Col. Edward Je Don Porter, formerly Farwell, served as president of the New Mexico Military Institute Board of Regents at Roswell in 1998.

He entered the military school in 1944, joined the Marine Corps in World War II, and then graduated from NMMI in 1950. He is also a former secretary of the NMMI Alumni Association.

After 28 years of active service, Col. Porter retired from the U.S. Army. He was the deputy commandant (for training) at the U.S. Army Aviation School.

Col. Porter authored "The Pictorial History of New Mexico Military Institute, 1891-1993." He wrote the chapter, "New Mexico **Military** Institute's Contributions" in the 1994 book, "Victory in World War II: The New Mexico Story."

He is the son of the late John and Mae Porter. His father opened the State Line Grocery in Farwell in 1931. His aunt, Tom Paul McCuan. resides at the Farwll Convalescent Center.

Sam Aldridge attended NMMI and the University of Texas Law School. He was re-elected mayor of Farwell in 1959.

Claude Rose Jr., salutatorian of the 1957 graduating class at the Institute's junior college, followed his father as a longtime pharmacist in Farwell. He now lives in Throckmorton, Texas.

The council discussed the property several months ago when City Inspector Terry Martin stated Estrada would have to remove the trailers and a garage on the property.

City Attorney Marion Ty Rutter sent a certified letter in August, received by Estrada, in August that stated they had 30 days to fix the problems.

State may force Texico Schools to make cutbacks

In New Mexico, school funds come from the state. That's great when the economy is going well, but not so good when there's a recession.

Schools, including Texico, have received letters that basically say the state's financial projections show a \$700 million shortfall (out of a \$6 billion budget) and that schools may have to cut their budgets 10 percent.

Since most school budgets go into salaries, you can see what that will mean if implemented.

Supt. R.L. Richards told the Texico School Board on Tuesday about the problem and that school officials throughout the state are lobbying against it, noting the severity of cutbacks and how it is putting athletic programs in jeopardy.

The state legislature is also fully aware of the situation and has scheduled a special session on Saturday.

Richards said the Legislature has three proposals before it:

- 1. 2.5 percent salary decreases for all state employees, including school personnel.
- 2. 3 to 5 percent budget cuts for all state agencies, including the schools.
- 3. Leave education alone, but force all other state agencies to reduce their budges by 16 percent.

Richards is also setting up a volunteer budget committee of Texico staffers to look a possible cutbacks in lieu of the state's budget situation.

In other business, the board:

- -- Heard Richards report that the bids for baseball field parking lot adjustments were too high (the school has received a state grant for improvements) and new bids will be sought.
- -- Received a donation from Caprock Wind of \$1,760 to buy varsity basketball video equipment.
- -- Plans a school auction for Oct. 24. See the ad elsewhere in today's Tribune for full details.







This is an alert about your drinking water and a cosmetic dental problem that might affect children under nine years of age. At low levels, fluoride can help prevent cavities, but children drinking water containing more than 2 milligrams per liter (mg/l) of fluoride may develop cosmetic discoloration of their permanent teeth (dental fluorosis). The drinking water provided by the Texico Water System has fluoride concentrations ranging from 2.08 mg/l to 2.55 mg/l.

Dental fluorosis, in its moderate or severe forms, may result in a brown staining and/or pitting of the permanent teeth. This problem occurs only in developing teeth, before they erupt from the gums. Children under the age of nine should be provided with alternative sources of drinking water or water that has been treated to remove the fluoride to avoid the possibility of staining and pitting of their permanent teeth. You may also want to contact your dentist about proper use by young children of fluoride-containing products. Older children and adults may safely drink the water.

Drinking water containing more than 4 mg/l of fluoride (the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's drinking water standard) can increase your risk of developing bone disease. Your drinking water does not contain more than 4 mg/l of fluoride, but we are required to notify you when we discover that the fluoride levels in your drinking water exceed 2 mg/1 because of this cosmetic dental problem.




