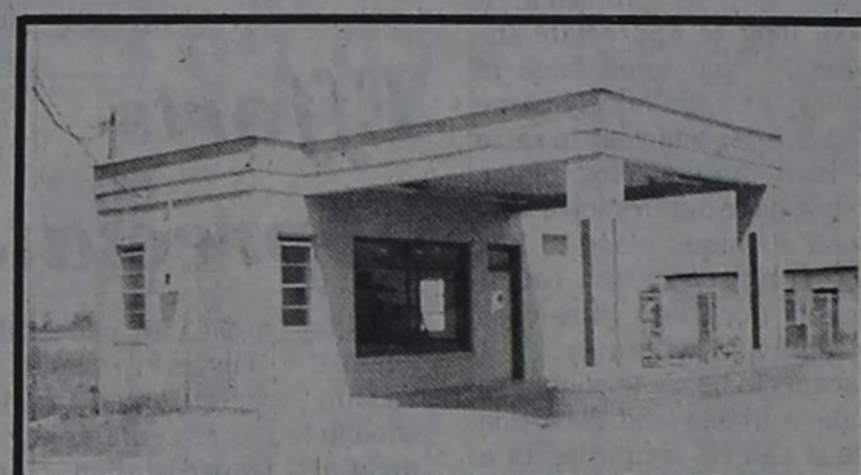

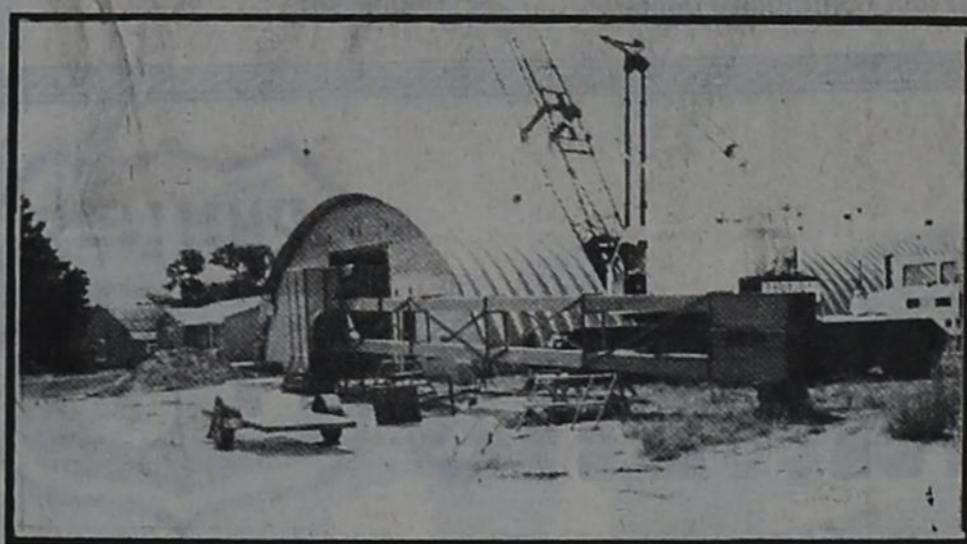


### Church expansion

## Kittrell wins 1st football contest

The 27th annual Merchants Football Contest began last week, starting the season with only one contestant guessing correctly on 11 of the 12 games.

Ysleta Kittrell of Farwell was the first place winner. Her check was for \$10, an increase from last year's first place prize of \$7.50. Mrs. Kittrell was correct on every game except for predicting that Clovis would defeat Palo Duro.

The number of participants in the contest keeps increasing. For the first game, there were 312 contestants. Last year, 282 contestants started the contest, up from 239 in 1983. By the contest's end last year,

502 contestants had entered as more folks enter each week.

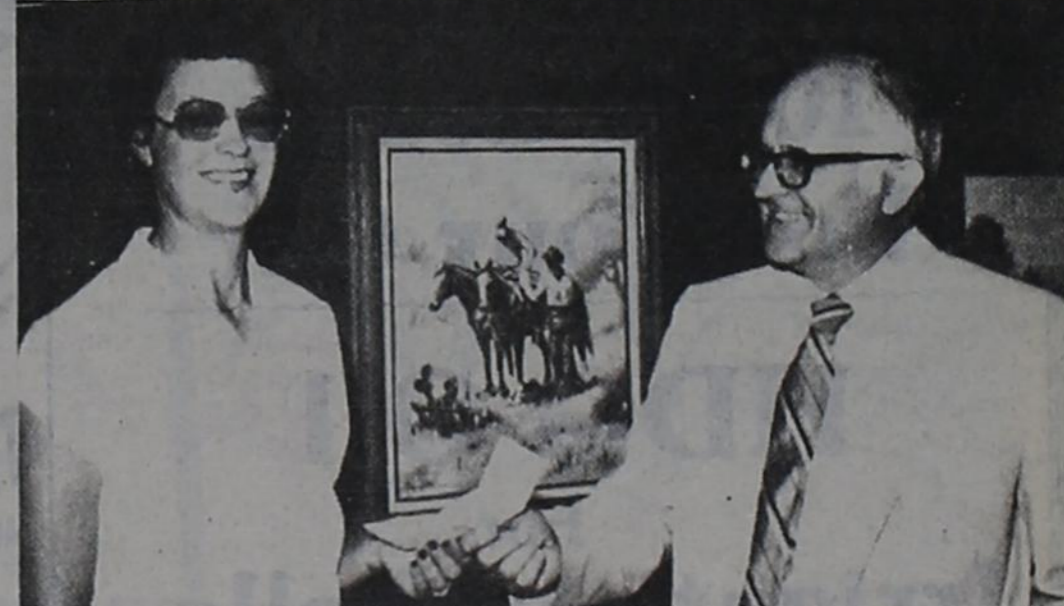

## Texico residents get gas company refunds

Texico residents opened their mailboxes late last week to find refund checks in them.

