



Wheat harvest begins

Harvest of the dryland wheat and barley is well under way in the Farwell area. Producers and elevator officials are geared for a bumper crop of wheat.

According to Martin Chandler, executive director of Parmer County ASCS office, "Probably the best dryland wheat crop - should be an excellent bumper crop. The average yield received has been 30-70 bushels."

The irrigated wheat is a little below normal. The price for wheat locally was \$2.95 and barley at \$4.70 per 100 weight, he added.

Worley Mills received its first bushels of barley from Leon Smith of Pleasant Hill. The barley weighed in at 46 bushels a pound. It

was No. 2 barley, 12.0 percent.

Walter Kaltwasser brought in the first wheat at Worley Mills with moisture content of 13. It weighed in at 61 pounds.

Price of barley is \$4.75 per 100 weight.

Lonnie McFarland, manager of Sherley-Anderson elevator in Lariat, reported John Saylor of Muleshoe brought in the first wheat June 10.

Saylor received a \$50 bonus for the first bushel. The wheat weighed in at 57 pounds and moisture content was 10.6.

McFarland said, "The dryland wheat is much better, yielding 35 bushels.

Fred Chandler, manager of

Sherley-Anderson-Pitman elevator in Farwell, reported the first loads of wheat were brought in June 6 and 8 by Bert Williams and Mitz Walling. The wheat tested at 61½ pounds and the moisture content was 13.70 percent.

Chandler reported, "The dryland wheat is testing better weight than irrigated wheat. The yield is between 60-65 bushels."

Billy Dickson, Curry County Extension agent, said, "There has been just scattered cutting in the county so far. With the scattered hail in the area, it doesn't look like it will have hurt the wheat.

At this time they are not sure if the rust has caused any damage.

By June 21, cutting will be under

way in full force, he said. "The yields in dryland will probably be 50 bushels and Curry County will probably get 25-30 bushels. It is hard to say right now. The irrigated wheat could yield as much as 70-80 bushels and as low as 50 bushels," he said.

The cotton and barley are both looking real good.

The price for wheat at the present time stands at \$2.90 a bushel.

Although the harvest has just begun and won't be over for another few weeks, the general consensus of the local elevator men to date is that this seems to be an excellent crop of wheat this year.

