Over the years, there have been ups and downs, just like any family business can have. About three years after we came, several of our top advertisers closed or were sold. Do you remember names like Worley Mills, Cal Jordan Implements and Bill Wooley?

But an auction was held at the Williams Office Supply in Farwell, and we had the opportunity to buy a broken antique press. It took five months of work to get that press running correctly but we did, thanks to the assistance of the late Bob Stovall, of Muleshoe. Thus, we opened Texico-Farwell Printing, which carried us through some of the bad times.

Then it came time to computerize. Approval of a loan by Bob Anderson at Security State Bank gave us the funds needed to upgrade. That improvement allowed us to cut costs and stay "in the black."

The introduction of digital cameras allowed our photo quality to improve. And we have added full color. Teresa Mesman's contributions over the years are always appreciated. And columnists like Will Anderson and Carolyn Curd add to our little paper greatly.

Meanwhile, the Tribune began branching out. When we arrived, the Tribune was basically the communications vehicle for the Texico-Farwell community. But a couple of years later, we began covering the Lazbuddie community. And five years ago, we were invited to come into Bovina and cover that area, also.

Thus, the Tribune had expanded to cover four school districts. Yet our staff is not what you call large. Instead, area folks have stepped forward to make the Tribune a true community newspaper.

Just look at the various bylines and photo credits each week in our paper. Did we say "our?" We should have said "your." The goodly number of contributors to the Tribune is vital to the Tribune's success.

Correct us if we are wrong, but isn't the Tribune a true "community" paper, whereby so many community members "put it out?" And isn't that the way a newspaper should be?

We think so. And the numbers prove us correct. The Tribune's paid circulation is currently at an all-time high for the past 25 years.

And this comes at a time when major headlines report many newspapers closing or in financial trouble. Thanks to you, the Tribune falls into neither category.

We try to do the best job possible by our four communities, Farwell, Texico, Bovina and Lazbuddie. We deal with the normal "school rivalries," but have found that doesn't affect us as long as we work hard to keep all our readers informed of events that concern them.

County proposes lower tax rate

The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday agreed on a proposed tax rate that is lower than last year.

The proposed tax rate is .4859 cents per \$100 assessed valuation.

Last year's rate was .5068 cents and the year before was .5258 cents per \$100 assessed valuation.

The proposed rate, which is expected to be approved at the next commissioners' meeting, is the "effective tax rate," which means it is expected to bring in the same amount of money as last year.

This is because the county's overall valuation has increased.

In other business, the commissioners:

- Held a budget workshop. No decision has been made yet on county employee pay raises, said County Judge Bonnie Heald.

- Agreed to allow Pct. 3 (the Farwell area) to buy a new vehicle.

- A 2003 pickup is being traded in for a 2007 pick-

- up at a cost of \$7,800. The seller is Precision Auto Group in Georgia.

- Reappointed Robert White for a two-year term representing Parmer County on the Central Plains Mental Health

- Mental Retardation Board.

- Held a workshop on the juvenile probation department budget with Sid Felan and Jeff Atkinson.

LIVE CATTLE: Looks like prices are now trading inside a range between \$88.00-91.00 basis the October contract. Cash trade is still struggling with cash trade holding the \$81-82 range over the last couple of weeks. The strongest level of support at \$88 will need to hold the market. A break below this level may project a test of the June lows around the \$85.50 area. Prices are seasonally weak during August.

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeder prices have also been trading inside a sideways pattern with most of the support around \$99.50 and resistance around the \$103.00 level. A break below support would also project a move into the June lows around \$96.00 basis the October contract. Cash sales have also begun to show some signs of weakness with the rest of the market. Prices should rebound into the September time frame.

CORN: Corn prices turned down last week and have almost traded all the way back into their late July lows at \$3.15 basis the December contract. Unlike beans, prices have come under pressure partly because of the significant strength seen in the U.S. Dollar. Crop conditions are reportedly ideal and traders continue to focus on production. Usage for feed and ethanol are still expected to come in lower than year ago levels.

SOYBEANS: Prices have remained the strongest of the grain complex. Beans have been able to hold on to significant gains seen over the last couple of weeks. Strong demand for proteins coming out of China have helped to support prices. The range is tight with support coming in around \$10.15 and resistance around \$10.50 basis the November contract.

WHEAT: Wheat prices were able to break down into new low territory late last week which now projects down into the \$5.32 area basis the December KC contract. Seasonally, wheat prices will normally find a low during the late August time frame before turning back higher. The significant shift in the U.S. Dollar had a negative impact on prices. The higher Dollar may stifle exports over the near term.

