My answer was short and to the point. "You don't take care of your lawn, you take your chances."

Yes, I was kidding.

But, seriously, walking also gives you a chance to meet people. There was a time when folks sat on the front porches after dinner and greeted others who were out for a walk. That tradition has pretty much gone by the boards.

Too bad. That kind of interaction is what helps build friendships and community. Here, in the Twin Cities, you still have those types of strengths due to the smallness of the area. But in the bigger cities, people live in more isolated conditions.

Remember the song, "You're the Reason God Made Oklahoma?" That's one of my all-time favorites. There's a lot of truth in those poignant words about living alone in LA, wishing she could return to her homeland.

Now, there's a reason that I dedicated this column to walking. Since I still enjoy evening walks, I wanted to alert folks in the Twin Cities that when they hear their dogs barking at some solitary figure walking down the street, don't-I repeat don't-get out the shotgun and think in terms of a prowler.

It's just a walker out for some exercise.

Kube top vote getter in aldermanic election

Martin Kube was the top vote-getter among 10 candidates for the five Farwell aldermanic posts Saturday.

Kube received 157 votes. Also elected to the City Council were Ysleta Kittrell, 143 votes; Curtis Smith, 141 votes; Elizabeth Phillips, 119 votes, and incumbent: Fred Chandler, with 142 votes.

The other incumbent running for the council, Jerry Monk, finished sixth with 116 votes. The other candidates were: James Chadwick, 100 votes; Donald Jones, 90 votes; James D. Williams, 83 votes, and Wesley Davis, 43 votes.

Incumbent Mayor Walter Kaltwasser was unopposed in seeking re-election. He garnered 196 votes.

Receiving one vote apiece as write-in candidates for mayor were: John Getz, Otis McMillan, Prentice Mills, James Craig, James Chadwick and Louis Foster. Foster's vote was not counted since he lives in Texico.

A total of 223 voters went to the polls Saturday. Nine absentee ballots also were counted.

At Monday's City Council meeting, Mrs. Kittrell, Kube, Kaltwasser and Smith were drawn in. Chandler and Mrs. Phillips were absent.

Due to the fact that this was the result of a special election to change the form of Farwell's city government, lots were drawn to see which aldermen got one-year terms and which got two-year terms.

The mayor also has a two-year term. After this year, all aldermen will have two-year terms; Farwell will have city council elections every year.

Mrs. Kittrell and Smith drew lots and received two-year terms. Kube drew a one-year term. Since Chandler and Mrs. Phillips were not present, outgoing councilman Jerry Monk drew their lots -- each got a one-year term.

Street repair bids higher than expected

The problem of patching Texico's streets came to the fore at Tuesday night's City Council meeting.

Two bids for street work were received for this year's work -- but both were much higher than the money Texico has available. So the bids were taken under advisement.

Eastwood Construction, of Clovis, bid \$76,993.41. Appian Corp., of Hereford, Texas, had bids of \$71,922.92 and \$82,419.17, depending on how much work was to be done. Appian added totals for patch work.

There were questions on whether the bids met the exact specifications sought, also.

Texico has about \$63,000 available for street work, including state funds.

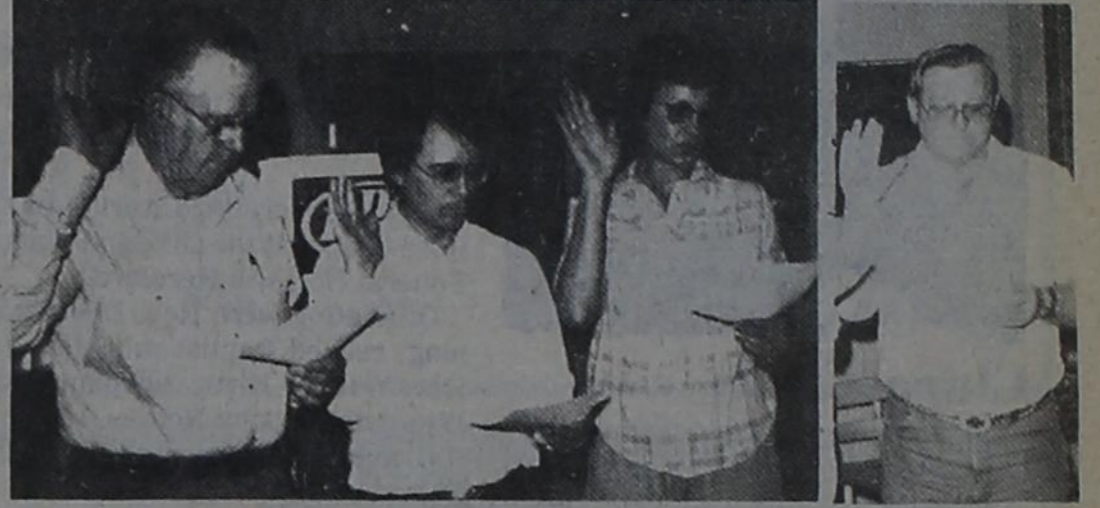
In other business, City Attorney Duane Hamar said the state environmental agency is still complaining of the lack of cover at the landfill.

At the request of Farwell City Alderman Curtis Smith, the council decided to send a letter to the Santa Fe Railroad asking the railroad to improve its crossing between the Twin Cities. Smith said the Farwell Council also will send a letter.

Recently, the railroad worked at the crossing, to improve the rails for trains. Councilman Vane Dasher said he was told that work is scheduled in November to improve the crossing for vehicle traffic.

