## Was Columbus a master spy?

Christopher Columbus is remembered in this week every year as a master sailor and a man who dared to challenge scientific orthodoxy. But now, evidence is being assembled suggesting his greatest work was as a master spy.

That would have come as a shock to me and my first grade classmates 50 years ago. Like most other schools in the nation, we put on a Columbus play, resplendent in the sailor suits our mothers had sewn for us, crowding around the boy-Columbus in the cast.

"The world is flat! We'll sail off the edge of the world," we boy-sailors would wail. "We shall all die!"

"Sail on!" replied the stern boy-Columbus,

"Sail on!"

The hard gleam of resolve in his eyes thrilled parents in the rows of the school auditorium and the play would end by applauding Columbus for opening America to people of faith, courage, and ingenuity. Columbus was honored as the man who enabled them over the next 500 years to transform its wilderness into a blessing for the whole world.

That is just what he did, of course, because Columbus was a master sailor. In the 15th Century, sailors were the Star Trek figures of Europe, "boldly going where no one had gone before" and returning with the treasures of the Orient.

However, the widely held belief that Columbus challenged authority to prove the earth wasn't flat is an urban myth; almost everyone in his time agreed with him.

The story of Columbus challenging the vision of a flat earth was the creation of the 19th Century writer, Washington

Irving. He probably intended only to create a hero-story to entertain young American readers but his unlikely account has persisted despite all the evidence against it.

After all, the moon hangs in space as an orb and the assumption was that the world must have looked something like that itself, especially when the rounded shadow of the earth could be seen crossing the face of the moon in eclipses.

Sailors were particularly convinced the world was round because ships and mountains "rose" out of the sea as the distance closed, suggesting a rounded globe and not a flat earth.

Even in the Church, it was noted that the Old Testament book of Isaiah speaks of God looking down on the "circle" or "sphere" of the earth.

Educated men even had an idea how big the globe was 200 years before the birth of Christ. Eratosthenes had by that time measured shadows on the day of the sun's equinox and doing the geometric calculations,

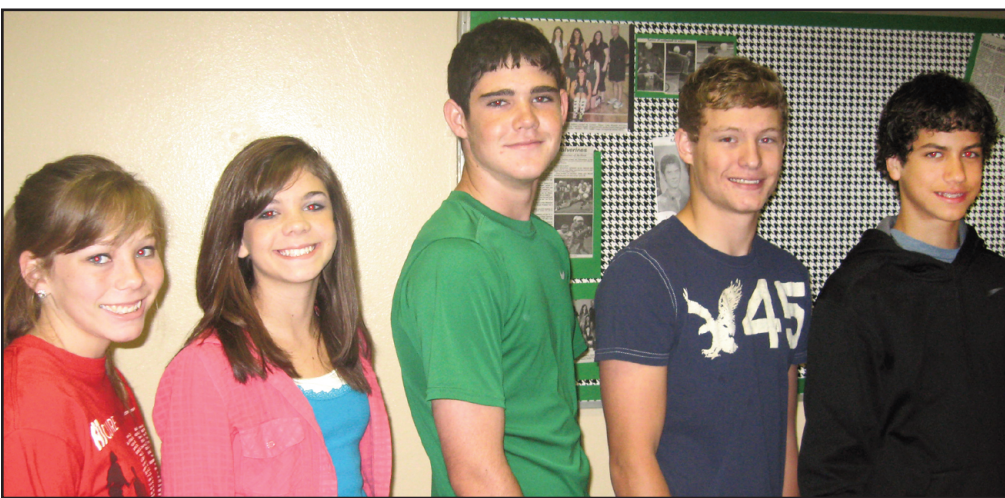

**Live Cattle** prices were sharply higher on Friday due to limit up corn prices. Higher corn prices have helped to support a premium in Live Cattle prices, but this relationship does not always hold for long periods of time. Keep in mind that long term trends remain lower in the Live Cattle. It would take a close above the \$100.25 level in order to turn long term trends back higher.

**Feeder prices** traded down into their 300 point limit before moving back off the lows of the day last Friday. Higher corn prices had to opposite impact on feeders as input costs rise. Prices broke below key support levels around the \$108 level basis the November contract. Both short and long term trends remain down into the November/December time frame.

**Soybean prices** also traded up their 70 point limit last Friday following corn's lead. The USDA numbers came in close to pre trade estimates, but there was heavy buying from Funds across the grain complex which pushed all the grains limit up. Odds are good that the market may have over extended themselves, but in order to confirm any top, it may take weeks. Both long and short term trends remain up.

