1978 Year Seen In Retrospect

The year 1978 is almost part of history now and another new year - 1979 - is looming on the horizon. Looking back, the past year has been filled with many changes - both good and sometimes not-so-good, as well as accomplishments. Not all the "great expectations" have been realized but with another new year ahead who can say that they will not be realized within the coming months?

This year has been a time of great strides forward both on the local and state as well as national levels.

President Carter proceeded with his human rights campaign, attempting to influence the Soviets to grant "freedom of speech and thought" to its dissidents. Arranging the historic Camp David Peace Talks, Carter also tried to help bring peace to the Middle East. Only the next few months will hopefully tell whether or not his efforts have

helped or succeeded in any small way.

Science took another giant step forward when the Venus probes began sending back historic, never before seen pictures of Earth's "twin sister" and important data which may make it necessary to re-evaluate our own theories about the origin of the universe. Other probes also beamed back pictures of the planet Jupiter shrouded with clouds.

On the political scene, a big change was in the winds for the state of Texas. For the first time in over 100 years the people of Texas went to the polls in November and elected a Republican governor - Bill Clements.

The City of Texico made the big news locally - also some good and some bad.

The year 1978 was a good one for the Texico Wolverines as they came into their own, nearly capturing the New Mexico State Class A football crown. Even though the Green and White fell one game short of that mark, they did succeed in making Wolverine football known throughout the state, and gave Texico boosters something to look forward to for next year.

The bad news for the year was the alleged shortage of \$27,500 from Texico city funds. The New Mexico State Auditor's Office began an investigation of the alleged discrepancy in the city's accounts.

After an intense investigation lasting several months, the former City Clerk was indicted in December on 38 counts of embezzlement, failure to deposit public money and tampering with public records.

The City of Farwell also made news in 1978. Raising taxes or rates is never a very popular move for city officials, but in November the Farwell

City Council "took the plunge" by raising the city's sewer rates. That action, termed a very necessary one, was prompted by the need to raise additional revenue for a new sewer plant to be built within the next five years.

Bad news occurred one cold night late in the year when an explosion destroyed the New Light Baptist Church in Farwell. However, the indomitable will of the congregation has preserved and the people of the church have been heavily involved with beginning the process of restoring their loss.

January, was the month of Super Bowl XII and much to the delight of Dallas Cowboy fans in Texico and Farwell, the "Pokes won the big game in New Orleans by corraling the Denver Broncos, 27-10.

American Agriculture was also on the move throughout the country and to prove their point farmers staged a tractorcade through Farwell one afternoon early in the month. After the farmers gathered for a "show of appreciation" at the local ASCS office, they continued on their way - with no incidents reported.

Farwell band students again proved their excellence as several high school and junior high band members were named to the Region XVI Band, following stiff tryouts.

Also in January, Texico's five-year-olds trekked to the first kindergarten session - going all day just like their older counterparts. Another new teacher was hired because of the large enrollment.

A Parmer County grand jury went to work, and before the month was over 29 indictments had been returned against area lawbreakers.

The first month of the new year saw several county candidates file for office. Texico-Farwell Girls Scouts, Junior Scouts and Brownies began their annual cookie sale.

The weather also figured importantly in the month of January as approximately three inches of snow accumulated during one day and night. Children enjoyed playing in the elements, but all too soon ol' sol melted away all the fun and enjoyment.

February was the big month for snow as approximately 12 (Continued on Page 2)

 inches blanketed the Twin Cities in three separate storms. Farwell Schools lost one day of classes due to the inclement weather.

A series of drug abuse workshops were offered in Farwell in an effort to alert parents and other interested persons to drug-related problems and possible solutions.

Also in February two men spectacularly held up the manager of the Piggly Wiggly Store in Friona, making off with approximately \$20,000 in cash and checks. However they were apprehended within a few weeks.

Several new pieces of equipment were added to Farwell Bands including a percussion cabinet, bongos, temple blocks and timbales.

