BTD parade to feature 'Caravan of Champions'

A highlight of this year's Big Parade will be Texico Schools' "Caravan of Champions."

The caravan will feature athletes, teachers and coaches involved in the school groups that finished 1st or 2nd at State or who won District.

First will come Doug Crawford's convertible carrying this year's Border Town Days Honorary Parade Marshals Keith Durham and Richard Luscombe.

Durham won consecutive state championships as coach of the girls' varsity basketball team.

Luscombe won last year's state championship as coach of the boys' varsity basketball team and also garnered his 400th as a Texico coach last season.

After the Honorary Parade Marshals will come rows of banners denoting the high finishes for the school's teams and organizations this year.

Then will come two flatbed trailers, donated by Ted Richardson and Leon Kelley.

Boys will ride on one flatbed, girls on the other.

Also, all former players for Coach Luscombe are invited to ride on the boys' float.

This will be followed by a convertible carrying the Texico student attending the International Science Fair.

High school students involved in any of the following teams or groups are asked to participate on the floats:

1. Girls basketball team.
2. Boys basketball team.
3. Football team.
4. Girls track team.
5. FFA chapter.
6. FCCLA chapter.
7. Baseball team.
8. Cheerleading squad. The cheerleaders may not be riding on the floats if they are asked to carry the banners in the parade.

Williams served Farwell Schools from 1945 to 1976. He taught math, coached football and basketball, was principal for the elementary, junior high and high schools, and served as superintendent.

After the gym dedication, a free meal will be served, compliments of Farwell Schools. Announcements and awards will be made throughout the evening, with the doors closing at 8 p.m.

The school will also hold an open house from 1 to 3 p.m. on Saturday.

Karolene Inman reminisces

Karolene Inman is happy to be a part of the 100th Anniversary celebration of the Farwell Schools. She was willing

to share many stories and memories in an in-depth interview. It was interesting to hear Karolene tell these stories and to see the Farwell Schools through her eyes; first as a student just starting out ... then as a young teacher, just starting out.

Karolene (Towns) Inman is the daughter of Verney and Mona Towns. She started at Farwell Elementary in the fall of 1944. Farwell had no kindergarten back at this time so her first experience in school was as a scared, nervous first-grader. Her mother had just had surgery and could not bring Karolene to school for her first day. She had to ride the bus and she recalls

being so scared that she just shook in her seat all the way to school. But relief washed over her as she stepped off the bus and saw the friendly, familiar face of her friend Alta (Norton) Geries.

Her first grade teacher was named Mrs. Whitley. Karolene fondly recalled her as the "sweetest, most precious person in the whole world."

"This woman treated each of us students just like her own children," Karolene stated. "And when you were as anxious about school like I was, this was extremely comforting. She continued to love us and treat us very special all through the school year too!"

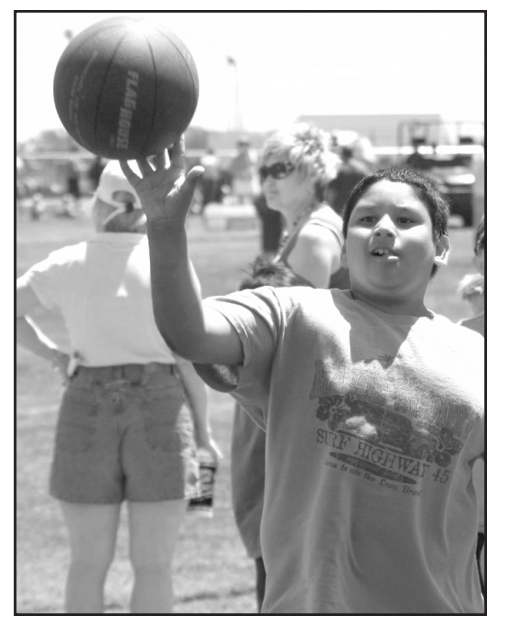
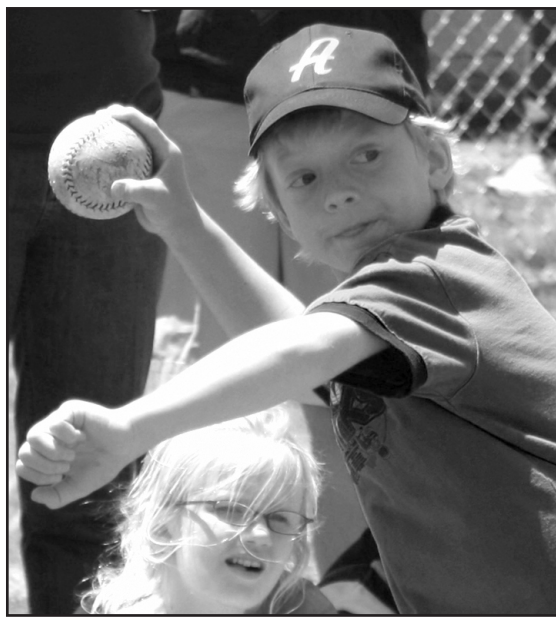


A look back...

