Texico's Oxsheer achieved prominence

Myrtle Reeves Oxsheer, a Texico High School graduate, achieved prominence as a schoolteacher, business owner, rancher with prize-winning livestock, and realtor who developed Oxsheer Heights in Albuquerque.

She is profiled in two books, Historical Encyclopedia of New Mexico (1947) and the third volume of History of Mexico in New Mexico (1961).

Mrs. Oxsheer (1908-1989) and her son, Lee Oxsheer, Jr., a Vietnam veteran, are buried in Texico Cemetery near her parents, Laton Alexander and Martha Jane Reeves, and brother, William O. Reeves, who died in 1930 from surgical complications of being gassed as a World War I soldier in France.

Surviving W.O. were his wife, Gertrude Curd Reeves, and three young children, Lillian Esther, Mildred Louise, and Robert Laton.

Representing the class of 1940 at this year's Texico All-School Reunion, Lillian was recognized as the oldest graduate present. She attended Texas Tech before graduate studies at the Nashville School of Social Work, a consortium including Vanderbilt University. She worked in Amarillo and married Elmo Payne, clerk of the 7th Court of Civil Appeals.

Her first husband, Jeff D. Ruckman, is named on the war memorial monument in front of the Texico Community Activities Center. A 24-year-old ambulance driver in World War 2, he was killed in the Battle of the Bulge in Europe in 1945.

His Clovis cousin, Oscar A. Ruckman, Jr., died in the Bataan Death March in the Philippines in 1942. Oscar's brother, Oswald C., was captured by the Japanese and liberated at the end of the war. Oscar and Oswald's nephew, Orville Drummond, of Clovis, was also a prisoner in the South Pacific.

Jeff's parents, Ted M. and Willie D. Ruckman, sister Leota R. Spence, and nephew Ted Cook are buried in the Texico Cemetery.

Mrs. Spence's husband retired in Arizona. He is 94. An airplane pilot, he remembers having Texas oil tycoon T. Boone Pickens as a passenger.

Robert J. (Bob) Strader and his wife, Helen Whitley Strader, moved to Clovis in 1950 where he purchased New Mexico Mill and Elevator Co. He also bought Golden West Seed Company in Texico. She published a genealogy book entitled The Wandering Whitleys.

A roadside marker two miles south of Muleshoe on FM 214 commemorates our area heritage

Winning \$7 for 2nd place was Gay Goettsch, who was 20 off the tie breaker.

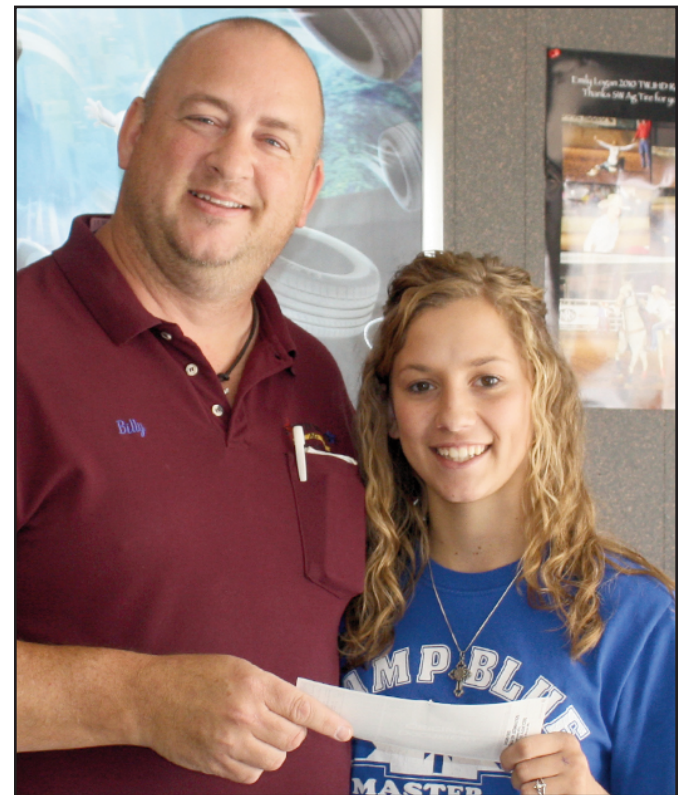
Also with 9 right was Marion Tutter, who was 22 off the tie breaker.

