

The annual top event in the Twin Cities is coming up later this month: Border Town Days.

The event, which drew more than 2,000 folks last year, is scheduled July 25, 26 and 27. Highlights will include the big parade, a square dance, a two-day rodeo and the Day in the Park.

BTD Committee members met Monday night to continue working on their plans; a final meeting is scheduled at 8 p.m. July 15 at the Spur Restaurant.

Here are the highlights of Monday's meeting:

-- A new group will participate in BTD this year: the Ladies Auxiliary of the Knights of Columbus. This Texico-Farwell group will have concession stands at the park.

-- Walter Hughes will be in charge of the Rotary Club's barbeque, as usual. Tickets will be \$4 for adults and \$2 for children; there will be six serving lines to help speed along the process. ESA and Beta Sigma Phi will handle refreshments.

-- Nineteen groups have signed up for booths so far, reported Sheree Montgomery. They include: Beta Sigma Phi, Sno-cones and Cokes; Baptist Women, tracts and free water; Trinity Lutheran, Pepsi; Church of Christ, tracts; Pentecostal Church of Texico, Dr. Pepper and 7-Up; Farwell High School Student Council, corn on the cob and flavored popcorn.

Also, Farwell High School Senior Class, dunking board; Texico Senior Citizens, baked goods; ESA, tea and lemonade; Farwell Study Club, baked goods; Texico High School Junior Class, ice cream; Child Welfare Board, tracts, water and free blood pressure tests; Texico Ladies Auxiliary, hot dogs and tacos, and a fishing game for kids; Pleasant Hill Volunteer Fire Department, ice cream and tickets for a lawn mower giveaway.

-- Larry Millhouse will be in charge of an "outhouse race." Four persons push a six-foot tall structure big enough for someone to sit in around two blocks. He said two teams have signed up so far --Texico football players and Nautilus Fitness Center.

-- John Hadley said that Miss New Mexico will not be able to appear this year in the parade due to a schooling conflict.

-- The following groups have signed up for the parade so far: Kitchen Band, Gladys Hardage's train, a 1940 half-ton Plymouth pickup truck, Farwell Pep Club, Farwell Junior High cheerleaders, Senior Citizens, breakdancers, Farwell Study Club, Farwell Conva-

lescent Center and the Lions Club. -- Joann Getz said five young ladies have signed up so far for the queen contest. The group will be limited to 16. Girls may bring their entry forms to the State Line Tribune office.

-- The honorary parade marshals will be all the former living mayors of Texico and Farwell. They will ride on a low trailer provided by Brvan Kube.

-The Beard Contest will feature prizes for best looking, ugliest and most unique. Steve Stephens and Virgil Fiske are coordinating BTD shave permits.

-- Nine entries have signed up so far for the arts and crafts show,' which will be on the front lawn of the courthouse. Spaces are available for \$10 per booth. Spaces may be reserved by calling Janie Bowery at 481-3620 days or 481-9251 nights.

--It was again noted that all entrants for the big parade must be officially entered to be eligible to win prizes. To enter, just call the State Line Tribune at 481-3681, John Getz, 481-9123, or Weldon Smith, 482-3839.

-- Groups wishing to reserve space for concession stands and booths at the park may call Sheree Montgomery at 481-3676 or Cindy Patterson at 825-2094.

-- LaMoin Williams is in charge of setting up the breakdancing demonstration. Persons who wish to enter this event should call her at 825-2531.

--Sam Drager, one of the rodeo organizers, said the Jaycees will sell caps. Funds raised will go for scholarships at Texico and Farwell high schools.

-- It was announced that Tedson Trailers will again sponsor the bicyle contest. (See other story in this issue on that contest).

-- Curtis Smith reported on the Merchants Giveaway. About 60 merchants are expected to partici-

-- Smith also said that the National Guard will provide a tank for the parade.

-- The BTD Committee voted to purchase 600 name tags to give to BTD visitors, such as persons re-

turning for class reunions. -- It was noted that "Friends of the Bluegrass" will entertain at the gazebo during the day.


-- Smith said that Joe Stanton has arranged for the Clovis model airplane club to provide a display of model airplanes and motorized

Roberts retires as school superintendent

For nearly 70 years, W.M. Roberts has been involved in Texas education as student or professional educator.

Roberts may well be the only Texas Superintendent who began his involvement in education in a one-teacher, one-room school, completing grades 1-10 in 7 years. He rode horseback 22 miles a day to achieve high school graduation at the age of 15. Once or twice the horse ran off and went home without

him, he recalled. At 17, he received a teachers certification and traveled to his

teaching position in a Model T Ford. The first significant event that influenced his career choice was "survival." He was the sixth of seven farm children, all of whom became Texas educators. After two years of college, he was certified as an intermediate teacher in 1927.