The checks are the result of a class action lawsuit filed in the 1970s against five natural gas users, including the Gas Company of New Mexico. The suit was settled for \$75 million.

As a result of the settlement,

funds are being distributed to gas company customers between July 1976 and early April 1984. Tony Leonard, manager for the Brewer Class Distribution Project, which is working for the federal district court, said 264,000 checks have been sent out.

He said the refunds distributed

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**A trying time**

Jubal Pierce and his family want to extend our gratitude and appreciation to all of the individuals and businesses that made donations and helped with the benefit at the fair sale.

You can't imagine what a boost it was for Jubal's mental state. After being in pain for over three weeks and his pigs not making the sale, he was ready for something positive in his life.

Jubal was born in California. It didn't take long to appreciate the kind of people that lived back in Curry County and the family came running back after one year to raise the kids in a more caring place.

You people have again shown why this is such a unique place to live and work. Your concerns, cards, prayers and donations mean so much to Jubal and his family.

There seems to be some confusion about Jubal's illness and condition so maybe it can be simplified in a summary from what has happened. He was operated on in Clovis Aug. 9 to clean and drain infected fluid around the hip joint. On Aug. 16 Jubal was transferred to BCMC in Albuquerque so their more sophisticated laboratory could determine the correct amount of antibiotics to have enough killing power in the blood to suppress the infection found in the fluid.

Jubal started to develop a fever and more pain and had to be re-opened on Aug. 24 to again clean infected fluid from around the hip joint. The incision is still open and another antibiotic is being used so Jubal is feeling good except for the twice a day dressing changes which are still very painful. He will stay in the hospital until they are confident the infection has been conquered.

(Continued from Page 1) thus far represent a bit less than 50 percent of the funds residents will get. The rest of the refund will be made in early 1986.

Leonard said the refund is for residential customers only — not commercial or industrial customers.

Persons who have not received refunds, but believe they are entitled to them, should call 1-800-824-2894. They will be sent a claim form. The form then would be verified and a refund would be made in the late fall.

According to Larry Cochran, of Southern Union Gas, Farwell customers are not eligible for the refund because Texas had a different rate structure than New Mexico.

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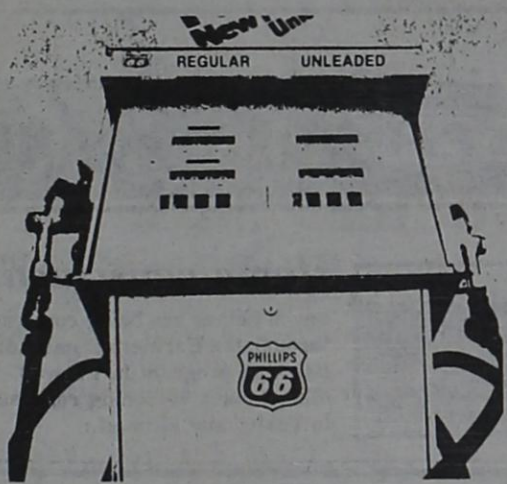
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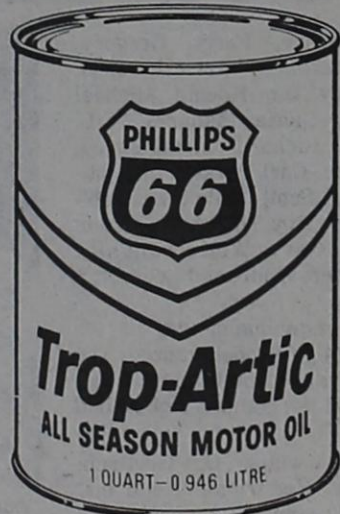
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## Farwell's tax rate stays the same

The Farwell City Council Monday approved a 34-cent tax rate, similar to the one that has been in effect for several years.

Approving it were Liz Phillips, Martin Kube, Curtis Smith and Ysleta Kittrell. Absent were Fred Chandler and Mayor Walter Kaltwasser.

Three residents appeared at the meeting, concerned about the council's newspaper ad that apparently

showed a large increase in the tax rate. It was pointed out that this was a bookkeeping procedure and the rate listed in the ad was "the effective tax rate" and not the rate to be settled upon.

Most of the meeting was given to a discussion of the possible use of a private garbage collector, similar to what has recently transpired in 'Texico. Waste Control of New Mexico began private garbage col-

lection Sept. 1 under a five-year agreement with the Texico City Council.

Willis Malone, district manager with Browning-Ferris Industries, appeared before the council to give its members some indications on cost and service.