City of Texico, Leavells at odds over wastewater

The Texico City Council on Sept. 14 met with the Robert George, of the New Mexico Environmental Department, and Texico residents Howard and Marcia Leavell to discuss the wastewater project.

Texico has to update the current wastewater plant or face state fines up to \$15,000 per day.

The current lagoons have to be cleaned out and lined with plastic,

but Texico needs to remove the sludge first.

Texico owns land next to the current sewage plant and the council wants to apply the sludge on it.

If the city can apply the sewage onto the land, it could save Texico up to a \$250,000. The sewage will be applied over 30-45 days and it is 95 percent water and would be disked in daily.

In the 1950s, the land

was leased for 99 years to a resident north of town. The lease now belongs to the Leavells.

The Leavells said they would not allow the city to apply the waste because there might be plastic items mixed in.

The lease also includes rights to all of the wastewater runoff from the sewage plant, but the Environmental Department will only

Just Passing Through
WILL ANDERSON

Kent McManigal raised some valid points in his latest Tribune column.

Differing with me, his perspective tends to view the Constitution as having either authorized an abusive government or having been powerless to prevent it.

I can but agree with him that the government has overstepped its authority and that our "political elites" disregard the well-being and the wishes of the American people. We part company on how "we the people" ought to respond to that, starting today.

By my perspective, the U.S. Constitution is the most excellent instrument of governance in history but it cannot be denied that it is much like a clock made by the finest craftsman in the world. If that clock is allowed to fall into the hands of any manipulators, they will be able to break it or to make it read any time they dictate.

That is the situation in our country with its Constitution, and a glance at its wordings will reveal how manipulators have been able to distort or even reverse its clear intent.

The Constitution's preamble does not have power of law but the manipulators have used it for their sinister purposes nonetheless, beginning with the simple statement that our government would provide for the "general welfare" of the people.

James Madison, the father of the Constitution, is said to have fought tooth and nail to delete the general welfare provision because he feared that the day would come when unscrupulous scoundrels would twist those two words any way they wanted.

Madison was prophet-

ic; those two words, "general welfare", have been twisted to become part of the justification for the nightmare of socialized medicine. That recent act of Congress, now being revealed as a nightmare indeed that grows worse day by day, was forced on an American people that strongly opposed it.

The political elite did this on the pathetic contention that it was for the "general welfare" of the ignorant citizens whether they liked it or not,

In Article I, Section 8, the powers of Congress are listed in very narrow and specific terms, including the power to regulate commerce with foreign nations, the Indian tribes, and between the states.

Congress took this "Commerce Clause" authorization to regulate trade between the states and turned it on its head completely. For the first time in the history of the Republic, Congress voted that American citizens can be required to purchase a private service or good. Every American is now required by law to sign on for the socialized medicine scheme or be subject to a fine.

Congress inflicted that atrocity on the claim that under the Commerce Clause; any American who chooses to NOT participate in the interstate commerce of socialized medicine has an impact on interstate trade. On this twisted premise, any inactivity is now Congress' business.

Thus, with Congress control over choices to not do something, for the first time in the Republic's history, there is absolutely nothing in the nation that does not fall under Congress' direct control.

Another mechanism of abuse that Madison opposed is the so-called "Elastic Clause" in Article I, Section 8, empowering Congress to make any laws that are "necessary and proper" in the performance of its duties.

Who defines if something is "necessary and proper" for Congress? Congress itself does, and that small phrase can be (and has been) stretched and distorted like a thin sheet of elastic to cover its abuse of powers over recent years.

Those and other illegitimate and nefarious distortions of American freedom are becoming more and more common in the halls of power in Washington. They are not to be blamed on the Constitution, however, because it was written

for the clear purpose of preventing power grabs like these.

The blame for the advance of tyranny like this must fall on an American people who have allowed it to happen. Just as a clock cannot be stopped or manipulated without someone seeing it, the Constitution that has been distorted for decades suffered that abuse right in front of American citizens who allowed it to happen slowly, in small steps, piece by piece.

