**PROJECT SUMMARY:**

- Construct new headworks (manual bar screen, gnt chamber, flow meter)
- Construct third lagoon
- Remove sludge, deeper, + install lines in existing lagoons
- Construct chlorine disinfection, disposal, + effluent flow meter system.
- Upgrade electrical service to 480v, 3-ph
- Construct irrigation system for treated effluent discharge.

**FINDING OF NO SIGNIFICANT IMPACT**  
 An environmental review of the project has been made by the Grantee and is available for public examination and copying at the office noted above. Based on this review, the Grantee has determined that a request for release of project funds will not significantly affect the quality of the human environment and hence, an environmental Impact statement will not be undertaken under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (PL 91-910).

The reasons for the decision not to prepare an environmental impact statement are as follows:  
No significant adverse impacts are anticipated, and numerous positive impacts are expected (improved efficiency, improved capacity, + updated compliance with State/Federal regulations).

**Public Comment on Finding**

All interested agencies, groups or persons disagreeing with these decisions are invited to submit written comments for consideration by the Grantee by date 25 September 2009. All comments must clearly specify which decision they object to - The Finding of No Significant Impact or the Request for Release of Funds. All comments so received will be considered by the Grantee prior to its taking any administrative action or requesting release of funds on the date listed immediately above.

**RELEASE OF GRANT FUNDS**

The Grantee will undertake the project described above with Block Grant funds from the US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. The grantee is certifying to HUD that the City of Texico (name of grantee) and Jerry Cunningham Meyer (name of Chief Elected Official) in his/her official capacity, consent to accept the jurisdiction of the federal courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental reviews, decision-making and action, and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval, the Grantee may use the Block Grant funds, and HUD will have satisfied its responsibilities listed in 24 CFR Part 58. HUD will accept an objection to its approval of the release of funds and acceptance of the certification only if it is on one of the following bases:  
 (a) that the certification was not in fact executed by the Chief Executive Officer or other officer of the Grantee (b) that the environmental review record for the project indicated omission of a required decision finding, or step applicable to the project in the environmental review process, or (c) another federal agency has submitted written comments pursuant to Section 309 of the Clear Air Act or Section 102(c) of NEPA. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure (24 CFR Part 58), and may be addressed to HUD or LGD/DFA, Room 202 Bataan Memorial Bldg., Santa Fe, NM 87501. Objections to the release of funds on bases other than those stated above will not be considered by HUD or LGD/DFA. No objection received after 15 days from the date of request for funds listed above will be considered by HUD or LGD/DFA.

**Texico looks at new wastewater treatment plant**

The Texico City Council on Tuesday discussed plans for the new wastewater treatment plant. The city is looking at options to replace the lagoon system that is currently being used.

Several city employees went to Tornillo, Texas, to see their new state of the art plant. It was recently built at a cost of \$5 million. It is believed that Texico could build the same plant at a much lower cost because the Tornillo plant had to be built above ground to prevent flooding in the area from reaching the waste.

The Tornillo plant was built to handle over 1,500 homes and used a process that includes UV lights to clean the wastewater and then discharge it into the Rio Grande River.

It is also expandable in case the city grows. The council will look into prices to find out if it is feasible for Texico to build.

In other news, the council:  
- Discussed the upcoming beautification of the entry to New Mexico. The state is looking at putting a walkway, park benches and a sign in the highway right-of-way in front of the former Crossroads Motel.

They will also use bricks to spell out Texico on the ground.

Councilman Oran Jay Autrey asked about parking, but that had not been discussed.

- Heard that Texico City Hall will be closed on Oct. 14-16. Office staff will be at meetings during that time. An emergency phone number will be available, and will be posted in the Tribune.

- Agreed on a mutual aide pact with Farwell. In the past, this only covered the fire departments, but was expanded to include city workers, police departments, and other city services.

For instance if there is a major water leak, Texico could ask Farwell to send their city employees over to help.

- Passed a resolution setting water as the biggest goal for the city to work on. Second was starting the Phase II sewer project and third were new sewer lines.

- Heard the city is working on rehabbing two wells on the south side of town to get them into service.