Farmers and their problems were again brought into proper focus in February as thousands traveled to Washington, D.C. to "speak their piece." Several local farmers also made the trek and in between meeting with important officials they also experienced various misadventures concerning the subway system and other elements of the big city.

Texico Wolverines staged their annual basketball homecoming, and the Cub Scouts held their yearly banquet and Pinewood Derby races.

Farwell Steers hit it big in February garnering first place ranking in the District 3-A basketball tournament. After a see-saw battle with arch rival Vega they captured the undisputed district crown. Further victories, however, were cut short as the Steers lost in bi-district competition.

In contrast with the usual windy month of March, the 1978 edition was comparatively calm with a minimum of strong winds and dust. The usual weather fare was relatively calm days, warm sunshine and cool nights.

Farwell seniors staged a three-act comedy, and the elementary school presented an all-school program featuring different holidays as the theme. Farwell also observed Texas Public Schools Week.

Texico residents went to the polls to elect a mayor and two trustees. A last minute write-in campaign gave the mayoral post to A.D. McDonald, who declined to accept. According to municipal law, the incumbent mayor, Manford Turnbough, was eligible to serve for two more years - until the next city election.

Local farmers organized an American Agriculture Strike office in Farwell, the first concrete "show of support" since the movement and strike officially began December 14. An informative meeting was held in which several concerned farmers from throughout the United States gathered to speak of the plight of the farmers.

Following the end of basketball season, three Farwell Steers, Russ Jones, Rowdy Chandler and Keevin Kelley, were named to the All-District ranks. March was also a fun month in which a circus came to town complete with performing elephants.

The Twin Cities Relays with 21 entries was staged with the joint cooperation of the Texico-Farwell Lions Club and the Farwell coaching staff. A big change for Farwell School came about when Athletic Director Van Tom Whatley resigned his post and veteran coach Don Alana was named athletic director and head football coach.

Tradition was observed when J.W. "Indian" Crim held his annual weather predicting ceremony March 22. Unfortunately, Crim saw only a year of dry weather and poor crops ahead.

April was election month in Farwell, but very few voters turned out for the school and

hospital district board elections.

Farwell thespians captured first place in the district one-act play competition, losing later in the regional competition. Several local actors also captured individual honors.

Farwell Chamber of Commerce staged its annual banquet and named Don Williams and Carrie Anderson as the Man and Woman of the Year. Similar honors at Texico Chamber of Commerce banquet were accorded to Aileen Teel and Lewis Cooper.

Both Farwell Steers and Steerettes garnered firsts in district golf, later losing in the regional tournament. The Steerettes placed fifth in district track, with four girls advancing to regional.

Also during the month of April, an audit of Texico's books led to the discovery of \$27,500 missing from the city's coffers. After an intense investigation - lasting several months - the former city clerk was indicted in December of this year on 38 counts of embezzlement, failure to deposit public money and tampering with public records.

In May, Texas voters again went to the polls to vote in the Republican or Democratic Primaries.

Both Texico Wolverine girls and the Farwell Steers advanced to state track meet competition. Earlier in the month beneficial rains fell on the Twin Cities, but a few weeks later tornadic type winds did extensive damage in the area and torrential rains caused extreme flooding in the Canyon-Amarillo area.

Graduation dominated the news for the rest of the month as both the Texico and Farwell high schools and junior high schools held commencement exercises and named honor students. Athletes of both schools were also honored at their respective banquets.

Seth Ralston, formerly of Dimmitt, took over as the Parmer County Extension Agent, replacing Mack Heald who resigned to go into private business.

Early in June, Farwell had some trouble with "Moonies" as the followers of Brother Moon and the Unification Church are sometimes called. Several were arrested for selling without a permit within the city limits of Farwell. A trial date was set, but none of the defendants appeared there by forfeiting their bonds.

Rev. Duane Knowlton was sent as pastor of Hamlin Memorial United Methodist

Church. He and his family moved to Farwell from Cimarron-Maxwell, N.M.