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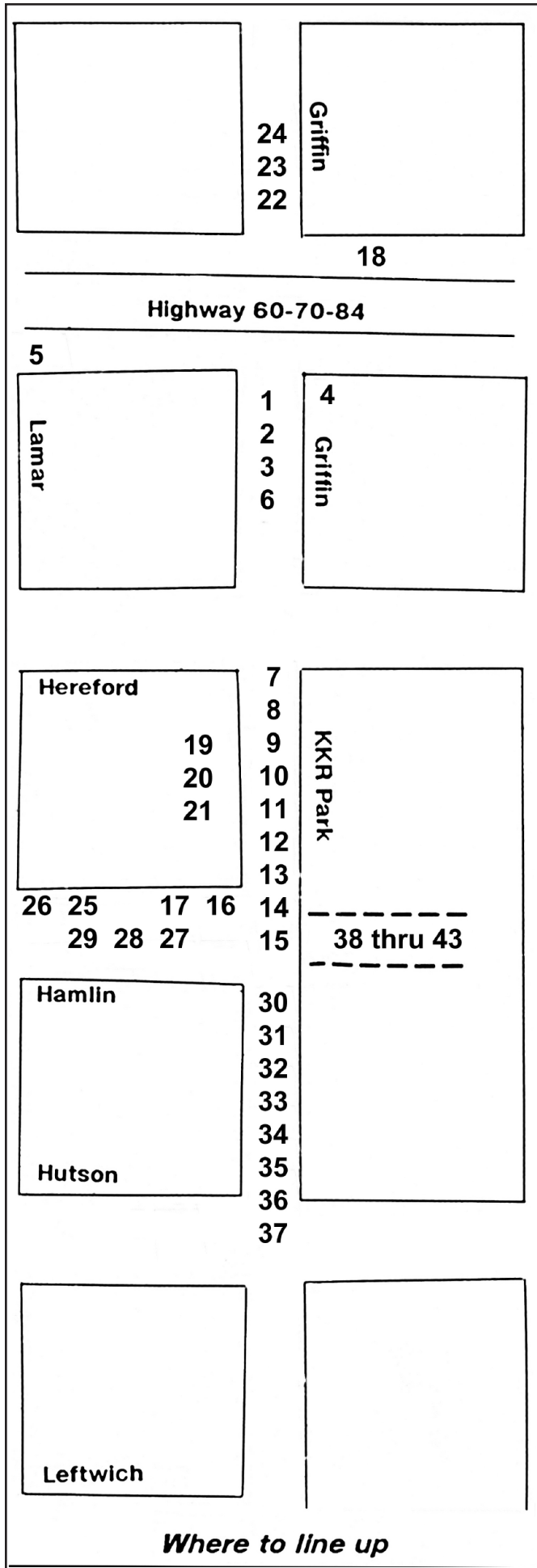
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Here's the 2008 BTD Parade lineup

The parade starts at 11 a.m. ct (10 a.m. New Mexico time) at Griffin Street in Texico, one block east of Highway 108.

The highway will be closed off during the parade. Hereford Street in Texico will be used as a by-pass. Residents are asked not to park their vehicles on Hereford Street during the parade.

The parade will go down the highway to 5th Street in Farwell, where it turns south, past the Farwell Convalescent Center, and ends at the Farwell city park.

Bill Dannheim will be at the parade end to direct groups where to park.

Any groups that wish to join the parade but are not included in this list still may do so, but have to line up at the end of the parade are not eligible for prizes.

NCC official speaks here

The annual meeting of Parmer County Cotton Growers Cooperative was held on July 17. Guest Speaker Craig Brown, Vice President of the National Cotton Council, spoke on the new Farm Bill and its effects on farmers.

Brown pointed out that 80 percent of the cotton grown in America this year will be for export.

Transportation prices are increasing and farmers will be quickly looking for ways to make farming work.

Among the topics he covered were the new cotton program, and the new acre program that will be available in the next couple of years.

He pointed out that spouses will soon be much more important to

cotton farmers as Direct Attribution payments will lower the restriction on who will be considered.

He also said that figuring out the impact of the Farm Bill is impossible at this time.

Other topics he touched on included the USDA's role in implementing the Farm Bill, and the trade debate with the World Trade Organization. He ended his talk with

a look at the problems with the futures market for grain and cotton, as well as for livestock. He pointed out that the market is failing farmers as they can not guess what is going to happen with the current system.