COTTON: Cotton prices have seen some improvement over the last couple of weeks, but prices look like they are now beginning to consolidate at current levels. The stronger Dollar hasn't had near the impact on cotton prices as it has in the grain complex. Sharply lower production levels have helped to support the market to some degree. Support around the \$58.00 level basis the December contract should hold.

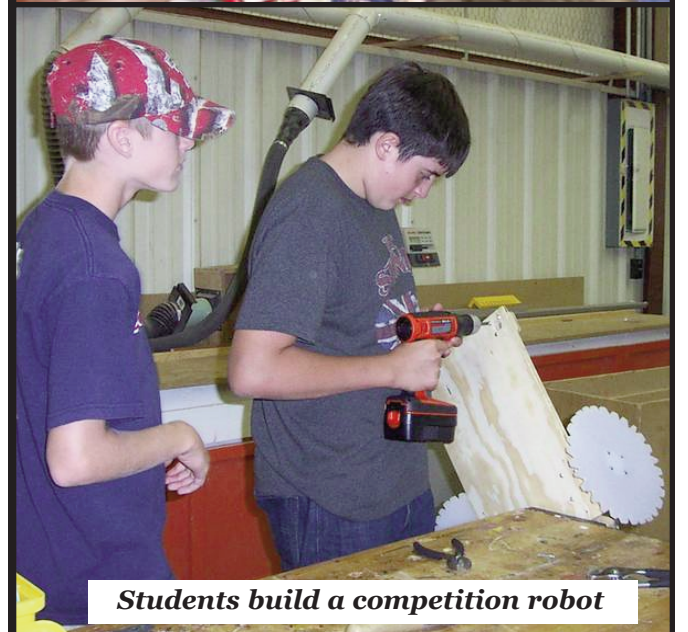

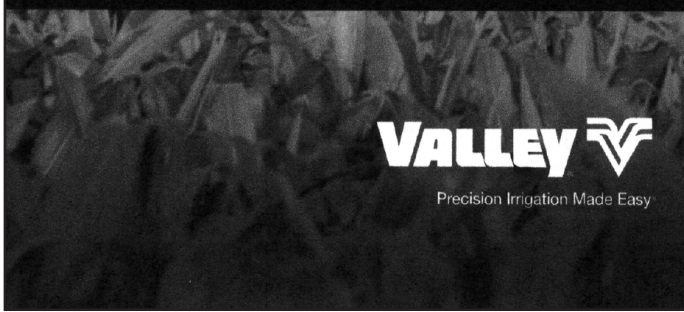

Texico City Council pushes property owners to clean up

- Heard from Bowman that recent letters sent to property owners about weeks have been responded to well. He said most folks did a really good job.

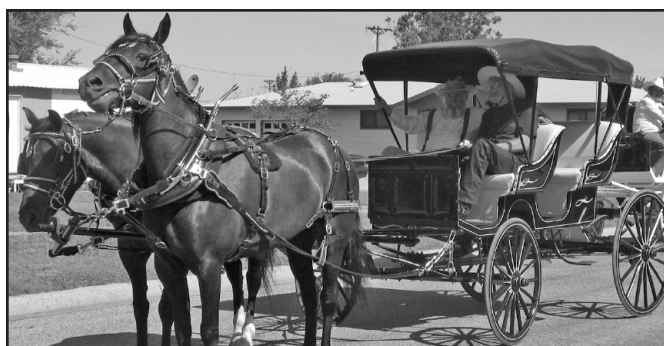
- Renewed the 10-year franchise contract with SuddenLink. The city receives 3 percent of their proceeds.

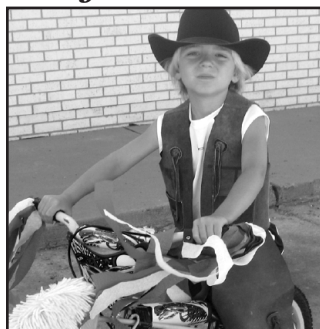
The council also approved buying a new control panel box for the wastewater plant. The only one had fallen apart, and something was needed until the new plant is operational.

Now Comes Plaintiff, to show the Court:

This Motion to Replevin allows Plaintiff to recover the security interest Defendant has taken. The actions of Defendant are unjust. Defendant had notice this proceeding was appealed to the Supreme Court of Texas at the time of the taking. This Motion to Replevin grants authority to The 287th Parmer County District for Plaintiff to have the property of Plaintiff returned with two new Model 8000 Valley Irrigation Sprinkler Center Pivot System 1296' of the same type and the one irrigation booster pump, with electric motor, and electric control panel.