That is the reason why I am so optimistic now, however. The American people are clearly fed up, more and more, day by day. For the wise citizens, the party is a sec-

ondary concern now and their vote will go for the candidates that agree with them on the sanctity of the Constitution and American freedoms.

This is a hard lesson that is being taught to the elites and insiders of both parties across the nation in the primary season so far.

In the homes of citizens and in the streets and city halls across the nation, Americans are reading the Constitution and defiantly renouncing the abuses of the elites that lord their power over the parties and (they believe) over the people themselves. The days of arrogance and abuse by the elite are numbered now.

The American people

are demanding to repossess their Constitution and the freedoms it guarantees them. The Constitution, the cornerstone on which the greatest nation in the world was built, did indeed fall into the hands of some wretched people for a while when the American people got distracted and neglectful.

That is ending now, though, beginning in the 2010 election. Americans across the land are embracing the U.S. Constitution as the treasure it is. We shall see in the coming years that our nation's finest days, based on that Constitution and the will of the working people of this country, are yet to be.

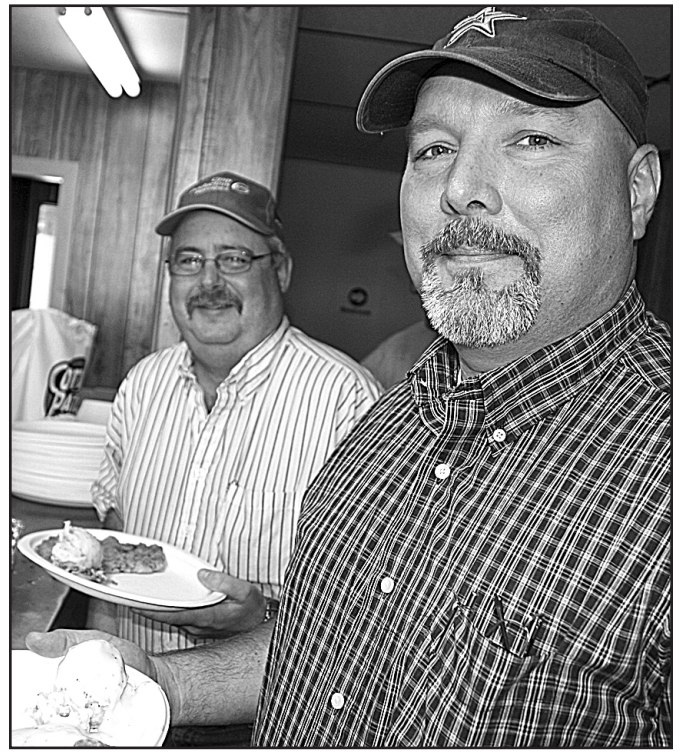

Local farmers got a corn market update at the J.D. Heiskell annual meeting on Thursday.

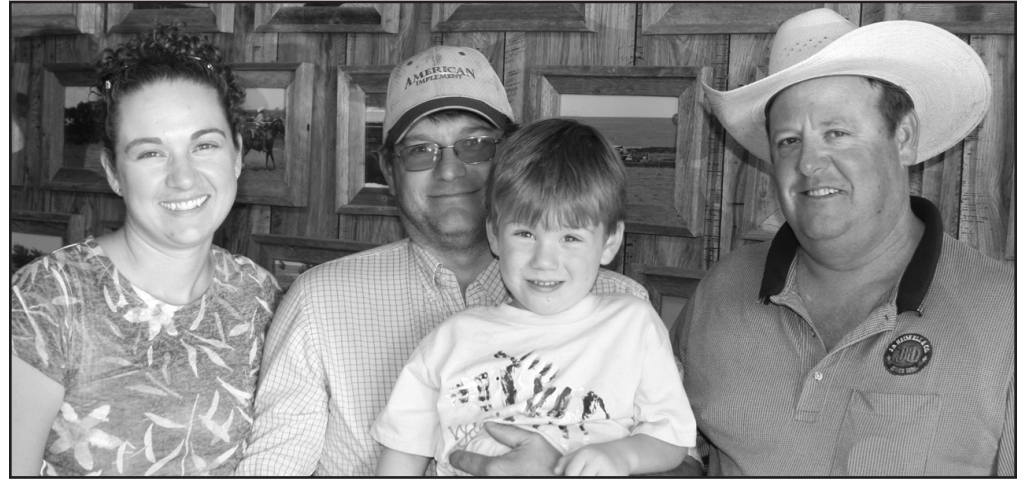
Charlie Tsatsos, VP of business development spoke about the current and future markets and stocks.