- Agreed to hire Stephens Construction to put in caliche around the new fire department building, and Curry County to chip seal over it. The total cost was \$12,500.

- Heard that Raul Esparza, on Lamar Street, has made progress cleaning up his property since the last meeting. Police Chief Doug Bowman said he will

continue to monitor the situation.

- Discussed the trash around the apartment complex on the south side of town. Councilman Doug Scioli said they have been fixing up apartments which led to the mattresses and other trash. Bowman said he looked into it and they have been doing a good job of carting off trash.

instead of your hand when they don't have a tissue, and remember to do this yourself. Don't share food or drink.

Know the signs and symptoms of the flu. Symptoms include fever, cough, sore throat, a runny or stuffy nose, body aches, headache, and feeling very tired. Some people may also vomit or have diarrhea. A fever is a temperature taken with a thermometer that is equal to or greater than 100 degrees Fahrenheit. If you do not have a thermometer to measure a temperature, a person may have a fever if he or she feels warm, has a flushed appearance, or is sweating or shivering.

Keep sick children at home for at least 24 hours after they no longer have fever or do not have signs of fever, without using fever-reducing drugs. Keeping children with a fever at home will reduce the number of people who may get the flu from them.

Texico is working closely with the state education and health departments to watch flu conditions and make decisions about the best steps to take for our students. We will keep you updated with new information as it becomes available. You may call me with any questions at 482-3492.

*Letter to the Editor*

Dear parents,  
As you may know, flu can easily spread from person to person. Therefore, we are taking steps to reduce the spread of flu at Farwell Schools. We want to keep the school open to students and functioning in a normal manner during this flu season, but we need your help to do this.

We are working closely with the Texas Education Agency and the Texas Dept. of State Health Services to monitor flu conditions and make viable decisions about the best steps to take. We will keep you updated with new data as it becomes available.

If the flu becomes more severe, we may take additional steps to prevent the spread such as:

1. Conducting active fever and flu symptom screening of students and staff as they arrive at school.

2. Making changes to increase the space between the people such as moving desks farther apart and postponing class trips.

3. Dismissing students from school if they become sick. The number of days absent will be monitored by our nurse and building principal.

For now, we are doing everything we can to keep our school functioning as usual. Here are a few things you can do to help:

1. Teach your children to wash their hands often with soap and water or an alcohol-based hand rub. You can set a good example by doing this yourself.

2. Teach your children not to share personal items like drinks, food or unwashed utensils, and to cover their coughs and sneezes with tissues. Covering up their coughs or sneezes using the elbow, arm or sleeve instead of the hand when a tissue is unavailable.

3. Know the signs and symptoms of the flu. Flu symptoms include fever (100 degrees or more Fahrenheit), cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, body aches, headache, and feeling very tired. Some people may also vomit or have diarrhea.

4. Keep sick children at home for at least 24 hours after they no longer have fever or do not have signs of fever, without using fever-reducing drugs. Keeping children with a fever at home will reduce the number of people who may get infected.

5. Do not send children to school if they are sick. Any children who are determined to be sick while at school will be sent home.

**LIVE CATTLE:** Live Cattle prices basically fell apart on Thursday last week. There was no news to speak of, just another day in this year in which traders refused to support prices for any reason? Cash trade took place at \$84.50 which was okay, but fundamentals continue to project a tight supply problem ahead. Packers have done a good job in controlling their inventories and keeping a lid on rallies. The futures price seems to have lost its way this year, but the market was able to hold long term support levels around the old \$85.50 level?

**FEEDER CATTLE:** prices followed Live Cattle prices with a sharp drop on Thursday, but the market seemed to rebound a little into Friday's close. Prices also held long term support levels around the \$96.00 level basis the October contract. We'll just have to see if any buying interest develops into next week?

Corn prices also got a boost early last week on weather reports which indicated possible frost between now and the end of the month. Most of the move was technical in nature. There is nothing unusual about a frost in the upper Mid West in late September and prices reflected this for the rest of the week. The market gave back most of the gains seen on the week by the time Friday closed. Traders will continue to watch weather.