Many interested parents in Texico and Farwell took an interest in the local gymnastics program which began during the latter part of the 1976-77 school year. The Twin Cities Gymnastics Program was organized to promote the program and to raise funds for additional equipment. A "gong" show was just one of the many efforts to aid the program.

Heavy rains fell the first part of June, but, unfortunately, after that area residents and farmers were plagued by a long hot dry spell. Record heat waves were set throughout the state, with temperatures consistently hitting above the 100 degree mark.

The June wheat harvest in Parmer County fell below expectations as weather, insects, and low market prices took their toll.

Great interest in the county was stirred when Lazbuddie Baptist Church announced it was starting its own Calvary Christian School, for kindergarten through grade twelve.

Border Town Days was the big event in July. A BTD Committee coordinated the events which included a BTD queen's contest, the first to be held since 1975. Five local girls vied for the coveted title, with Lisa Hughes being crowned BTD Queen.

Hail storms plagued county corn crops in some areas, and approximately 15,000 acres of cotton were damaged, in one degree or another, by the chemical 2-4-D or its derivatives.

August was a big month for the community of Pleasant Hill as former graduates, teachers and residents gathered from far and near to participate in the community-wide reunion as well as individual class reunions.

Parmer County Commissioners Court elected to complete the unfinished cell block of the Parmer County Jail.

Texico and Farwell schools as well as area schools prepared for Opening Day. After days and weeks of preparations students, teachers and personnel trekked back to class for another year.

September was the month of pigskin activities as local teams donned their pads and helmets and took to the field to test their prowess against a worthy slate of tough opponents.

While area football enthusiasts prepared to prop in front of their television sets to watch college and pro games, they also entered the Tribune's annual Merchants Football Contest, ready to do their best in the weekly game of luck and chance.

The current school year was in "full swing" by the ninth month of the year, with Texico, Farwell and Lazbuddie Schools reporting a decrease in enrollments.

As the new year began though, Lazbuddie unveiled a variety of new facilities which had been completed in time for the fall term. New additions included a bus barn, band hall, shop and gymnasium.

In the law enforcement department, burglaries were news as both Donnie's Medicine Chest in Bovina and Rose Drug in Farwell were hit by thieves who took drugs and

left the cash.

Also in law enforcement, Farwell acquired a new stationery radar unit for the city marshal. The City also passed two ordinances pertaining to regulating the speed around the schools during class hours and the keeping of livestock within city limits.

Parmer County corn harvest sputtered to a halt soon after it began as several days of wet, hazy weather settled in over the Twin Cities. After a few days, however, a dry spell offered some respite and the harvest again swung into high gear.

October was a busy month filled with lots of Homecoming and Halloween related activities.

Both Texico and Farwell staged successful Homecoming celebrations. For the first time Farwell staged a parade as part of the festivities and the

