Paving Looms For Texico

Only One Run-off Race In Parmer Co.

Only one county race remained unsettled in Parmer County as a result of the first primary election held last Saturday.

Earl Billingsley, incumbent, will be opposed by T. E. Levy in the second primary on August 23 for the office of county commissioner of precinct No. 3.

Billingsley polled a total of 219 ballots and Levy rolled up 141. Shorty Hughes trailed with 99 ballots to throw two high men in to the run-off primary.

In the only other contested election in the county, E. R. Day lost his seat on the commissioners court from precinct No. 1 to Forrest Osborne by a count of 262 to 324.

In the only write-in balloting of the county, J. D. Hamlin, present justice of the peace at Friona, was defeated by Walter Loveless.

Jess Osborne, Muleshoe banker, outdistanced Karl Lovelady, Muleshoe attorney, in the Parmer County voting by 1150 to 193, and went on to win handily over the five-county district in his bid for representative of the 96th district.

Harold LaFont won over Andy Rogers for state senator in Parmer County voting by 773 to 525, but was defeated for the nomination by the Childress legislator.

In other district and state races, the Parmer county voting strung along pretty well with the winners.

With thirty blocks of street paving already assured in Farwell, prospects for launching a paving program in Texico appeared the first of the week.

Members of the Texico Chamber of Commerce, who are responsible for getting behind the move, were free to predict Tuesday afternoon that it seemed quite probable "several blocks" might be paved before the close of the present summer.

Mrs. Faye Anderson, representative of the D. & T. Construction Company, the firm now engaged in doing the Farwell paving, was in Clovis Tuesday checking records in order to determine the ownership of the property under consideration.

Sponsors of the paving program are hopeful of getting Garwood Street paved from the Red Cross Pharmacy north to the B. O. Faville property, then west to the school house along the west side of town.

It is hoped to get a complete loop by the school property and back to the main street in the center of the town, with the possibility of paving at least another north-south route being under consideration.

C. of C. officials contacted early this week said that New Mexico laws permitted the city council to create a special paving district, assess the cost to the property owners to be paid over a period of ten years.

The property owner is given his choice of paying for the paving when it is completed and accepted by the City, and getting a ten per cent discount, or having paving certificates issued against his property.

The Junior-Intermediate MYF will meet at 6:30 p.m., and the senior MYF at 9 p.m.

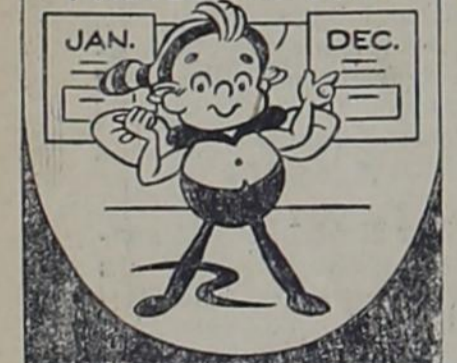
The official Board will not meet on August 4, because of the absence of the pastor. The board will meet later in the month.

