We've got several elections coming up soon. There will be an election to pick Farwell councilmen in April and one for Texico School Board in February. The first one on the agenda, though, is the special election in Farwell Saturday. For the details on when and where you can vote, the news story on this page will give them.

What I would prefer to do with this column is to talk about voting. I think what made me decide to write this particular column is a comment that a Farwell resident made to me, or rather a prediction that was made.

# Moseley doing fine since four-bypass, open heart surgery

Parmer County Tax Assessor/ Collector successfully underwent four-bypass, open heart surgery last year.

On July 24, Moseley was in Friona on business when he began to feel ill after lunch. He drove to Reeve's Chevrolet for a soft drink but didn't feel better.

So Glen Reeves Jr. took him to Friona Hospital. Moseley walked in but began feeling faint. Within a few minutes, he had a doctor and four nurses caring for him. He was given an IV, oxygen and medication for pain.

Moseley was having a heart attack.

"It felt like an 18-wheeler had run over my chest," he recalled.


After two days, he was transferred by ambulance to High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo. While there, he was in the care of Dr. Joel Osborn, who Moseley had known since the physician was an infant.

On Aug. 21, Dr. Osborn ran an angiogram, and three days later Moseley underwent open heart surgery. Four veins were transplanted from his leg to his heart.

After the surgery, he was placed in the coronary care unit for two days, then transferred to a regular room. He was discharged and returned home Aug. 29 - only five days after the operation.

On Oct. 10, Moseley returned to work on a part-time basis, gradually working up to fulltime.

Now, Moseley says he feels just fine, and has ever since the surgery Moseley has lived in this area all his life. He was born Jan. 22, 1927, on the family farm south of Friona. Moseley grew up on the farm, and attended school in Friona. When World War II was still in progress, Moseley and his friend decided one day that they wanted to join the Navy. They were still in high school, and Moseley was 17 years old.

During the two years that Moseley was in the Merchant Marines, he went around the world three times, carrying supplies from port to port. After the war ended, when he was coming into port at San Francisco, he decided to come home to see his folks. His dad, David Moseley, wanted him to stay home and finish high school, so that he and his brother could graduate in the same class. He did, and he and his brother graduated in May 1947.

After graduating from high school, Moseley attended Texas Tech in Lubbock, majoring in agriculture. He graduated with a Smith Hughes Degree, which qualified him to teach vocational-agriculture, in 1953.

He decided that teaching wasn't really what he wanted for a life's

A long-simmering question in the city of Farwell is about to be answered: Should the form of government be changed?

City voters will go to the polls tomorrow (Saturday) to answer that question.

Currently, Farwell has a threemember commission -- two councilmen and a mayor. The mayor votes in case of a tie. If voters approve the change in government, there would be five councilmen and a mayor.

The special election was called by the City Council in November after a petition was presented with 93

qualified signatures of Farwell voters asking for the election. Fiftyeight signatures were needed. There are about 584 registered voters in the community.

According to Texas law, once the petition was certified as having the number of signatures needed, the special election was scheduled the third Saturday in January.

The election will be held at City Hall. Billie Blain has been named judge. Ysleta Kittrell is alternate judge. The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Absentee voting ended Jan. 15.

The ballots that voters will get will contain two boxes -- one supporting the change in government, the other against. All that is needed is to place an "X" in the square which the voter supports.

If the change in government is approved, an election will be held in April to elect six aldermen. Aldermanic terms would be for two years and staggered.

If the change in government is rejected, an election still will be held in April for the current three positions.

City Clerk Janie Bowery told me that Farwell had about 584 registered voters. And almost 100 of them signed the petition calling for the special election.

So I'm sure that more than 30 folks will vote Saturday. Better make that, pretty sure ....

I know folks have been talking about the election for the past few weeks. We've carried stories in the paper about it, the legal ad has been run, the petition drive was successful, and now one last step is needed: for you to vote.

As I wrote in a column a couple of weeks ago, that's what counts. Regardless of which way you feel philosophically, please stop by City Hall Saturday and cast your ballot. An informed public that goes to the polls is what has made this country great.

And the worst part occurs after the election is over. Then you will hear some folks criticize the decision -- even though they themselves didn't bother to vote. Think about it..

Well, that's about all I want to write on the subject. A major decision is at hand. If you are a registered Farwell voter, please show some of that famed community spirit we like to talk about -- and go to the polls Saturday to do your American duty. Vote.

The Parmer County Commissioners heard a request Monday from the four county school systems to divide up among them a school trust fund of about \$875,000.

School Board officials and superintendents from the Farwell, Friona, Bovina and Lazbuddie systems were united in making the request.

But the commissioners were not so unanimous. The request was taken under advisement. From comments made, it appeared that commissioners Robert White and Tommy Williams favored approving the request, while Ernest Anthony and Raymond McGehee were opposed.

The fund -- the county permanent school fund -- consists of monies gained from partial mineral rights in land in Gaines and Andrews counties. This system was set up by the state.

The amount of funds Parmer County has received from these minerals -- including one oil-producing well -- has declined over the years and currently two small ing new revenue. But it was said

checks are received each month, it was said.

