## Farwell stock show to open up season

The 45th annual Farwell Junior Livestock Show will be held at the Farwell Community Center starting at 11 a.m. on Saturday, Jan. 15.

Contestants will begin setting up at 10 a.m. and the show begins at 11 a.m.

The judge will be Kevin Branham, the former extension agent for Curry County. The ring chairman will be Leslie Curtis and the master of ceremonies is yet to be determined.

Concessions will be available for purchase from Farwell 4-H students.

Farwell ag teacher Tomee England anticipates a large turnout of competitors with the full range of show animals. The top entries this year will receive trophies and ribbons.

Friona - Parmer County extension agent Benji Henderson is working to put on a Friona show on Jan. 16.

Weight cards must be turned in by 1:30 p.m. The judge will be Bailey County extension agent Curtis Preston.

The Lazbuddie Junior Livestock Show will be held Jan. 21 at 11 a.m. at the Friona show barn. Since the animals have been brought here for the county show, it made sense to use the same facility for the Lazbuddie show, said Lazbuddie ag teacher Sid Morris.

Judge will be Shane Miller, Spur High School ag teacher.

Grand champions and showmanship winners will receive belt buckles, and reserve champions will be honored, too.

This will be the second year in a row it will be held at the school. Previously, it was held in Friona.

The Parmer County stock show will be held Jan. 19, 20 and 22.


We'll begin this week with the Lions Park, that beautiful patch of grass, foliage, and playground equipment adjacent to the Texico water tower.

Jan. 22 – 1 p.m., premium sale.

General regulations include:

The show is open to all 4-H, FFA and FHA boys and girls under the supervision of the county agent or vocational ag teachers of the county. Entrants must be enrolled in grades 3 through 12 in one of the four public schools in the county or be a county resident attending a home/private school in those grades.

Floor prices will not be set on any animals. All animals will be taken home by exhibitors after the show. Pens will be assigned by community.

Exhibitors may show four animals per species -

and seven in total. Each exhibitor may only sell two animals in the

premium auction. The state mandated "no pass, no play" rules will apply. If an exhibitor is not scholastically eligible by UIL rules, then the exhibitor and his/her animals are

not eligible to compete in the county show. Showmanship rules are:

Steer, barrow, lamb and goat shows will have two age divisions, junior 8-13 and senior 14 and up. Each species judge will select showmanship winners within their division.

Showmanship classes will be held upon the completion of judging each species and will be open to all exhibitors of that species, within each age division. Showmanship selection will be based on the exhibitor's efforts within the classes as well as during showmanship competition class.

All ages will be as of Jan. 1, 2011.

One hundred and 40 animals will be sold at the Saturday sale.



Ordinance No. 334

An ordinance amending Ordinance 332, pertaining to public utilities and changing the rate to be charged for water and sewer. This ordinance shall replace Ordinance 332.

Be it ordained by the governing body of the City, of Texico, New Mexico

It is hereby determined by the governing body of the Municipality of Texico, New Mexico, that the rates presently being charged for water and sewer services are not sufficient to defray the cost of providing and maintaining such services and that the rates in this ordinance are sufficient to defray the cost of operation of the water and sewer services delineated in this ordi-

Section 2 -- Water Rates Minimum Gallons Rate Required monthly charge for the \$19.13 minimum use of 4,000 gallons for users within the city limits

Required monthly charge for the \$23.86 minimum use of 4,000 gallons for users outside the city limits

For each 1,000 gallons in excess of 4,000 gallons used monthly either within or outside the city limits

\$4.23 per 1,000 gal

New rates to take effect January 1, 2011

Section 3 -- Sewer Rates \$13.70 Residential rates Commercial rates \$16.47

New rates to take effect January 1, 2011 Section 4 -- Repealer

#### Ordinance No. 335

An ordinance amending Ordinance 333 pertaining to Public Health: establishing charges to be imposed for refuse disposal within the city of Texico, New Mexico; and establishing an effec-

Be it ordained by the governing body, that is, the City Council of the city of Texico, in the County of Curry and State of New Mexico:

Section 1 -- Residential Rates -- The following rates are hereby established for those categories of residential property indicated below, upon which a structure is not located or may hereafter be erected, and for which structure the City of Texico makes available refuse collection and disposal services, with the rates being calculated upon a monthly basis:

A. For all residential structures (including mobile homes occupied as a residence) located within the corporate limits of the City, a refuse collection and disposal charge of \$18.50.