He noted that private service is much cheaper than if a city tries to operate the service itself. He gave a rough estimate of \$8.20 BFI would charge the city per customer for weekly service, not including any landfill maintenance.

Malone appeared at the meeting at the invitation of City Clerk Janie Bowery, who said she had discussed the service with Mayor Kaltwasser first. "I invited him to get information," said Mrs. Bowery. "Legislation is pushing us toward a private service and we may need this some day."

Currently, Farwell uses open burning, something the state frowns upon.

Councilman Smith said he favors hauling trash and is opposed to open burning. He said more information on trash hauling is needed and asked Mrs. Bowery to check into what costs have been to the city as compared to what it would cost to haul trash to a landfill.

"It's obvious, we're going to have to do something in the near future," said Mrs. Bowery.

"We need to take care of this before we're made to do it," Smith added.

In other business, Mrs. Bowery said Southwestern Public Service has filed a rate change calling for a slight decrease in its rates.

The council agreed to seek bids for a water line extension toward the First Baptist Church of Farwell. The half-block extension is estimated to cost more than \$3,000; thus bids are needed.

Mrs. Bowery said she has asked the state to check Farwell's insurance key rate. The council asked her to do so at its last meeting because they believe the rate will be lowered. Farwell is now on the state's list for an inspection but no indications were made as to when it would be.

The council approved the request of the Farwell Chamber of Commerce to place a sign on its property noting that a tourist information center is available here. Also, Mrs. Bowery will check with the state highway district to get information

on the feasibility of moving the Texas marker from its current site to one near the Farwell drug store where a picnic area has been discussed.

## Charter bus too expensive

The Farwell Booster Club held its meeting Tuesday at Luce's Spur Restaurant.

They discussed the proposed charter bus to the Seagraves game and found the price was too much.

They are checking into using one of the school buses.

There will be a membership drive at the Petersburg game here today (Friday) for new members. The fee will be \$10 for family.