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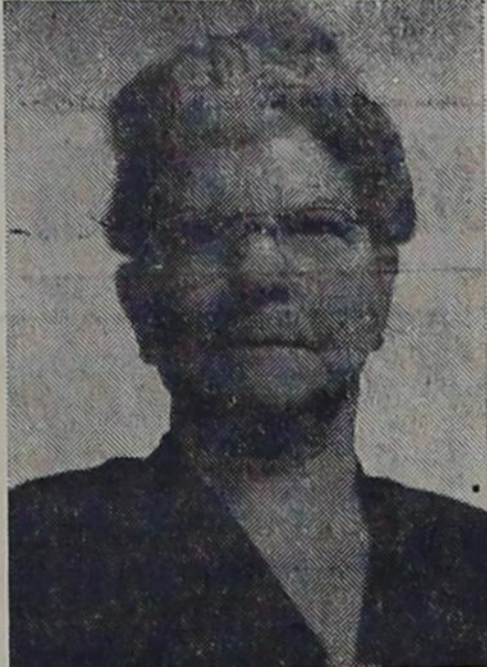
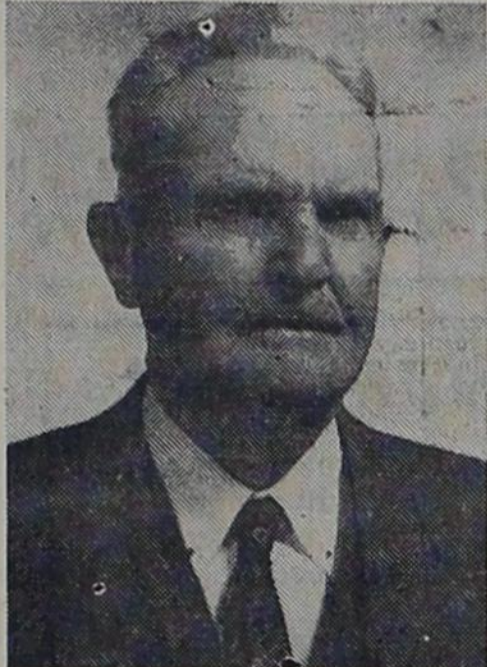

(Seventh in a series of informative articles revealing little known facts about well known people in and around Texico-Farwell and nearby communities. Our sole purpose is to promote better acquaintances—in the hope of promoting better friendships.)

Mr. and Mrs. George Magness, who came to this area back in 1920, could write a book about their experiences in the Oklahoma territory, and in Texas in the early 1900s.

Both of the Magnesses were born in Waco, within two miles of each other. They attended school together, and began dating after they grew older. They remember that they had a misunderstanding at one time during their courtship days, and didn't see each other for six or seven months.

Upon renewing their courtship, however, they began going steady and dated one another for about a year before their marriage in October, of 1898. She was 19 and he was 20 at that time.

On their wedding day, they went from church with a young couple, and were married in the friend's home.

The Magnesses moved to Comanche in Oklahoma in 1901, when the area was still a territory. He filed on 80 acres of land there. They have an abundance of stories accumulated from their stay in the sparsely settled area. "We got our mail 3 1/2 miles from home," says Mr. Magness, stating that he would ride into town about twice a month to pick up supplies and letters.

They bought their lumber for their Oklahoma home 45 miles away. Upon their arrival in their new home, they camped out until their home was completed, about 30 days. Their

home was a one room box house with a large basement.

They had traveled from Waco to Oklahoma in a covered wagon and were seven days on the road. They had crossed Red River on the sixth day, and witnessed a prairie fire. We were scared to death" says Mrs. Magness. They tried to extinguish the fire "but it traveled like a whirlwind. A boy working on the other side of a hill finally stopped the fire. Prairie fires were common in those days, says Mr. Magness.

Upon their arrival in Oklahoma, Mrs. Magness remembers that they made camp outside Lawton, and he went into town to see about some business. He didn't get back to the wagon until after dark. About sundown, two big Indian braves came up to the wagon and began talking in sign language. "I was scared, but finally realized they were looking for some hogs and answered them as best I could," Mrs. Magness relates. She

kept a pistol beside her all the time, however. She notes that the Indians were very civilized then. They would have big war dances, but for entertainment only.

Mrs. Magness remembers another time when Mr. Magness was gone and she received quite a scare. She heard something outside the house, immediately extinguished the light, and grabbed her pistol, only to find that the commotion was caused by "two old cows."

Two of the Magness children were born in Waco, and the others were born in Oklahoma. "We had two children born in the same house in the same spot," says the local woman, "but they were born in different counties." She explains that the county was divided after the birth of the first child, and the house was located in the new county.

The Magnesses remained in Oklahoma for 13 years and "we held our own awfully well," he says. They

moved to Vernon on December 14, 1914, "and started all over again," he says. They remained there until they moved to Parmer County in 1920.

It was in 1919 that they purchased land 11 miles east of Farwell on the Oklahoma Lane road, but it was not until August 16 of the next year that they arrived here. "We will have been here 32 years in August," they say.