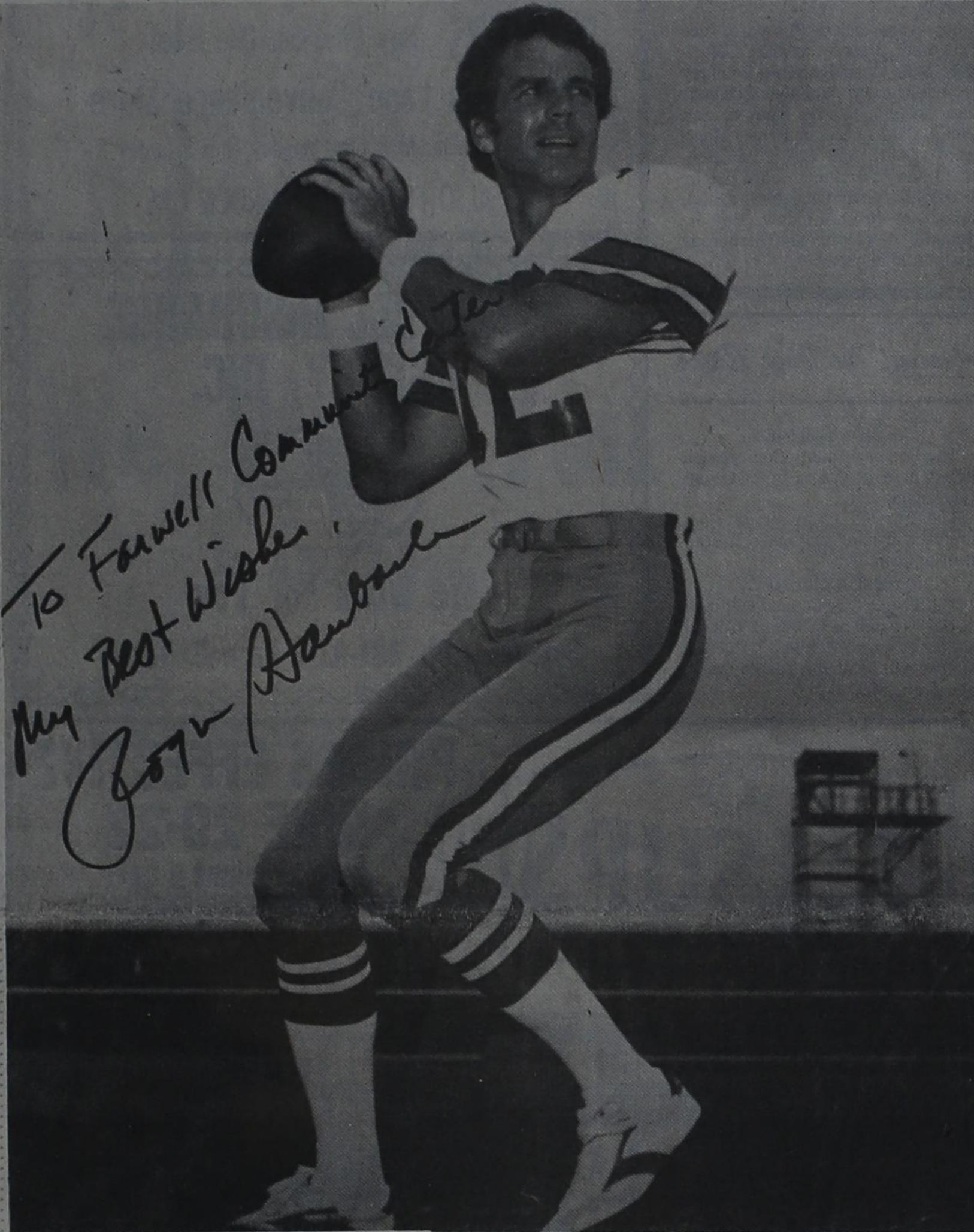

Celebrity Auction makes Farwell debut

The much-heralded Celebrity Auction, a fund-raiser for the Farwell Community Center, comes on stage Saturday.

Doors will open at 6 p.m. at the Community Center, on Ninth Street. A spaghetti supper will be served and a concession stand will be open. The auction will begin at 7 p.m. and is expected to run about three hours.

As of last Monday, 124 celebrities had sent items for the auction. That marks 20 percent of those who were sent letters. Auction officials estimated the response as outstanding.

The latest celebrities to send items were: Carol Burnett, the Los Angeles Rams, Gary Busey, New Mexico state Sen. Caleb Chandler, the San Diego Chargers, Raquel Welch, Shirley MacLaine and former Dallas Cowboy great Roger Staubach.

Staubach sent an autographed photo made out directly to the Farwell Community Center. Other celebrities who had made out autographs to the center were Brooke Shield and Dyan Cannon.

It has been decided that the photos of Staubach, Shield and Cannon will be framed and placed in the lobby of the Community Center. However, the photos will be placed at the auction under the stipulation that whoever successfully bids for them will have the honor of having a nameplate placed under the photos noting that they donated the pictures to the center.

In order to attempt to attract area visitors to the auction, neighboring newspapers, from Friona to Portales to Muleshoe, were asked by auction committee members to run articles about the auction. Also, committee members appeared on

KENM-Radio, Portales, last Saturday to promote it.

A public service ad was to run this week in the Clovis newspaper, also. And Curtis Smith Office Supply ran off 2,000 flyers for placement in businesses in Clovis, Muleshoe, Friona and Texico-Farwell last weekend.

Two radio stations are expected to broadcast live from the auction - KLZK and KZZO. Plus, the Lubbock newspaper was expected to run a preview of the auction sometime this week.

The total number of items to be auctioned off will be around 400. In order to keep the auction within a reasonable time, a "Silent Auction" will be held at the same time. Approximately half the items will be in the Silent Auction.

Here's how a Silent Auction works: Items are placed on tables alongside a pencil and piece of paper. Folks wishing to bid on them write down their number (people will get numbers when they arrive for bidding purposes) and how much they want to bid. Whoever has the highest bid by the deadline time gets it.

The auction is being put on by several groups - the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club, the Farwell Study Club, ESA, Beta Sigma Phi and the Farwell High Student Council.

The two sororities are combining on having a spaghetti supper (\$2.50 per person) and operating a con-

69th Legislature finally finishes its business

It may have taken three extra days, but the 69th Legislature finally has finished its business.