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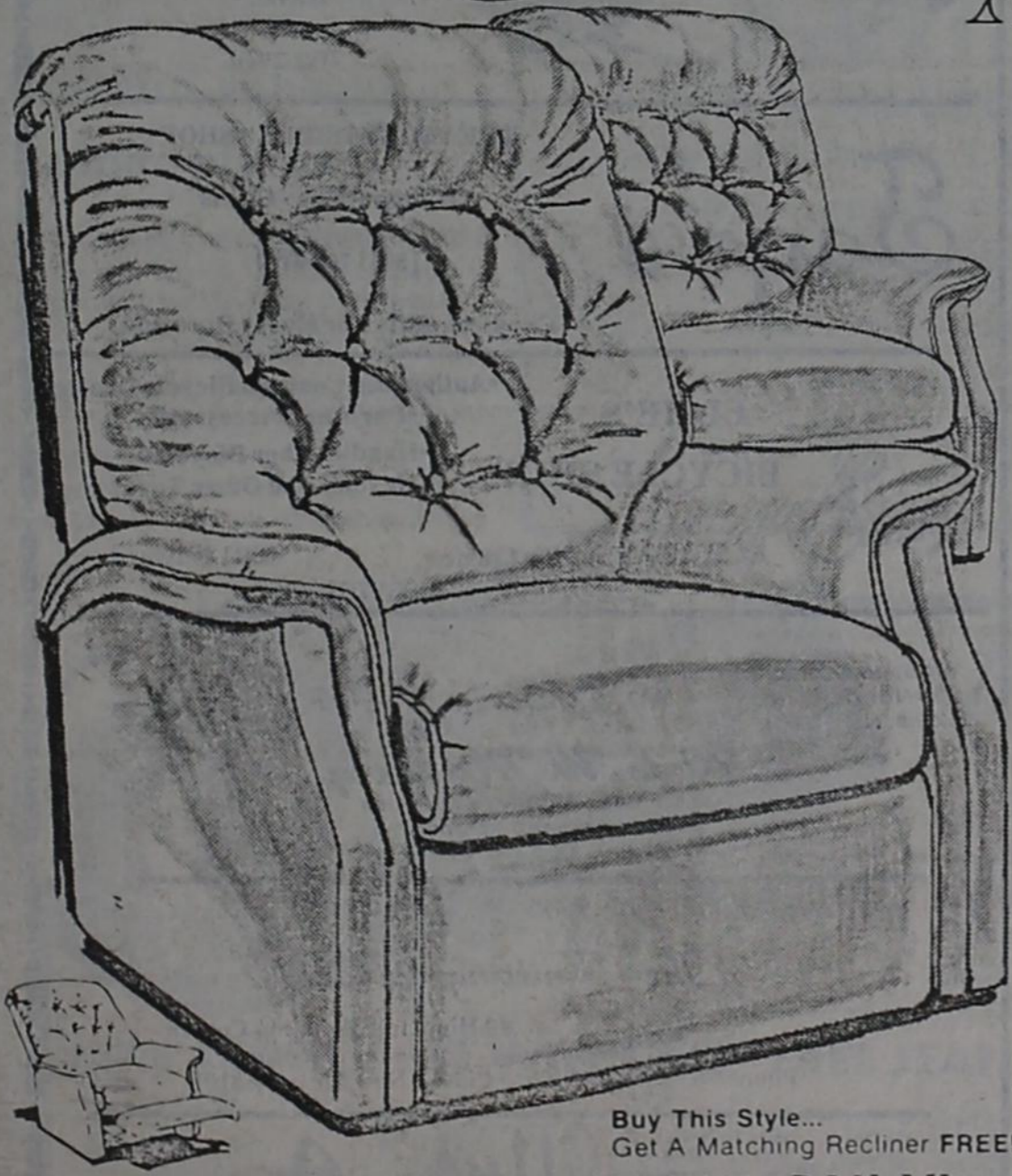
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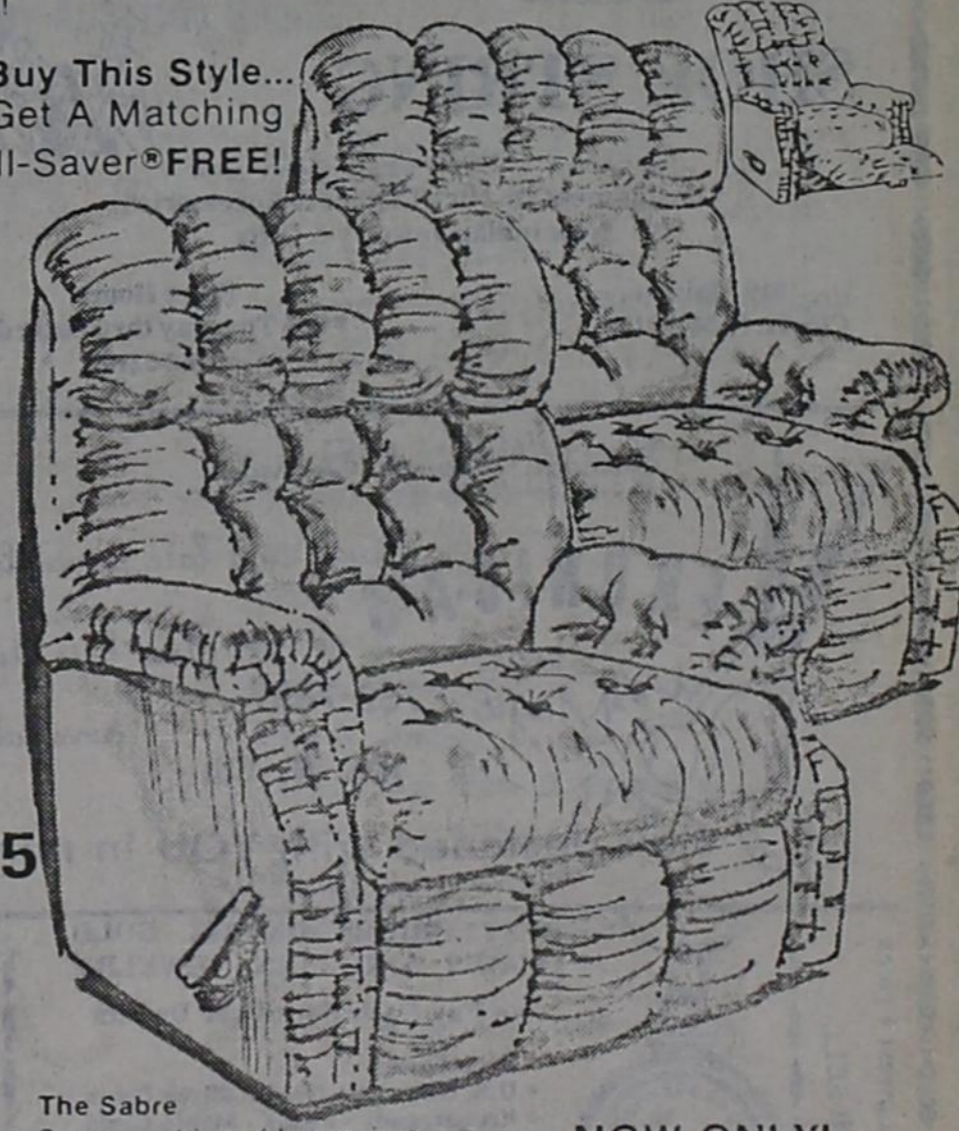

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## Work progressing on tourism center

Work has begun to start a tourism information center at the United Drug of Farwell building. Last month, the Texico-Farwell Lions Club, Texico-Farwell Rotary Club and Farwell Chamber of Commerce agreed to contribute funds to start the center.

Needed was money to buy a rack for tourism brochures from Texas and New Mexico, and to put up signs along the highways telling tourists that the information center is here.

The project, initiated by the Farwell Chamber of Commerce, does not involve any state or federal funds. Because of that, a problem occurred with getting Texas brochures from the state highway department, which has a policy of sending brochures only to state-supported tourist centers.

However, after being contacted by the Farwell Chamber, state Rep. Pete Laney, whose district includes Parmer County, went to bat for Farwell. The result is that the Texas Department of Tourism is sending many brochures, posters and highway maps for the Farwell center. Also, New Mexico's Department

of Tourism shipped nine large boxes full of brochures to the new center.