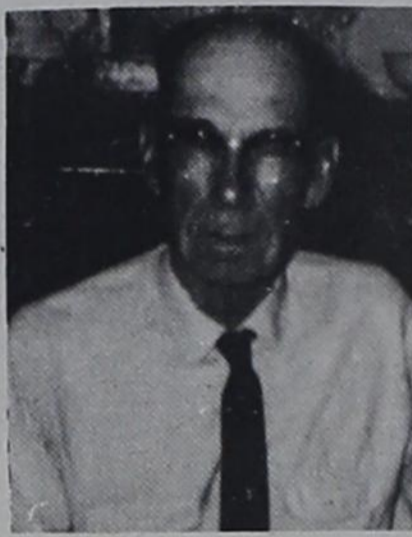

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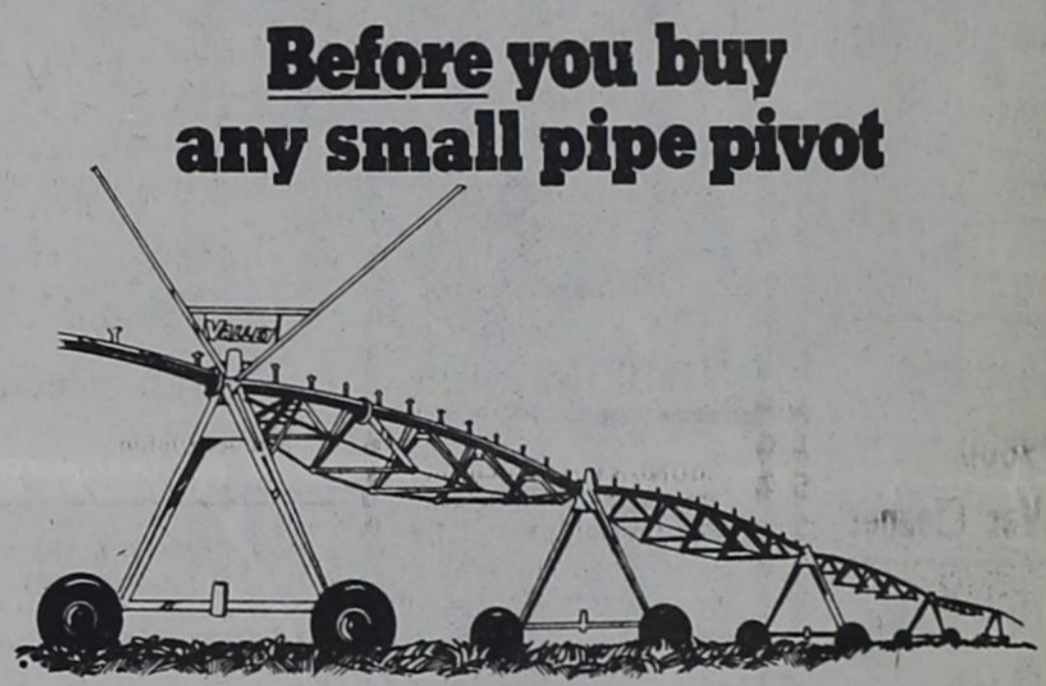

The public is invited to attend the swearing-in ceremony of all Parmer County officials elected in the November 7 general election. The ceremony will take place Tuesday, Jan. 2, at 10 a.m. in the Parmer County courtroom. The invitation was made during the Commissioners Court session December 20.