The regular session was the most grueling in recent memory, a seemingly endless test of a legislator's stamina. The budget constraints were tight, and everywhere one turned there was another controversial issue that demanded a decisive vote.

And, just when we thought everything was through, along came a special session to take care of an issue that fell through the cracks.

Like every session, there were more bills introduced than we possibly could hope to deal with. Some were good, some mediocre and more than a few were downright pathetic. Among the biggest issues were:

THE BUDGET - State revenues, we were told, have not grown fast enough to keep pace with inflation. Going into the session, we knew the best we could hope for was a "no-growth" budget, and the chances for even that got slimmer with each passing day.

When all was said and done, the Legislature was able to pass a no-frills, balanced, \$36.8 billion budget. No one was completely happy with the measure, but it was better than expected. And, most importantly, it contained no new taxes.

AN INDIGENT HEALTH CARE PACKAGE - This was the measure that forced the special session, but in the end it was worth it. Poor Texans now are guaranteed the basics of medical care, and local hospital districts no longer have to carry the full burden of indigent care.

For you and me, the state sharing of medical costs for the needy means the local districts will not have to raise our property taxes. It's nice in this day of rising taxes to be able to save a little money for a change.

PARA-MUTUEL WAGERING - Horse-racing enthusiasts tried to tell the Legislature the only way to solve its budget woes was through revenue from legalized gambling. House members said there has to be

a better way, and the plan overwhelmingly was defeated.

STATE LOTTERY - This time it was the Senate's turn to say no to a get-the-state-rich-quick scheme. The lottery bill never made it out of subcommittee.

WATER - For the first time ever, the Legislature passed a statewide water plan. The original bill was woefully short on funding for agriculture, but on the Senate floor we were able to increase by one-third the money available for farmers to implement conservation measures.

The package may not be as comprehensive as we'd like, but it represents a significant step in the right direction. When the funding proposals come before the voters in November, they will merit everyone's whole-hearted support.

BLUE-LAW REPEAL - If ever there was an issue where the people's will won out, it was the blue-law repeal. A large majority of Texans wanted to shop on Sunday, so the Legislature granted them their wish. Only automobile dealers will remain closed.

We believed that any repeal should be slow and steady, but our poll indicated 60 percent of the people in the Panhandle and South Plains wanted the laws repealed. This is a representative democracy, and we were elected to reflect the will of the people. We voted for repeal.

UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION - Farm labor advocates forced the Legislature to pass a bill that will make many struggling High Plains buy unemployment compensation insurance for their workers. We tried to write a fairer, compromise bill, but pending court action forced lawmakers to act too

quickly for the plan to be considered.

EDUCATION - Perhaps the biggest failure of the 69th Legislature was its inability to improve House Bill 72 made significant strides in

improving Texas' education system, but there are several areas that are unworkable for our students, teachers and administrators.


Lawmakers realized those problems existed, especially in the areas

of discipline, paperwork and extra-curricular activities, but declined to make changes. Last summer's special session may have been a success, but this year's regular session was a total disaster.

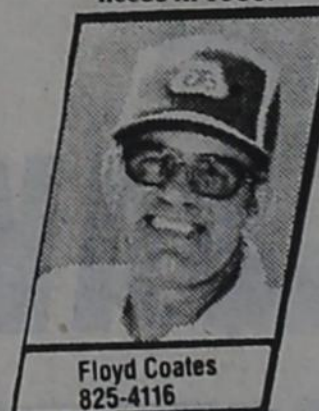

Bailey field day scheduled

An "Irrigation Demonstration Day" highlighting the latest in irrigation water management techniques and equipment has been scheduled for June 26, from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. on land owned by Sam Harlan three miles west of Muleshoe on Highway 84, then three miles north on FM 2079, and one-half mile west on the county road.

Featured attractions during this hands-on demonstration day will include individual discussions and demonstrations of soil moisture monitoring equipment and techniques, pump plant energy efficiency testing on both a center pivot and surge irrigation system, and soil infiltration testing.

Mike Risinger, Soil Scientist for the USDA-Soil Conservation Service in Lubbock, will demonstrate soil moisture monitoring tools including tensiometers, gypsum blocks used with resistance meters and the neutron soil moisture probe, as well as discuss the benefits of monitoring the moisture content within your crop root zone area. Ken Carver, Assistant Manager for the High Plains Water District, will have equipment set up and will explain the benefits of having an irrigation

pumping plant energy efficiency test performed on your well. Additionally, Jerry Funck, Agricultural Engineer with the Water District, will demonstrate a surge irrigation system which is used to increase the efficiency of furrow irrigation.

