Other boys in his class had been out hunting with their dads and my boy wanted to know when we would "get with the program," so to speak.

Well, I told him that I had never hunted before, having lived in big cities or suburban areas. But there's always a first time. So I promised him that hunting would be high on our agenda once we get settled in okay.

The next thing I know is that I've volunteered to help with a trap shoot run by Jim Craig and Bill Whitesides of the Texico-Farwell Lions Club. I was hesitant to tell Jim I had little idea of what a trap shoot was about since he probably already considered me a tenderfoot Midwesterner.

Then the preparations started. I dove into my closet and found the pair of Western boots I bought a couple years back when I went to a newspaper group meeting in Jackson Hole, Wyo. (everyone who went had to be decked out in Western gear).

And I found a good, old work shirt and blue jeans. One thing was missing, though: I had overcoats and light jackets - but no good heavy jacket. So I shot over to Rip's in Texico (there's a freebie ad for you, Roy!) and he dressed me up okay in a duck-hunting jacket.

I topped my outfit off with my Farwell baseball cap, and I was ready for the shoot!

The weather that Sunday was a bit on the nippy side. That minor problem didn't deter at all any of the 15 fellas and one lady who came for the shoot. What I found was a fun camaraderie that is second to none.

Those shotgun-shooters had a ball. I was really surprised how many good shots there are in this area. Many of the matches ended in ties with shoot-offs being necessary. The matches ran from 1:30 to nearly 5 p.m. with little break in the action. Those fellas came to shoot!

My job was easy - keeping score. And my boy pushed the button that let the targets (clay pigeons?) rocket off their launch. That was good for both of us because it gave us a good chance to learn about trap shooting, how matches are handled and the split-second timing needed to shoot well.

The people who showed up for the shoot were of all ages. There were a couple of youngsters about my son's age. There was that lady, I mentioned earlier. And a couple of the fellas would be classified as old-timers. I especially enjoyed watching those old-timers shoot as well, if not better, than some of the younger shooters.

Finally, the matches ended and it came time for Jim to give a lesson to me and my boy. I hadn't shot a gun or a rifle since my Army days - and that's been awhile.

I didn't have much luck as I flailed away. It wasn't until later that another shooter explained to me what I had been doing wrong: When I sighted on the target, I held the shotgun still and shot. What I should have done was keep the shotgun moving in the same arc as the target. Well, that's how you learn.

My boy didn't have much luck either, but he really enjoyed shooting a gun for the first time. Plus, he had the opportunity to learn about the safety aspects of using a gun. That's Rule No. 1.

And the boy had a "trophy" to show off to momma when we got home: the welt on his arm for the times he forgot to put the stock of the shotgun in the correct position when firing.

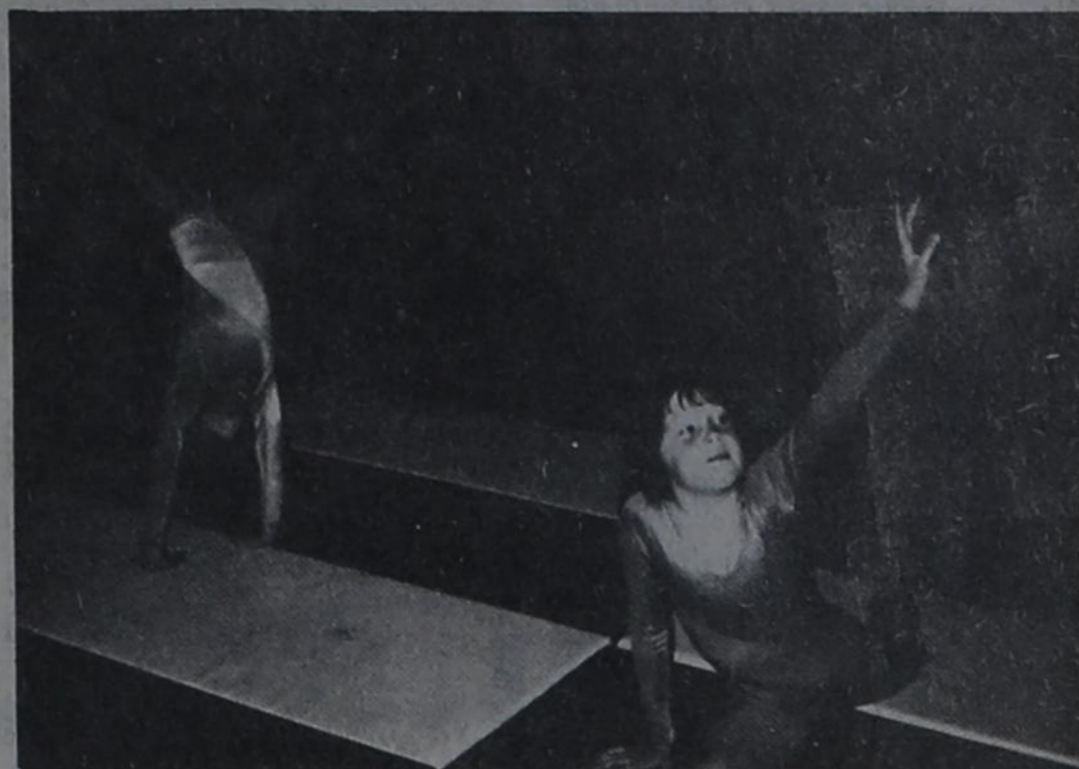
For some reason, though, the welt didn't seem to hurt too much, he told me.