The Farwell Junior High Cheerleaders attended NCA cheerleading camp in July at Wayland Baptist University in Plainview.

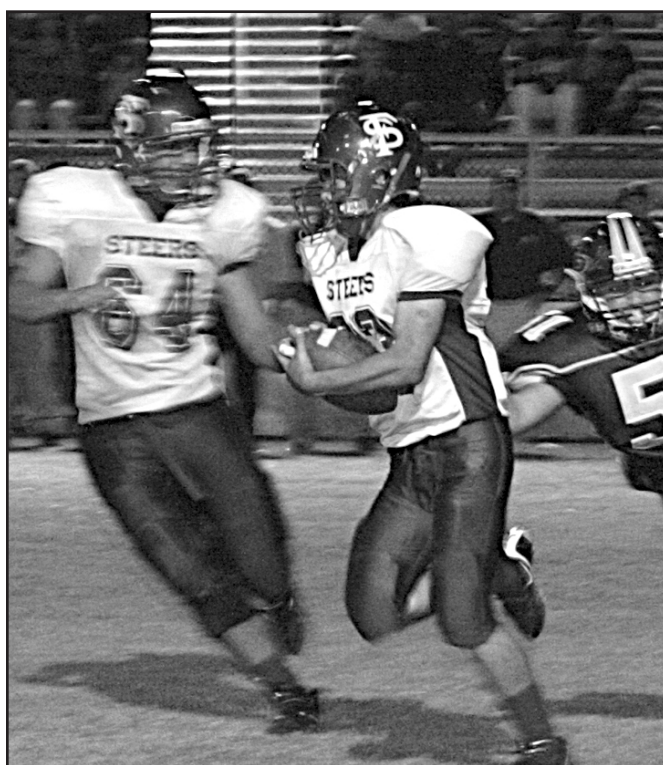
They won several awards, including the S.P.O.T. award (2 times) and a National Championship Bid. The S.P.O.T. award is for displaying

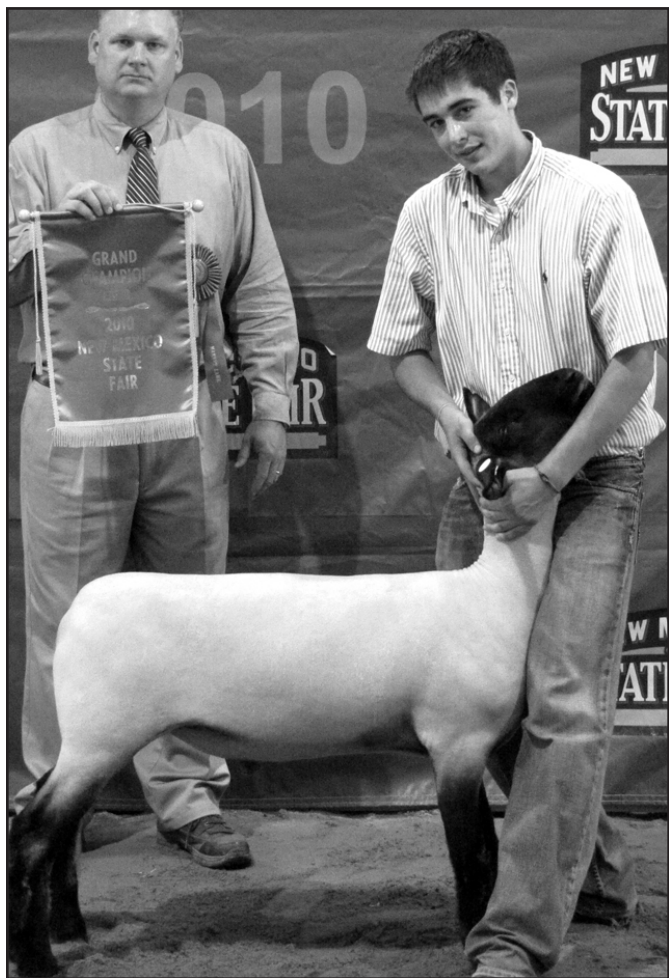
Texico used big runs by Harrison, Johnson,