Obie Kelley, Soil Conservationist, and Warren Givens, Soil Conservation Technician, for the Bailey County Soil Conservation Service, will check the irrigation application efficiency of a center pivot sprinkler system. Dan Blackstock, Soil Scientist with the SCS, will demonstrate and discuss the use of infiltration rings to determine the water infiltration rates of the soil on the farm, and Tim Dybala, Area Irrigation Specialist, will have on-hand a mobile display of a drip irrigation system and will discuss and demonstrate drip irrigation.

Water depletion rate reduced

Improved water use efficiencies have substantially reduced the rate of net depletion in the Ogallala aquifer in the 15-county area served by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1.

In the past 25 years, approximately one-third of the available water in the Ogallala aquifer has been utilized, leaving 66.6 million acre feet in storage. During 1984, however, the rate of net depletion of the Ogallala aquifer averaged less than one percent of the total quantity of water remaining.

The total quantity of gravity water in storage in the Ogallala aquifer within the 5.2 million acre area served by High Plains as of January, 1980 was almost 100 million acre feet. Twenty-five years later, as of January, 1985, that total quantity of recoverable ground water has been reduced by approximately one-third to 66.6 million acre feet.

Averaging the net depletion over the past twenty-five years reveals an average annual net depletion rate of about 1.3 million acre feet. However, during the past ten years, 1975 to 1985, the average annual net depletion rate has average about 77 percent of the 25 year average for a net depletion rate of 1,013,325 acre feet per year.

Refining the average annual net depletion rate even further reveals that during the first half of this ten-year period, between 1975 and 1980, the average annual net depletion rate in the Ogallala aquifer was 1,249,315 acre feet. This annual rate of net depletion has declined during the past five years, 1980 to 1985, with the net depletion during this period amounting to about 777,336 acre feet per year. And, during this past year, 1984, the net depletion rate drops even further to 601,509 acre feet.

The 1984 net depletion rate of 601,509 acre feet is 48 percent of the 1975 to 1980 annual net depletion rate, and 77 percent of the 1980 to 1985 net depletion rate. This past year's net depletion rate represents only 59 percent of the ten year net depletion rate for the period 1975 to 1985.

There are numerous reasons for recent decreases in the rate of net depletion from the Ogallala aquifer. The most notable is the relatively stable or declining prices producers receive for their products as compared to ever increasing production costs. Just one example of increased production costs is the 400 percent or more increase in energy prices for the fuel used to pump irrigation water from the formation. This does not take into account

increases in price for other fuels used on the farm which have also occurred during the past ten years.

Additionally, increased interest costs to the producers of 15 to 25 percent during the past ten years as compared to six to eight percent for the prior ten years has tremendously affected the irrigator.

There have, however, been tremendous improvements by irrigators in their irrigation water use efficiencies. The High Plains Water District, the USDA Soil Conservation Service, Texas Tech University, Texas A&M University, the Texas Agricultural Research and Experiment Station, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and the irrigation industry have all strived to assist irrigators in improving their water use efficiency.

Examples of the efforts made by these organizations include the introduction and utilization of mobile field water conservation laboratories which are used to evaluate on-farm irrigation application efficiency. From these evaluations recommendations to the irrigator are made on how he might reduce water losses. There has also been the development of the drop-line center pivot sprinkler system. These drop-line systems virtually eliminate evaporative losses in sprinkler irrigation.

Another advancement is the introduction and demonstration of the surge irrigation valve and time control mechanism which has increased efficiency in furrow irrigation by 20 to 40 percent. The demonstration of furrow dikes to capture and hold precipitation in place until it can infiltrate the soil is yet another example of recent technological improvements. The use of furrows dikes by some irrigators has resulted in a savings of their pre-plant irrigation.