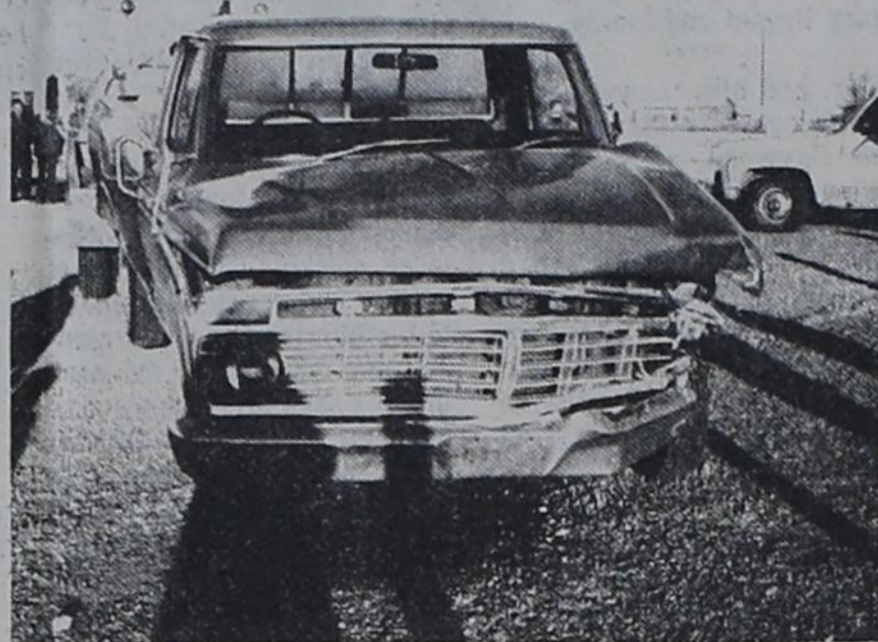
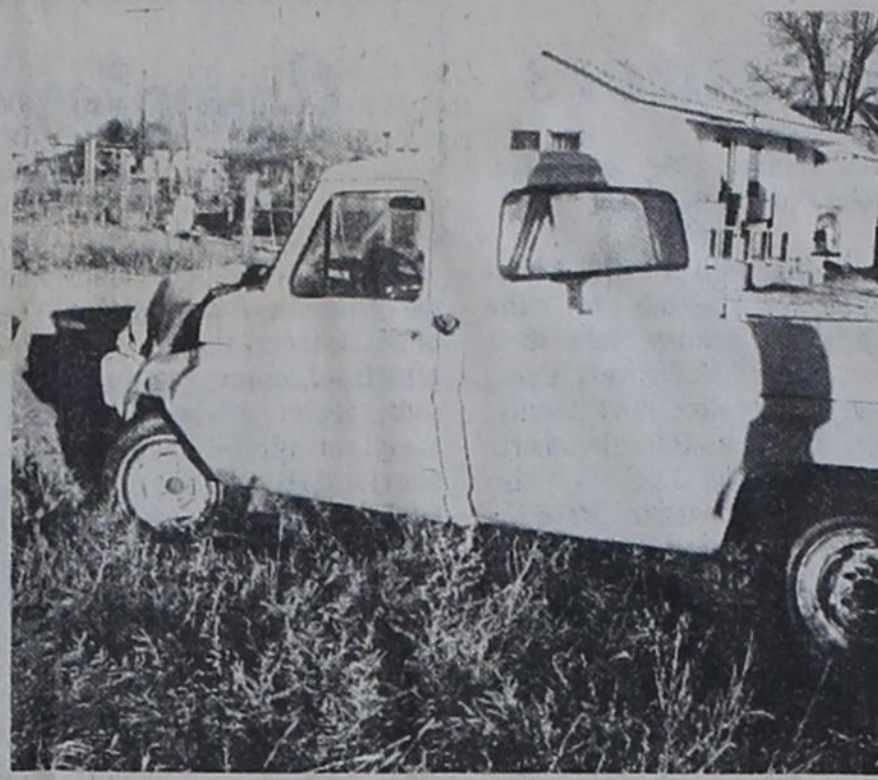
Since that was the final meeting for this year and since two members of the Court, Jimmy Briggs and William V. Gromowsky, will not return in 1979, best wishes were extended to them by the Court in general, as well as appreciation for their services in recent months and years.

Jack Patterson, incoming Commissioner from Precinct 2, met with the Court.

The Court also resolved that the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture be authorized to place a marquee on the west side of Main Street in Friona, in what is commonly known as the city park area. It is understood that all construction and maintenance costs shall be borne by the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

Mrs. Pat Fleming of Friona was appointed to represent Parmer County as a director on the Panhandle Emergency Medical Services Board. Mrs. Fleming will also represent the city of Friona.

The Court agreed to re-deposit in the county depository for a period of 90 days two \$60,000 certified deposits belonging to the Right-of-Way fund.

Conversion and the salvation that accompanies it begins with humility. Faith in Christ as the virgin born son of God (Heb. 11:6) certainly is contrary to human pride. The very admission that one is a sinner, lost and hopeless, is a humbling experience. Baptism for the remission of sins (John 3:5; Mark 16:16; Acts 2:38) requires a humility of heart that some cannot find within themselves. No wonder the act of conversion is so often referred to as a "change of heart." When the people of Jerusalem heard the first full gospel sermon it pricked their hearts (Acts 2:37). The grand result was the product of humility. Paul reminds the people at Rome that the transition from sinner to saint was brought about by obedience "from the heart" to the gospel - a joint participation with Christ in His death, burial and resurrection that took place in Bible baptism (Rom. 6:16-18; 3-4).