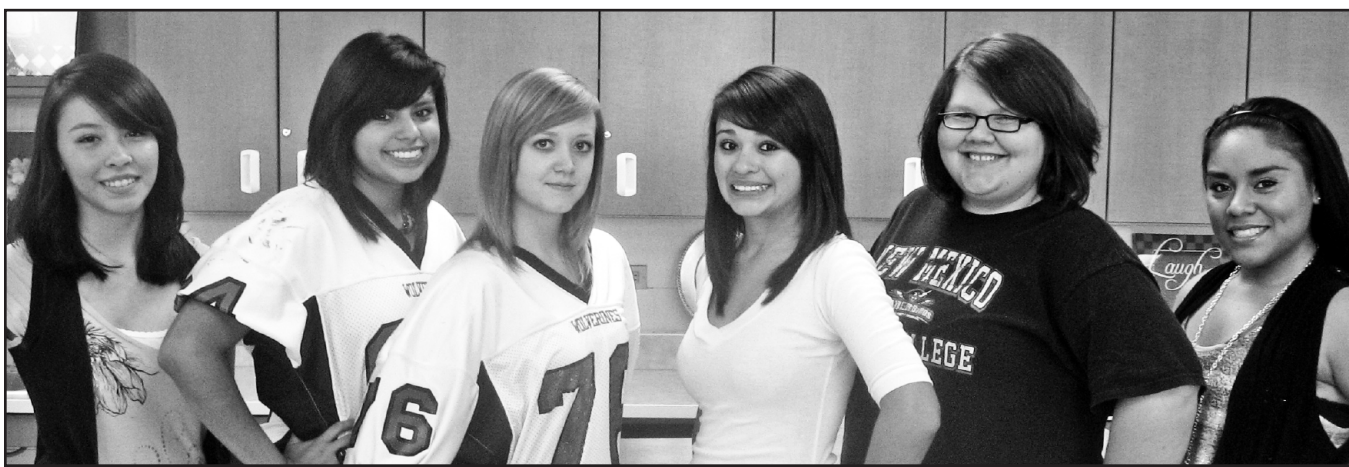

In other business, the board:

-- Decided to have some track repairs made now (due to cracks)

instead of putting it off until later when the expense will be greater.

-- The new cafeteria will be ready Nov. 16 and maintenance building will be ready on Dec. 16.

After the new cafeteria opens, the old cafeteria will be renovated as a vocational ed building.

-- Enrollment is up to 578 -- a record for Texico Schools.

-- Set Parent-Teacher Day for Oct. 6 from 1 to 6 p.m. Buses will run at noon.

-- Plans an auction in November to sell cafeteria equipment.

-- Plans to host a cheerleader competition later this year. In New Mexico, cheerleading is a sport.

Other area schools will be invited.

-- Asst. Supt. Dennis Roch and the elementary school staff has started a "Breakfast and Books" program at the cafeteria.

This encourages kids

to come and have extra activities.

-- Texico was picked by the state to participate in an academic field test to help the state set standards for student achievement.

The days of President Eisenhower, a Republican, working with Sam Rayburn and Lyndon Johnson, the

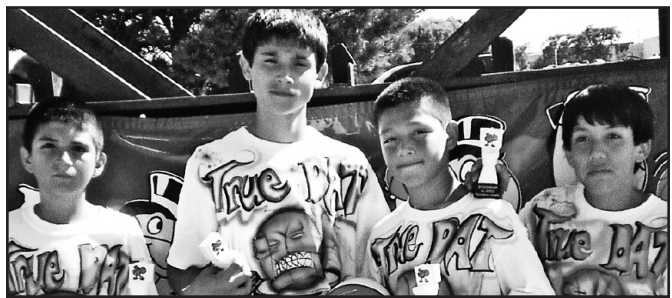

MOTION TO REPLEVIN

To the Honorable Sheriff of Parmer County, Texas:
Now Comes Laurance Kriegel to show This Motion To Replevin allows Laurance Kriegel to recover \$18,720.75 from a CD from the Estate of Marie Magdalena Kriegel. The actions of The 287th Parmer County District Court are unjust and have violated the Constitution. The 287th Parmer County District Court had Notice proceeding 10020 was on Appeal to The Supreme Court of Texas. The 287th Parmer County District Court entered Orders which violated the bequeath of Marie Magdalena Kriegel and Statutes in Texas Probate Code and these Statutes have been upheld by The Supreme Court of Texas.