Soybean prices rallied to sharply higher levels early in the week on a weather forecast for a possible frost at some point over the next 10 days. The market was able to back off the next day, but has held inside a tight range for the remainder of the week until a closer forecast, which would be more accurate is made. Prices did stop a major resistance levels, but it will take a close below \$9.28 in order to turn trends down.

Wheat prices received some benefit from the sharp move higher across the grain complex, but prices began to loose ground the next day. Like beans, wheat prices have been able to hold some of their gains into the end of the week. Exports have seen some improvement which has helped, but the grain complex on the whole has been trading basically in tandem with each other for quite a while.

**COTTON:** Cotton prices have continued to inch their way back to their Summer highs. Prices have been supported by hope that some business will soon develop out of China over the near term. Domestic stocks continue to decline as this year's production levels are expected to be some of the lowest seen in recent history. There is a contraction taking place in many industries and textiles have been hit hard over the last year.

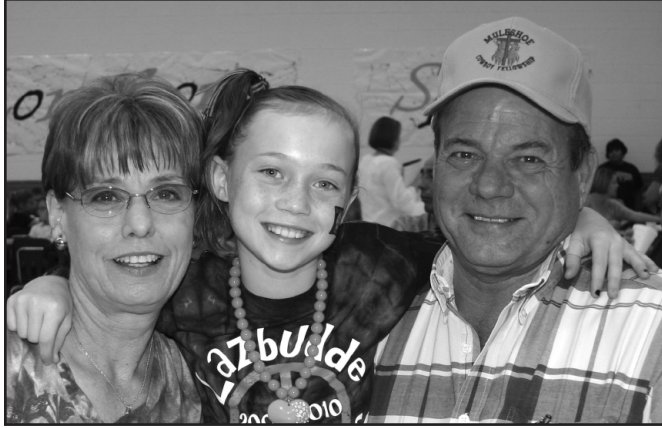
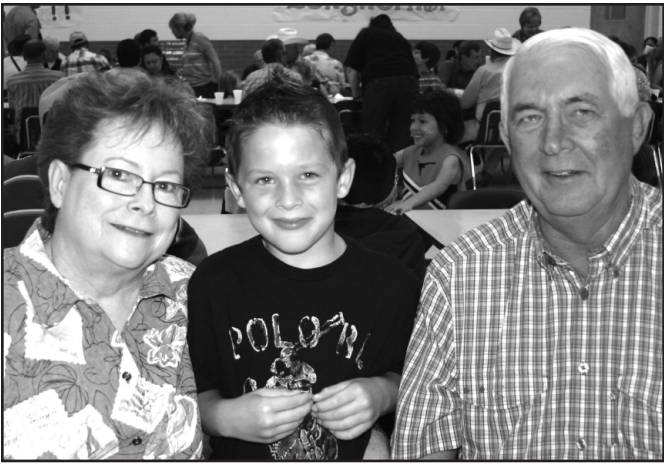

The Lazbuddie Longhorns lost to Southland 78-34 last Friday.

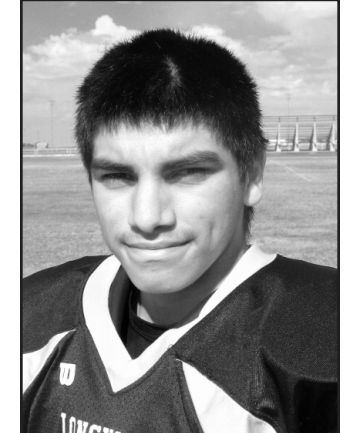
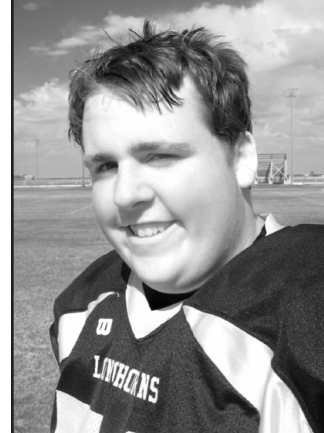

## Texico School Board establishes time line for construction work

The Texico School Board on Monday established a time line for the construction projects.

Work is expected to start in mid- to late-December on the new cafeteria – pre-k building.

A school auction will be held Oct. 24 to sell the current pre-school building and metal building on the site. Both are movable and would need to be moved next summer.