He accepted a teaching position in Anson, then moved to Wylie as high school principal and coach in 1929. In 1930 he accepted a high school principal and coach position at King High School, Quanah. It was there that he met and married Leatha Jo Jones, a senior student.

The Depression sent the Roberts to the farm carrying with them five months of school checks that were worthless. King High School was not able to pay the \$100 a month teaching salary past December, but he felt he should complete the school year, whether or not he was paid. He has that kind of integrity.

From 1931 to 1935, he worked as a

In 1935 he accepted a position as principal and teacher at Lamesa. It was there that the first of the Roberts "future educators," James, was born in 1937. James was coaching at Quitaque at the time of his death in 1962.

From 1937-45, Roberts was a math teacher and coach at Bellevue. He was employed to fill the position and subsequently moved to high school principal, then to superintendent. Following summer sessions in 1936-37, he had received his bachelor's degree from North Texas Univers-

At the end of the World War II, the Roberts moved to Oklahoma Lane, following the birth of their second son, Charles. Charles is currently serving as assistant high school principal at Fort Stockton where he has been employed as an educator for 17 years.

In 1947, Roberts returned to Bellevue as high school principal and coach, completing a total of 10 years with the Bellevue system. But in 1948, when the Oklahoma Lane School consolidated with the Farwell system, he was asked to fill the high school principal position. The Roberts returned to the Farwell

Meanwhile, he completed his

stration in 1949-51 at Eastern New

In 1955 he accepted the Estelline superintendency, moving to the Whitharral Superintendency in 1957 and back to Farwell in 1959.

Mexico University, Portales.

He retired in 1975 but found he was addicted to Texas education. At the request of the Farwell School Board, he returned to the superintendency in 1977.

He has completed 30 years in Farwell, 51 years as a professional educator and nearly 70 years of involvement with Texas education.

Roberts was confronted in the mid 1960's with an enrollment of over 700 students, and was instrumental in securing a bond issue for a new high school building, a new auditorium, an addition to the existing high school to be used as a junior high school, a new field house, paving of streets, and parking facil-

In 1974 another bond issue was passed for a music building, improvements to the older gymnasium, addition of a wood shop, moving of football bleachers to a new site, and improved lighting of the football field. He spent many hours speaking to civic groups and organizations.

Roberts has professional memberships in the Texas Association of School Administrators, Panhandle School Leaders Association, Parmer County Unit of TSTA, Joint Committee and Region XVI Educational Service Center. His civic service includes the

Texico-Farwell Lions Club (charter member). He has been a Lion for 35 years and currently is treasurer. He is a charter member of the First Baptist Church, superintendent, adult department, teacher for the Young People's Department, and present secretary for the Senior Men's Class.

He is active in school and community service, Border Town Days parade committee and promotion committee. Also, he has handled the public address for football games. livestock shows and track meets for the past 26 years.

The Roberts are planning to go to Fun Valley in Colorado, relax and do a little fishing.

The Farwell School Board has placed Roberts in nomination for Texas Superintendent of the Year.

The necessary information will be submitted to the Texas School Board State Selection Committee for regional screening process. In August the TASB State Selection Committee will choose four final-

In September the State Committee will interview and choose the Superintendent of the Year. The winner will receive a \$5,000 award from the Bertha Foundation.

Roberts retired June 30 as superintendent. He was replaced by John Grigsby.





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
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Fire Calls

High-voltage 'Back-up' line strengthens SPS reliability

Southwestern Public Service Company, to buttress the reliability of its electric utility system, put a new, 345-kilovolt transmission line into service June 22.

The 162-mile line, the highestvoltage transmission line ever in the SPS system, connects the utility with other utilities in the Southwest Power Pool.

The Southwest Power Pool is a group of 38 utilities that have interconnected to "pool" their electric resources, to help ensure a reliable and continued supply of electric service to customers.

The new SPS line could be used by the Southwest Power Pool utilities to back up energy supplies in case of an emergency. Supply emergencies can occur because of storms or mechanical or electrical problems. Utilities also share power supplies on a back-up basis during routine maintenance of power plants, and to lower costs of service to customers.

"This new line will improve the reliability of our service, and will help us hold down the cost of service to our customers," said Roy Thomas, SPS vice president of corporate The line runs easterly from near

Abernathy, Texas, to near Vernon, Texas. It connects SPS with highvoltage supply lines near Vernon at a coal-fueled power plant under construction by Public Service Company of Oklahoma.

The 345-kilovolt line is Southwestern's fourth interconnection with the Southwest Power Pool group. It can carry enough power to temporarily substitute during an emergency for the largest of the Company's power generation units.

The line is supported by 100-foottall, tubular steel structures. It was designed by Southwestern's inhouse Tramission and Distribution Design staff. Southwestern's Construction Services Department oversaw construction of the line and related equipment.

The project was completed at a cost of approximately \$25 million Southwestern Public Service Company primarily provides electric service to a population one