**Corn prices** were also locked up the 30 cent limit on Friday after the USDA report indicated yields would drop to around 155.8 bushels, down from their previous estimates of 162.5 bushels. This still places the crop at a record, but dropped estimated ending stocks to levels which generated some fear over the next year. Similar to the rest of the grain complex, it may take a few weeks to confirm a top. Otherwise, both short and long term trends are still pointing higher with \$6.00 the target for some analysts.

**Wheat prices** also traded up their limit, but some months failed to hold their gains going into Friday's close. Supported by limit corn and bean prices, wheat seemed to be the weakest link. Long term trends technically turned down a couple of weeks ago an it will take a close above \$7.83 basis the December KC contract in order to turn long term trends back higher.

**Cotton prices** continue to make higher highs followed by higher lows. Trends high continued to climb to new highs on every turn. How far will the market move? It's anyone's guess as Funds are pressing the long side in a big way. Once they begin to exit, prices could see a fairly strong pull back, but until Funds buying comes to a halt, prices are higher.

**County employees banned from texting while driving**

The Parmer County Commissioners on Tuesday voted to schedule flu shots for county employees and elected officials on Oct. 18, beginning at 8:30 a.m.

Their spouses and children may also receive the flu shots although the county will not pay for those injections.

In other business, the temporary traffic signs at the intersection of county roads 2500 and EE will remain as permanent installations.

The county adopted the statewide prohibition of county elected officials and employees using the "text" function of their cell phones while driving county vehicles.

It also adopted the Fair Labor Standards Act requirement that new mothers be periodically provided break times and a room to obtain breast milk for their nursing infants.

From Benji Henderson, Parmer County extension agent:

Many producers across the county are in the full swing of corn harvest. Some producers are even finished.

The grain sorghum for the most part is mature and some is being combined. Silage harvest is winding down with those last cuttings of alfalfa getting cut.

Many producers are spraying cotton and getting ready to strip. There should be several strippers running across the county by the end of this week.

Much of the wheat has been planted and much of the irrigated crop is up and growing.

Most dryland needs a good soaking rain.

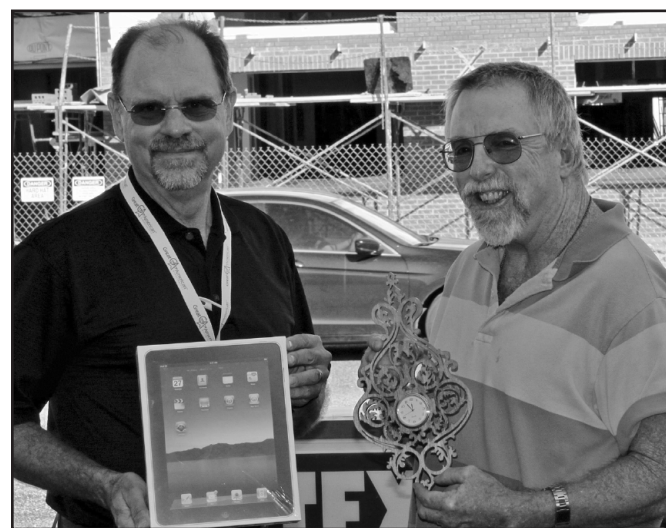

estimated the circumference of the earth to within one percent of the actual figure.

So while Columbus cannot be remembered as the figure we were taught as children, the champion of science over superstition, he remains a skilled sailor and a daring explorer. But much more than that, according to author Manuel DeSilva Rosa, there is a very good case to be made that Columbus' primary role was as a spy.

In the 15th Century, a nation's wealth depended on trade by sea and navigational charts were the equivalent of the blue-prints to make a nuclear weapon in the Cold War. A ship's master, fearing his ship might be captured or washed up on a shore, would risk his life to burn, shred, or sink the navigational charts on board to prevent their capture.

It was in that world that Christopher Columbus survived, and flourished. How did Columbus know that sailing south he would catch currents and winds that would carry him west? How did he know that sailing north would carry him back on his return voyage?

How did this simple sailor gain access to the inner courts of Spain? How did he then manage to receive a small fortune in the queen's silver to finance the voyages he proposed?

In a nutshell, according to Rosa, Columbus was a spy. He stole information. He bought influence and access. He exploited his skills in lan-

guages and espionage. He prowled waterfronts, arranging late-night encounters to obtain information from dangerous men, a bag of silver in one hand and a hidden dagger in the other.

He prowled royal courts, arranging late-night encounters with dangerous women, flowers in one hand and a hidden dagger in the other.

He did this at great peril to himself because, despite the common belief that he was Italian, Rosa has found a great deal of evidence that he was Portuguese, the greatest rival to Spain at that time. He may also have been Jewish.

In the time of religious turmoil and the international race for the riches of the Orient, Columbus knew that anyone who provoked even the slightest suspicion faced the Inquisition, the rack, and the thumb screw.