Other goals for the building program include: May, begin renovation of the bathrooms; July, decide on bus stops; August, bathroom renovation complete; and November, new building complete.

In other business, the board:

-- Table the parking lot bids at the baseball field because they were too high. The work will be re-bid.

-- Set Parent-Teacher Conference Day for Sept. 30.

-- Heard that school enrollment is up to 565, near the highest it has ever been. There has been a big increase in pre-k and kindergarten enrollments.

-- Reviewed the Reduction in Force (RIF) policy. There are no plans to do so at Texico but less state funds are being expected and 87 percent of a school's budget goes to salaries and benefits.

## 'Surf's Up' is theme for Farwell Homecoming

Farwell Schools will celebrate "Surf's Up" next week for its 2009 Homecoming activities.

The Homecoming football game will feature the Steers hosting Clayton's Yellowjackets on Oct. 2 at 7:30 p.m. Pre-game fun starts at 7 p.m. and will include the presentation of this year's royalty as well as last year's Homecoming King and Queen. A fireworks display will take place at halftime.

The Homecoming pep rally will begin about 2:45 p.m. on Oct. 2 and the 2009 Homecoming King and Queen will be announced.

## Texico Schools plan to deal with the flu

From Karen Stevenson, Texico school nurse:

Texico Schools' plan is to reduce exposure to flu, including H1N1, without major disruptions at school.

The CDC no longer recommends that schools be closed only because H1N1 flu is diagnosed in a student or school employee. Based on the current CDC guidance, the state recommends all schools take specific actions, based on the severity of the flu season.

The good news is that most cases of the H1N1 flu have been mild and are similar to the regular seasonal flu. However, we are still taking steps to reduce the spread of flu in Texico Schools. We want to keep the school open to students in a normal manner during the school year, but we need your help to do this.

Here are a few things you can do for your family and school:

Get vaccinated. It is recommended that most school aged children get both the regular seasonal flu vaccine and the H1N1 vaccine this fall. Ask your family health care provider if the flu vaccine is right for your child. Flu vaccine will be free through the Public Health Office or at the Texico Schools flu shot clinics. We will have several clinics this fall as soon as the vaccine becomes available.

Wash your hands. Wash hands often with soap and water or an alcohol-based hand rub. Set a good example by doing this yourself.

Cover your cough or sneeze. Cover up your coughs or sneezes using their elbow, arm or sleeve

## Piano vs. keyboard

When I was in second grade, my parents decided that I needed to be involved in some kind of activity. It turned out to be piano lessons, which I took from our elementary music teacher, Mrs. Nancy Miller.

It definitely wasn't easy at first, but I loved it once I got the hang of it. Of course, when I first began, I only learned the simple songs such as "Old McDonald" and "Mary had a little lamb".

A couple of years later, Mrs. Miller quit teaching lessons and I moved to a teacher in Clovis name Mrs. Tankersley. She is what I call a "hard core" piano guru.

There were three pianos in her house, plus a keyboard. During lessons she had her pointer stick and instead of using a metronome to keep rhythm, she whacked her stick on the side of the piano.

My sister, Kristin, was apprehensive to go to lessons with me because my teacher and her pointing stick kind of scared her.

This "hard core" attitude was just what I needed. Mrs. Tankersley

pushed me harder and harder to improve my skills.

I participated in the Guild program, where students are required to memorize anywhere from 5 to 10 songs and play them in front of a judge. The judge then determines how skilled the students are in the memorization of the pieces and the musicianship in general.

All of this took up a lot of time. To be successful, I had to practice for at least an hour or two a day, constantly repeating the same song.

I took part in this program for about 5 or 6 years before I became too busy to memorize that much music.

Mrs. Tankersley also entered me into classical piece competition when I was in 4th grade. This competition requires kids to memorize a classical piece (Bach, Beethoven, Chopin, etc.). Usually these arrangements are about 6 or 7 pages long.

Every single detail about these songs must be memorized perfectly, which includes fortes and mezzo fortes (how loud and soft you play), crescendos and decrescendos (when you are supposed to go from loud to soft, or soft to loud), accents (how hard you push down the key), phrases (how you connect the notes together), staccatos (pushing down the key fast and releas-

ing it quickly), and much more.