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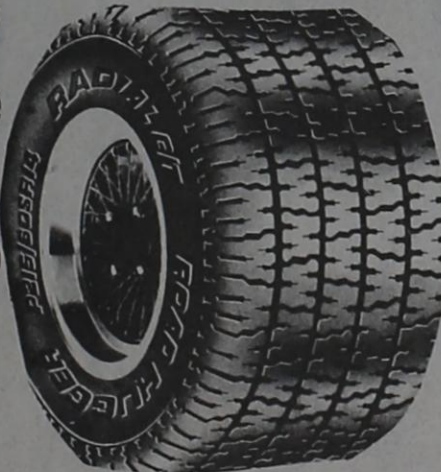
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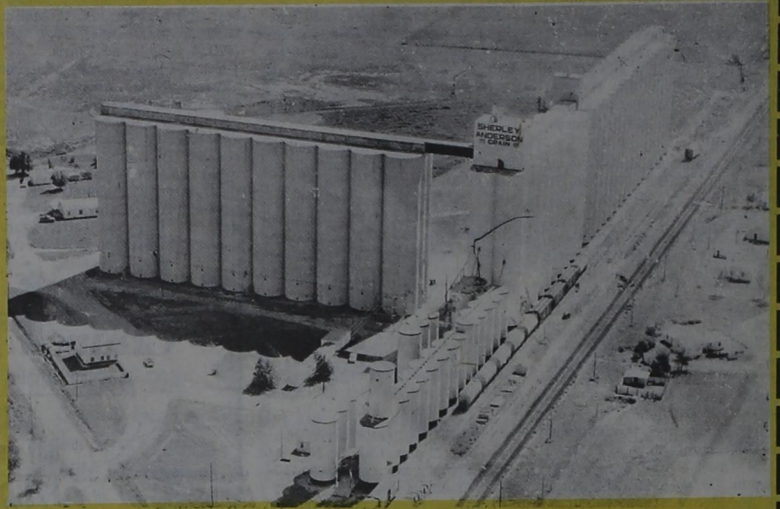


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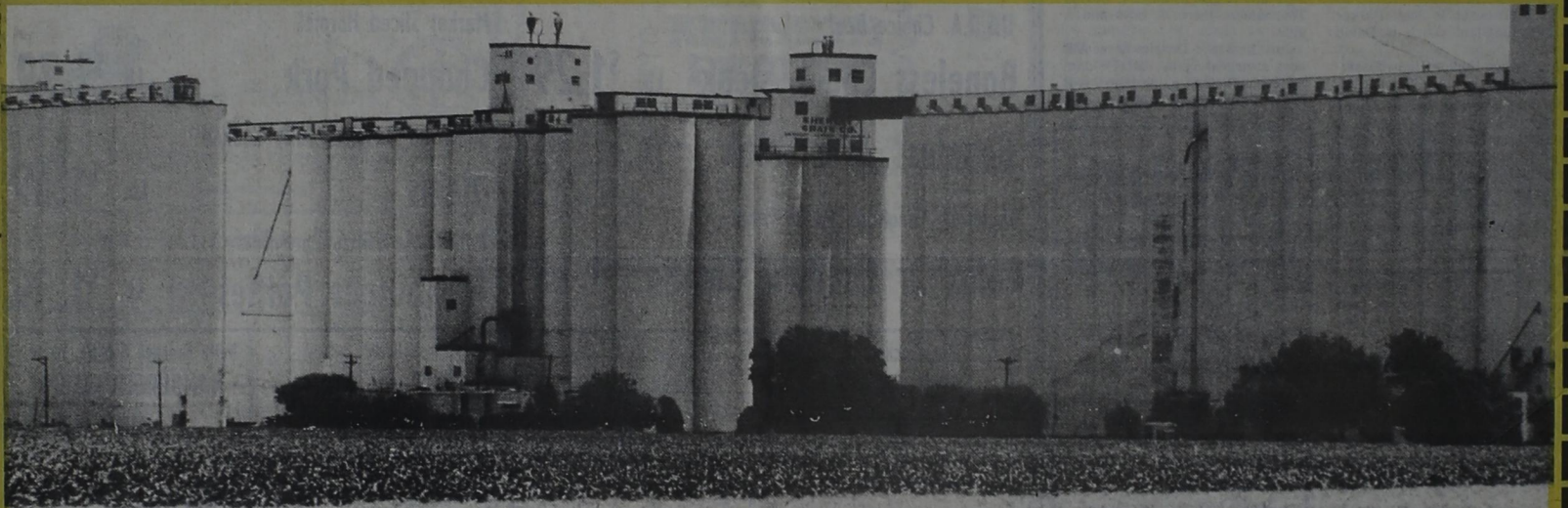
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