Pride rejects the one church in favor of every man having a church of HIS own choice. The same pride rejects the simple worship of the New Testament Christians in favor of elaborate rituals that exalt individuals and entertain an audience rather than honor God.

Satan's biggest tool in his fight against truth has been man's pride. Instead of man's view as seen through the eye of pride why not catch a God's eye view of matters as they are recorded in the Bible. I promise that will not only be an eye opener but also a pride killer. Abandon pride and do it God's way.

PERCOLATOR PUNCH

2 1/2 c. pineapple juice
2 c. cranapple juice
1 3/4 c. water
1 T. whole cloves
1/2 T. whole allspice
3 sticks cinnamon
1/2 c. brown sugar

Put spices in top of percolator and perk.

SCALLOPED FRANK POTATOES

1 c. thinly sliced onions
4 1/2 c. thinly sliced potatoes
2 t. salt
3 T. butter
1 t. salt
7 t. flour
1/8 t. pepper
2 c. milk
6 franks halved lengthwise (optional)
1/8 lb. American cheese grated

Start heating oven to 400 degrees F. In one inch boiling water in saucepan, cook onions and potatoes with two teaspoons salt. Simmer covered for five minutes, then drain.

In double boiler melt butter; gradually stir in flour, one teaspoon salt, pepper and milk. Cook, stirring constantly until smooth and thickened. Arrange one-third of potatoes and onions in greased two-quart casserole and top with one-half of the franks. Pour on one-third of sauce, add another one-third potatoes and onions and rest of franks and another one-third of sauce. Arrange rest of potatoes and onions on top. Pour remaining sauce and top with cheese. Bake 35 minutes.

STRAWBERRY CAKES

1 pkg. white cake mix
3 T. flour
4 eggs
1/2 box or 3/4 c. frozen strawberries
1 c. oil
1/2 c. cold water
1 box strawberry gelatin (small)

Beat four minutes and place in pan. Preheat oven to 350 degrees and bake 30 minutes or less.

ICING

1/4 lb. or less butter
1 box powdered sugar
1/2 box frozen strawberries

Blackeyed Beans For New Year's Day

Prepare blackeyed "beans" for a traditional New Year's feast.

That's correct, this ever-popular New Year's dish is not really a pea - it's a bean, a foods and nutrition specialist, Marilyn Haggard, says. But, tradition dictates that black-eyed peas are known as peas - and will probably continue to be called peas.

Whether pea or bean, no New Year's day celebration would seem right without them, the specialist points out. Miss Haggard is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

PREPARATION

When preparing blackeyed peas, soak the peas before cooking to reduce cooking time.

First, boil them in water for two minutes, remove from the heat and soak for one hour.

Now, they're ready to cook. Or, to soak the peas overnight, start with the two-minute boil - the brief boil will keep them from souring and help prevent hard skins.

Then, leave the peas to soak until the next day.

SEASONING

Season with one teaspoon salt for each cup of dry peas, the specialist continues.

Salt pork and bacon are old standbys for seasoning, but chopped ham or smoked turkey left from the Christmas celebration are great also.

Add pepper, garlic and oregano in small amounts - one-fourth teaspoon per pound of dry peas - to enhance flavor.

'SLOW' COOKING

In the slow cooker, soak the

peas overnight, then cook the soaked beans in water on "high" for two to two and one-half hours.

Reduce control setting to "low", add seasonings and meat and cook for eight to 10 hours.

For less watery peas, use less water, she recommends.

For a change of pace, try Barbecue Blackeyes.

BARBECUE BLACKEYES

4 slices bacon
1 large onion, chopped
3 cups drained cooked or canned blackeyed beans
1 cup bean liquid
1/4 cup of your favorite barbecue sauce
1 teaspoon prepared mustard
1/2 cup diced green pepper

1 cup coarsely crushed potato chips

Cook bacon crisp in skillet or saucapan. Remove bacon. In the hot fat, cook onion until thoroughly heated.