This competition required even more time and practice than the Guild program did. I had to buy a CD of my piece and listen to it at night before I went to bed. I practiced at least 2 hours a day, and my piano lessons were a solid hour of non-stop work.

This paid off, though, because the first year I participated, I made it to the state competition in Farmington, N.M., where I placed 4th.

For several years, I competed in this competition, but I just didn't really enjoy classical music. I finally broke the news to my teacher, and she understood.

It was then that I discovered what I truly love playing on the piano: Praise and Worship music.

I began buying books of church music and thoroughly enjoyed learning new songs. To this day, Christian music is my passion and I have more pieces of this type of music than I can even count.

These days, pianos are being replaced by the electronic keyboard simply because they are

portable and easier to handle than pianos. This is what we have at my church.

I personally do not like keyboards. There is an extreme difference between the two instruments, even though people who listen might not notice.

Pianos are all about touch and feel; the sound depends on the firmness and softness of the person playing. It involves more emotion and feeling. The purpose of the music being released out of the piano, is to connect with the people who are listening.

Keyboards on the other hand, have no feeling whatsoever. No matter how hard the keys are pressed, the sound coming out never changes. It is much harder to be involved in the music being played on a keyboard.

Music is a way for some people to release their emotions or feelings, and the more emotionally involved the musician is, the easier it is for the audience to relate to the songs. With pianos slowly being replaced by keyboards, the true heart of what playing a piano is based on will be lost eventually.

I absolutely love just sitting down at my piano when I've had a bad day and just playing my heart out. I've been playing for about 9 1/2 years, and it

never gets old.

One of my favorite quotes is:

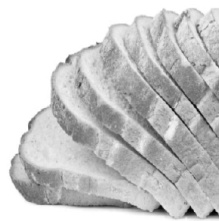

The ensuing short kick was returned to the Wildcat 47, where Colton Hollis and Brandon King made a good stop.

Pena had a good tackle as Clovis got a first down at the Texico 34. Bailey caused a fumble, which Posada recovered and sprinted 62 yards for a TD. He also kicked the point after and it was 14-0.

Clovis started at its 29. Donovan Johnson and Bailey made good plays and Clovis went 3 and out. Texico started at its 35. Texico fumbled and Clovis got the ball back at the Wolverine 40.

Texico's defense again stepped up as Pena broke up a long pass play, and Burciaga, Pena and Meza applied pressure as the Wildcats gained a first down at Texico's 13.

Bailey, Hill, Garrison and Pena unleashed crushing blows to create a 4th and 6. Pena had strong pass defense, and Clovis was held as the first half ended.

Texico received the 2nd half kickoff at its 7, and methodically drove the ball all the way for a 3rd TD. Posada, Meza, Bailey and Johnson had

Shay Harrison and Johnson teamed up to stop the kickoff returner at the Wildcats' 26.

Vasquez, Pena, Garrison, Harrison, Meza and Burciaga held them at short gains, while

Miller and Johnson broke up pass plays. Rivera recovered a fumble at the Texico 19.

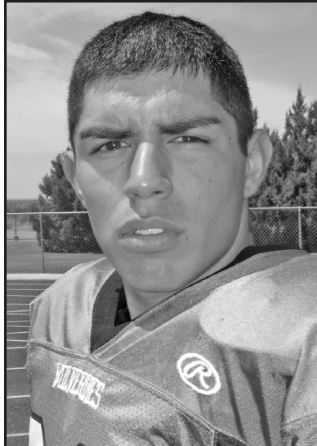
Texico moved the ball behind runs by Johnson and Harrison as Posada took over at QB. But the drive halted on a lost fumble.

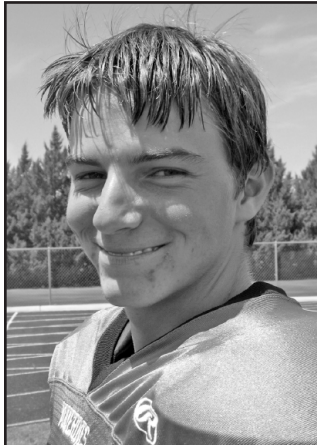