Bovina Cemetery regulations listed

Some information about the ordinance concerning Bovina Cemetery that you might like to know:
 No fences and no enclosures are allowed other than concrete, granite or marble four to six inches high.
 No more than two bouquets of flowers may be placed in vases on a grave. One bouquet on each side of the head stone or market or wreath or basket of flowers, but never more than two floral arrangements at one time.
 Artificial flowers are allowed but are subject to removal during maintenance, watering, grass cutting, etc.
 The cemetery has the authority to remove any floral designs, flowers, decorations, etc., which are judged to have become unsightly, hinder maintenance and/or don't conform to the ordinance standards.

Let's lower our taxes

As a Parmer County resident, I was most happy to see the excellent financial report for the last fiscal year for our county government as reported in the Tribune last week.

There was a time about 20 years ago when the financial picture wasn't that rosy, but the commissioners court has done an excellent job of returning to financial stability. Tom Ware, the Bovina area commissioner at the time, had a lot to do with that improvement and I will always remember his part.

I congratulate our commissioners court.

But I believe the current picture is too strong. Basically (and I am using rough figures), the county is about \$2.8 million "in the black."

In the audit that was presented, the county picked up another \$400,000-plus. I see no reason, especially since some valuations have increased again, that a similar number won't be provided again for the current fiscal year.

If so, we are looking at a county surplus of more than \$3 million. In my opinion, that surplus is way too large. I think a surplus of half that

amount would do us well.

Now I realize that last year, the county commissioners kept their tax rate the same. However, due to higher valuations, taxes increased.

I wouldn't be surprised if the county commissioners vote to keep the tax rate the same again this year – but that again will result in higher taxes for us due to some increased valuations.

While land did not go up in value, some homeowners will see higher valuations due to higher home prices.

Folks, we are in a recession. Many families are struggling with food and gas costs especially.

I would like to see the county commissioners reduce their tax rate to the point that even with higher valuations for some, our taxes would not go up – or even be lower!

That makes a lot of sense to me.

And it could mean lot of cents to all Parmer County residents.

If you have thoughts on this subject (pro or con), let your county commissioner know: Michael Haseloff, Farwell area; Elvis Powell, Lazbuddie area; Kirk Frye, Friona area; and James Clayton, Bovina area.

Saturday is Border Town Days.

Again, I would like to thank the many, many volunteers who work to make this day special for the Twin Cities.

But our community is indeed fortunate to have folks who give back.

Alice A. Luikart, a Farwell resident at the time of her death, was the widow of John C. Luikart, a Clovis post-master and an early regent of Eastern New Mexico Junior College (now ENMU) in Portales. He possessed a notable military record.

Second Lt. Luikart, of the New Mexico National Guard, reported for duty after Pancho Villa raided the border town of Columbus, N.M., in 1916. Villa and 800 or more of his Mexican followers set fire to houses and killed local citizens in the for-

eign raid.

Luikart served in France in World War I as captain.

As executive officer of the 515th Coast Artillery (AA), Lt. Colonel Luikart survived the infamous Bataan Death March in World War II.

He died as a prisoner on a Japanese ship in 1945. A U.S. Air Force plane bombed the enemy ship.

He is honored with a monument at Fort William McKinley in the Philippines.

The Luikarts' daughter, Annabel, married Lt. Samuel Sprott, an Air Force officer. He was killed in Europe in World War II.

Wonder how many women lost both their husband and father in the same war.

Ladena Williams Zinn once worked for the National Democratic Party at Washington, D.C. Mrs. Zinn was born at Texico in 1921. She died at Santa Fe in 2004.

Her husband, Dean Zinn, was appointed U.S.

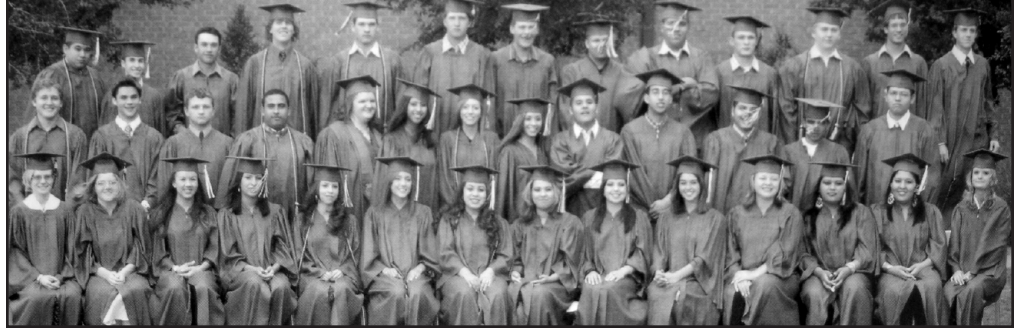

A look back...

