Jack Patterson: Parmer County vet

Parmer County has a hero in its' midst. As a soldier in World War II, he received honors for his heroic actions during battle.

Jack Patterson and his wife, Ona, came to this area from North Georgia in 1949. He and his family traveled here looking for a better life and ended up in Rhea Community.

He registered for the army and was trained in Kansas. On Aug. 6, 1944, Jack was one of 22,000 soldiers shipped out on the Queen Elizabeth. They landed in Scotland five days later and were later stationed in Brest, France, where they began combat.

Jack was in the 94th infantry and his job was a point-man. What this means is that he was the man in the front, leading the troops forwards and looking for the enemy. Because he grew up in the mountainous country as a kid, and knew the dos and don'ts of the land, he was well qualified for his position.

His Army commander, George S. Patton, received word late in 1944 about the Battle of the Bulge. He pushed his troops up to the battle site in two days, which most thought was an impossible task.

The battle began on Dec. 16, 1944. The specific job of Jack's infantry

was to hold back the Germans, and stop their attack. The reason the battle was named "Battle of the Bulge" was because the Germans pushed their way through to the middle of the line, creating a bulge.

This battle took place during one of the coldest winters recorded. At night, soldiers would be stationed outside camp to watch for the enemy, but because of the severity of the temperatures, they could only stay out-

side for one hour at a time. Between November and April, 40,000 soldiers suffered cold related injuries. During the last 41 days of the battle, there were 81,000 casualties, but the Allies managed to beat Hitler's army back. Jack's division then moved to the Sara Mozel triangle, where there was more fighting, and they eventually penetrated Hitler's line there.

Many years after the

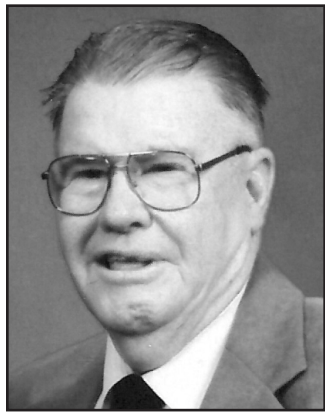

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In 1918, on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day in the eleventh month, the world rejoiced and celebrated. After four years of bitter war, the Allied powers signed a cease-fire agreement with Germany at Rethondes, France on November 11, 1918, bringing World War I to a close. The "war to end all wars" was over.

November 11, 1919 was set aside as Armistice Day in the United States, to remember the sacrifices that men and women made during World War I in order to ensure a lasting peace. On Armistice Day, soldiers who survived the war marched in a parade through their hometowns. Politicians and veteran officers gave speeches and held ceremonies of thanks for the peace they had won.

Armistice Day officially received its name in the United States in 1926 through a Congressional resolution. It became a national holiday 12 years later. Congress voted Armistice Day a federal holiday in 1938, 20 years after the war ended. But Americans realized that the previous war would not be the last one. World War II began the following year and nations great and small again participated in a bloody struggle. After the Second World War, Armistice Day continued to be observed on November 11.

In 1953 townspeople in Emporia, Kansas called the holiday Veterans' Day in gratitude to the veterans in their town. Soon after, Congress passed a bill introduced by a Kansas congressman renaming the federal holiday to Veterans' Day. Beginning in 1954, the United States designated November 11 as Veterans Day to honor veterans of all U.S. wars. 1971 President Nixon declared it a federal holiday on the second Monday in November.

Americans still give thanks for peace on Veterans' Day. There will be a ceremony at Farwell High School at 11:00 in the morning.

However, if Smyer defeats Sudan on Nov. 6 by at least 12 points, it means Farwell would play Olton in the state opener at a time and place to be determined.

The Steers were scheduled to play Anton this Friday but Anton has forfeited its games due to lack of players. Thus, Farwell will finish district with a 3-2 record.

Farwell will finish 3rd in district and likely will face New Deal in the first round of the state playoffs in two weeks.

He remembers leaning over to his wife during the movie and saying, "That looks so real, my face is starting to get cold."

Jack received honors for his courageousness during combat, including an award for meritorious achievement in Germany on Feb. 20, 1945 during the assault on the town of Thorn.