Married 61 years

Mr. and Mrs. Johnnie Williams moved to West Camp on Jan. 1, 1930. They traveled from Oklahoma in a Model T Ford.

While living at West Camp, he was elected County Commissioner of Bailey County for six years. Williams was able to get several

roads paved, starting from the State Line Road on into Muleshoe. Also Williams was able to get the first Home Demonstration agent in the area. Williams, with the help of the commissioner court, was able to get electricity to the rural area in 1935.

Williams decided they needed a

telephone one time so he got the necessary material and ran a line from his house to Mrs. Matthews house at the State Line Road. Williams recalled, "The phone worked very well."

During this time the Williamses had three children - Flora Lee, Jo Ann and Bert. The children attended school at West Camp. The school just went to the seventh grade; then they came to town for high school. The West Camp school burned down in 1934.

The school activities were the main social get-togethers - mainly county meets - spelling, writing and arithmetic and church activities.

In 1952, the Williamses moved into Farwell to the house they now live at 701 3rd St. When they first came, there were no homes south of them. In the mid-50's Williams ran for mayor and was elected for six years. Williams himself helped pave Third Street, hauling sand in an old truck. Williams and John Aldridge paved the road from the Williams' alley to the school. Also the roads on 1st and 2nd streets were paved with his help.

Their daughter, Flora Lee, married Penny Anderson in 1947 and they had two children David and Johnnie. Flora Lee and son Johnnie died in a car accident in 1950 between Bovina and Farwell. David and his wife live in Lazbuddie and have 2 children. Daughter Jo Ann married Mark Liethen in 1960 and they had one child, Nicky. Jo Ann died in 1974. Nicky is 21 and going to school at Southern Methodist University.

Barnes, Rucker elected to School Board

Just over 20 percent of the Texico School District's 520 registered voters went to the polls Tuesday to elect two School Board members for six-year terms.

Paul Barnes, unopposed for the Position 2 seat, received 94 votes. Incumbent Johnnie Rucker defeated Oran Autrey, 80 to 27, for the Position 1 seat.

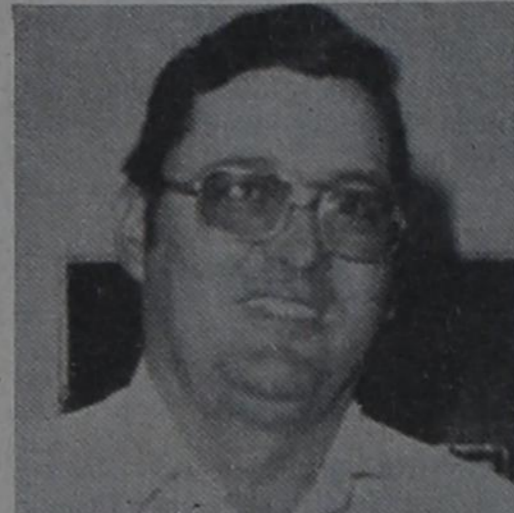
In all, 109 persons voted, including six by absentee ballot.

The judges at the polling place at the Texico Community Center reported no problems during the voting, which was by machine. After the results were checked, they were brought to Texico School Supt. James Pierce.

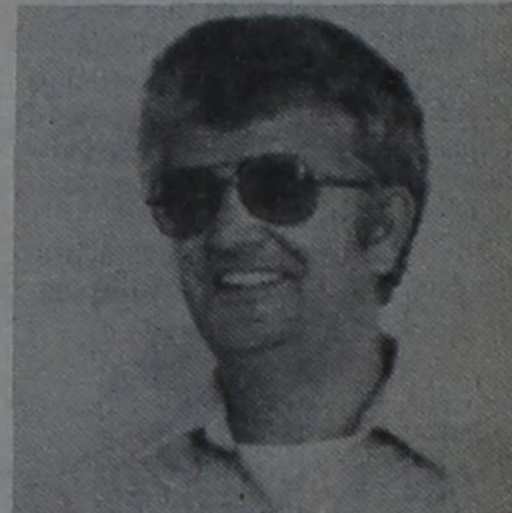
Barnes ran for the post that had been held by Greg Martin, who did not seek re-election.