The Court misinterpreted the Statutes of Texas and did not follow the correct Judicial Practice and Procedure, including Motion Practice, Rules of Evidence, or the correct acceptance of the Valid Last Will and Testament of Marie Magdalena Kriegel.

The Valid Last Will and Testament of Magdalena Kriegel was signed willingly by Marie Magdalena Kriegel in the Parmer County Courthouse on 5-1-2008.

At a hearing on July 8, 2010 transcript page 51, to determine the Valid Last Will and Testament of Magdalena Kriegel, Arnold W. Kriegel and his Attorney Fredric M. Wolfram presented a theory in their argument as to why a legally revoked Will should be accepted by the Court. This violates Rules of Evidence. A theory is not clear and convincing evidence.

Marie Magdalena Kriegel ask 3 or 4 Attorneys after the death of her husband to write a Valid Will according to her desires. These Attorneys never wrote a Will for her according to her Wishes or Desires.

The 287th Parmer County District Court ruled to accept a revoked Last Will and Testament of Marie Magdalena Kriegel to be valid. The will is dated March 21, 2001. This revoked Will was not written according to Texas Probate Code.

Arnold W. Kriegel disqualified himself from any inheritance when he and others removed Marie Magdalena Kriegel unwillingly from her paid for home with a broken in door on Aug. 14, 2009.

This also disqualified Arnold W. Kriegel from being an Executor in the Estate of Marie Magdalena Kriegel. Arnold W. Kriegel did not have a Bond in the Parmer County Court on Aug. 14, 2009, the day Marie Magdalena Kriegel was removed from her home. This also disqualifies Arnold W. Kriegel from inheriting from the Estate and / or being the Executor of the Estate of Marie Magdalena Kriegel.

Marie Magdalena Kriegel was removed from her home before the scheduled hearing on Aug. 17, 2009.

This order accepting the revoked Last Will and Testament of Marie Magdalena Kriegel overturned the Constitutional provision of the Constitution to bequeath assets to the qualified heirs according to The Texas Probate Code and according to the bequeaths of Marie Magdalena Kriegel.

The 287th Parmer County District Clerk has not signed the Letters Testamentary in proceeding 10020 in the matter of the Estate of Marie Magdalena Kriegel.

The Public Notice of Letters of Testamentary published in The State Line Tribune dated Aug. 5, 2010 is a Error of Law.

Arnold W. Kriegel has not proven to the Court he has purchased a Judgment from Diversified. The Court allowed 1/3 interest (\$20,000) from a CD in the Estate of Marie Magdalena Kriegel to be used belonging to Laurance Kriegel to pay on this Judgment.

The Diversified Trial was on June 15, 2009 and the Court Order creating this Judgment was dated June 18, 2009 which allowed unlawful interest calculations to be taken by this Judgment in excess of 10%. The Court action which led to this Judgment is still pending on Appeal at The Supreme Court of Texas and the Notice of Appeal stops all interest calculations and any activity that has to do with this Judgment.

The facts proven at the Diversified Trial by Laurance Kriegel, Plaintiff, demonstrated Defendant, Diversified, could not prove with exhibits (evidence) Laurance Kriegel owed any money to Diversified for two electric Sprinklers. During the Trial Diversified's Attorney requested a directed Verdict Written by the Judge.

By the end of the Trial, Diversified's Attorney interpreted the Court and handed the Judge his draft Order to sign. The Signed Order was a draft by Diversified's Attorney and not a directed Verdict by the Court. This Order affirmed a debt on two account numbers Diversified could not prove in Court belonged to Laurance Kriegel. This is a error of Law and error of Accepted Judicial Practice and Procedure. The Order is different than the facts proven by Laurance Kriegel in the Trial. Additional discussions can be obtained in the Notice of Appeal to the Supreme Court of Texas sent in on June 24, 2009 and other Appeals, proceeding 9699.

