## Should cell phones be allowed in school?

The Texico School Board on Monday held a lengthy discussion on the use of cell phones in the school by students and staff.

Supt. R.L. Richards and Elementary School Principal Rick Stanley recently attended a conference dealing with schools' liability. The issue involves cell phones' ability to take photos and videos.

For example, there has been a case elsewhere where a fight broke out in a school and a student took video and posted it on YouTube.

And there have been cases of "sexting," where youths post nude photos of themselves taken at school. Or photos can be taken of a youth in a locker room without knowing it.

Then, there's "cyber bullying," which can be done through text messaging. A recent case in another state resulted in a young girl committing suicide.

Farwell Schools only allow students to use their cell phones at lunch. Bovina Schools ban cell phone usage by students.

Currently, students are allowed to have cell phones at Texico School. But this

Dr. Richards plans to meet with teachers and parents to discuss this further, then bring back the topic to the school board.

In other business, the board:

-- Made changes in the way students are picked for the National Honor Society chapter. More emphasis will be placed on their academic grades and less on service and leadership.

-- Reminds all students that the school's Code of Conduct is in effect 365 days

-- Heard that the building project is on schedule.

-- Adjusted the attendance and leave policies for staff to fit state regulations and also the school's new condensed calendar which goes into effect in August.





Recent storms have battered some area crops. Extreme winds really worked some of the cotton over; hail and driving rain also accompanied a few of the storms.





LIVE CATTLE: Live Cattle prices have remained under pressure and cash continues to drift lower from week to week. The fundamental situation remains fairly strong, but lower futures prices have many traders concerned. Most of the action in cattle and the rest of the commodity complex is related to pressure seen over the last couple of weeks in the financial sectors. A weakening economy seems to be blamed for the overall decline.

FEEDER CATTLE: Prices have held up much better than the Live Cattle prices, but the Cash Feeder Index continues to remain under pressure with the Index cur ently trading at \$108.00. Technically, short term trends have remained slight positive while long term charts continue to point lower. Another test of the \$107.00 could be expected over the next couple of weeks. If prices hold, then a bottom may be near?

CORN: Corn prices were able to catch some long term support off their weekly charts and have now turned their short term charts higher. The market was expected to trade back into the \$3.52 level basis the nearby July contract. A close above this level could lead to a little stronger rally, but weather and crop conditions have been ideal and production could reach another record level this season. Long term charts are still down.

SOYBEANS: Prices have remained inside a narrow trading range for the last several weeks. Weather seems to be working in favor of a potential record crop this season. For now, prices seem to be trapped and until the market can decisively break out of this range. Long term charts still point to lower levels.

WHEAT: Wheat prices have rallied alongside the res of the grain complex, but the fundamental situation remains very negative as cash has continued to move sharply lower across many locations. The basis of cash below futures prices now ranges from \$1.10 to 2.00 lepending on the location. There seems to be little demand at this time or until exports can show signs of improving.