The honors states, "He was always in front and in the thick of fighting. He shot the leading German officer of a small counterattack, causing the surrender of 10 more. He performed in a highly creditable manner, was an outstanding soldier and leader, and was keeping to the highest traditions of the army."

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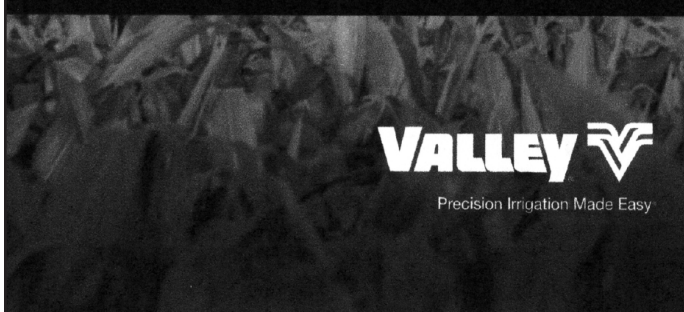

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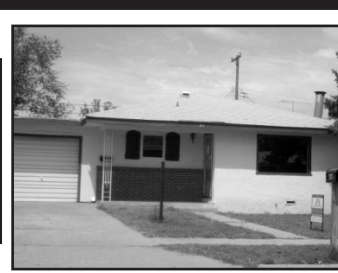

Heather Reed, Missionary

(Editor's note: Heather is the daughter of Kathey and Robert Adams, of Progress. She began in August a year-long mission trip to 11 nations and will send periodic updates to the Tribune.)

We are heading into Turkey as I speak. Just so you know, as we are heading into the Middle East, we are limited on what we can e-mail. We have to be very careful with "Christianese."

Thus, I need to avoid words like God, Christ, missionary, prayer, ministry. And I probably will not be able to tell you where I am for the safety of our contacts.

The last time I wrote, we were leaving Romania and heading toward Croatia.

We got hooked up with the wonderful people of Zadarska 19, a youth center provided by the Evangelical Pentecostal Church in Osijek.

When we got to the church in Požega, I got really excited as I smelled the fumes from painting and saw the church to be looking more like a construction zone than a pretty sanctuary. We learned what we were supposed to be doing: helping remodel this building that had been purchased and get it ready for its dedication.

This was a really cool time because we got some fun work to do, and got to forge relationships with some of the most loving people I have ever met.

We then ended up in Pula, one of the most beautiful cities in the world. We worked with foster parents in their homes preparing the way for fence to be built and a

vineyard to be planted. We also partnered with the "youth" (ages 15-35) in some street evangelism and restoration of the church building, as well as helping to facilitate worship services.

Something that really struck me about this church is their commitment to the young people of Croatia. Every week, without fail, the pastor calls all the children of the church to the front to receive a special prayer and blessing. They also have several families in their church that have foster children who have been orphaned, abused or neglected. They are committed to making sure that these young people know about their identity in Christ, regardless of what the world is telling them.

We also spent four days in Vinkovci. We did some spiritual assessments but mostly we prepared for leaving this country that we had fallen in love with. The first night we were dropped off in the middle of the city center and we started praying for guidance for where to stay. Several hostels fell through, being too expensive for our meager budget.

Finally, we decided to go down to the river and just "tent it" for the week. As we were headed there, we spotted a hotel. We asked there if we could use a room for a home-base; that way we don't have to bring our entire packs all the way to the river and have a guard there at all times.

They agreed. As we were putting our stuff in the room, the owner comes in to work on the heater, and starts questioning us about who we are and what we are doing. After a while, he offered to let us all stay in this room for a price that was actually about half of what we had budgeted for housing.

We celebrated and got settled in. Then we heard a knock on the door: they gave us a second room so we now had two rooms for half of our budget for housing. And they also threw in breakfast for free.

It was pretty amazing.

Prop. 5 - Allowing rural counties to combine appraisal districts to save money: in favor, 252; opposed, 249.

Prop. 6 - Gives the Veterans Land Board more flexibility in approving loans for veterans: in favor, 322; opposed, 200.