The brochures will be placed on a large rack in the drug store lobby. The rack was purchased from Pudge Rose.

Signs noting that the center is in Farwell will be placed at three strategic locations on the outskirts of the community: Crossroads Motel (a double-faced sign for traffic from Clovis and for traffic from Amarillo), Lunsford Auto Parts (for traffic from Lubbock) and Farwell City Hall (for traffic from Clovis). And a double-faced sign will be placed on the crossbar of the pole at the drug store.

The cost for the signs and rack is estimated about \$450.

Placing the brochures at the drug store is the first phase of the Chamber's project. Under discussion is the possibility of placing a small picnic area at the rear of the drug store, which would include the Texas marker, presently located adjacent to City Cleaners. This will be checked into further with the state.

## Texico buys decorations

Texico Chamber of Commerce President James Pierce announced at Monday night's Chamber meeting that \$2,387 worth of Christmas decorations have been purchased.

He said the decision had been made at a meeting of the Chamber's directors.

The 12 decorations will be placed along the highway during the holiday season. Southwestern Public Service has agreed to provide hook-ups and service.

The Chamber now is in the midst of a drive to raise funds from local businesses to pay for the decorations. Pierce Real Estate and the Texico branch of the Bank of Clovis both have agreed to sponsor individual decorations.

Also, Pierce said it would be a good idea to see if funds remaining from the former Texico riding club

could be used toward the purchase. About \$1,000 is available. Pierce and Bill Christian will check with former riding club members to get their approval.

Contributions toward the decorations can be turned in at the Texico bank.

## Small fire reported

Farwell firefighters were called twice late last week to the Sherley-Anderson-Pitman grain elevator.

Manager Johnnie Williams said: "There wasn't any damage to report on. It concerned a small fire in one of the dryers. It could have been caused by trash or one of the sensors in the dryer."

The elevator has been working at full force since Saturday.

## Texico OK's hike in solid waste rates

The Texico City Council Tuesday unanimously approved a new solid waste ordinance which has increases in garbage collection.

The ordinance follows the contract approval with Waste Control of New Mexico, a private garbage collector, for five years. Services began last week.

The new rates, effective Oct. 1, are:

-The \$5.50 a month rate most city residents now pay goes to \$8.50. Waste Control is charging the city \$6.52 per residential account but the city has added on the \$1.98 to avoid having to raise it each year. Waste

Control's fee likely will go up each year due to an escalation clause in the contract.

-The \$7.50 a month rate residents who are outside the city but are on city water lines goes up to \$11.50.

-The rate commercial businesses will be charged will be 10 percent above the cost Waste Control charges the city.

-Rates stay the same for using the transfer station, where residents can take items too large for the Poly-Karts. Fees are \$5, \$7.50 or \$15, depending on the load.

It was noted during the meeting that residents must place their

Poly-Karts along the street curbs if they want their garbage picked up.

Last week, city workers picked up

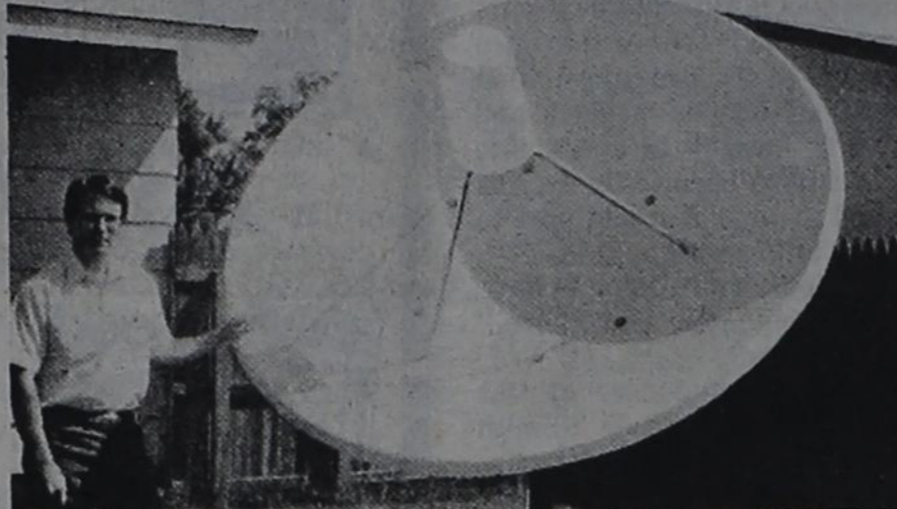
garbage from containers in the alleys due to the transition between the old way and the new service.