The 'Order of Sale' submitted to Plaintiff on Aug. 4, 2009 by Sheriff Randy Geris was not file marked by The 287th Parmer County District Court.

The Courts action to rule to allow the two sprinklers to be removed and sold was unjust and violated the Statutes established by the People of Texas and upheld by The Supreme Court of Texas. The 287th Parmer County District Court is to uphold the Statutes of the People and the Statutes upheld by The Supreme Court of Texas.

The removal of the two sprinklers creates a hardship on Plaintiffs' ability to provide for himself. The income potential of the farm is severely reduced with the taking of the two sprinklers. The unjust taking, which violated Statutes established by the people to conduct business with people were broken by Defendant. This created immediate and irreparable hardship, financial injury, loss of income will be the result to Plaintiff.

The Courts action to rule to allow the two sprinklers to be removed and sold was unjust and violated the Constitution and Statutes of Texas. A number of Notices of Appeal have been presented to The 287th Parmer County District Court to show and explain the Court's err. The Court misinterpreted the Statutes of Texas. The Court did not follow the correct Judicial Practice and Procedure, including Motion Practice, and the correct Trial Procedure. This unjust taking, which violated Statutes established by the people to conduct business with people were broken by The 287th Parmer County District Court. These violations then constitute a Civil Rights violation because the Statutes of Texas were not upheld for this citizen, Plaintiff.

A Motion to Transfer, Change of Venue is still pending before The Supreme Court of Texas in this proceeding. The 287th Parmer County District Court Clerk and Defendant are not allowed to request the Sheriff of Parmer County Texas to 'Order a Sale' for the two sprinklers when a Appeal is pending before The Supreme Court of Texas.

A Motion for a Restraining Order to keep Defendant from removing the two sprinklers is still pending before The 287th Parmer County District Court. Defendant did not respond to the Restraining Order submitted by Plaintiff, therefore the Retraining Order should have been signed by the Court about a year ago.

Plaintiff learned from Defendant's documents approximately 30 days before this proceeding began, Plaintiff was not Delinquent with Defendant, Diversified. Defendant's refinancing plan offered to Plaintiff was not Lawful.

The Judgment signed on June 15, 2009 by the Judge allows a unlawful interest rate greater than 10%. The daily rate for late payments is also not allowed, since the filing of this Court Action stopped any interest from being charged.

The Judge did not accept Defendant's Exhibit's 18 and 19, which were the Defendant's attorney's fees on the day of the trial. Therefore the Court cannot sell property to recover Defendant's attorney's fees. Therefore the Judge cannot enter a Judgment for Defendant's attorney to collect any fees for the Defendant's attorney fees.

Wherefore Premises Considered, Plaintiff request this Motion to Replevin be Affirmed.

Wherefore Premises Considered, Plaintiff request the described collateral be returned.

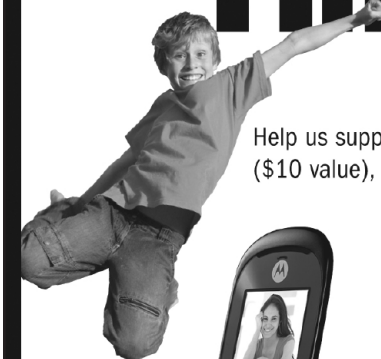

With the amount of illegal drugs and illicit sex in the crowd, it is unlikely that many noticed or cared.

Those three inconsequential days would seem to be an oddity of American cultural history, worth little more than a footnote one place or another, but sure enough, a concert to mark the 40th anniversary of Woodstock is touring the nation.

The purpose of this concert tour is supposedly to honor the alleged courage of the 500,000 at Woodstock because they

opposed the Vietnam War and because of the many gifts that their "flower power" counter-culture left our nation.

The concert tour is called "The Heroes of Woodstock."

Perhaps we should stop and think about that before we lay the wreath of "heroism" on the fevered brows of the Woodstock crowd. We have a pantheon of heroes from that decade that are much more worthy of the honors we might bestow and those heroes are the American military men and women who served in Vietnam.

The details of the American heroes of Vietnam are provided at the History Channel's website (history.com) and it is impressive. From the first 15,000 combat troops who were stationed there in 1963 by President John Kennedy until the last troops were withdrawn 12 years later, more than 3 million would serve in Vietnam.

