Brandon Kirkland and his wife, Jessica, were driving by Cal-Maine when they spotted the fire, which was in its early stage. They immediately drove to the plant and Brandon went into the plant telling employees that the place was on fire and to evacuate.



LIVE CATTLE: Prices made an attempt to turn higher on Fridayís close. More follow through to the upside will be needed early next week in order to turn short term trends back higher. If prices are able to turn back highr, then expect to see a retest of the \$86.00 level basis the August contract. So far, the market has been able to hold strong support levels around the \$83.00 level.

FEEDER CATTLE: Prices have held up much better than Live Cattle prices. Strong support around the \$102 level was not even tested on the most recent decline basis the August contract. The market had a fairly good close on Friday, but still needs to see some follow through buying early next week. The back months have already traded back up near highs on the year. Another leg up could take prices another \$3-4 higher.

CORN: Corn prices have taken out a series of major support levels, but the weekly chart support comes in around the \$3.06 level the nearby September contract. The market has been close to this level, but has yet to actually test this area. Technically, all trends are still down, but prices may be in a position to rally over the short term. Once pollination is complete, expect downtrends to resume.

SOYBEANS: Soybean prices were able to hold about a 2/3rds retracement of their entire move up since bot toming in early March. Increasing acres and production based on the last USDA report weighed heavily on the whole grain complex. Traders seem to remain focused on demand coming out of China for proteins which has been the primary source of support in soybean prices.

WHEAT: Prices are also indicating that a rally could materialize over the short term. The market made a push back towards the upside late last week, but did not actually turn. World wheat stocks are sharply higher than year ago levels and until demand begins to improve, prices may remain under a certain degree of pressure. Looks like a rally may come soon which will tell us more about the strength near term.

COTTON: Cotton trends have turned higher after breaking out above major resistance levels late last week. Prices held about a 50% retracement level back in mid June before turning back higher. The market was at a crossroad last week and ended the week on a strong note. Look for a retest of the high on the year which was made last May around the 64 cent level basis the December contract.

Tempers flared at the Texico City Council meeting on Tuesday as Dale Autrey, who lives on the 300 block of Lamar Street, again asked the council to do something about the conditions of the house next to his.

large amounts of trash that have piled up over the years.

Councilman Oran Jay Autrey was also upset J'Dan Sudderth and Bill Dannheim. about the conditions and asked if Texico was doing enough. He said over the last seven months, since this issue began, very little has been done. As soon as the neighbor carts off trash, he brings in more, he said.

City Attorney Marion Rutter said the city ordinance only allowed the city to cite the homeowner into municipal court where the judge could levy a fine up to \$500. Police Chief Doug Bowman said he has been fined twice. The council asked if the resident should be fined every week.

Bowman said the resident had been making progress in cleaning up the trash, but Bowman was not watching to see if more had been moved in.

Bowman said the resident had been doing some drawn. work, and he was afraid that if the city fined him too heavily, all clean-up work would end.

Councilman Doug Scioli asked why the judge had not put a deadline on the work, but Rutter said the city ordinance did not explicitly give the judge the power to do it.

Councilman Autrey asked if the property could be condemned based on public health and safety issues that would override city ordinances, and Rutter will look into it.

The city may file charges in district court. If successful, the city will have to pay to clean up the prop-visits up to \$200 each. erty which could run over \$10,000.

The council also:

- Heard there will be a Dollar General store opening across from the Citizens Bank branch in Texico. The company asked to use the end of Anderson Street as a parking lot.

- Met with engineers Brandon Autrey and Karen Perez about the wastewater project.

A public meeting has been set up. The sewage plant is located in a 100-year flood plain.

Ms. Perez discussed the differences between a lagoon system and pushed for the city to consider a more costly mechanical system. She also brought a time line leading to an April completion if everything goes well.

- Discussed using a chemical additive to help break down sludge in the current sewer plant.

All of the solid waste in the current plant will have to be removed before the new sewer project can begin.

BioTech Nutrients, a company that sells microbes made to break down solids, said that in two months they could break down a large portion of the almost 320 tons of solid waste in the sewage plant.

The cost is a maximum of \$95,000 but they said they only charge based on success. If only half the solids are digested by the microbes, they would only charge half price.







### Patterson family takes mission trip to Nicaragua

Gary and Cindy Patterson, along with two of their children. Leesa and Clint. and several others from around the U.S., recently took a mission trip to Nicaragua.

This is the month of the Pattersons' 30th anniversary and they wanted to do something special. The Pattersons have been on mission trips before with each of their kids, and enjoyed them, so they decided another mission trip would be the perfect way to celebrate this special event.

"Instead of going to some resort or special vacation, we decided to spend money on someone else," Gary said. Before they knew it, they were packing their bags and heading to Nicaragua.

They stayed in the town of Jinotega. This town has a population around 100,000 people and Cindy said there are no stoplights in the entire town. "Walking down the streets was like stepping back in time,' she said. The city is very safe, with a low crime rate, and they felt very at ease during their stay there.

There is an open market in the city and cows just walk down the street. Gary said during the mornings while driving to their clinic, they would see men plowing their fields with oxen or spraying by hand. "There are no tractors there," he said.

The people of this area are poor. The Pattersons' interpreter told them the typical working person makes an average of \$20 per week. A well-known doctor who is highly recommended in the area helped out with the mission and her salary is only \$500 per month.

Even though these people do not have a lot of money, their level of contentment is the same as it is in the U.S. "Because they do not have TV or computers to tell them what they're missing out on, they're happy with what they have," Cindy said.

"If you put us in the same situation that those people are in, I don't know if we could survive," she said. These people still use wells to acquire their water, have virtually no electronic devices, and grow most of their own food. Most of their diet consists of beans, rice, and tortillas.

Because these people don't have much money, most can't afford good health care. The Pattersons' mission consisted of setting up a health clinic 30 miles from Jinotega, which had optometry, physical therapy, dentistry, and medical departments, plus a pharmacy.

Gary and Cindy were in charge of optometry. They supplied people with reading and prescription glasses every day. Cindy said they gave out nearly 800 pairs of glasses.

They used the standard eye chart as their basis to determine who needed glasses, but sometimes had to resort to different methods. "Some people didn't understand what the chart meant, so we had to give them a pair of glasses and ask them if they could see the leaves on the trees," Cindy said.

Leesa worked in the physical therapy department of the clinic. She administered wound care and also made a trip down to a special needs school to work with handicapped children.

In addition to the clinic, several mission workers did construction. During the trip, they built a house, church, and school.


