## FDIC assessing <br> banks higher fees

The Federal Deposit Insurance Corporatio (FDIC) has assessed additional fees on the nation's that have failed since the beginning of the current hat have failed since the beginning of the current that may yet arise. hat may yet arise.
the middle of last year, banks were assessed a one-time payment followed by a requirement at the end of that year to pay three years insurance assess ments in advance.
"It may seem a bit unfair," Nichols suggested, "Healthy banks are paying fees for problems that they themselves did not cause.
The New Mexico Business Weekly recently noted that community banks have seen their annual FDIC assessments nearly quadruple from 2008 to 2009.

It notes that these unprecedented hikes in assessments have the effect of reducing the funds that community banks have to channel back into th
local economy through loans and investments.

Recent cool weather has reminded us that we have a limited amount of time to mature our crop.

While this is not what one would call hot, it will provide valuable energy to continue crop development. Projected highs are similar to the $\mathbf{2 0}$ year long term average but the lows are a bit above.
Corn silage harvest has began, early yield reports have been "middle of the road". Some fields dried down much faster than expected which made harvest moisture less than optimum.
This rapid drydown was likely a result of a combination of factors including soil moisture availability, spider mite pressure, environmental conditions, and ossibly hybrid selection.
Recent cool weather has cost area cotton producers 2 days of maturity as of today.

Farwell residents urged to allow fiber optics
Some residents of Farwell are reportedly refusing the installation of fiber optic connectivity to their homes and businesses, reports Farwell Mayor He Mace.
He emphasized that the installation at this time may be inconvenient in some cases but at least for Fiber being, it is free.
Filding that connectivity will be beneficial for any building that the owner may wish to sell in the future, that will invariably arise in the coming years will all require a fiber optic link.
Telephones, computers, and home businesses will require fiber optics in one way or another, and homes or businesses that lack it may suffer reduced property value.
The ENMR-Plateau Chief Operating Officer, Jeff Moore, also emphasized that rejecting fiber optics in order to retain the existing copper wire connectivity for "land-line" phone service is not a choice at all; once the fiber optic program is completed and the system is switched over, copper phone lines will no nger work.
Residents who rejected the free fiber optic installation thinking they could continue on the existing copper lines will simply lose their phone service hen the system transition is executed
Itll be scheduled, again without cost installation can still be scheduled, again without cost, by phoning
the Farwell offices of ENMR-Plateau at 481-3800.
That applies also to homes or businesses that do not currently have land-line phone service; while the current program is active, land-line service via the new fiber optic link can be scheduled with a phone call.
Once the fiber optic project is completed, however, installations will require the payment of the service charge that is normally required.
Moore stressed that the cost for telephone connectivity on the new fiber optic will be the same as it is for the current copper system so other than the ime it takes to install the fiber to the building, the hange will be transparent to land-line users.
Mayor Mace also noted that some trash dumpsters have missed their Thursday emptying by lation is proceeding.
He said the city regrets the inconvenience that it causes residents who find their dumpster full for a week or who must find other dumpsters to use but hopes that it will be worth it when residents can enjoy the advantages that the new fiber optic system will one day provide.


The Fillpot Report


Live Cattle prices were able to turn short term rends back down late last week. Cash is expected to
trade around $\$ 08$ compared to $\$ 99.50$ last week. The market is still a long way from turning long term trends back down. There are several levels of support below the market with $\$ 94.50$ being the strongest level of support basis the October contract. Higher grain prices have actually supported the back months.
Feeder prices have softened some, but are still holdng most of their gains seen over the last couple of weeks. Higher grain prices have basically had no impact
on feeder prices up to this point. Technically, the market will need to see a close below $\$ 116.25$ basis the October contract in order to turn short term trends back lower There are several levels of support below the market. Soybean prices turned their short term trends back higher late last week and have seen a fairly strong rally
back to the upside. This rally has helped to support both corn and wheat prices. Odds still favor a top made just couple weeks ago and it will take new contract highs in order to nullify a top. Long term trends would also turn lower on a close below last weeks low. Crop in still in great shape.
Corn prices were also able to turn short term trends ack higher late last week. Outside pressure from lower energy and stock prices had little impact. The marke
was able to penetrate the $\$ 4.38$ resistance level, but has yet to close above this level. Technically, the market extremely 'overbought' at these levels and the crop is till reportedly in great shape to set a new production record this year.
Wheat prices rallied alongside the rest of the grain complex and the market has been able to test the two week and turned short term trends back higher. There are several levels of resistance above the market and odds still favor a top is probably in place at this time, but ust how close prices will move towards that levels will have to be seen.
Cotton prices moved up into new high territory late last week and have done a good job in holding their
gains. Trends remain higher after the market stalled out for a couple of weeks and has been able to make new contract highs. Prices may be pushing their upside for a minute, but so are many other markets. With the supply/demand out of touch in many respects, prices ar istorically high across the board
may not be suitable for everyone.

Originally begun as a newspaper for the Texico-Farwell area, the Tribune expanded into the Lazbuddie area in the 1980s and into the Bovina area six years ago. Thus, the Tribune now covers four school districts and other Parmer County areas.

site is tribune@plateautel.net. A one-year subscription for Parmer, Bailey and Curry counties is $\$ 24$; elsewhere, $\$ 35$. A 9-month subscription for college students is $\$ 29$.
The newspaper is open weekdays from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Helping Rob Pomper are Will Anderson, the editor; Deanna Curtis, the Bovina columnist; Mike Pomper, on a part-time basis, and a host of other local contributors.

The newspaper originally was in the 300 block of 3rd Street, but moved to its current location at 404 3rd St. in the 1920s. Its current facility may be the oldest building still in use in Farwell, dating back to about 1907 when it was a mercantile store.