Interest from the fund is split among the school systems each year. Over the years, about \$650,000 in such interest has been turned over, it was said.

If the funds are distributed to the schools, according to state law, they must be used for either reducing bonded indebtedness and/or making permanent improvements.

Officials of the Farwell, Bovina and Lazbuddie schools indicated that if they get their share of the fund, they would leave it in the bank accumulating interest for the time being. Only Friona officials told of a pressing need -- more high school classrooms in the near future due to new state educational mandates. But that need doesn't have to be met immediately, they said.

The chief reason the school officials gave in seeking the funds now is that they fear the state might try to take back the money, especially in a time in which the state is seeklegislation would be needed to accomplish that.

The four schools had agreed on a formula to divide up the funds, if the commissioners agreed. It would be based on the past five years' average daily attendance for each school. This would be: Farwell, 17.64 percent; Bovina, 19.95 percent; Lazbuddie, 10.75 percent, and Friona, 51.66 percent.

In voicing his opposition to the request, McGehee told the school

officials, "If you need it fine. But it's good insurance to keep it." Anthony said he felt the same way.

The funds are in a bank CD until March 31. Interest from it can be used by the schools for maintenance and operation.

The schools' request also asked that \$10,000 be left in the fund in

case more monies arrive, but that when the total hits \$25,000, the excess should be distributed among the four schools on the percentage basis.





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# Liles message to farmers: 'Get involved'

The fifth annual Irrigation and Agricultural Conference was held Monday at the Bailey County Coliseum in Muleshoe.

The conference was hosted by the Bailey County Electric Cooperative Association, the Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District, and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

About 150 area farmers listened to speakers discuss topics that ranged from conservation to credit to marketing, to pesticide regulations to use of energy and irrigation.

Danny Nobles of the Bailey County ASCS Committee announced that non-graze period for diverted lands in Bailey County will begin May 15.

This will not be the date for the non-grazing period for Parmer County. According to Martin Chandler, the non-grazing period in Parmer County will begin June 1 for those lands covered by ASCS.

Jim Lutz of the Great Plains Conservation Program reported that there is still money available from the federal government for Bailey County farmers who have not already drawn the maximum for irri-

Bailey County Electric Cooperative also had the following information available on "Load Management and How It Works":

Bailey County Electric Cooperative Association is billed by its wholesale power supplier, Southwestern Public Service Company, every month for a specified demand based on 65 percent of the highest "peak demand" reached in the most recent 12-month period. This means a higher cost of power for all members in all classes of service.

In order to offset this higher cost of power, Bailey County Electric has started a "Load Management Program." The primary purpose of load management is to reduce purchased power costs by reducing or lowering our kW peak demand during peaking situations.

Since the majority of BCEC's meters serve irrigation pumps and because irrigation is the major factor in the Cooperative's peak demand, we have purchased load con-

trol equipment to be installed on the member's electric motor in order to reduce or lower our peak during peaking situations. Reduction in peak demand is accomplished by de-energizing (turning off) electric irrigation motors, which have been fitted with a load control switch, through a series of radio signals sent out to the switch.

As the demand at a given metering point approaches a peak, some of the controllable load will be cut off, thereby reducing or holding the demand to a lower level than it would have been. If the demand continues to increase, then additional load can be cut off to maintain a demand or peak below a desired level.

When the demand begins to decline, the controlled switches can then be released and power restored back to the motors in steps to prevent the occurrence of a delayed peak. This is accomplished through the use of a "Load Data Acquisition" computer which monitors our load and allows us to control various

control groups, or loads, during a 128 malta ash particular day.

There are basically two types of However, under no circumstances control alternatives which an irrigator can select: Anytime control or N-day-per-week control. The N-dayper-week control participants are allowed to sign up for one, two or three days per week. Also, those that select two or three days have the option of being controlled on consecutive days or skipping one day between control days.

In other words, a participant who selects three days per week might be controlled on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, or Monday, Wednesday and Friday. The Cooperative will select the day or days of the week to be controlled. The N-dayper-week control participants can be controlled only on the day or days to which they are assigned, up to a maximum of 12 hours in any day.

The Anytime Control participants are subject to control at any time, up to a maximum of 12 hours in any day, and 36 hours in any week. Anytime Control participants will not

know the exact day or the exact time they will be shut off.

will they ever be shut off on consecutive days. The control period of these wells will probably occur during the months from March through September.

This "Load Management" program is strictly a voluntary program. However, in order for this program to work efficiently we need the participation from as many irrigators as possible. The more wells we have on the program, the less time a member's particular well will be controlled.

In order to get as much participation as possible, the Cooperative is offering incentive payments based on horsepower size. These incentives are subject to change from year to year, but those who participated in the 1984 season will be receiving \$7.50/HP for Anytime Control; \$4.50/HP for 3-days-perweek; \$3.00/HP for 2-days-perweek; and \$1.50/HP for 1-day-perweek.




A popular feature of this conference each year is the discussion by a panel of growers, said Leon New, Extension agricultural engineer who is conference coordinator.
