Notice of Public Hearing on Tax Increase

The City of Farwell will hold two public hearings on a proposal to increase total tax revenues from properties on the tax roll in the preceding tax year by 6.382979 percent (percentage by which proposed tax rate exceeds lower of rollback tax rate or effective tax calculated under Chapter 26, Tax Code). Your individual taxes may increase at a greater or lesser rate, or even decrease, depending on the change in the taxable value of your property in relation to the change in taxable value of all other property and the tax rate that is adopted.

The first public hearing will be held on September 1, 2009 at 5:30 PM at City Hall.

The second public hearing will be held on September 15, 2009 at 5:30 PM at City Hall.

The average taxable value of a residence homestead in City of Farwell last year was \$59,183. Based on last year's tax rate of \$0.433200 per \$100 of taxable value, the amount of taxes imposed last year on the average home was \$256.38.

The average taxable value of a residence homestead in City of Farwell this year is \$61,199. If the governing body adopts the effective tax rate for this year of \$0.423000 per \$100 of taxable value, the amount of taxes imposed this year on the average home would be \$258.87.

If the governing body adopts the proposed tax rate of \$0.450000 per \$100 of taxable value, the amount of taxes imposed this year on the average home would be \$275.40.

Members of the public are encouraged to attend the hearings and express their views.

* "Appraised value" is the amount shown on the appraisal roll and defined by Section 1.04(8), Tax Code.
** "New property" is defined by Section 26.01(17), Tax Code.
*** "Taxable value" is defined by Section 1.04(10), Tax Code.

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William Lynn Burton

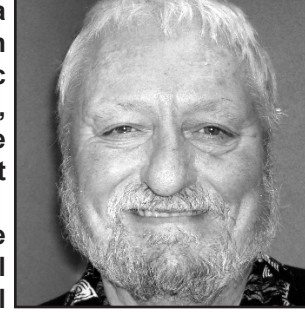
William Lynn Burton, a recent band director in the Lubbock Public Schools and others, entered the full presence of The Creator on August 13, 2009.

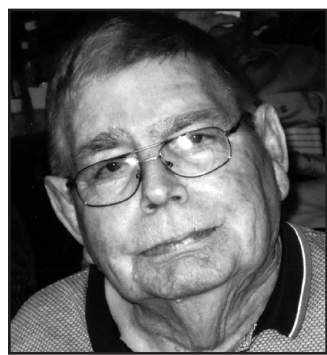

LIVE CATTLE: Prices traded sideways for most of the week while waiting for the USDA Cattle on Feed report due for release on Friday. The report is expected to show an increase in placements, but odds are good that there will be very little impact. Supplies remain tight and demand is expected to hold into the Labor Day Holiday. Short term trends are pointing higher at this time.

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeder prices seem to be under a little more pressure than the Live Cattle prices. Corn prices seem to have stabilized for the moment and Live Cattle prices will need to show some improvement in order to support another feeder rally. Short term trends have turned higher, but prices seem to be caught inside a tight trading range waiting for news to move the market.

CORN: Prices continue to stumble, but short term trends have turned higher at this time. This year's crop is expected to be the largest on record and demand has decreased from year ago levels. Like the rest of the grain complex, most of the negative news has already been factored into prices at this time. Technically, corn should trade sideways to higher over the next few weeks until actual harvest numbers come in?

SOYBEANS: Soybean prices were able to hold support around the \$9.50 level basis the November contract and turn their short term trends higher. Although this year's crop is expected to be large, traders know that the crop is not out of the field. Most of the negative news is well known in the market, but prices may continue to trade sideways to higher until the crop is actually harvested.

WHEAT: Prices continue to be the weakest link in the grain complex, but seasonal tendencies should begin to turn positive at some point in late August. The seasonal tendency is strong to move higher into the end of the year, but with huge world stocks looming overhead, it may be difficult to see a significant improvement in prices. Resistance lies between \$5.50-6.00 basis the December KC Wheat.

COTTON: Cotton prices may continue to trade inside the price range which began back in early July with \$65 being resistance and \$58.50 support basis the December contract. Production in the U.S. will be at some of their lowest levels seen in years, but demand also remains weak at this time. Any interest coming out of China could help to support higher prices, but this may take some time to materialize.