They lived on their farm until December 13, 1932 when they moved to town. Then for a brief time in 1947, they lived in Friona, but moved back here.

When the Magnesses first came to Farwell, there were three houses between their place and town, they add.

Asked how they traveled from Vernon to Parmer, they said they shipped their things, and drove a car through. "In Farwell at that time, (Cont. on next page, this section)

you couldn't buy a meal or a pair of socks" says Magness, the dry goods store and cafes were in Texico.

Mr. Magness's father had moved here before they did. He remembers that his father had a house completed, and well waters pumping three weeks after his arrival.

The local couple have five surviving children: Mrs. Tom Foster of Oklahoma Lane; Chester Magness of Clovis; Muggs Magness of Colorado; Eunice Vincent of Muleshoe; and Mrs. Sterlyn Billington of Farwell. Their oldest daughter passed away in 1919; and two sons died when infants. They have 28 grandchildren

and seven great grandchildren.

Mr. Magness was a charter member of the Lariat Church of Christ and also of the local Church of Christ. For a period of thirteen years, he didn't miss a Sunday of going to church.

Mr. and Mrs. Magness celebrated their Golden wedding anniversary back in 1948. They are both active and keep busy. She collects salt and pepper shakers for a hobby and has souvenirs, over 400, from 38 states and one country. She also has 38 novelty dolls.

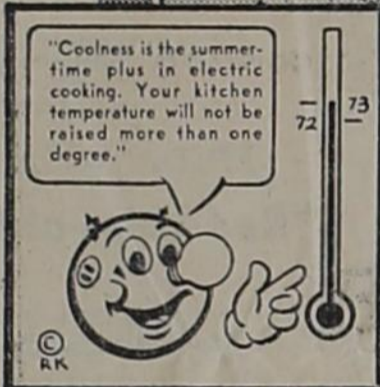
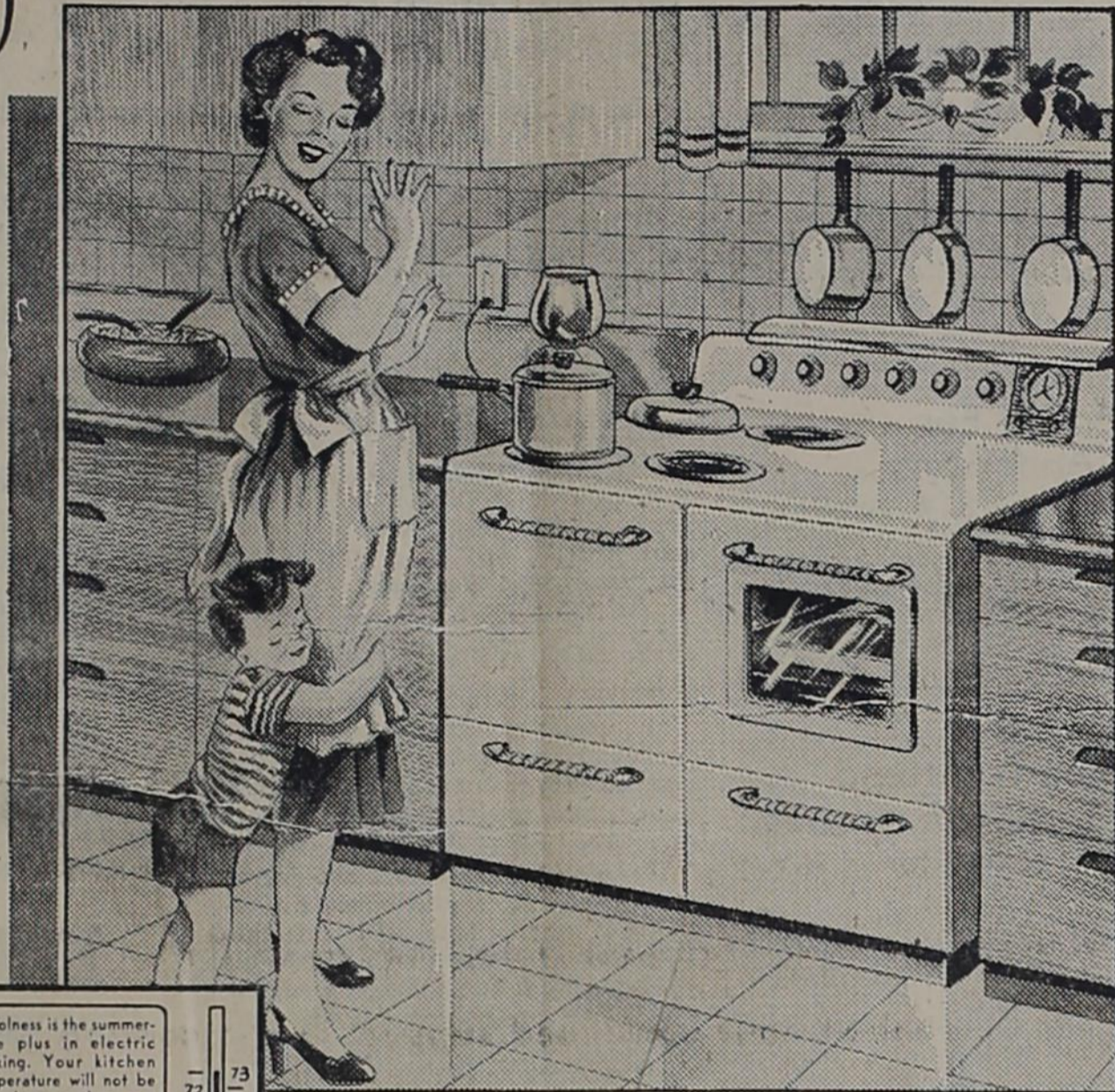