Add beans, liquid, barbecue sauce and mustard, mixing lightly. Simmer 15 minutes adding more liquid if needed.

Just before serving, stir in green pepper and potato chips and heat a minute or two longer.

Serve topped with bacon. makes four big servings.

FRIED BLACKEYED PEAS

Fry a sliced onion slowly in fat until lightly browned. Add leftover blackeyed peas, and fry until hot and tasty.

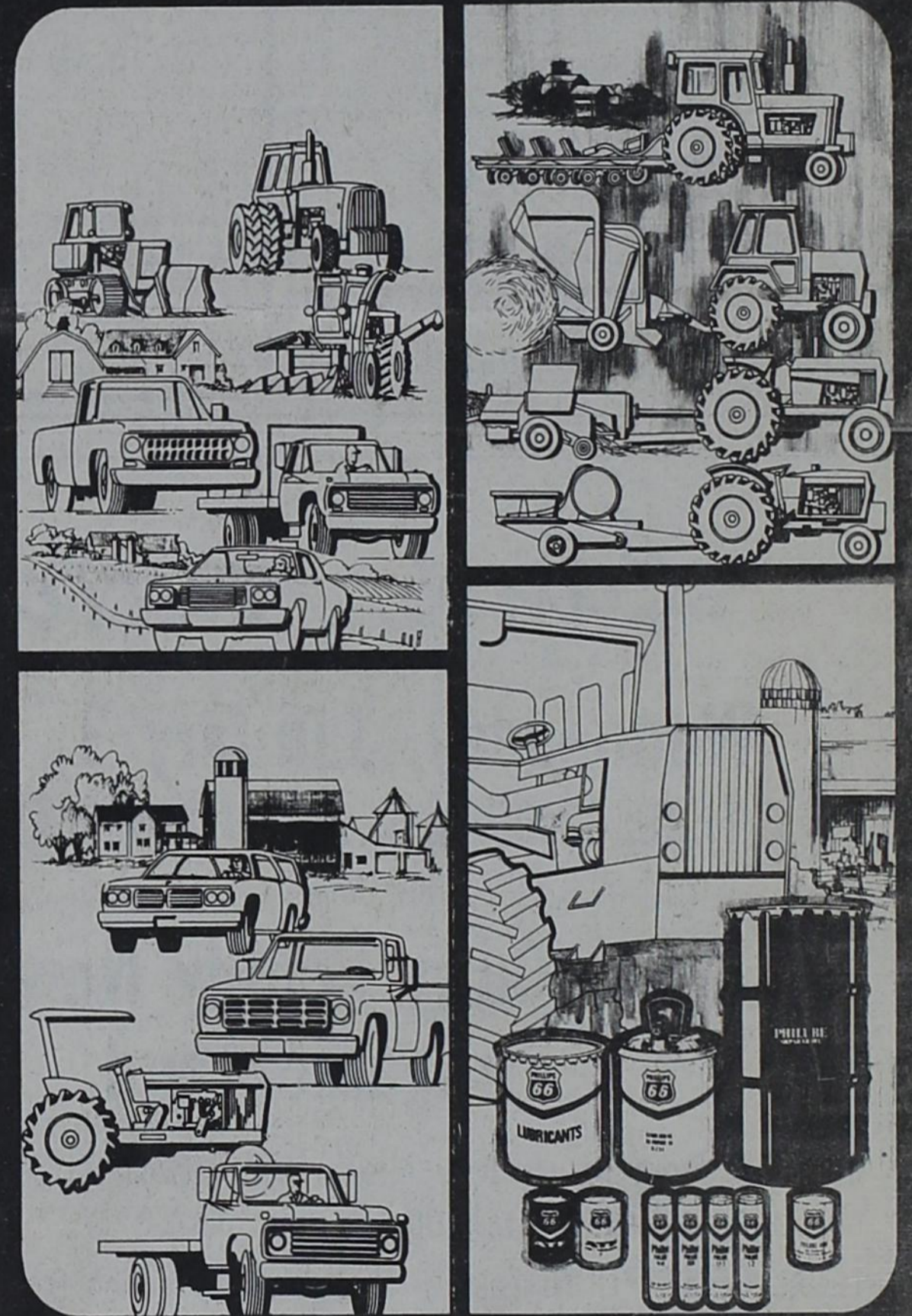
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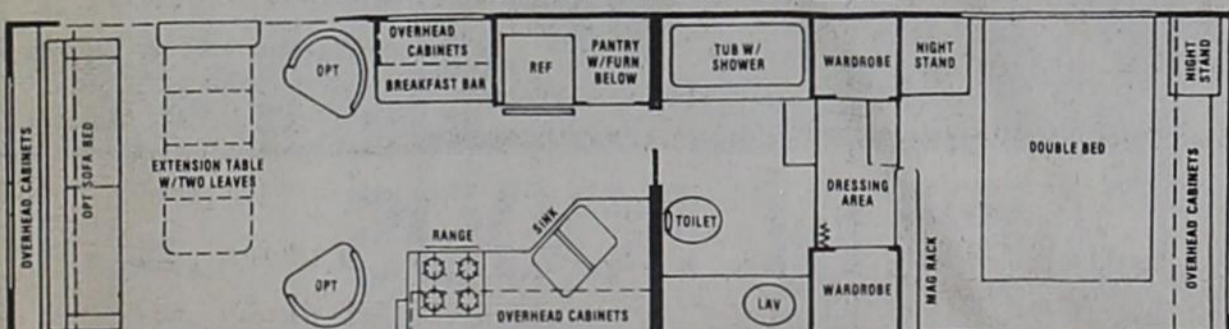

