Nice job, Texico.


Those folks on the Farwell Hospital District Board have done a super job at filling an important community need: getting a drug store here.


I guess that's why I decided to come here: folks work together to get the job done.

Funds for county schools put on hold

After legal questions were raised, the Parmer County Commission voted last Friday to rescind its decision to divide up about \$875,000 among the four county schools.

On Feb. 11, the commissioners voted 2-1 to give Friona, Bovina, Farwell and Lazbuddie schools the bulk of money in the county schools trust fund. In favor were Robert White and Tommie Williams, with Ernest Anthony opposed. Raymond McGehee was absent due to illness.

But last Friday, County Attorney Charles Aycock appeared before the commission to state that, in his opinion, there were some legal questions that needed to be answered before the commission could go ahead with its plans.

So the commission voted 3 to 1 to reverse its Feb. 11 decision and not to divide up the money among the schools until a written opinion is received from the state Attorney General's office, at which time the request to divide up the money will be reconsidered

In favor of this motion were Anthony, White and McGehee. Williams was opposed.

1. According to state law, the schools can only use money from the trust fund, which is under county jurisdiction, for either reducing bonded indebtedness and or

making permanent improvements. Yet, when school officials made their request for the funds, officials of Farwell, Bovina and Lazbuddie schools indicated that if they got their share of the funds, they would be put into a savings account until needed. Only Friona officials said they had an immediate use for the money -- to build new classrooms.

2. State law, apparently, says that if the trust funds are divided up, it must be done on a scholastic basis -i.e., based on the number of children ages 6 through 18, in a school district whether or not they attend the public school.

Yet, when the commission approved dividing up the funds Feb. 11, it was based on the recommendation of the school officials to use the past five years' daily attendance for each school as the yardstick.

The chief reason school officials gave in seeking the funds now is that they feared the state might try to take back the money, especially in a time in which the state is seeking more revenue. Questions have been raised since the Feb. 11 meeting as to whether the state could legally do

The fund consists of monies gained from partial mineral rights in Gaines and Andrews counties. This system was set up years ago by the state. The amount of funds Parmer has gained from these minerals -- including an oil-producing well -has declined over the years.

If it turns out that the commission legally can divide up the money among the four county schools at this time, there still could be a problem. The commission had voted 2-1 to do so Feb. 11, with McGehee absent. But McGehee, who has returned to work after a short hospitalization in Muleshoe, has opposed giving the schools the money at this time. Thus, a new vote likely would result in a 2-2 tie, with Judge Porter Roberts to be the tie breaker. Roberts also has indicated he doesn't favor changing the current system at this time.

McGehee and Anthony have both said that if it was an emergency, they would be glad to give the schools the money. But they thought, at this time, it would be wiser for the county to keep control of the funds.

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

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


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During the past season's action against Floyd, Texico junior varsity's Bret Taylor goes high for a jump shot while Aaron Scott fights for position.

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Cheaper Natural Gas for Panhandle Irrigation Farmers.

For the past several months, Western Gas Interstate and Southern Union Gas have been working with the panhandle irrigation farmers, regulatory agencies in Oklahoma and Texas and the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) to arrive at an equitable rate that will assist the irrigation farmer to operate more profitably.

Recently, all of us agreed, in principle, to settle a FERC rate case. This, when combined with renegotiated contracts with producers, will result in a cheaper natural gas rate to the farmer. More specifically, effective February 1, 1985, Western Gas Interstate's cost to Southern Union Gas will be \$3.46 mcf.

Southern Union Gas will reflect this savings on meter readings, on and after, March 26, 1985.

What this means to the irrigation farmer is that at the sales pressure the cost of gas will be about \$3.10 to which Southern

Union Gas will add variable operating costs and a small surcharge to recover certain deferred gas costs. This will result in a cost of \$3.50 to the irrigation farmer.

In Texas, irrigation farmers will have a monthly \$100 customer charge per meter effective for the March through August billing periods to cover a portion of Southern Union Gas fixed operating costs.

These lower costs are attributable to the cooperative efforts of area producers, Western Gas Interstate employees, regulators, Southern Union Gas employees, and the Texas and Oklahoma panhandle farmers.

Our interim rate request still awaits FERC approval. However, we are very optimistic that all parties to the rate case settlement proceedings will agree to the new rate which provides cheaper natural gas to the Panhandle.

Cotton, rice growers get federal payments

Upland cotton and rice growers who participated in the 1984 acreage reduction programs will receive deficiency payments for these crops, according to Martin L. Chandler, Parmer County Executive Director.

Checks totaling an estimated \$4,577,690.14 will be issued to 1,383 farmers in the county.

Deficiency payments are computed by multiplying the program yield for the farm by the acreage planted for harvest times the payment rate.

The 1984 acreage reduction program participants became eligible for federal payments when the national weighted average market price for cotton during calendar year 1984 fell below the 81 centsper-pound target price.

Nationally, farmers received a calendar year weighted average price of 62.4 cents per proud for upland cotton. Eligible farmers will receive 18.6 cents per pound for

Nationally, the agency will disburse about \$700 million in deficiency payments for upland cotton.

Chandler said farmers who participate in the 1985 acreage reduction program will be eligible for deficiency payments and other program benefits. The signup period closes March 1.
