Members of the Parmer County Commissioners' Court have unanimously approved and authorized for publication the following detailed statement regarding tax valuations in Parmer County: In response to much public interest in the tax matters of Parmer County, Texas, which we certainly welcome and

which we deem a very healthy sign, the county commissioners want to make public the tax situation as it pertains to some individuals and corporations and welcome an investigation and public interest into all tax matters. The Commissioners' Court of Panmer County for the

years 1949, including this date, has raised the valuation of the railroad tax \$69,710.00 instead of lowering the tax. This county taxes the railroad as high as any county in the Panhandle; for instance: we are 20 per cent higher on the cut-off to Lubbock than the average county tax on that line. Parmer County occupies the position of taxing

the railroad higher than any other county. This matter should be thoroughly understood and each court, including the years 1949 down to and including the present court, should take its share of the responsibility or credit for this situation.

In the year of 1949 the Interstate Commerce Commission merged all of the Santa Fe lines into one railroad known as the Panhandle and Santa Fe Railroad. Interested citizens of Parmer County and members of this court procured the railroad to divide all of its intangibles and rolling stock on a basis commensurate with the miteage in each county.

Parmer County having approximately 49 miles of railroad to tax and being the highest taxing unit on railroads in the Panhandle got the railroad to request the State to allocate the intangibles and the rolling stock and through the various agreements and negotiations certain mileages were lowered and intangibles and rolling stocks were increased, and out of the entire transaction Parmer County received a net increase of \$69,710.00.

Now, let us say that the State does allocate the rolling stock and intangibles, but it was at the railroad's request that this was done. Consequently, the eastern counties raised their mileage on the roadbed and lost the intangible and rolling stock tax in part. This county has not seen fit to employ experts to value

ratiroad property. Many of the counties have. This information is all available and this county has had access to it. The so-called experts who have been employed by various counties at a considerable cost have reached the conclusion that \$38,000.00 per running mile is a fair market value of the railroad. This, of course, depends upon the weight of the steel in the lines, the condition of the crossties, and many other factors. The factor that is ordinarily

used by so-called experts is 120 to be multiplied by the

weight of the rails. The value that this county places upon the main line is \$15,500.00 per mile, including intangibles. This makes the railroad render its taxes at slightly less than 50 per cent of its actual value. The average land value in Parmer County for tax purposes, according to the State Comp-

troller's records, is \$6.05 per acre. We hardly think that \$6.05 per acre represents 50 per cent of the actual value of land in Parmer County. We know of no railroad selling and have no figures on this basis to determine their value, but we do know of some land in the county that is assessed at \$5 and \$6 per acre which has sold at from \$200 to \$300 per acre.

We do not think that we are favoring the railraad over citizens of this county and believe that when we have gained a valuation of \$69,710 we have not cut the tax of

With reference to the lowering of the value of town lots, this practice has been followed by this court and many preceding courts. The value of land in this county for tax purposes is not less than \$4 and not more than \$7 per acre. We have found ourselves in the position of having land which was subdivided into lots assessed at some \$400 per acre and land across the road assessed at \$7.

We thought-and think-that some adjustment was necessary. For this reason the Commissioners' Court at its last equalization meeting announced that all applications for adjustment on unimproved town lots in any city in the county not being used for residential or industrial purposes would be favorably considered if applications were made for adjustment, and we believe we have given favorable consideration to all such applications.

We have to treat all taxpayers alike within constitutional and statutory limitations regardless of personalities or residence, and with your help we will try to give adjustments where discriminations occur, The last available information that we have on cattle

shows that approximately 10,000 cattle were rendered for taxation in Parmer County and the actual market value of cattle and hogs was much different than our tax rolls showed. The raise in the valuation of cattle was given for the purpose of equalizing this differential and again to let every taxpayer pay his share of the taxes. We welcome any inquiries into the entire tax structure

of Parmer County and assure you that we will be the first to recommend correction of any discriminations that exist.
