

The previous trip to State was in 1940 when the team was coached by A.D. McDonald. At that time, New Mexico had all teams lumped into one class regardless of school size.



It was announced recently that a marker highlighting the Coronado expedition through this area would be placed at Farwell City Hall.


Mrs. Spring noted:

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LIVE CATTLE: Live Cattle prices have continued to rend higher and cash prices have held strong at \$92 for the last couple of weeks. Technically, the April contract has yet to retest it's old high around the \$93.50 level while most of the back months have actually penetrated highs made a few weeks ago. Long term charts are currently 'overbought' and the seasonal turn down on the 10th of this month.

FEEDER CATTLE: Prices have also continued to move highs outpacing the Live Cattle prices. There were a couple of long term targets which were reached this week but price spreads between the Live Cattle and Feeders is once again reaching historical spreads. This has take place several times over the last few years usually when prices are close to long term highs. Trends are still high-

CORN: Prices also dropped into the lower end of their three week trading range late in the week. There really has been no news to drive the market in one direction or the other. Next weeks USDA Crop Production report is expected to raise world stocks again. At this time prices are trading around the \$3.70 support level basis the May contract.

SOYBEANS: Soybean prices dropped hard last week, but they were able to hold support at the lower end of a sideways trading range which has held the market together for about the last four weeks. There will be a USDA Crop Production report out next Wednesday which should give this market some direction. South American harvest is still expected to be one of the largest ever recorded.

WHEAT: Prices are also trading around the lower end of their trading range. Prices have basically been trapped inside this range for almost two months. Wheat may try to take itis lead from the rest of the grain complex, but for now, the higher U.S. Dollar and lack of buying interest has kept a fairly tight lid on any substantial rallies. Next weeks USDA report may give prices some direction.

COTTON: Cotton prices reached a long term price projection around the \$84.50 level basis the May contract, but only backed off for about a day. Since then, prices have continued to trade sideways with very little news to give the market any direction. New highs could boost this market for another 5-10 cents. New lows would turn charts back down with strong support coming in around the \$78 level basis the May contract.

Wind energy meeting held for area land owners

More than 100 folks turned out at the Farwell wind farm informational meeting at the Farwell Community Center on Friday morning.

Managers of the group are Daren Sudderth (president), Mark Williams, Kendall Devault, and attorneys Max Best and Zollie Steakley.

The group also scheduled a second meeting at Pleasant Hill later that day.

The "Big Five Renewable Energy Project, LLC" includes close to 200,000 acres in Curry, Roosevelt, Parmer and Bailey counties, said the group.

"Big Five" refers to the original five districts in the project, Farwell, Oklahoma Lane, Lariat, Pleasant Hill, and West Camp.

The local group is working with wind energy developer Tri Global Energy, LLC.

In a paper given folks attending, the group said:

-- Total royalties generated by the wind farm are shard by the landowners according to their acreage in the project, meaning no one gets left out if a wind turbine is not on their property.

-- Royalty payment calculation is comparable to other wind farms in the area. By pooling the royalty, the risk of not receiving a turbine on your land and therefore not receiving a royalty check is mitigated.

-- The wind and easement lease agreement is as landowner-friendly as possible and has been reviewed by the managers and their attorney to the managers' satisfaction. Since the project is majority owned by the community, there is no reason for the lease to not be as landowner-friendly as possible.


-- Landowners have the option, but not the obligation, to purchase ownership in the wind farm. Investment in the project will only be accepted from qualified individuals in accordance with securities laws.

-- The advantage of purchasing ownership in the project is that it entitles the landowner to cash distributions once the project is "paid off," typically in 7-10 years. Royalties are received the entire time the project is operational.

-- Landowners that are signing leases in other projects are only receiving royalties for the entire term of their lease: 40 to 50-plus years. If they have a turbine on their land. This means that they are missing out on the majority of cash flow generated by the project that goes to the project's financers and owners.

-- Additionally, although we are not recommending the sale of the development prior to operations, if this were to occur, the proceeds from the sale would be distributed to the owners according to their ownership (the community).

Kindergarten, Pre-K and Head Start Registration

Wednesday, March 10, 2010 and Thursday, March 11, 2010, are the days to register children for next year's Bovina School kindergarten, pre-K and Head Start classes. Registration will be held from 9 to 12:00 a.m. and from 2 to 5 p.m. at Ridgelea Elementary School office.

All children who will be four and five years of age by Sept. 1 and live in the Bovina School District need to register for next year's classes. To register, a child must have immunization records, state copy of birth certificate and Social Security card.

Requirements to be eligible for pre-K and Head Start, a child must be four years old prior to Sept. 1, is unable to speak or comprehend the English language, or is from a family whose income, according to standards set by the State Board of Education, is at or below subsistence level (eligible for free or reduced price lunches), and is a resident of the Farwell School District.

Head Start requires income verification (check stub), Medicaid/TANF

Texas school districts are required to provide pre-K if 15 or more students are identified.



Profile of the Farmer

More than three million people farm or ranch in the United States. Individuals, family partnerships or family corporations operate almost 99 percent of U.S. farms.

Over 22 million people are employed in farm or farmrelated jobs, including production agriculture, farm inputs, processing and marketing and wholesale and retail sales.

According to the 2002 Census of Agriculture, 50 percent of the farmers are 55 years of age or older, up only three percent from 1997. Average age of the principal operator is 55.3.

Forty-one percent of U.S. total land area is farmland (938.28 million acres). In 1900, the average farm size was 147 acres, compared to 441 acres today.

The top five agricultural commodities are corn, cattle and calves, dairy products, broilers and soybeans. U.S. farmers produce 46% of the world's soybeans, 41% of the world's corn, 20.5% of the world's cotton and 13% of the world's wheat.

Farmers and ranchers are independent business people who provide for their families by growing and producing food and fiber. They use modern production techniques to increase the quality and quantity of the food they produce.

In the 1960s one farmer supplied food for 25.8 persons in the U.S. and abroad. Today, one farmer supplies food for 144 people in the U.S. and abroad.