'Cigars kill deadly gases'

Here's another in the series of articles from the Texico-Farwell News, which was published in 1917 and 1918.

The Dec. 7, 1918, issue of the Texico-Farwell News contained a lot of post-World War I news.

Headlines included "500 correspondents sail to cover peace conference", "Wearing of army togs after war", "Austria's casualty list 4 million" and a poem entitled "Let the Kaiser Live!"

One interesting article was headlined "Cigars kill deadly gases." The article said cigars saved a lot of American soldiers from deadly gas, so many officers and enlisted men went into battle smoking cigars.

"I think a cigar kills the Huns' gas just like it kills moths and germs," said an Army major.

One non-military article found itself on to Page 1. A 28-year-old woman married a 107-year-old man in Alabama. The bridegroom said, "They say there is no fool like an old fool! I guess they must be about right."

On on Page 2 was a column listed "Bovina items." They included:

-- A. Berggren has been on the sick list but has recovered.

-- Eva Messenger spent Thanksgiving with her sister, Mrs. B.P. Abbott. Mrs. Abbott and Miss Eula McDonald shopped in Hereford on Tuesday.

-- F.W. Jersig had a visitor from Kansas City, Mrs. Walker.

-- J.H. Aldridge and sons John and Sam attended the Pie Supper in Bovina.

-- The 1st quarterly conference of the Bovina Methodist church was held in Bovina with Rev. A.L. Moore, the presiding elder, to preach Sunday.

Then there were the ads:

-- Texico Garage, batteries rebuilt and recharged. Expert mechanics at your service.

-- Southwest Utilities Co., Farwell -- If it's anything electrical, we have it and can supply the demands.

-- V. Tate, auctioneer -- "I guarantee my work."

As always, Page 3 was the full page ad for the Cannon Ball Six-60 "Star of the Highway". The ad said the vehicle "has just been finished and is now snow bound in route to Texico."

It never arrived.

Page 4 had one large ad for three businesses -- Triplett Brothers, Red Cross Pharmacy and E.T. Maddux Hardware.

The ad said, "Influenza is recurring at other places. It might do so here! You are urged to do your Christmas buying now. This week, while the community is free from the disease."

Local tidbits filled most of the page. They included:

-- Pastor J.F. Nix of the Texico Baptist Church has declined the offer as State Evangelist.

-- Twins were born to Mr. and Mrs. W.S. Simmons, of Farwell. Mr. Simmons is the tinmaker man.

-- Prof. E.A. White of Farwell Schools went to Goldthwaite, Texas, because his mother was ill with pneumonia. His class in school was being dismissed meantime.

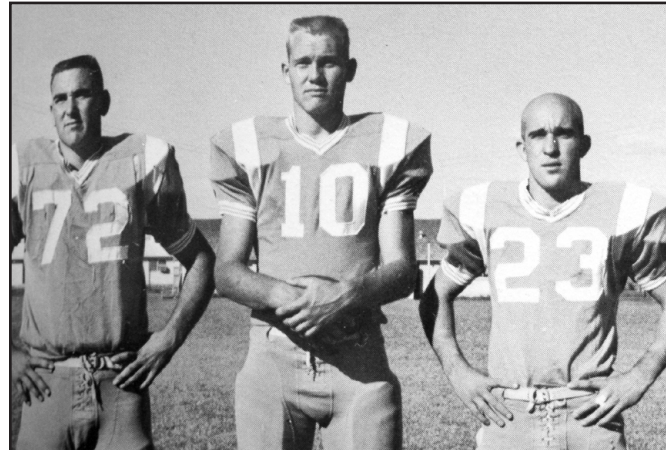
-- J.R. Mason has sold the business, stock and good will of his lumber company to the Kemp Lumber Co. and will retire from that business.