Prop. 7 - Allow members of the State Guard or other military reserve units to hold civilian office: in favor, 378; opposed, 145

Prop. 8 - Sets up a veterans hospital in the Rio Grande Valley: in favor, 399; opposed, 161.

Prop. 9 - Guarantees public access to Texas beaches: in favor, 351; opposed, 170.

Prop. 10 - Extends to four years the length of terms for emergency services commissioners: in favor, 367; opposed, 162.

Prop. 11 - Strengthens restrictions on the taking of private land for public use: in favor, 462; opposed, 64.

Texico's Wolverines edged Estancia in the final district game, 28-24 victory, after a scoreless first half.

Texico, 8-1 on the season and 2-1 in district, was given a No. 4 seed in the 12-team Class 2A state bracket. This means they get a first-round bye this weekend.

But next week, they will face either New Mexico Military Academy, seeded 12th, or Estancia again. Estancia is seeded 5th.

Edgardo Meza gained 12. A penalty moved the ball to Estancia's 36. Meza rushed for 15 behind the excellent blocking of Sean Rusk, Jairo Lozano and Pena, but a holding penalty and short gains on the Wolverines stopped the drive at the Bears' 22.

Pena's interception stopped Estancia's drive at the Texico's 20. Texico was held and punted. Donovan Johnson and Pena interfered with Bears' passes, and Brandon King had a QB sack for minus 10.

Texico started at its 16. Meza gained a first own, then ran for 18 behind the blocking of Humberto Burciaga, Vasquez, and Garrett Garrison. The drive stalled and Texico again punted.

Donovan Johnson tackled the returner at Texico's 44. Jose Posada intercepted and Texico got the ball back at its 40. Estancia rose up and stopped the Wolverines again.

LIVE CATTLE: Prices dropped off last week for no apparent reason. Cash trade was sharply higher at \$88.00, but futures prices didn't seem to react. Prices were able to hold a major resistance level around the \$85.00 level into Friday's close which could help to support a higher market into this week. Last weeks low really needs to hold or a retest of \$83.50 could take place? This week will be important and most analysts believe the cash market will hold the \$87-88 area for at least another turn.

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeder prices have held firmer than the counterparts the Live Cattle. Prices were able to catch a 50% retracement level around the \$94.50 level basis the November contract. There seems to be fairly good technical support this level with some support around down around the \$94.00 level.

CORN: Prices have also move sharply lower off their highs made just over one week ago. Most of the support comes in around the \$3.63 level basis the December contract. The market probably overshot some levels to the upside and the correction was quick. Prices may have found a base to work from at current levels until more harvest progress is made. The weather should improve significantly this week.

SOYBEANS: Soybean prices remained under pressure for the most part last week, but prices traded more inside a range than anything else. Support basis the November contract lies around \$9.60 level. Most of the support in beans continues to focus on the harvest progress in the Mid West which is still behind and still a concern. There has been more focus on the bean harvest than corn.

WHEAT: Wheat prices have also remained volatile while trading side by side with the rest of the grain complex. The market dropped off sharply last week, but seemed to catch with the corn and beans. Support basis the December KC contract lies around \$4.95. Prices are somewhat oversold at current levels which may support a bounce, but everything will depend on the direction in the rest of the grain complex.

COTTON: Cotton prices took a breather, but have held up fairly well over the last couple of weeks. Prices have yet to break out to new high territory, but have held support around the \$66 level very well? Most traders continue to focus on a declining inventory due to low production. Demand from China will remain a factor in this market for quite some time into the future.

Remember our vets

Veterans Day is very special to me since I fit into that category as a veteran (1965-68).

I sincerely hope you and your children take the time to read the essays and ads scattered throughout this week's Tribune.

It's like going to church. You need to stay with it.

Same goes for understanding the importance of Veterans Day. You need to stay with it.

During my three years in the U.S. Army, despite the fact I served during the Vietnam War, I was never in combat.

I was very fortunate. What most folks don't understand is that many soldiers don't come back uninjured if they serve in combat or just by being in a "theater of operations."

Your brain can take a beating.

Obviously, I am generalizing and viewing things from a Vietnam War viewpoint. This is probably quite different than those who use a World War II viewpoint, for example.

What I am writing is not true of all combatants. But I saw enough guys coming back from "the Nam" to know there is some validity in what I am saying.