B. For all residential structures (including mobile homes occupied as a residence) located outside the corporate limits of the City, a refuse collection and disposal charge of \$23.53.

Section 2 -- Commercial Rates -- The following rates are hereby established for those categories of business, commercial, or industrial property indicated below, upon which a structure is now located or may hereafter by erected, and for which structure the City of Texico makes available refuse collection and disposal service with the rates being calculated upon a monthly basis:

**Charge** Solid Waste 5: 1.5 yd \$47.87 Solid Waste 6: 2 - 1.5 yd \$91.26 Solid Waste 7: 3.0 yd \$73.04 Solid Waste 8: 2 - 3.0 yd \$141.62 Solid Waste 9: 4.0 yd \$87.66 Solid Waste 10: 3 - 4.0 yd \$253.05 Solid Waste 11: 4 - 3.0 yd 2 x week \$463.68 Solid Waste 12: 6 - 3.0 yd 3 x week \$924.77 Solid Waste 13: 1.5 yd & 3.0 yd \$116.44 Solid Waste 14 \$61.71 Solid Waste 15 \$598.20 Solid Waste 16 \$61.89 Solid Waste 17: 1 - 3.0 2 x week \$118.17

Section 3 - Frequency of Service - Normal collection of refuse will be on a weekly basis, except as noted in the rate schedule.

Section 4 - Vacancies - No charge shall be imposed for any structure, which is vacant and unoccupied, and to which refuse collection disposal service is not afforded. A structure shall be considered vacant if it is completely unoccupied and is not connected to the municipal water system on the first day of the calendar month.

Section 5 -- Effective Date - This ordinance shall be effective at these rates on and after January 1, 2011.

Section 6 - Repealer -- All ordinances or parts of ordinances that are inconsistent with the terms of this ordinance are hereby repealed.



Headed by Hal Helton, the club made a proposal to the Texico City Council. The Lions offered to transform the water tower area, across the alley from the First Baptist Church of Texico, into a decent park.

The City Council agreed, adding that on its completion its name would be changed to Lions Park.

The Lions were realistic in their planning projec-Council it would take about five years to complete since the club was small and that came pretty close to being right on the money.

The key to developing the area into a park where parents could be proud to take their children was in getting grass to grow. And that made an underground sprinkler system a priority because small trees, bushes, and grass planted there over previous years didn't take due to lack of watering.

This time, however, Joe Helton, longtime Texico civic booster, offered to buy the underground sprinkler system as a donation.

Before the sprinkler system could be installed, the club set a work day to remove the broken concrete, glass and rocks. The Lions turned out in their work clothes and essential to their success were Oran Jay Autrey and Butch Tharp and the equipment they provided to load and remove the debris.

City workers then helped lay out the area for the sprinklers and soon after that, everything was in

Hal Helton got the bushes to plant along the north and south sides of the park. The reseeded grass flourished in the water that now came regularly. Club members chipped and painted the playground equipment. Another picnic table was added.

Lions Park was thus born, a small monument at the west end of the park identifying it and another plaque thanking longtime Lion Joe Helton for his civic response. But the greatest marker of this achievement must be the shouts and laughter of children over all these years in this oasis of grass, trees, and flowers.

Walter Prescott Webb, one of the finest American historians, contended that the people of the High Plains are the heart and soul of our nation. The harsh environment on the Plains demands cooperation, community, and virtue to an extent that the people living in more benevolent parts of the country cannot begin to comprehend.

Our rural communities have validated Webb's point throughout their existences. In issues throughout this year, the Tribune will enjoy recording a variety of examples to just that end.




