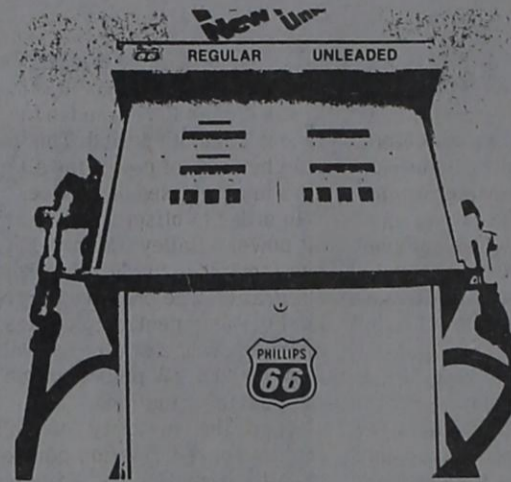
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Liles message to farmers: 'Get involved'

The fifth annual Irrigation and Agricultural Conference was held Monday at the Bailey County Coliseum in Muleshoe.

The conference was hosted by the Bailey County Electric Cooperative Association, the Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District, and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

About 150 area farmers listened to speakers discuss topics that ranged from conservation to credit to marketing, to pesticide regulations to use of energy and irrigation.

Danny Nobles of the Bailey County ASCS Committee announced that non-graze period for diverted lands in Bailey County will begin May 15.

This will not be the date for the non-grazing period for Parmer County. According to Martin Chandler, the non-grazing period in Parmer County will begin June 1 for those lands covered by ASCS.

Jim Lutz of the Great Plains Conservation Program reported that there is still money available from the federal government for Bailey County farmers who have not already drawn the maximum for irri-

gation projects.

"Get Involved" was Bill Lyles' message to farmers from the Federal Land Bank.

"If you can't spend \$100 per year to support your agricultural associations today, you won't have \$100 to spend next year."

Lyles urged farmers to write

letters against federal one stop credit, and in favor of locally controlled farm lending programs such as the Federal Land Bank.

Bailey County Electric Cooperative also had the following information available on "Load Management and How It Works":

Bailey County Electric Cooperative Association is billed by its wholesale power supplier, Southwestern Public Service Company, every month for a specified demand based on 65 percent of the highest "peak demand" reached in the most recent 12-month period. This means a higher cost of power for all members in all classes of service.

In order to offset this higher cost of power, Bailey County Electric has started a "Load Management Program." The primary purpose of load management is to reduce purchased power costs by reducing or lowering our kW peak demand during peaking situations.

Since the majority of BCEC's meters serve irrigation pumps and because irrigation is the major factor in the Cooperative's peak demand, we have purchased load con-

trol equipment to be installed on the member's electric motor in order to reduce or lower our peak during peaking situations. Reduction in peak demand is accomplished by de-energizing (turning off) electric irrigation motors, which have been fitted with a load control switch, through a series of radio signals sent out to the switch.

As the demand at a given metering point approaches a peak, some of the controllable load will be cut off, thereby reducing or holding the demand to a lower level than it would have been. If the demand continues to increase, then additional load can be cut off to maintain a demand or peak below a desired level.

When the demand begins to decline, the controlled switches can then be released and power restored back to the motors in steps to prevent the occurrence of a delayed peak. This is accomplished through the use of a "Load Data Acquisition" computer which monitors our load and allows us to control various

control groups, or loads, during a particular day.

There are basically two types of control alternatives which an irrigator can select: Anytime control or N-day-per-week control. The N-day-per-week control participants are allowed to sign up for one, two or three days per week. Also, those that select two or three days have the option of being controlled on consecutive days or skipping one day between control days.

In other words, a participant who selects three days per week might be controlled on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, or Monday, Wednesday and Friday. The Cooperative will select the day or days of the week to be controlled. The N-day-per-week control participants can be controlled only on the day or days to which they are assigned, up to a maximum of 12 hours in any day.

The Anytime Control participants are subject to control at any time, up to a maximum of 12 hours in any day, and 36 hours in any week. Anytime Control participants will not

know the exact day or the exact time they will be shut off.

However, under no circumstances will they ever be shut off on consecutive days. The control period of these wells will probably occur during the months from March through September.