It is for those reasons that Rosa paints Columbus as the James Bond of his time. His book analyzes Columbus' letters, filled with cryptic language, code words, and inexplicable symbols. It studies the flow of money. It notes that the islands that Columbus explored would receive names in Portuguese, not Italian or Spanish.

All of this evidence has existed for 500 years but it has never before been studied like this. Some people will embrace Rosa's theory and some will not but one thing is certain.

Whoever he might have really been, Columbus must have been remarkable; it has taken 500 years to begin to even slightly expose some of his secrets.

I cannot speak highly enough of how fortunate we are to live in an area where cooperatives are available ... and thriving.

Every time you get that capital credit check, you can thank your lucky stars that you are a member of a cooperative.

That local office has been a major plus for the Farwell community. ENMR - Plateau didn't have to install that office here, but they did it to offer better service. And that is what co-ops are all about.

I like dropping off my monthly bills at the slot in the door at the Farwell office. It's very convenient and saves me money.

I like knowing when a

line problem happens that I can call someone I know (Shandra) to report the problem, knowing she will make taking care of it a priority.

I like knowing when I bought cell phones that I didn't have to run all over to shop -- that what I needed was right here in Farwell. And I could sign up for service immediately.

And their service keeps getting better.

Those fiber optic lines being installed in Farwell is a huge plus. And this work doesn't come cheap -- it cost a bunch. Just like it costs more to have an office in Farwell. But ENMR spent that money in order to provide its customers with the best service possible.

Really great! Once I computerized at the Tribune years back, when problems occurred, sometimes it would be me, sometimes it would be ENMR.

Thus, I got to know Victor at the ENMR tech support office. I can't tell you the number of times he went 100 percent to help me get things going okay with my computers.

I will always appreciate Victor's help, especially to someone as "mechanically challenged" as I am (understatement of the century). He saved my butt more than once.

I sure hope Victor sees this note, to know what he meant to me when I sorely needed assistance with my machines.

up: As you know, DeeDee and I now live in Canyon. Well, we got our city utility bill last week with a return envelope for payment. The return envelope was made out to the "City of Borger."

Yeah, a goofup had been made... But one would think the error would have been found before those return envelopes were stuffed in with the utility bills. Nobody's perfect.

The monthly AARP newsletter (for old people like me) had an article saying that the state of New Jersey from 1997 to 2003 made virtually no contributions to two giant pension funds for teachers and state and local employees.

Instead, the article said, officials resorted to gimmicks -- overvaluing the pension funds, creating then short-circuiting separate benefit accounts, then announcing and abandoning a plan to comply with the contribution levels required by law.

In August, the federal Security and Exchange Commission ruled that New Jersey had committed fraud.

The state agreed not to do it again.

With all the crowd on their feet and the game on the line, Bovina goes to the air. Morris knocks down the pass and the Steers took over on downs.

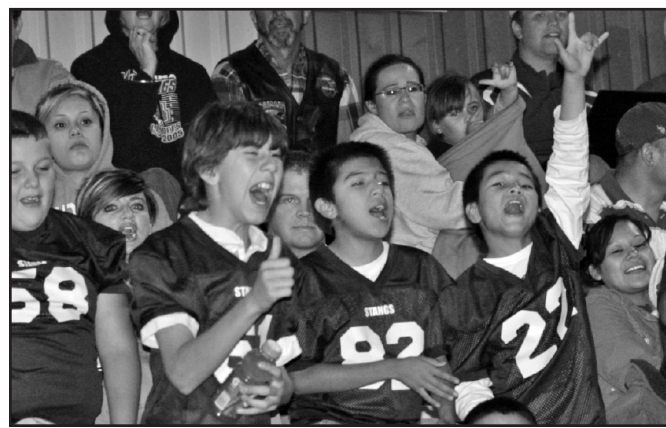
Since Bovina was out of time-outs, Actkinson "took a knee" as the clock winded down.

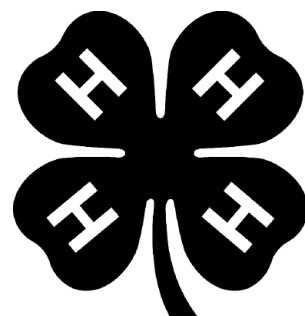

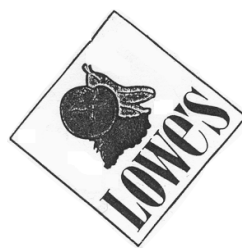

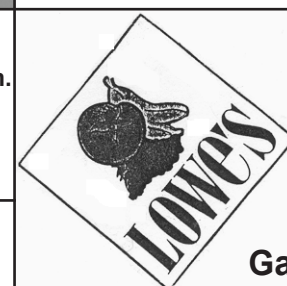