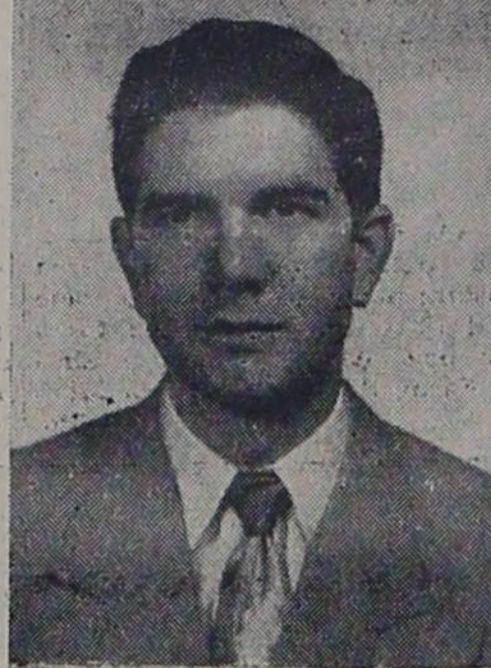

Dr. Spring Gives Pointers On Polio

"This is one of the worst years that Texas has ever known as far as polio is concerned, yet we haven't had a single case in this county," says Dr. Paul L. Spring, county health officer.

Spring notes that he still feels that fly and weed control are very important. "We know that polio enters the body through the mouth and is contracted by the way of the stomach and intestines.

Dr. Spring informs that authorities think that during the polio season, almost everyone carried the germ, and only when in a state of exhaustion and rundown condition do they contract the disease.

Dr. Spring urges Parmer County citizens to keep these things in mind and help keep Parmer polio free this year.

