



Parmer County water to be studied in 3-D

High Underground Conservation District No. 1 Board has approved doing a 3-dimensional hydrogeologic stratigraphic analysis of Parmer County.

To put into terms most of us can understand, the HPU said this might compare to a CAT scan or MRI of the Ogallala Aquifer within Parmer County.

It is hoped that the 3-D model will give the farmers a better understanding of the geology and hydrology of the groundwater stored in Parmer County.

If this proves successful, the HPU may expand the modeling effort to other counties within its service area.

Phase 1 calls for constructing a hydrologic stratigraphic framework,

Plains using data from various Water sources. Must of this data will be gotten from driller's logs kept on file at the HPU office and from the annual depth to water measurements.

> Also, state agency data might be used.

Thus, a data base will be fuilt using that information from geologic formations, well depths, pump test data and other attributes, for example.

Phase 2 involves building a 3-dimensional computer model of the 100 selected locations within Parmer County. It would include aquifer surfaces and hydrologic properties.

Parmer County was selected as the test county because of the range of results for groundwater availability from previous models.

The project is expected to be completed this year.



parents, John W. and Mollie E. Bradley, are buried in Texico Cemetery. J.W. Bradley managed the Roosevelt County Telephone Co. in early Texico.

I once worked with Ralph's sister, Vivian Bradley Robinson, and more recently saw her at a Texico School reunion.

T.C. Hennington (later replaced by the Rev. G.O. Dean), Walter Hapke, Ernest M. Jennings and Walter Noble sang in a Sunday quartet at Cracker Box School near Lazbuddie in the 1920s, according to "A History of Parmer County."

G.O. Dean was the father of country singer and actor Jimmy Dean.

You can read about the entertainer in hits 2004 autobiography, "Thirty Years of Sausage, Fifty Years of Ham: Jimmy Dean's Own Story."

Nimrod, "the mighty hunter" of the Bible and a great-grandson of Noah, founded cities in the province of Muthanna in Iraq.

LIVE CATTLE: Live Cattle prices may have reached a stopping point for the moment? Prices rebounded back to test contract highs on the nearby contracts this week and looked like they failed going into Fridayís close. Cash prices traded sharply lower this week and could possibly move lower into next week. Market may have done about all it can for now?

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeders traded back down into a major support level around the \$111.85 level basis the August contract, but closed on the low of the week. Any further decline into next week may indicate a short term top in feeders as well. Corn prices added most of the pressure, but lower Live Cattle prices would probably have more impact on feeders than lower corn?

CORN: No doubt that corn prices closed strong on the week, but weak on the last day. All the grains hit major long term resistance levels early Friday and all lost much of their gains. There was reportedly heavy selling around todayis highs forcing the market back down. It would take a close back below the \$6.39 level basis the July contract in order to turn trends back down.

SOYBEANS: Soybeans also hit several of their long term price projections this week before turning back down off their highs on Friday. A close back below the \$14.15 level basis the July contract would turn short term trends back down. There has been little news pushing grains higher, but Funds have been big buyers up until Friday. Funds were heavy sellers early today.

WHEAT: Wheat prices have basically been marching to a beat of a different drummer lately. The market has reached most of it's long term price targets on the downside which looks like it may have stopped the drop for minute? The market closed stronger than most of the grains and may have a little more room on the upside. Overall, expect harvest pressure into early August.

COTTON: Cotton got a boost this week mostly from a stronger grain complex. There has still been little news to support a significant rally along with a slowing world economy. Todayís unemployment number saw one of the largest jumps seen in the last 20 years dropping the Dow Jones almost 400 points. Cotton will remain economic sensitive at least over the near term.

Commissioners approve tax abatement schedule

The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday approved a new tax abatement schedule for qualified applicants.

Criteria includes employment, fiscal and community impacts. These include:

-- The project must be a capital investment of at least \$1 million and create at least five new permanent fulltime jobs.

-- All tax revenue lost as a result of the abatements will be recaptured if the propery owner fails to fulfill the agreement.

-- Retail businesses do not qualify for real property tax abatements.

-- Every effort will be made to ensure that the tax abatement policy doesn't encourage unfair competition within the same product area.

If it is determined that the applicant qualifies, the following guidelines for the maximum abatements are offered:

Year 1, 100 percent; year 2, 100 percent; year 3, 75 percent; year 4, 50 percent; year 5, 25 percent, and year 6, 25 percent.

Abatements shall be allowed for up to two years during the construction and for four years after.

The commissioners also renewed the designation of the unincorporated area of Parmer County as a commercial - industrial reinvestment zone.