This "Load Management" program is strictly a voluntary program. However, in order for this program to work efficiently we need the participation from as many irrigators as possible. The more wells we have on the program, the less time a member's particular well will be controlled.

In order to get as much participation as possible, the Cooperative is offering incentive payments based on horsepower size. These incentives are subject to change from year to year, but those who participated in the 1984 season will be receiving \$7.50/HP for Anytime Control; \$4.50/HP for 3-days-per-week; \$3.00/HP for 2-days-per-week; and \$1.50/HP for 1-day-per-week.

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High Plains election set

Officials who are charged with representing the interests of the residents of the counties they serve to the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 are to be elected by registered voters residing within the boundaries of District Director's Precinct Three on Jan. 19.

A.W. "Webb" Gober of Farwell was elected to his first term on the Board of Directors representing Director's Precinct Three in January 1973. Gober is eligible for re-election at the upcoming election and is running unopposed in this election.

Bailey County Committeemen-at-large David Stovall and Ernest Ramm have both served two consecutive four-year terms and are ineligible to run for re-election while Lewis Scoggin from Committeemen's Precinct 2, has just completed his first term and is running for re-election. Sam Harlan and Jay Herington are seeking election to the committee seats vacated by Stovall and Ramm.

In Parmer County, John R. Cook,

Committeeman-at-large, and Wendol Christian from Commissioner's Precinct 3, are both seeking election to their second terms in office, while Ronald Elliott will be leaving the county committee having completed two consecutive terms in office. Robert Gallman from County Commissioner's Precinct 4 is running for election to fill the vacancy left by Elliott.

Voters who wish to cast their ballots in Bailey County should vote at either the Enochs Gin Office in Enochs where Mrs. W.R. Adams will be presiding or at the Bailey County Courthouse in Muleshoe where Mrs. Margrethe Taylor will serve as Presiding Judge.

The County Courthouse in Farwell where Mrs. Albert H. Smith will preside is just one of the Parmer County polling locations. Parmer County voters may also cast their ballots at City Hall in Bovina with Jay Sherrill, Jr. presiding or the Council Meeting Room at City Hall in Friona where Melba Burleson will be serving as the Presiding Judge.

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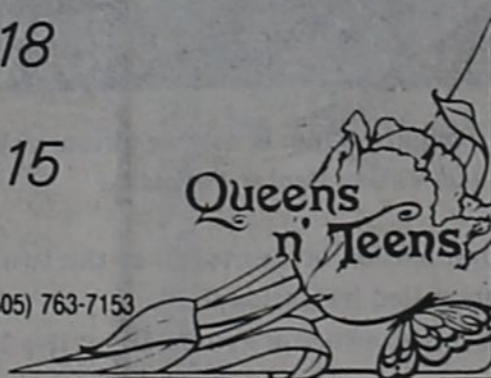
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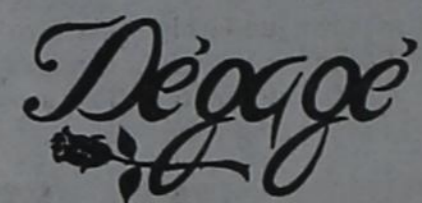

Sarpalius appointed

Sen. Bill Sarpalius, D-Canyon, has been appointed by Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby to serve on the Senate Natural Resources, State Affairs and Education committees during the 69th session of the Texas Legislature.

Sarpalius' appointments for the current session, which began here Tuesday, are the same as those he had during the 68th session.

In addition, Hobby appointed Sarpalius chairman of the natural resource panel's Agriculture Subcommittee for the third consecutive session.

The Natural Resources Committee, in addition to hearing all agricultural legislation, will consider much of the proposed water package currently before the legislature. Many hope the package will guaran-

tee an adequate water supply for Panhandle-area residents and the rest of the state in the years to come.

State Affairs Committee members will be hearing a number of major bills during the session, including the measure that would give voters a chance to legalize pari-mutual wagering in the state. The committee also will consider Sarpalius' proposal to raise the legal drinking age to 21 by Sept. 1, 1986.

Being on the Education Committee is doubly important to Sarpalius. Not only will that committee consider all revisions of the controversial education reform package passed last summer during a special legislative session, but it also keeps him attuned to developments in the teaching field.

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Library grant pursued

The Farwell City Council received a letter from the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission Monday noting that funds might be available for libraries in the district.