The Judge did not accept Defendant's Exhibits 18 and

19 at Trial on June 15, 2009 in proceeding 9699 in The 287th Parmer County District Court which lead to the Judgment for Defendant's Attorney fees. Therefore, Defendant, Diversified, cannot sell property to recover Attorney's fees.

If Plaintiff assumes a Judgment could be obtained legally in Court, if Plaintiff assumes from two documents Plaintiff received from Diversified a few days before the Court Action began, the principle remaining to be paid on two electric sprinklers was \$30,833.04. One electric sprinkler sold for \$45,000 at the Sheriff Sale on Aug. 26, 2009. A Sheriff Sale cannot be lawfully held until all Notice's of Appeal to the Supreme Court of Texas are decided. That proceeding is still on Appeal. The illegal Sheriff Sale collected \$95,000 from the sale of two electric Sprinklers and five property's in Bovina, Texas, owned by Laurance Kriegel.

The 287th Parmer County District Court illegally Ordered Arnold W. Kriegel could use a \$20,000 inheritance of Laurance Kriegel's to pay on a Judgment Arnold W. Kriegel did not own. Arnold W. Kriegel was not a party in the Diversified proceeding which created this Judgment. The Court has Ordered and allowed \$113,720.75 to be collected for this \$30,833.04 principle balance with Diversified. The decisions of the Court are unjust and unconstitutional. The Court as extorted from Laurance Kriegel approximately \$82,887.71 in excess of a possible principal balance of \$30,833.04.

The Temporary Administration of the Estate has been closed by Order of The Court and The Letters of Testamentary was not signed by The Clerk of The 287th Parmer County District Court.

The Court Ordered \$18,720.75 to pay a Judgment Arnold W. Kriegel claims he owns is a unjust unlawful taking done after the Court closed the Temporary Administration of the Estate of Marie Magdalena Kriegel. Additional discussion can be obtained in the Notices of Appeals in proceeding 10020.

The Estate of Marie Magdalena Kriegel contains a house and ten acres, bank accounts, in Parmer County, Texas, and some Oil and Gas Mineral Interest Royalties, and other hidden assets from the Estate of Marie Magdalent Kriegel. Laurance Kriegel has received correspondence from the Attorney Fredric M. Wolfram for Arnold W. Kriegel indicating Arnold W. Kriegel is considering a Public Auction on the property of the Estate of Marie Magdalena Kriegel.

A Public Sale of Property in the Estate of Marie Magdalenta Kriegel has not been before the Court for a forced Sale. A Public Sale of Property cannot be held until all Notices of Appeal by the Supreme Court of Texas have been heard. A legal Public Sale cannot be held until all Statutes and the Constitutional are upheld in this proceeding. Any Public Sale will be loaded with encumbrances'.

The Sheriff can stop any Notice of Sale with this Motion To Replevin and a Writ of Execution.

This Motion To Replevin stops any attempt for Arnold W. Kriegel or his Attorney to sell any property at Public Auction or conduct any business activity in the Estate of Marie Magdalena Kriegel.

This Motion To Replevin grants authority to the Parmer County Sheriff for Laurance Kriegel to have the \$18,720.75 bequeath by Marie Magdalena Kriegel returned to Laurance Kriegel.

This unjust taking violates Statues established by the people to conduct business according to the Valid Last Will and Testament of Marie Magdalena Kriegel. These violations then constitute a Civil Rights violation because the Statutes of Texas were not upheld for this citizen or the Estate of Marie Magdalent Kriegel.

The Law and Rules of Judicial Practice and Procedure state, a Notice of Appeal stops all activity in a proceeding until the final Order of the Supreme Court of Texas.

Wherefore Premises Considered, Laurance Kriegel request the Sheriff stop any attempt to sell the Property or collateral or change the address on account's of Marie Magdalena Kriegel.

Wherefore Premises Considered, Laurance Kriegel request this Motion to Replevin by Affirmed.

Wherefore Premises Considered, Laurance Kriegel requests the \$18,720.75 be returned to Laurance Kriegel from Arnold W. Kriegel.

allow the Leavells the right to the maximum amount of water they can immediately apply, and they will not be able to store or sell any of the wastewater.