More than two-thirds of the Americans in Vietnam had volunteered for that duty. Of the more than 58,000 who died there, almost 80 percent of them were not draftees but those volunteers. To this day, 91 percent of Vietnam veterans say they are proud of their service in that conflict and three out of four

say they would serve there all over again, even knowing how the conflict would end.

One of the best definitions of "heroism" I have heard is personal sacrifice made on the behalf of something greater than self, and that definition more than applies to the Americans who served in Vietnam. The Americans who served in Vietnam weren't doing it for the money, they weren't doing it for the adventure, and they sure weren't doing it for the gratitude of their fellow citizens.

Armchair historians will argue to the final trumpet about what our missions were in Vietnam and about how our government fumbled whatever it was trying to accomplish but one fact is beyond contestation. America said a task needed to be done in Vietnam and more than two million Americans stepped forward and said, "Here I am, take me."

And that is the difference between these real heroes and the so-called "heroes" of Woodstock. The sweet idealistic days of "peace and love" were

dead two years before Woodstock ever happened. By 1967, the counter-culture had degenerated to such a level of crime, disease, and drug-induced death that its birthplace in the Haight-Ashbury district of San Francisco conducted a symbolic funeral, burning a coffin labeled "summer of love", and declaring the high-water mark of "flower power" to be dead and gone.

Woodstock was just three days of empty rhetoric, tired chants, and cookie-cutter answers to complex problems, mixed liberally with sex and drugs and rock and roll. It was not in service to anything other than each individual's capacity for debauchery and illegal drugs.

Woodstock was nothing heroic and nothing worthy of honor and, in fact, it seems to me that one translation of Philippians 3:19 could be called The Woodstock Verse:

□ In the end they will be destroyed. Their own emotions are their god, and they take pride in the shameful things they do. Their minds are set on

worldly things. In the three days that Woodstock soiled the landscape of northern New York, 109 young Americans killed in action in Vietnam. Their graves are scattered across the country in family plots and military cemeteries, each with only the Government

Issue simple gray stone to mark their passing. They gave their all for their country and for their friends and for their families. They are the real heroes of those three days 40 years ago. Why isn't there a concert touring the country to honor them instead?

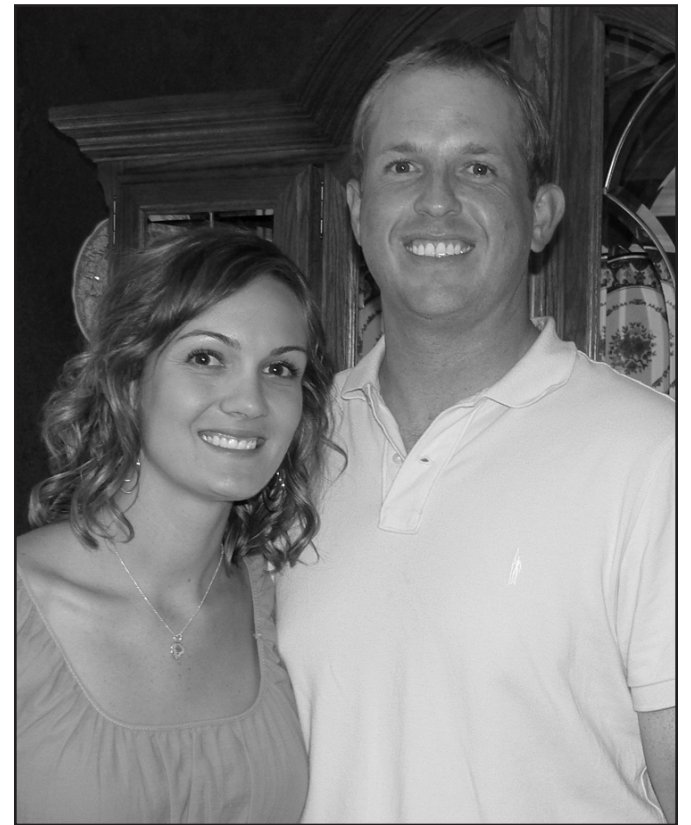

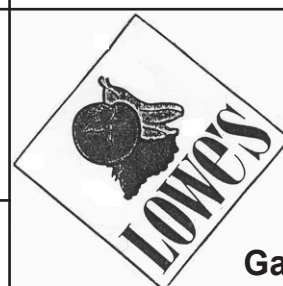