Your brain can take a beating.

You can't just see your buddy bleeding to death and "get it over it."

You can't shoot a rifle round into another person and "forget it."

Psychologically, your brain can take a beating. And that can last your entire life.

That is why when we remember our servicemen and women, we use the phrase "they sacrificed for us."

This is why I respect current and past military personnel who have served on the front line. They have given so

much for our nation and deserve the utmost respect. They may only have served on the front line for a short time, but it doesn't matter: the effects can be lifelong.

I hate it when I hear "who cares about a vet, what did they do for me? They don't mean anything to me."

Anyone who says something like doesn't have a clue to what being an American means. The freedoms we take as "rights" are only due to veterans, who have sacrificed for all Americans.

I don't really view myself as much of a "veteran," although I volunteered to serve my country during wartime.

Yes, it was a hardship. I was out of our country for two full years; away from my family for that span. But I was never in combat. I was never on the front line. I went where the Army sent me.

When my Army tenure ended, I found some of my friends who avoided the military had been "climbing the career ladder" while my own career had been put on hold. That put me at a disadvantage as my peers moved ahead of me.

I didn't care. I had something they didn't have ... pride in serving my country.

Rev. Randall Partin, pastor of Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church, got some demographic insights about Texico-Farwell that I wanted to pass along:

-- More than 40 percent of the folks here were born after 1982.

-- We have a larger percentage of folks born before 1942 than the national average.

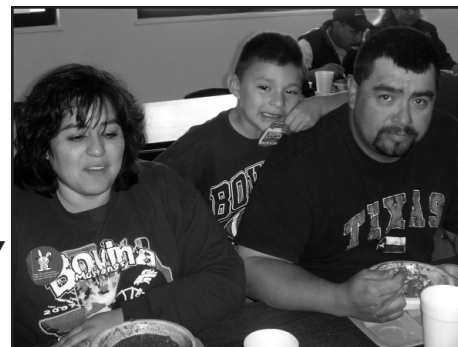

Reasonable Notice of Open Meeting Law
 The Texico City Council met in a regular session on October 27, 2009, and decided that reasonable notice to the public as required in Open Meetings Act (NMSA 1978, Section 10-15-1 to 4) would be as follows:

Unless the business before the City Council dictates otherwise, the City Council conducts open meetings to take formal action on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month at 6:30 p.m. However, when that Tuesday is a City holiday, that meeting will be held on the next business day.

The City Clerk and staff were authorized and directed to publish an annual schedule of regular meetings as legal advertisement in State Line Tribune.

Emergency meetings will be called only under circumstances, which demand immediate action to protect the health, safety and property of citizens or to protect the public body from substantial financial loss. The City of Texico Council will avoid emergency meetings whenever possible. Emergency meetings may be called by the Mayor or a majority of the members upon four (4) hours notice, unless threat of personal injury or property damage requires less notice. The notice for all emergency meetings shall include an agenda for the meeting or information on how the public may obtain a copy of the agenda.

The Mayor or majority of the council members upon three (3) days notice may call special meetings. The notices shall include an agenda for the meeting or information on how members of the public may obtain a copy of the agenda. The agenda shall be available to the public at least twenty-four hours before any special meeting.

All other meetings which may be called for informational purposes at which no action is taken shall be held only after written notice is issued to the State Line Tribune no later than 12:00 noon of the day of such meeting, of four (4) hours before such meeting, whichever is greater.

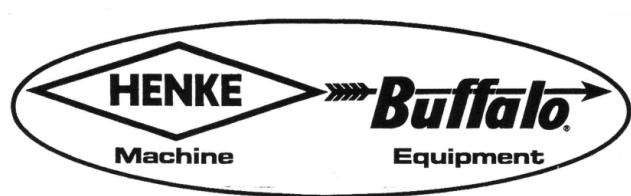

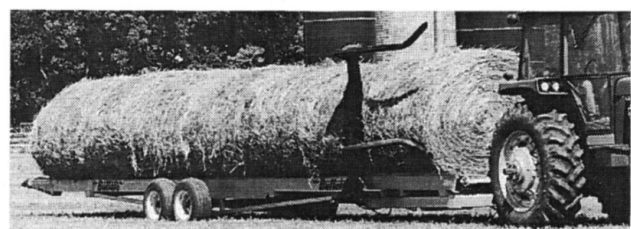
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Mustangs clinch playoff spot

