Farwell Chamber honors given out

It was a very successful Farwell Chamber of Commerce banquet on Saturday night at the Farwell Community Center with a large crowd present.

A highlight of the event was the presentation of a special plaque in honor of the late Joe Jones.

Farwell Mayor Jimmie Mace noted that Jones was a longtime Farwell civic booster. He was a founding member of the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club, long active in the Farwell Chamber of Commerce and was instrumental in starting the Farwell Community Center.

The plaque will be hung on the wall at the community center. Mace noted that the community center is dedicated to his memory.

Accepting the plaque were his widow, Irene, and son Russell. Also present for the ceremony was longtime friend Ralph Franse, who initiated the Chamber project to honor Jones with the plaque dedication.

Mace also thanked Franse for his leadership in the community and area over the years.

The "Not-So-Andrews Sisters" from Fort Sumner performed songs from the 1940s and early 1950s and were enthusiastically received.

The steak dinner with all the trimmings was prepared by Bryan Kube, assisted by friends; and the Farwell lunchroom ladies, headed by Linda Hardy.

He was on the very first West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative board, serving nine years. He was instrumental in an R.T. A. service in our area.

He spent many years coaching Little League baseball. He has served his church as treasurer, pianist, Royal Ambassador leader, and teaching junior high Sunday School classes. For the past 25-plus years, he has played the piano at the Farwell Convalescent Center from 6 to 8 times monthly. He current teaches an adult Sunday School class at the Oklahoma Lane Methodist Church.

Harold was head of the ASCS office here one time. He farmed for 11 years and is still active in the farming business.

He also was co-owner of the Oklahoma Lane cotton gin and farm supply.

He served several years on the FHA board and for 60 years has been an election judge in his precinct.

He married Avis Donaldson, a neighbor two miles up the road, in 1939 and they have lived on this road ever since.


He always says "God is good!"

He has two sons, Richard, of Oklahoma Lane, and Donnie, of El Paso, and five grandchildren.







Walker, assisted by Jason Anaya, is putting together a band program there that will pay off with big dividends in a couple of more years.


Teachers like Shelly and Walker make our schools great.



Gilbert Kaltwasser moved to Parmer County in 1931 at the early age of 5. His grandfather, a second generation farmer, purchased land for his parents to farm. Along with his parents, brothers and sister, they made the slow move from Lockett, Tedas, on dirt roads to Parmer County.

He attended Oklahoma Lane School until enlisting in World War II to serve his country. As the saying goes. "Once a farmer, always a farmer," he couldn't wait until his time was up from serving his country so he could return home to farm.

In 1950, newly married, he moved a young city girl from Clovis to the farm and bought a tractor, which was something new for the farm. His father never drove a tractor; he liked the horses better. They farmed together, one on a tractor and the other with a team of horses.

Parmer County was all dry land at this time, but with a lot of faith and hard work, he farmed through a lot of trying years. He drilled his first irrigation well in the late 1950s an at this time he had only ditches to water from. Next came the underground pipelines, and he was one of the first to have electric drive pivots. Most won't remember the steel pipe and chain drives on those first pivots.

He raised corn, milo, cotton and wheat. He also had a registered Angus herd, and ran stocker cattle. In 1963, he became a Pioneer seed dealer and sold seed for over 35 years.

After retiring, he and his wife of 58 years bought a motor home and traveled for many years until health stopped that. He is now retired and still resides on the same farm he moved to in 1931. His oldest son is now the 3rd generation to farm the original home place. He is the proud father of 4, grandfather to 10 and soon to have 5 great-grandchildren.

Later, she noticed that some rural widow ladies were being overlooked. She and Lois Billingsley decided to host annual Valentine's Day luncheons and included these ladies.





Henderson: "Avoid planting spring beds too early"

agent:

Spring is here and many people are getting out and getting their flower beds ready. The average frost date in Parmer County is April 15. However, April 15 is only an average last frost date and does not mean that we can not have a freeze after this date. It will soon be time to get started to prepare for those spring beds. Many nurseries are beginning to obtain and sell items which can help in getting flower beds off to a good start.

Soil preparation is one of the other important aspects of flower gardening. Organic matter is one of the important factors in contributing to the well being of your bed. Organic matter may need to be added to soils. Organic matter can be leaf refuse, peat moss, or a compost that you have yourself or any other spent plant or animal refuse. These materials also need to be incorporated into the soil. This can be done either by roto- tilling or tilling the soil with a shovel or hoe.

A soil test will give you an idea of how much fertilizer is present in the soil. Soil test results and plant plants not to grow at all.



By Benji Henderson, Parmer County extension requirements will give the amount and type of fertilizer that may need to be applied. Be careful not to over fertilize; over fertilization can be as much of a detriment to plants as under fertilization. Different types of fertilizer should be applied in different ways. Nitrogen can be spread over the top and watered in while phosphates need to be incorporated into the soil.

> Weeding is also extremely important since these weeds can rob your soil of important nutrients and moisture. Weeds can be prevented by putting down some type of physical barrier. These barriers may be as simple as a sheet of black plastic laid over the soil bed and/or spreading some type of mulch. Many other barriers can be purchased wherever nursery and plant products are sold.

Avoid planting spring beds too early. Most bedding plants that are that are used in the spring are not very cold tolerant. Wait until that last average frost date has passed or provide some type of protection before planting. Cool soil temperatures can both delay germination of seeds or cause trans-

LIVE CATTLE: Live Cattle prices have seen significant mprovement this week with beef prices up about \$5.00 rom last week. Most of the trade is hoping to see cash cattle trade around \$88, but this may be pressing the issue as packers still have lots of contract cattle to get through. The volatility has created large swings up and down in prices which has created some anxiety. Market s once again trying to find a bottom, but struggling against too many outside influences.

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeders have basically followed the lead in the Live Cattle price. Grain prices have been moving in both directions with little impact on feeders as of late. The market failed to climb back above the \$103.25 level basis the may contract, which could lead to some pressure into next week.

CORN: Corn prices closed below the \$6.00 level this week which technically should lead to lower price levels over the near term? Improving weather was blamed for the decline this week, but any change in the forecast next week could pop prices back up. Lots of volatility based on weather is expected to continue. Market did hit some long term targets on the upside this week.

SOYBEANS: May Soybeans were able to trade above the \$13.57 resistance level, but have yet to close above this mark. A close above this level would technically turn long term trends back higher. Higher soybeans would help to support a higher corn market as well. The corn/bean ratio is still out of line. It will take higher beans/lower corn to realign this ratio, otherwise, acres could shift again?

WHEAT: July KC Wheat is still in a long term downrend. Market turned lower when prices closed below the \$10.50 support level, but higher corn and beans could change the direction? Record production is expected this year around the world. This could keep some pressure on prices, but donít look for a total collapse to take place. The grain complex seems to be supporting each other.

COTTON: December cotton prices have moved back p into major resistance at the \$85.50 level. A solid close above this level should project a move up into the \$90 area. This may take a weather event or sharply higher rain complex in order to reach \$90 again?





-- Approved a resolution sought by state Rep. David Swinford supporting development of renewable energy zones in West Texas, to include infrastructure to export wind power from West Texas.


-- Received the annual report from Monti Vandiver, Parmer County extension office IPM.