Farwell School student killed in accident

Andy Serna, 11, died Monday in an accident when the Suzuki ATC 4-wheeler he was riding on and a car collided.

Texas Highway Patrol Officer Richard Diegelman said the accident occurred at 5:45 p.m. on Farm Road 3333, eight-tenths of a mile west of 1731—about four miles south of Bovina.

The driver of the car was Sharmy Christian, 22, of Farwell. Police said she was driving east on 3333 when the ATC pulled out onto the roadway from behind some trees, which had hidden it from view.

"The driver did what she could," said Diegelman. "There was an oncoming car and if she had swerved onto that side of the road it would have been a head-on crash."

Diegelman said no charges were filed.

The driver of the ATC was Stephen Heard, 11, of Bovina. He was listed Wednesday in critical condition at Clovis Hospital. Also aboard the vehicle was Ralph Serna, Andy's brother. Ralph, 10, was listed Wednesday in stable condition at Clovis Hospital. A fourth rider had gotten off the ATC before the accident, police said.

Andy was born June 24, 1973 in Weslaco, Texas. He was a fifth grade student at Farwell grade school. He was a member of the Farwell school band and was active in the Bovina Little League program.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Andy Serna, Sr. of Bovina; two sisters, Maria and Lisa Luna, both at home; one brother, Ralph, at home; grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Louis Serna of Bovina and Mr. and Mrs. Ventura Saavedra of Weslaco.

Funeral services are Friday, April 12, at 1 p.m. at the Calvary Tabernacle Pentecostal in Clovis. Officiating will be Boyd Cates. Burial will be at Bovina.

Adults and children of all ages are invited and urged to attend this meeting, sponsored free by the Lazbuddie 4-H Club.

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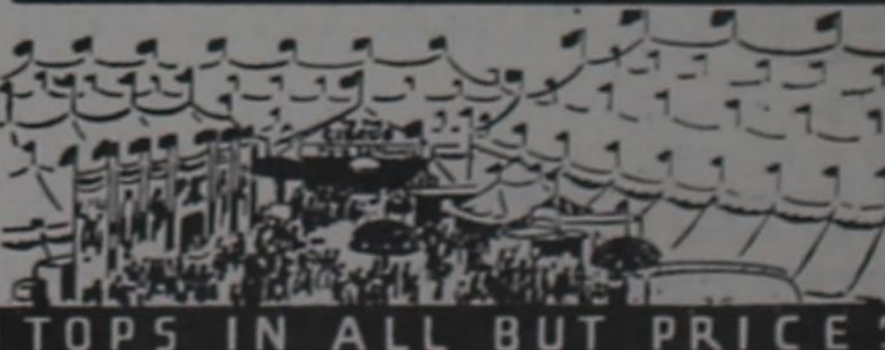
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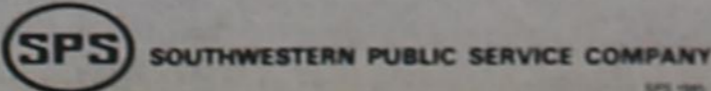

Bishop has been charged in Clovis with armed robbery, assault with intent to commit a violent felony and criminal damage to property over \$1,000, said Morgan.

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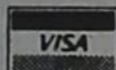
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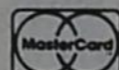

Publication reports test yields

A publication which reports test yields of sorghum and corn at New Mexico State University Agricultural Science Center is available for producers.

According to R.D. Baker, Extension agronomist at Clovis, the publication gives information on test yields of grain sorghum, forage sorghum, sorghum-sudangrass, forage corn and grain corn.

Test areas included Clovis, Tucumcari, Los Lunas, Alcalde, Artesia and Farmington.

"Not all areas had experiments

on all crops, but test yields on the principal crops grown in the area of the individual science centers are given," Baker said.

Greenbug resistant varieties were under separate tests at Clovis and Artesia. No attempt was made to control greenbugs in these test plots, Baker said.

Limited and dryland sorghums were evaluated at Clovis and Tucumcari.

Forage corn tests were conducted at all six science centers while grain yields were measured only at Clovis, Farmington and Los Lunas.

"Using this publication, producers can compare their crop yields with those obtained at the various science centers. Comparisons can also be made with fertilizer rates, irrigation rates and other agronomic characteristics," Baker said.

The publication, Station Research Report 562, "Test Yields of Sorghum and Corn, 1984," is available from NMSU County Extension Offices throughout the state or from NMSU Agricultural Science Center.

Persons may also write for copies to the Agricultural Information Bulletin Office, Box 3AI, NMSU, Las Cruces, N.M. 88003.

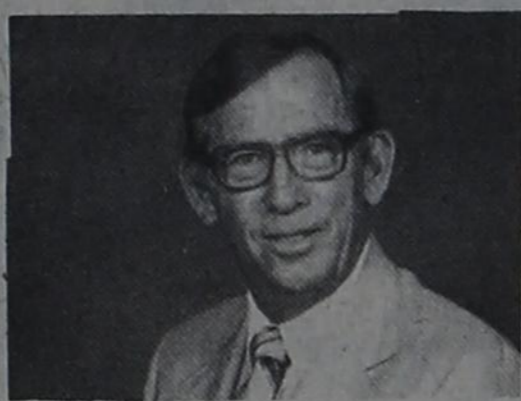
Texico to present 'Absolutely Murder'
