## Texico to use private collector

The Texico City Council last Friday accepted the bid of Waste Control of New Mexico to be the city's garbage collector.

The council and Waste Control now will work out a contract. Normally, Waste Control seeks a fiveyear contract with a five-year option for renewal.

Waste Control will begin service to Texico Sept. 1. It will offer once-aweek pickups and be headquartered in the city. District Manager John Good said a local person will be hired to staff the office here. Good currently works out of Hobbs, N.M.

The bid accepted calls for the city to be charged \$6.25 per residential account, which number about 350. The city now has to decide whether to absorb all or a portion of the cost, and how much to pass on to the consumer. Thus, Waste Control will get about \$2,200 per month.

Current garbage collection rates by the city are \$5.50, 7.50 or \$18.50, depending on the location (some users live outside the city).

The bid accepted has an escalation provision. The price is subject to escalation based on the "all items" index of the Consumer Price Index provided by the U.S. Bureau of Labor statistics department. The escalation will be 8 percent per year, or 75 percent of the increase in the "all items" index, not to exceed 8 percent. The lowest of the two percentage figures will apply.

For its service, Waste Control will place 2-wheel, 90-gallon Poly-Karts at each residence without charge. These carts have latches so that if they are knocked down they won't

After Waste Control picks up the garbage, it will be taken to a transfer station, tentatively to be located at the old landfill site. It will be a 40-cubic yard container. From there, Waste Control will haul the garbage to the Clovis landfill.

When the new system goes into effect, the city landfill will be closed. The main reason that the city has sought out a private contractor is that Texico has had severe problems trying to maintain the landfill according to state health standards. This solves the

Waste Control will empty its transfer station twice a month for \$42 per month. Additional pulls would be charged to the city at \$125 per pull.

Waste Control, with a home office in Farmington, N.M. was founded in 1974. It also has contracts for Alamogordo, Bloomfield, Carrizoza, Cloudcroft, Dexter, Farmington, Hobbs and Tularosa.

Texico City Councilman Steve Chancey visited several of those communities to check into the services that Waste Control offered. He said the response he heard was excellent.

Waste Control also has contracts in Arizona, including Navajo County the city of Show Low, city of Winslow, and Bureau of Indian Affairs, Indian Health Services.

The officers of Waste Control are: David Smith, chairman, Hobbs; Kelly Smith, president, Farmington, and Kevin Smith, Ruidoso Downs, vice president.

In its bid proposal, Waste Control said it had the following equipment available for Texico: 1,200 Poly-Karts, 60 front load containers of various size, one 1982 CCC front load 33-yard collection truck, and one 1985 Ford Truck with a BURRO

In August, a Waste Control sales person will meet with Texico businesses to check out their needs.

According to Ann Cooper, in charge of the kids' bicycle contest, the number of entries was up about 40 percent over last year.