Jane Gallagher Describes Trip to Helsinki, Finland

Jane E. Gallagher, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. George E. Meyer of Friona, once again writes her parents on her travels and experiences abroad. In the following letter, she describes her trip from Norway to Finland for the Olympics. She is a student at the University of Oslo in Norway.
Printed below is Jane's letter.
Dear folks,

Well, I did arrive at Helsinki, Finland. To begin with I had great fun with the little man at the Winge Travel agency in Oslo, Norway over my ticket. I insisted that I wanted to go to Helsinki. He said, "Oh yes, Helsinkfors." "No, Helsinki" I said. Helsinkfors, Hesinkki, Helsingfors, Helsinki, round and round we went. Naturally I got a ticket to Helsingfors, Finland. These traveling agencies always win. When I did arrive in Helsinki it was to find its just another way of spelling Helsinki "Believe it or Not." I have since learned that regardless of how you spell it in Norway, in Helsinki-Helsingfors-it will be spelled differently.

Originally, I had planned to travel by train from Oslo to Stockholm and thence by boat to Helsinki. But as usual, something happened, namely, no place to sleep anywhere on train or boat. Me-you know me-I do like to sleep now and then. I switched and sailed on a dinky little coastal steamer that normally sails from Bergen to Stavanger, but was making a special trip to Helsinki for the Olympics. So I switched to the boat.

The trip began with my throwing things frantically, into a bag at 6:30 in the morning after having entertained the Texas Summer school students at the Oslo University until some unthinkable hour the night before. I arrived at the spot where I was to board the boat, and saw 720 tons of green, of course it was green for what other color fits better. I'm sure it was a green boat. The captain had a wonderfully reassuring smile, and so I clambered aboard.
Everything was wonderful; I had

bright red roses to stick in my water jar in my cabin—a nice single first class cabin—and Chris" to see me off, also an Italian newspaper man whom I knew from the winter Olympics for company on the boat. The weather as we left the dock was beautiful. I stood on the deck waiting for the "Ja Vi Elsker". The Norwegian national air—but we heard the first strains of the Olympic Hymn.
The funnel began to spout black, very black smoke, great puffs of it—and away we went out to sea. The skies soon got darker and darker. The sea got rougher and rougher before we had hardly cleared the Oslo fjords. Then came the waves—no, waves is not the precise word. There was nothing gentle or peaceful about the tons and more tons and more tons of water heaving up and down underneath us. We all took a leave of absence from dinner, breakfast etc. Those of us who talked ourselves into believing that we were 'hardy creatures'; that seasickness is all a matter of psychology-or lack of it—ate anyway. I'm sure that the sea gulls enjoyed our dinner. I finally slumped into bed about two in the morning where I gently collapsed, only to end up on the floor two waves later. I finally managed to sleep—right through breakfast which I didn't miss in the least.

We waved our way on and on relentlessly. The first relief came as we saw the pilot who came bobbing out to us in a small boat to guide us into a haven among the Swedish rocks. The scenery was perfectly marvelous. The weather was blowing a full gale which made the clouds into weird and fantastic shapes all tinged with fiery red and all gold-rimmed. Among those rocks we had a relatively peaceful evening. We were protected by the rocks and could and did eat and we could and did sleep and how.
Second day—We woke up to waves bigger and better than before. Everyone was seasick. Even the captain looked a bit greenish. Either we began to get used to having our small world weave about at the will of some seadevil, or we were used to being seasick for on the third day complete strangers began to appear on deck, and we began to recognize faces we hadn't seen since we left Oslo. The very fact that we recognized those faces was a sign of recovery.
Third day we needed coal—We

landed at Visby on Gotland, a Swedish port. There little men with great ambition, shoveled it, slowly, into small baskets which two men very carefully lifted and carried onto the boat where they dumped the coal onto a pile in the hole of the boat, and it was then, once more, shoveled into a pile near the engine.
During the "coaling" of the ship (anyway it traveled on the water) we went into the town to see it and ended up in a picture show. And there we saw "The Last Stand of General Custer," also believe it or not.
In due time—48 hours late—our little old ship the D-S Soma landed at Pervika. Helsinki is a city of contrasts. There are flashy modernistic office buildings and there are drab, hot-waterless apartments and sleeping accommodations offered the Olympic visitors. I am living on the boat instead of in the town as it is far more livable and convenient. I'm taking pictures like mad for the press, that is Reuters News Agency of London, England.
I haven't said much about the Olympics. I'm here covering them for the News Agency I mentioned. It is like the Associated Press in the good old U. S. A.
The Olympics opened with the lighting of the Olympic Light, followed by the Olympic parade. The weather had been bad and was bad. It rains about three times a day. The Olympic parade of Nations was most impressive even in spite of the fact that it was a mud splattered spectacle.
The funniest thing at the Olympics today was the 50 kilometer walk; you know, heel toe, heel toe, heel toe etc. An Italian won it by walking those 50 kilometers in 4 hours and 30 minutes and 7.8 seconds.
He was really tired when he finished.