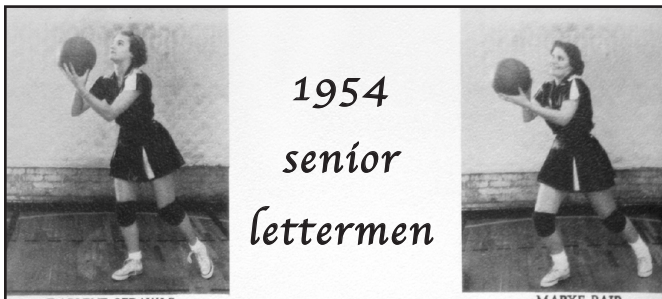

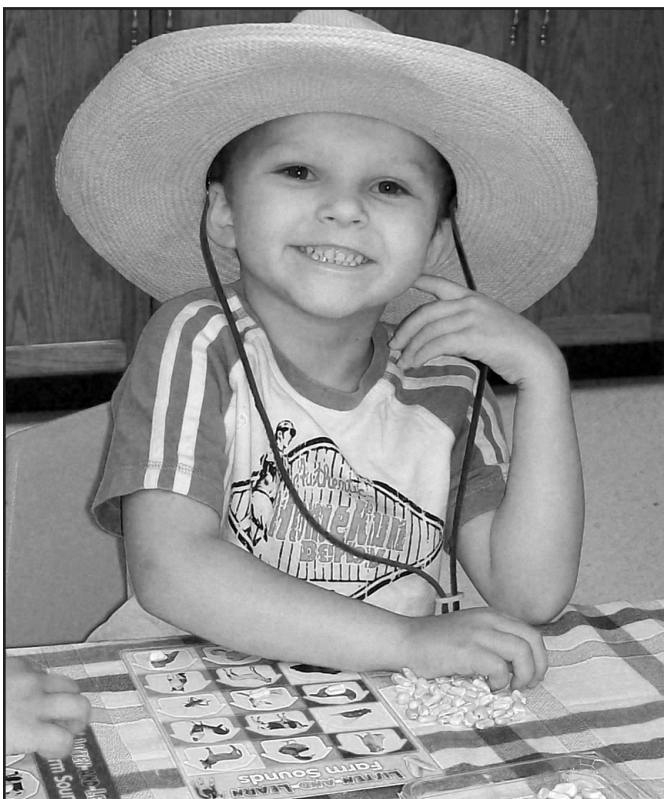

Code of Conduct changes approved

The Farwell School Board on July 15 approved changes in the student Code of Conduct. They include:

- Junior high school will adopt the high school tardy policy.
- Changes were made in the cell phone policy.
- If a fight breaks out, any person who is caught videotaping the fight with their cell phone will be punished just like the two individuals.
- No make-ups will be given on six weeks or semester tests without principal's permission.
- No caps will allowed in the high school during instruction time; no caps at all in the junior high.
- No head bands or combs will be worn during the day or at any event.

For a complete list of all the changes, persons should see the school principals.

In other business, the board:

- Authorized Supt. Larry Gregory to also become the athletic director again. Football Coach Mark Anglin, who has doubled as athletic director, is working on his master's degree.
- Will meet on Aug. 7 to set the tax rate. Gregory expects the rate to be just under \$1.10 per \$100 assessed valuation, close to what it was this year.

State says Texico does not qualify for liquor sales

Since discussion had started in Texico about the possibility of offering liquor there, the State Line Tribune called the New Mexico Regulation and Licensing Department's Alcohol and Gaming Division.

A department deputy director, quoting Chapter 60-5A-1, said a town needed a population of at least 5,000 to qualify for allowing liquor sales.

Texico has about 1,000 residents.

Karolene recalled the classroom with vivid memory: "It was in a classroom behind what is called the "old gym." It was on the southeast side of the gym. It's now used as a kindergarten classroom. Students sat two to a desk at table-style desks."

Her second grade year brought a very funny memory of school to her mind. Mrs. Pool was her teacher. This woman taught school until the very late 1970's or early 1980's and was very well respected. Just about every time Karolene would see Mrs. Pool around town following her second grade year, she and her teacher would have to share a laugh over what happened with Karolene in her classroom.

and meeting the girl that would become her long-time best friend.

The bus route was driven by Mr. Meeks and went far north of Farwell to the McKillips, Nortons and Langfords. Leon Langford rode the same bus.

Karolene would lay down in the seat and go to sleep. "Mr. Meeks would be so kind to stop the bus at my house, go back to find me and wake me up to get off each day!" Karolene said.

The great thing about third grade was Betty Shanks. Betty and Karolene hit it off right away. They were best friends all the way through their school years and into college. Betty and Karolene were suite mates at Hardin-Simmons before Betty left to attend West Texas State University in



Lisa Sanders is in charge of this contest.

The bicycle contest judging starts promptly with three judges picked by the Clovis Chamber of Commerce serving in that capacity.

At 11 a.m., the Big Parade kicks off from Griffin Street in Texico. A map showing where participants need to line up is elsewhere in today's Tribune.

This year's parade again will feature a large contingent of antique tractors and cool cars.

Highlights will include Texico Schools' "Parade of Champions" and the Farwell School Centennial float.

Parade Marshal Hal Helton will be assisted by Wayne Anderson, Amanda McFarland and Ruth Anne Bennett in lining up the entries. Participants are urged to be at the parade start at least half an hour early.