Any water over the amount the Leavells can take will be shipped to Texas where the state laws are more lax.

Texico is pushing to get the work done quickly as a \$450,000 CDBG grant will expire if the project isn't completed by the end of the year.

In other news, the city:

- Heard Police Chief Doug Bowman thank the city works department for helping with animal control.

- Approved a resolution in support of building the new Curry County Detention Center and courthouse renovations.

County Manager Lance Pile said the new buildings were absolutely necessary, and Curry County spends a lot of money to house criminals in other counties.

District Judge Bob Orlik said the current courthouse was constructed in the 1930s when there was only one traveling judge. Now there are 5 District judges and they have to share a courtroom with hundreds of trials that have to be seen.

Orlik said the building is currently unsafe and could invite lawsuits in the case of an accident.

The new building would have separate zones for the public, court workers, and arrested folks to keep folks safe.

Capt. Sheila Morrison said the current Detention Center had many problems, including ventilation, the walls, and segregation cells.

Pile said if the bond is passed it would add 25 cents per \$100 assessed valuation. In Texico the average property taxes would increase around \$14.49 per year.

- Heard from Pile that Miguel Vega, a senior at Texico High, was selected to be the first student selected as County Manager for a day. He got to follow Pile around for a day.

- Received an update from Raul Esparza about cleaning up his property. He said he is almost ready to start removing trash. He was invited back to the next meeting to show progress.

 "This project is being funded by a grant from the ARRA (American Recovery and Reinvestment Act) and not by local taxes," Mrs. Pitcock emphasized. "These new water meters will save the city money through the coming years because they transmit their reading by a radio signal."
 "That will really accelerate meter readings, with savings in the man-hours required," she continued. "An automatic reading will never make mistakes, plus any leaks will be detected immediately. We are very happy to get these improvements all paid for by this grant."

Swafford finds evidence of Coronado's route through Parmer County

Archeological evidence has been uncovered near Bovina of the passage of the first expedition of the Spanish Conquistadors through this region.

Jim Bob Swafford, who researches local history as a hobby, made the discoveries in the Running Water Draw near its confluence with Catfish Draw.

Through 1540-1541, less than half a century after Christopher Columbus first introduced the Americas to Europe, a Spanish officer named Francisco Vazquez de Coronado led a force of Conquistadors and Tlaxacan warriors north from Mexico in search of the mythical city of gold, Quivira. The city purported to tower above the High Plains.

The articles discovered near Bovina have been identified by museum authorities in Canyon and Lubbock as being of Spanish design from about that period.

All the items were found in a small spot of the draw and they include, a man's ring, a Conquistador's button, a large copper ferrule and a hand crafted rivet that may have come from a Spanish wagon, and other items.

Also found nearby is a musket ball with the characteristics and composition of Spanish musket balls of the 15th Century recovered recently by the National Geographic Society in excavations near Lima, Peru.

"Some Spanish soldier, crossing these plains with Coronado 470 years ago, for one reason or another, managed to drop these items on that one spot," Swafford speculated. "Whether he didn't realize it at the time or he just couldn't recover them for any other reasons, they remained there in the

draw all these centuries waiting for someone to find them."

Historians over the years have proposed different routes that Coronado's expedition might have followed but no proposed route, other than the Running Water Draw, has produced tangible evidence of Spanish relics from the 15th Century.

These finds by Swafford, when combined with the extensive finds in the Running Water Draw near Floydada, seem to validate those historians who are convinced that the first Europeans to traverse the vast expanses of our plains did so through what is now Curry, Parmer, and Bailey counties.

"It is remarkable how much evidence that history has left in our fields to this day," Swafford said. "The Running

Water Draw was one of the seven "Comanchero Trails" that crossed the plains, this one running from New Mexico to the Yellowstone Canyon in Lubbock."

It was Swafford's discovery of spent cartridges and other artifacts in Yellowstone Canyon that pin-pointed the site of the March 18, 1877, battle between buffalo hunters and the Comanche warriors of Black Horse.

As one of the only tangible surface features in this part of the plains, Running Water Draw has always attracted the people in each era through the centuries here, beginning with the hand-flaked flint tools of the Comanche and continuing through to spoons that were accidentally left behind at a family's picnic sometime around 1916.