The council decided to send the letter to Prentice Mills, who, councilmen said, is looking into possible grants for a library. One possible site mentioned was a room at the Farwell Community Center.

The council also decided to ask Mills to serve on the PRPC as that group's Farwell delegate.

In other business, only one bid was received for the old police car the council has decided to sell. The bid was for \$410. The council rejected accepting it because it felt the bid was too low.

Seven bids were received for a new pickup. The council accepted the bid of Doc Stewart Chevrolet, Clovis, at \$7,862.37.

Only one bid was received for city insurance, from Henry Insurance, Muleshoe. The current policy runs out Jan. 31. The council decided to continue the current policy at the new rates offered in the Henry bid while it takes a closer look at its coverage.

The Texas Health Department has asked the city to appoint a health officer. The council will ask Dr. William Green to take that post.

The council renewed its contract with Parkhill, Smith & Cooper, project engineer for the sewer program.

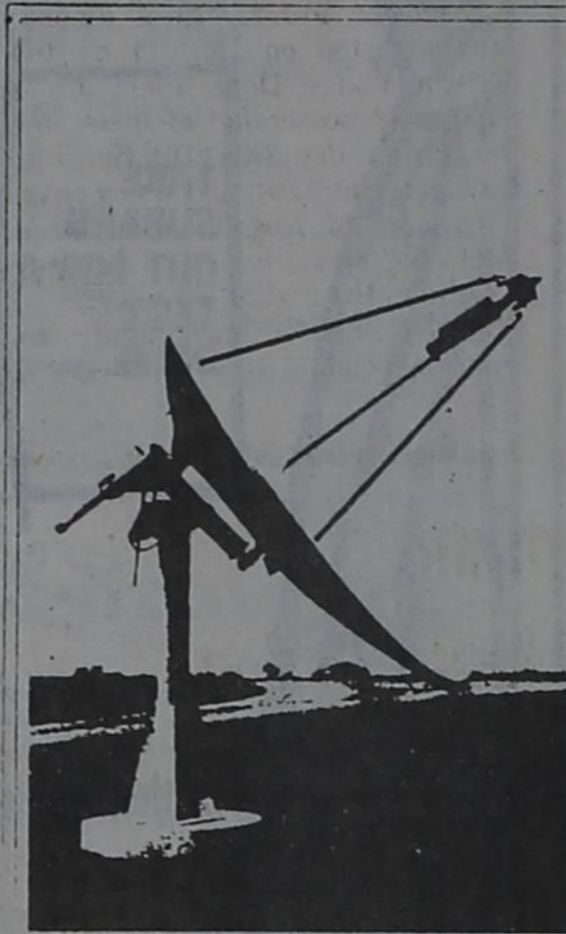

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Mayors tell of goals for cities

Texico Mayor John Hadley said that 1984 was a good year for Texico, with most all of the goals set forth by the city council met.

One of the goals not yet met is the resealing of the city streets. Last year, the excessive amounts of rain the area received prevented the city from getting this done, but they hope to this year, Hadley said.

The city park has seen some improvements each year, and Hadley hopes to continue this trend in 1985.

He said that he hopes to see a few more trees planted, and more picnic tables installed.

The Texico Chamber of Commerce is looking into obtaining Christmas lights for next year, and Mayor Hadley will be working with them on this endeavor.

Mayor Walter Kaltwasser of Farwell said that he would like to see some of the vacant buildings on Main Street filled with good solid businesses that would stay.

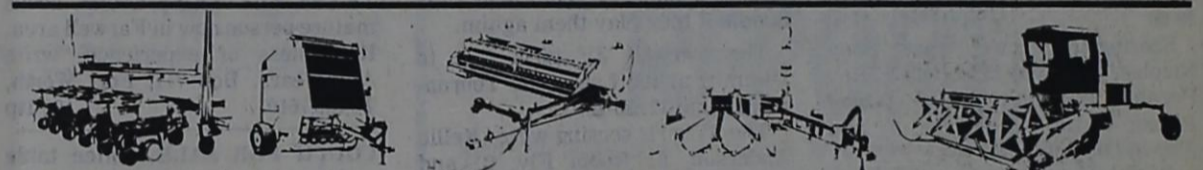

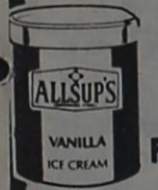