Because the highway will be closed during the parade, Hereford Street will be used as a bypass for traffic moving through the area. Hereford Street residents are asked not to park their vehicles on that street while the parade is held. The Border Town Days Committee appreciates your help.

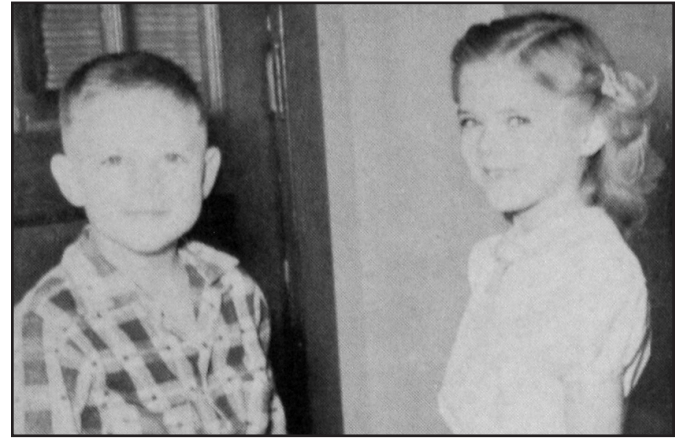

Canyon. She wanted to be close to her boyfriend.

Betty married Jimmy Wilkerson and moved to Fort Stockton, Texas many years ago. Sadly, Betty passed away about three years ago after battling cancer. Karolene still feels a connection with her when she visits with Irene Jones, of Farwell. Irene and Betty were sisters.

Other memories that Karolene recalls about her elementary school years were the Spanish lessons that she received in the fourth grade. Her teacher had a dual major in education and Spanish. She offered to provide lessons to her students. Each student had to have a letter of permission signed by their parents and the Spanish lessons were taught during recess time.

"I'm not fluent in Spanish today, but I can recall many of the words and phrases that she taught us to this day," Karolene commented.

Her fifth grade teacher was Miss Wilma Louise Snider, who later married Hugh Moseley. As fate would have it, the Moseley's son, David was Karolene's student in her fifth grade class years later.

Karolene had to leave the Farwell Schools as a student in the spring of 1950 when her family moved to Muleshoe. From the fall of 1950 through her graduation, she attended school in Muleshoe. She started dating Marlon Inman in 1952 and that set the

course for her graduation plans. Karolene wanted to graduate from high school early so that she could go to Hardin-Simmons while Marlon was attending.

"I was just in a hurry to get down there to be with Marlon!" she laughed. "I went to summer school and doubled up on all my courses so I could graduate in three years!"

Karolene accomplished the task and she was a college student at Hardin-Simmons in no time. She and Marlon married in September 1956 in Muleshoe.

By this time, her father had been renting a farm over in Clovis (where the Colonial Park subdivision is now located). She and Marlon had both recently graduated from Hardin-Simmons and wanted to come back to the area.

"I had my degree and I was ready to get a teaching job," Karolene stated. "I promptly applied to the Clovis Schools and got the surprise of my life: I was told to go home, grow up and come back later!"

Karolene was only 19 years old and she was stomping mad.

"My father suggested that I go to Farwell and talk to Jack Williams at the Farwell Schools," she commented. "I thought that was not something I wanted to do. I didn't really want to teach at Farwell. But right now, I can't think of the reasons why I didn't want to teach there, but I remember I was set against it and thought

there was no way they would hire me."

Karolene used a pay phone to call Jack Williams and an interview was set up for that day. Karolene was a math major with a minor in English. She was hired on the spot and signed her teaching contract that afternoon.

"All my daddy would say to me about it was 'see, I told you!' she laughed. Karolene began teaching during the summer of 1958. She was young and ready to challenge the kids with the subjects she was hired to teach - Algebra and Geometry.

"My first class in the fall of 1958 was 38 freshmen in Algebra and about 8 juniors and seniors for Geometry. The freshmen about drove me crazy and I recall wondering just what I had gotten myself into," she mused.