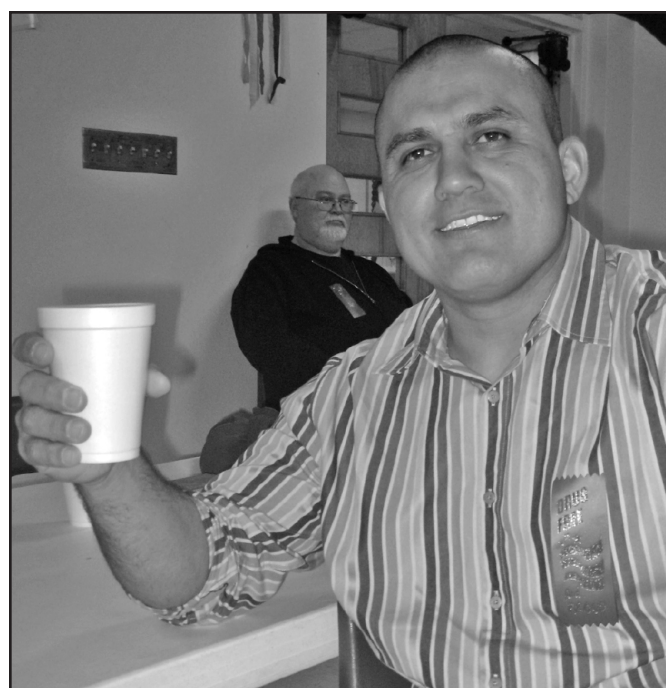
and the Mustangs pulled further ahead when Vela ran right up the middle for 30 yards into paydirt. Daniel Rivera kicked the extra point.

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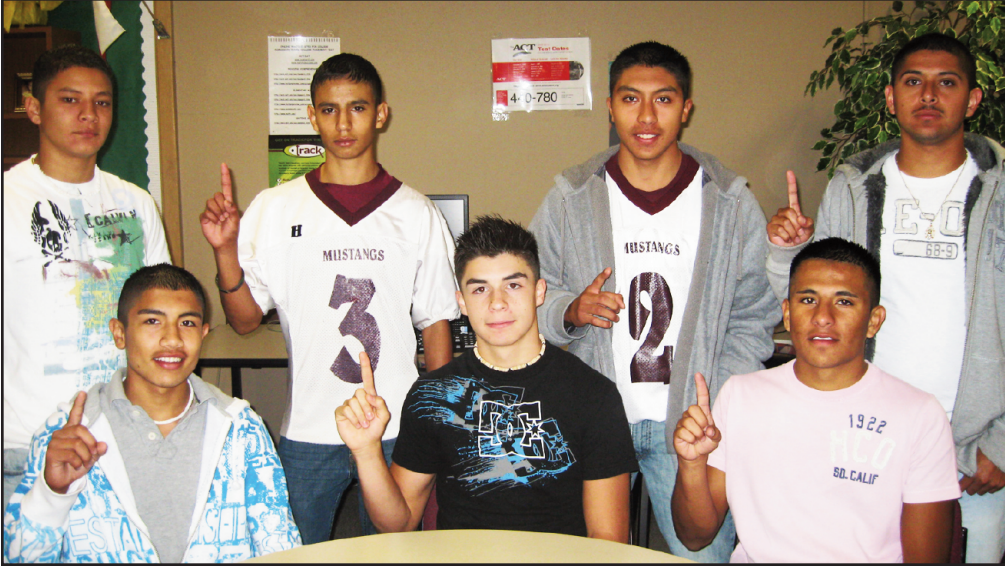

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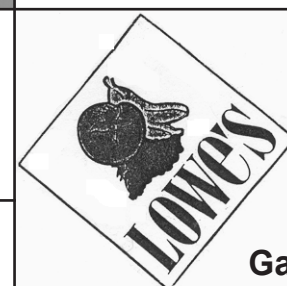
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
