course, to Carmichael's attendance of the Havana conference of the Latin American Solidarity Organization, at which he supported Fidel Castro's grand design of infiltration and subversion, and spoke himself of black guerrilla warfare, aimed at eventually tumbling the government of the United States of America. This is too much! Stokely Carmichael has advocated the overthrow of the United States government and as such, is guilty of high treason! No excuse will suffice, Stokely has made himself absolutely clear. By his own admission, he is working toward the day when bands of black guerrillas will run rampant through the cities of America, hurling bombs and shooting anyone who gets in their way, especially policemen and other guardians of law and order. He does not want to build a better America for the Negro, he wants to burn it down, to reduce it to ashes. He is not motivated by a desire to improve the lot of the Negro, he is motivated by an intense hatred of the white man. He wants to destroy the white man's world, and in so doing, he will destroy the world of the Negro as well. If the majority of American Negroes allow themselves to become so frustrated by their problems, that they too embrace this self-destruction philosophy, then their cause in America is lost forever. No amount of political double talk, no new civil rights legislation can save them. Once they lose the compassion of the American public, they are doomed, and they are dangerously close to this today.

It will not suffice to merely remain silent on the problem. Responsible Negroes must speak out, again and again. They must make it plain to all of America that what Stokely Carmichael is doing, he is doing on his own, and that they, indeed all responsible Negroes, condemn him for it. Above all, they must not allow further riots to take place, at any cost. If necessary, they must organize peace keeping squads in black neighborhoods, to insure that followers of Stokely Carmichael and Rap Brown do not succeed in their plans. Even this is not enough. The responsible Negro himself must stop demanding and start asking, for in making demands, he automatically identifies himself with the Carmichael faction. The time for action is not next month or next year, it is now, today, the sooner the better. The American public is rapidly becoming fed up with the current state of affairs and only swift action by the responsible Negro can head off a massive condemnation of the entire civil rights movement. What will his answer be? The American public waits -- but not for long.