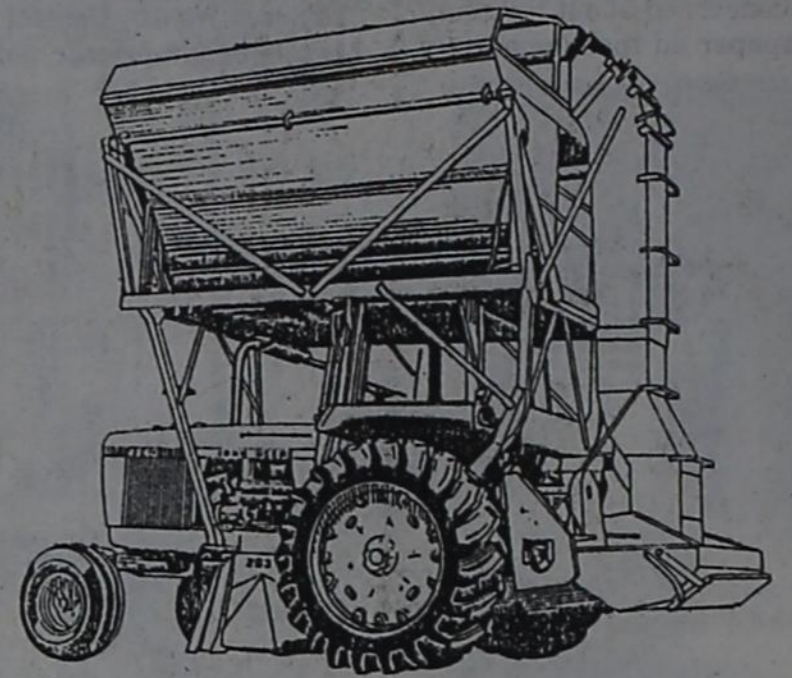
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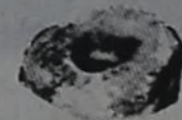

# Woman gives up career to pursue mission work

Throughout the history of the Christian church men have claimed the limelight, but much of the work of the church has been accomplished by women. Some feminists argue that the church is built on a system of patriarchy that continues to enslave women. Others call Jesus Christ the liberator of women.

But while scholars argue, preachers pontificate, and demonstrators on both the far left and the far right cry foul, most women simply get on with the business of living out their spirituality in whatever way seems appropriate to their background and circumstances.

Tonda Fulcher, 23, is one Lubbock woman taking a traditional route of service offered by her church. She left her job at the Avalanche-Journal recently to enroll in Adventures in Mission, a program of missionary training offered at the Sunset Church

of Christ.

"I always wanted to (do mission work), but never really had the opportunity," she said. "Now that I'm older and more mature, I am more ready to settle down."

Settling down for Miss Fulcher means having the confidence that

she has the self-discipline to give a year and a half of her life to a mission project. Her preparation will include five months of Bible study and six weeks of missionary training. Once the course is completed, she must decide where she would like to go and raise support from churches and individuals.

"I think it would be neat to go to Australia, but I haven't really talked with anyone a lot about that," she said.

The most difficult part of the decision was giving up the security of her job. And although her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Pete Fulcher who live in Farwell, are pleased about her decision, she admitted that both she and her mother probably will have some moments of doubt when she is far away from home.

Emphasizing that she will have a much clearer picture of the kind of work she will do after she has been through the training program, Miss Fulcher said she envisions herself assisting in new church growth by helping with Bible studies and vacation Bible schools.

At this point she is not thinking beyond the two-year commitment of training and mission service. "After I get into it, I think I'll be more able to make decisions about the future," she said. "As of right now, I figure that no matter what I do with the rest of my life, I'm going to benefit. I also think that I can be on the

mission field right here in Lubbock.

The yearning to be a missionary has been there since she was a child, in her home church. She is a member now of Monterey Church of Christ. The young people there have opportunities to participate in two

and three-week mission trips, an option that was not available to her in the small church she attended as a teen-ager, she said.

But the decision now is more than a vague desire. "I really love people and I love the Lord," she said. "It feels right."

## PCG urges increased income

"Provision for increased producer income is desperately needed in a new farm program, and anything that produces less farm income would be a disaster."

That interpretation of a detailed legislative policy developed over the past year by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, was given to ginners and guests at the 1985 meeting of Plains Ginners Association in Lubbock Sept. 6 by PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson.

Noting the impossibility of establishing in advance a legislative position giving clear guidance on the many proposals that surface during a legislative year, Johnson said this condensed "philosophy" was devised by the PCG executive committee to serve as the "guiding light" for the organization's staff and officers as they labor in Washington the remainder of this year toward an acceptable farm program for 1986 and beyond.

More specifically, he told the ginners, PCG favors retaining the current 55-cent floor on a cotton loan set by the same market-oriented formula now in use, plus a 1986 target price of 86 cents per pound, adjusted each year to reflect increasing production costs.

Johnson said PCG readily agrees with administration spokesmen, legislators and farm economists who just about all say agriculture needs a farm bill that will increase producer income, enhance farm

commodity exports and reduce government cost.

However, he stated, such a bill "is an impossibility." Under current conditions you can't increase producer income, reduce market prices to world market levels, which is necessary to increase exports, and save government money all at the same time, he reasoned.

## Problem with spoilage?

Have you had problems of spoilage of home canned foods?

Parmer County Extension Home Economist, Janette Pierce has had several calls this season about canned food not sealing. "This can be frustrating because of the waste of time, energy, money and food."

Take a look at the jars and lids you have been using.

Do the jars have chips or nicks at the top? If they do, this can cause a poor seal—thus spoilage. Do not use these jars for canning.

Do you tighten the two piece lid as tight as you can get before and after processing? If you do, this can cause the sealing material to be broken—and again spoilage.

What you can do? Run your finger around the tops of jars and inspect them visibly to make sure they are smooth and free from nicks and cracks.