Barnes has lived in Pleasant Hill for 14 years. He farms and has raised corn, milo, wheat, barley and cattle.

He and his wife, Nancy, have three children in Texico Schools - Misty, first grade; Chad, sixth grade, and Justin, ninth grade.

Barnes is a director of the Curry County Farm and Livestock Bureau. He also is helping with the Pleasant Hill Fire Station construction.

Rucker was appointed to fill Mike Spearman's place on the school board, then ran for the post and was elected.

He owns Dura Bilt Steel Buildings in Clovis and is involved in farming. He and his wife, Sandra, have four children - three have graduated

from Texico Schools and one is in seventh grade.

The incumbent has been a Curry County resident his entire life and has lived in the Texico School district since 1959. He is on the administrative board of the Kingswood United Methodist Church. He has served on the Farmers Home Administration Board, as community committeemen for the Curry County ASCS and as chairman of the Soil Conservation Board.

Drug store coming to Twin Cities

Farwell Hospital District Board members received a verbal commitment last weekend from a New Mexico resident to set up a drug store in Farwell.

A man who owns two drug stores in Arizona and New Mexico said he will sign a contract with the Hospital Board and go into partnership with a pharmacist in the Twin Cities.

The pharmacist currently works in Arizona and the paperwork process of getting him certified in Texas has begun.

During the visit last weekend of the drug store owner and pharmacist, they met with Hospital

District Board member Don Williams, Farwell Convalescent Center Director Ron Fechner and Dr. William Green. They toured the Convalescent Center, Farwell Clinic and Twin Cities community.

They also have purchased fixtures from two closed pharmacies to help equip the new drug store here.

The building to be used for the new drug store is the former Gateway Restaurant across from Capitol Foods and Dairy Queen. This building was donated by public-spirited area residents late last year to the Hospital District.

During their visit, the drug store

owner and pharmacist visited the building to make arrangements for renovating it as a drug store.

The Hospital District Board is expected to meet with the two men later this month to sign the contract.

Last month, it had appeared that the Hospital Board had successfully negotiated with a pharmacist from Missouri, who was a native of Clovis, to come to Farwell and set up practice. But the pharmacist decided against it.

After that, Tom Nichols, president of the Hospital District Board, began talking with the drug store owner, who is planning to go through with this venture.

Definite information on the proposed widening of Highway 60 between Farwell and Summerfield (nine miles west of Hereford) should be known within two weeks, Parmer County Commissioner Robert White reported this week.

Recently, White, County Commissioner Ernest Anthony and officials of Amarillo and Friona appeared before the Texas Highway Department of Public Transportation Commission in Austin.

The local delegation gave a presentation in favor of the widening,

noting the heavy traffic flow of trucks and the number of accidents on the stretch.

White said the state commission told the group that the proposed widening would be a "high priority." The commission will meet within two weeks and then let Parmer County know when the funds would be available for the work.

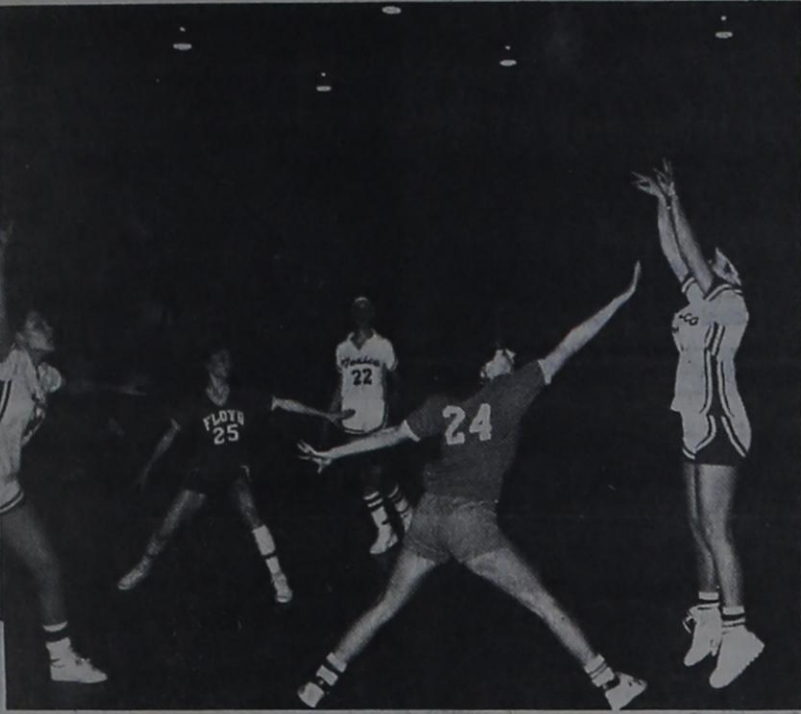