She and Marlon were

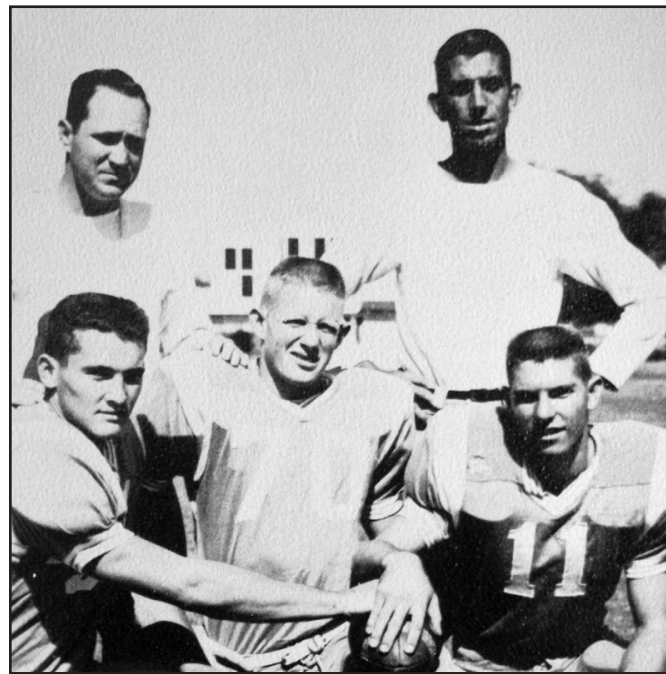
ready to begin a family after two years. The couple was blessed with son, Brent, and daughter, Suzahn. Karolene was happy to be a stay-at-home mom. However, that just wasn't in the cards. She was just too good of a teacher and the Farwell Schools needed her back.

Initially, she was asked to substitute for a few days for Lucille Franse.

"I got to the school about 10:30 a.m. and was ready to take Lucille's class. I should have known something was up when Mr. Craig and Mr. Scott asked me how long I'd be willing to be a substitute," she laughed.

She told them that she'd be willing to be a substitute for the schools and she did this fairly regularly throughout that semester. However, a fulltime job came to her that

Christmas, after Mr. Tatum died of a heart attack while taking treatment for cancer.

She wasn't certified in elementary mathematics, so she immediately went to Clovis and got an emergency certification to start teaching fulltime the next fall.

This was the beginning of teaching elementary mathematics for the next 12 years.

"I never intended to be a fulltime teacher all those years," she commented. "I guess I ended up doing what God fully intended me to do! It's just like that with younger brother Jim. Our family always figured him to go into full-time church work because we always played church as kids. But now he is a professor of communications at Stephen F. Austin University in Nacogdoches, Texas. And, it was always so funny when I was first teaching back at Farwell, I was always known around school as Jim Towns' sister instead of a teacher!"

(A side note and funny story about her brother Jim: When their family first moved to Muleshoe from Farwell, Jim had to be constantly reassured that Muleshoe was in America and that they were still living in America.)

Karolene's years of teaching saw many changes in the school system and the lives of her students. She is still saddened by the fact of how school teachers cannot properly discipline in the classroom

and that the standards of education are seemingly so much higher, but the children are not getting enough of the basics to go through to the end of their schooling and into their lives.

"I came from a time of washing mouths out with soap or taping mouths shut if you misbehaved, acted up or disrupted class," she exclaimed. "Teachers can't do that any more and the kids know it!"

Having her own children as students in her classroom was a tough job. Karolene recalled a time when Suzahn absolutely refused to learn her multiplication tables. She and her daughter would go round and round about the issue and Karolene was getting very frustrated at how to make her understand how important they were to learn.

"My relief came in the form of a stuffed Snoopy dog at the store. Suzahn wanted that stuffed animal so much and said that she'd do anything to get it. I told her to learn her multiplication tables and she'd get the stuffed animal. Suzahn learned them quickly and brought home the dog in no time."

She taught for a total of 14 years but laughingly states that she "quit-uated" the same year that her daughter Suzahn graduated from Farwell High School.

Karolene is one teacher that valued her time as a student in Farwell and as a teacher. She loved her time in the classroom and with the children. She still enjoys

talking with many of her former students and they, in turn, always thank her for the time she took with each of them.

Berny Mesman is one such student that fondly remembers Karolene as a patient and wonderful teacher.

"She had an awesome ability to make multiplication and division come alive to each of us to where we truly grasped the functions. To this day, whenever I use math, it's with the steps, memorization and understanding that I gained with Mrs. Inman. And I can still break down units of volume - cups, pints, gallons, etc. by visualizing the "Measure Man" that she taught," he explained. "I even taught it to my own sons."

Karolene was the driving force behind starting the St. Jude Children's Research Hospital "Math-a-thon" that Farwell Elementary students participated in for many years. The children were given workbooks with math problems to solve. They took

pledges for the number of problems they could solve and then went to work.

Farwell Elementary students helped raise thousands of dollars for St. Jude's over the years and learned a lot of math in the process.

She was also responsible for a yearly back-to-school party for the migrant children in the area. She would coordinate a date with the area farmers and migrant workers to have their school-aged children brought to the party. There they would receive a sack of school supplies, socks, a Farwell t-shirt and a bag to carry everything to school in.