'Castaways' To Sing At Inaugural Ball

A well-known Eastern New Mexico band the "Castaways" has been chosen to play for one of the inaugural balls to be held in Santa Fe January 1. Fred Chandler of Farwell is a member of the five-piece band. They will perform at the High School Activity Center from 8:30 until midnight MST. The "Castaways" have been together for the past 17 months, but three of the members have played in the same band for the past seven years.

Chandler who is associated with a Farwell elevator, sings and plays the harmonica as well as a "mean" bass. He will team with Alva J. Parker of Floyd, N.M., to play "twin fiddles."

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Muleshoe Farmer Named A Top Corn Producer

A local area farmer was recently named a member of the DeKalb Yieldmasters Club for producing one of the top Farmer County corn yields.

John N. Agee of rural Muleshoe was named a member of the club by DeKalb district sales manager, Dan Ryan of Abernathy, after producing a 223.67 bushel-per-acre yield using DeKalb XL-72aa.

The yield was mechanically harvested without gleaning from 1.50 acres, computed to No. 2 corn and calculated on a 15.5 percent moisture basis in the presence of impartial witnesses.

Agee planted the crop on April 6 and harvested a stand of 30,180 plants per acre on September 30.

The Muleshoe farmer applied 300 pounds of 10-20-10 per acre during spring tillage and he followed with 470 pounds of 82-0-0 per acre just before planting.

Agee used one quart of AAtrex 4L per acre to control weeds. Sevinal was used three times at a rate of one quart each per acre for insect control. He irrigated seven times to add a total of 3 1/2 inches of water to the 3 1/2

inches of rain that fell from planting to harvest.

The DeKalb Yieldmasters Club promotes an exchange of ideas and information among the nation's leading grain producers. Through the sharing of such information, the program encourages farmers

to adopt management practices that will aid them in obtaining maximum profit from each acre.

Last year more than 1,500 corn, sorghum and silage yields were submitted to the club, which is sponsored by DeKalb AgResearch, Inc.