The British were most terribly disappointed. Everyone in the stadium thought their man MacDonald had won the 100 meter, but in a photo finish they decided the American had won it. The groans around my office were something terrible, not a few of them directed at me, for you see

I am still an American. The British are practically whipped in the fencing too. They had very bad luck, drew France and Belgium on their first day. Of course the French and the Belgians are heavy on all kinds of fencing, they and the Italians are the world's best.
Norway and Sweden played football. The Swedes won 4 to 1. Rugby is the game they play. Great unhappiness reigns on this little boat Soma tonight for we are almost all from Norway, you know that "inhabit" this special "craft" for the time being. The game is now being— that is as I write this letter—re-broadcast in Norwegian so our friends can hear it and how it happened in their own language.
It's great to be at the heart of the

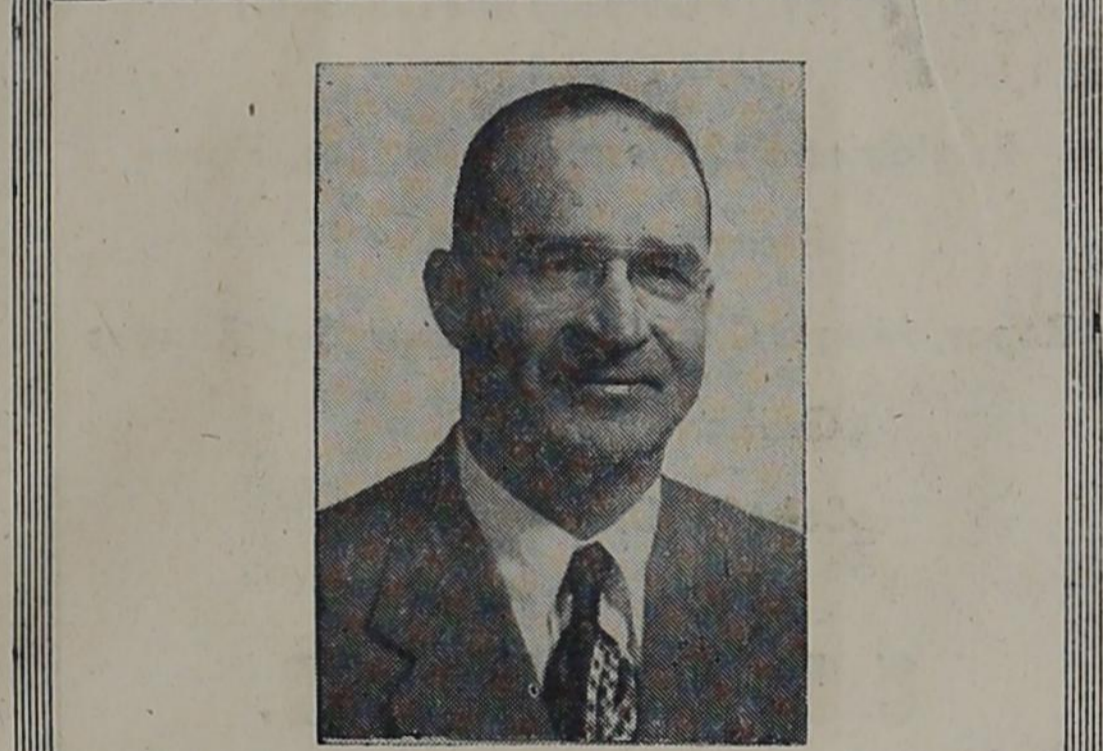

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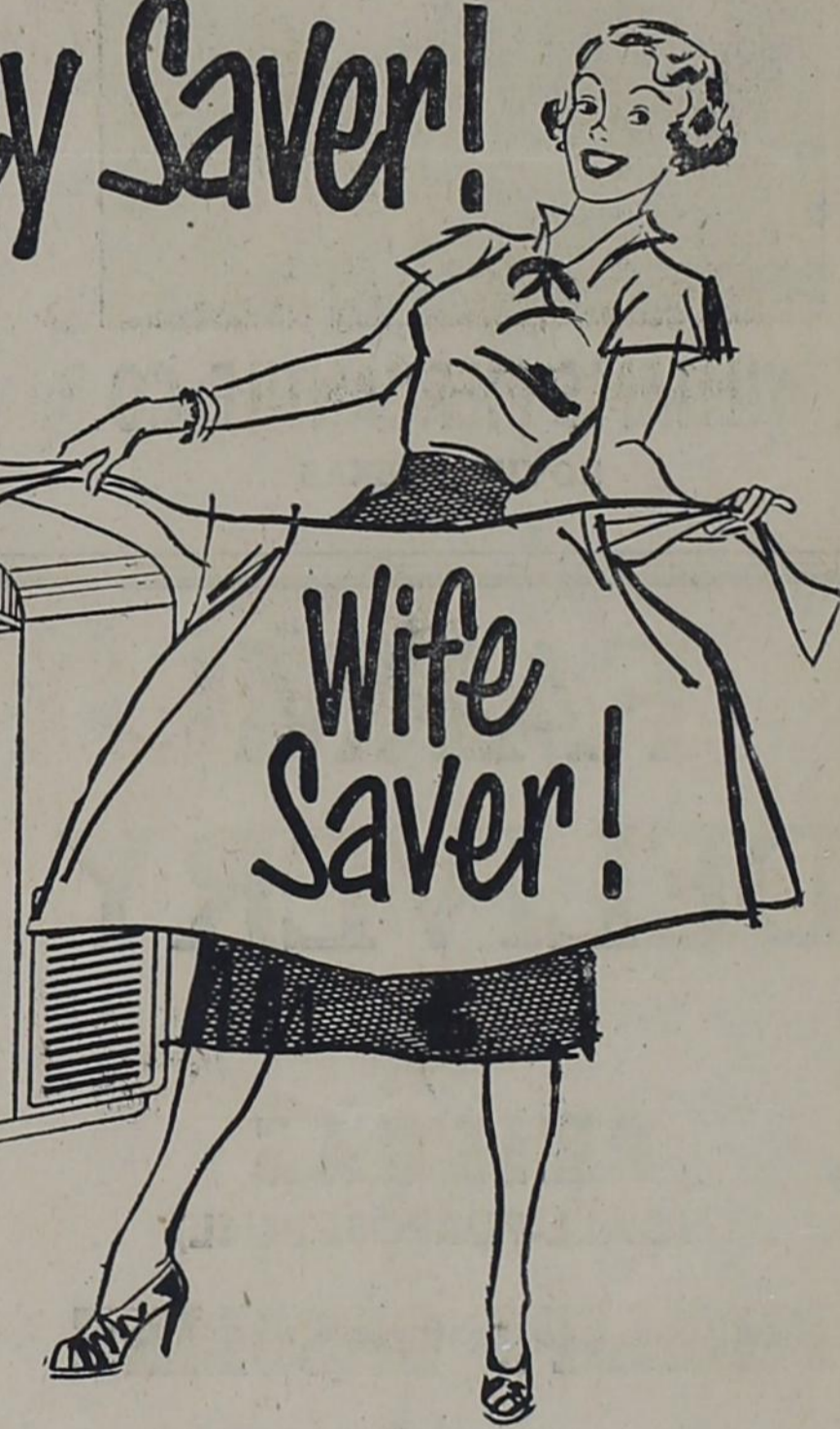
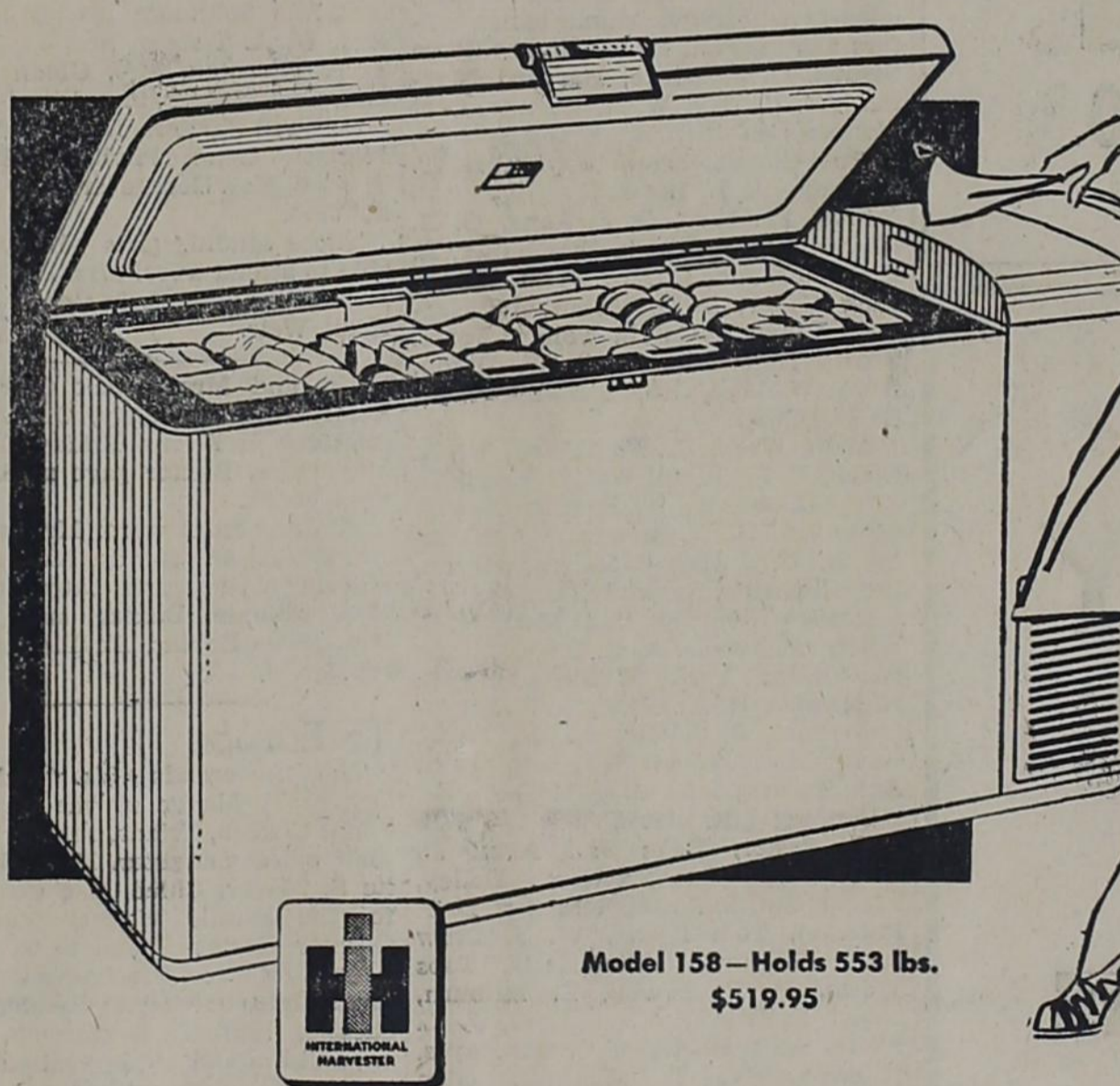


A MESSAGE TO THE VOTERS