"My daughter and I had been at an Act-Teens convention in Kansas City, Kan., one year and heard the speech from a former migrant student. In this speech, the girl spoke about how special is was to her in her life to have been made to feel welcome by the schools that she would attend, and how the students' and teachers' acceptance of her helped her to

become a successful person in life. I went away from that convention convinced that we could do something here in Farwell to make our migrant students feel the

same and it was a ministry that I wanted to take on," she explained.

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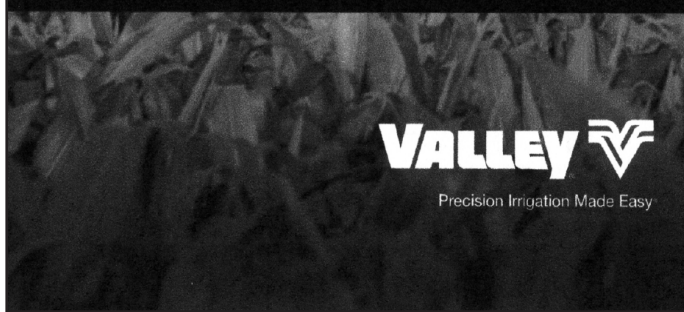

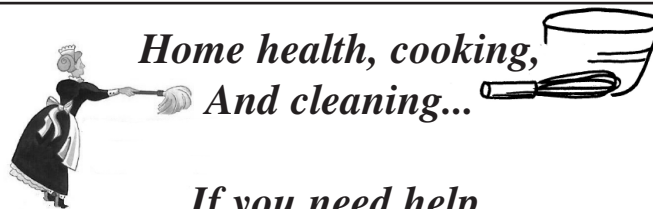

had addresses. She and her daughter, Suzahn, would also go personally invite them to the party.

Word soon spread around the region about Mrs. Inman and her party. The kids looked forward to getting something from Mrs. Inman each year. She held the party every year until she retired from teaching.

Another memory that Karolene has of being a teacher at Farwell is how each year, one home-room at the Elementary School would have to perform a play. The last year Karolene taught, her class was up to perform the play and it was all about trees. The students were to portray different types of trees and had to hold a branch of each type up in front of them onstage.

No tree in Farwell was safe from Karolene that month! She would go up to people's doors and ask for a branch from the trees in their front yards, back yards and side yards. She gathered samples from just about every tree in town and beyond for this play. But it did get something that can still be seen at the school to this day.

Karolene's father-in-law lived at Lariat and had a good sturdy row of Maple trees growing. He learned that she needed trees for something at school and he brought her three sapling Maple trees to the school. Her

class was delighted to have them and they planted them on the west side of the new addition to the elementary school.

The trees took on even more of a special meaning to the class that year. Wayne Pierson was a student in her class and his little sister DeAnn died in a 4-wheeler accident during the school year. The class dedicated the three trees to her memory and they continue to grow today.

"A student came run-

ning in to me the next year and was very upset that Mr. Crabb, the groundskeeper at that time, was using a weed-eater to trim the grass around the trees. The small trees were getting torn up around their trunks by this and they were afraid they were going to not make it. I went out and asked Mr. Crabb to trim the grass by hand or to pull it away by hand so that the trees would stand a chance of surviving," she explained. "I don't know

if this has changed today or not, but the trees are still growing!"

Karolene has seen the changes in the Farwell Schools over the years and is happy to see that the majority of its stu-

dents go on to lead happy, fulfilling lives both in and away from Farwell. She's seen the buildings of the schools go through changes, additions, remodeling and such, but the basic

traditions and pride never go away.

She is happy to have been a part of the schools past and is anxiously waiting what the Farwell Schools hold for the future.

Dear Editor,

Many times in the past few years, there have been a lot of complaints made against the person responsible for mowing the country cemetery south of town on State Road 348.

Writers have griped about the destruction of headstones and such. Since we have been in a drought for the early part of this summer, it really hasn't been a problem for no one to "care" for the grounds. Maybe all of the complainers could bring out their PUSH mowers and gas cans and get busy so that the weeds don't get out of control; or maybe they would prefer to open their checkbooks and pay a company to come and spray the weeds!


When a caring individual goes out of his/her way to make something look nice and never asks for cost of chemical or diesel reimbursement, I think a complainer who does not want to do the work, raise funds for the care, or pay for spraying should keep the complaints to himself!





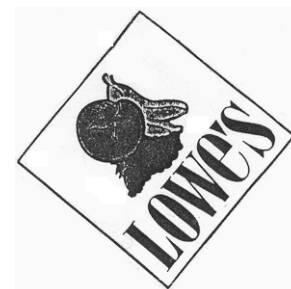