If two-piece, self-seal lids are used, follow the manufacturer's instructions in adjusting the lid and tightening the metal ring. After

processing, when the canned product is thoroughly cool, take off the metal ring, if possible without forcing. If the ring sticks, cover it with a hot, damp cloth for a minute or two to loosen. Then wash them to prevent rust and they may be used again. However, the lid may be used only once.

Also, consider the age of lids being used. The sealing compound may not be as good quality as it once was, preventing sealing.

### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Sections 1 and 2 of House Joint Resolution 6 propose a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development bonds.

The additional bonds to be issued will be dedicated for deposit in the Texas Water Development Fund, with \$190 million of those bond proceeds to be used for water supply loans and facilities acquisition and with \$400 million of those bond proceeds to be used for state participation in the acquisition and development of facilities for storage, transmission, transportation, and treatment of water and wastewater. Of the remaining bonds authorized, \$190 million will be dedicated for use in water quality enhancement projects, and \$200 million will be dedicated exclusively for flood control projects.

The amendment would also allow the legislature to provide for the creation, administration, and implementation of a bond insurance program to which the state pledges up to \$250 million of its general credit to insure payment of the principal of and interest on bonds or other obligations issued by political subdivisions of the state for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, recharge, chloride control or desalinization. Unless authorized to continue by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the Legislature, the bond insurance program will expire on the sixth anniversary of the date on which this section becomes a part of the constitution. Bond insurance issued before expiration of the program will not be affected by such expiration.

The amendment would authorize the legislature to create and appropriate money to special funds in the state treasury to make grants, loans, and other financial assistance available to governmental entities for certain enumerated water planning purposes. Also, the legislature would be permitted to extend the benefits of constitutionally approved water projects to nonprofit water supply corporations.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development Bonds, to create special water funds for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, subsidence control, recharge, chloride control, agricultural soil and water conservation, and desalinization, to authorize a bond insurance program, and to clarify the purposes for which Texas Water Development Bonds may be issued."

### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Section 3 of House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue and sell Texas agricultural water conservation bonds in an

amount not to exceed \$200 million, if authorized to do so by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the legislature. The Texas agricultural water conservation bonds would be general obligations of the State of Texas, and would be paid from the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year. The amendment would allow Texas agricultural water conservation bonds to be issued and sold only for four years after the date on which this Act becomes a part of the constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance and sale of \$200 million of Texas agricultural water conservation bonds."

### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to authorize a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property if such relocation or replacement is done in conjunction with or immediately following the relocation or replacement of water mains serving the property. Any legislative enactment permitting the expenditure of funds for such purposes would authorize the city or town to fix a lien on the property, with the owners' consent, for the cost of relocating or replacing the water laterals, and would provide that such cost shall be assessed against the property, with repayment by the property owner to be amortized over a period not to exceed five years at the rate of interest set by law. Such liens could not be enforced until after five years from the date the liens were affixed.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to enact laws permitting a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property."

### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 21 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the use of the proceeds from the sale of permanent school fund land to acquire other land for the permanent school fund. Currently, the constitution requires that proceeds from the sale of such land be invested in certain bonds and other securities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing proceeds from the sale of land dedicated to the permanent school fund to be used to acquire other land for that fund."

### PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 89 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts by determining

the services the district must provide, by setting requirements a resident must meet in order to qualify for services, and by determining any other relevant provisions necessary for providing health care to residents.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts."

### PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the State of Texas to enter into an agreement with another state to confine inmates from the state of Texas in penal or correctional facilities of the other state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to permit state prisoners to be placed in penal facilities of another state pursuant to an interstate agreement."

### PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the commissioners court of Chambers County to divide Chambers County into not less than two and not more than six justice precincts. Under current constitutional law, Chambers County may be divided into not less than two and not more than five justice precincts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing Chambers County to be divided into two to six precincts."

### PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 9 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant an additional \$500 million in bonding authority to the Veterans' Land Board for the veterans' housing assistance program. Under the current constitution, the Veterans' Land Board is authorized by Article III, Section 49-b-1 to issue and sell not more than \$800 million in bonds, \$500 million of which may be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. This amendment would increase that authorization to permit the issuance and sale of up to \$1.3 billion in bonds, \$1 billion of which would be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. In addition, the amendment would remove the current definition of "veteran" from the constitution and permit the legislature to redefine "veteran" as the changing times and circumstances require.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing \$500 million in additional bonding authority for the veterans' housing assistance program and changing the definition of those veterans eligible to participate in the veterans' land program and the veterans' housing program by authorizing the legislature by law to define an eligible veteran for the purposes of those programs."

### PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 72 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature either to enact a statute or to attach a rider to the General Ap-

propriations Act to require prior approval of the expenditure or emergency transfer of any funds appropriated by the legislature to state governmental agencies.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to protect public funds by authorizing prior approval of expenditure or emergency transfer of state appropriations."

### PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to provide for the issuance of general obligation bonds, the proceeds of which would be deposited in a fund to be known as the farm and ranch finance program fund. The fund would be administered by the Veterans' Land Board and would be used to make loans and provide other financial assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land. The amount of bonds outstanding at any one time would be limited to \$500 million. The principal and interest that becomes due on such bonds in each fiscal year would be paid from amounts remaining in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, with the balance due to be appropriated from treasury revenues in the fiscal year when such amounts become due.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide financing assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land."

### PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 16 proposes a constitutional amendment that would define indictments and informations as instruments charging a person with the commission of an offense, and would delete certain technical requirements as to the form of writs and processes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment relating to the manner in which a person is charged with a criminal offense and to certain requirements applicable to state writs and processes."

### PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the Texas Supreme Court and the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals jurisdiction to answer questions of state law certified from federal appellate courts. In addition, the two courts would promulgate rules of procedure relating to the review of those questions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment granting the Supreme Court of Texas and the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas jurisdiction to answer questions of state law certified from a federal appellate court."

### PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 14 proposes a constitutional amendment that would create a board with responsibility for the reapportionment of judicial districts, subject to legislative approval. The amendment would provide for the continued power of the legislature to provide for judicial reapportionment, and would provide that reapportionment

will be the responsibility of the Legislative Redistricting Board if the Judicial Districts Board fails to make a timely reapportionment. The amendment would provide for the creation of judicial districts smaller than a county in counties where the creation of such districts has been approved by the voters at a general election. The amendment would provide for more than one judge for a judicial district. The amendment would rename supreme judicial districts as courts of appeals districts. The amendment would provide that the jurisdiction and terms of court of district and county courts may be as provided by law. The amendment would provide for rules of judicial administration and civil procedure to be promulgated by the Supreme Court, and would provide that the legislature may delegate additional rule making power to the Supreme Court or to the Court of Criminal Appeals. The amendment would provide that courts and judges in existence at the time of its adoption remain in existence until otherwise provided by law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the reapportionment of the judicial districts of the state by the Judicial Districts Board or by the Legislative Redistricting Board, and providing for the administration and jurisdiction of constitutional courts."

### PROPOSITION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment that would abolish the office of County Treasurer in Andrews County and transfer the powers and duties of that office to the County Auditor. The amendment would also abolish the office of County Treasurer in El Paso County if, at the statewide election at which this amendment is submitted to the voters, a majority of the voters who vote in El Paso County favor the amendment. The functions of the office of El Paso County Treasurer will be performed by a person employed or designated by the El Paso County Commissioners Court. The amendment also provides for the abolition of the office of County Surveyor in Denton, Randall, Collin, Dallas, El Paso, and Henderson Counties upon approval of such abolition by a majority of the voters who vote on the question at an election called by the commissioners court of the county. If the office of County Surveyor is abolished in any county, the commissioners court may employ or contract with any qualified person to perform the duties of the office.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for:

- (1) the abolition of the office of county treasurer in Andrews County and El Paso County;
- (2) the abolition of the office of county surveyor in Collin, Dallas, Denton, El Paso, Henderson, and Randall Counties."

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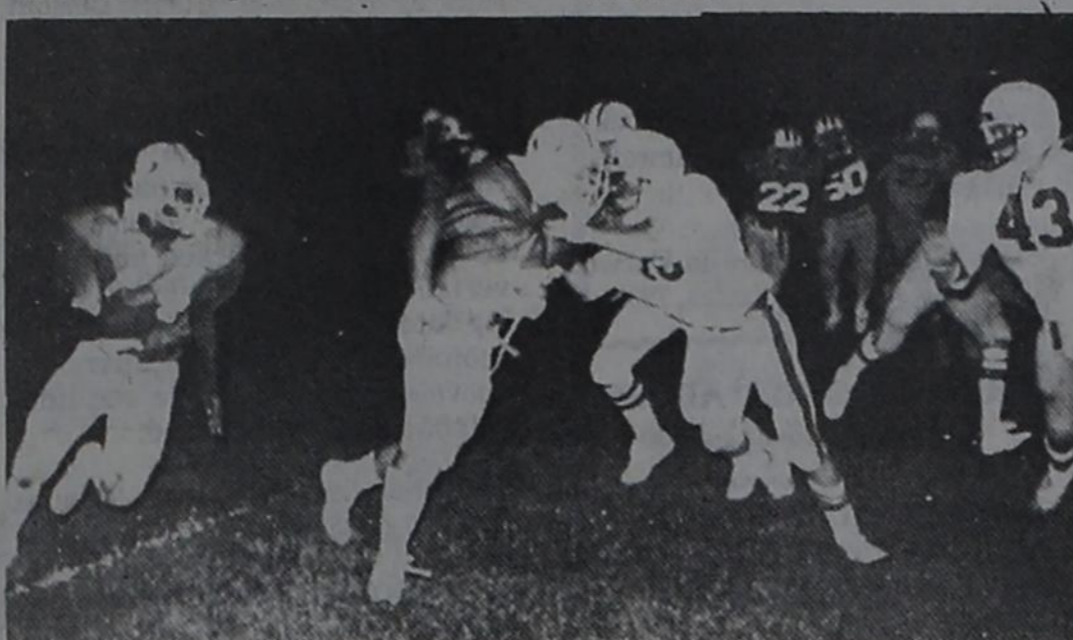
## 90th birthday celebrated

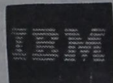
