Langford, Delgado win Farwell High's most coveted honors

The most coveted honor given at Farwell High School, the Loving Cup, was awarded to Keegan Langford at the school commencement exercises on Friday.

The award was started by the Farmers Grain Co. of Farwell and was first presented in 1928. It is given to the best all-around Farwell High graduate and comes with a \$2,000 scholarship.

The other top school honor, the Carlos Nicolas Award, was presented to Brenda Delgado. The award is named after a Farwell High student who died in 1984.

This is accompanied by \$1,000 and is presented to the student who has exhibited outstanding citizenship, giving of time and effort unselfishly for the good of the class and school.

Spring crops show improvement

From Monti Vandiver, Parmer County extension agent - IPM:

After getting off to a slow start, most spring seeded crops have shown a marked improvement lately.

Corn which was severely burned by high winds and sand May 10 is "none the worse for wear" today. Most corn has been planted but a bit of late corn still remains to be seeded.

Cotton is responding well to better environmental conditions. Warmer ambient and soil temperatures have stimulated growth and enhanced emergence.

Most cotton I've seen has ranged from not yet emerged to the 2 true leaf stage, with the majority in the cotyledon stage.

Area wheat is a mixed bag ranging from poor to fair to good. Winter moisture kept the crop rolling but late winter/early spring dry spells and plant diseases have taken a toll.

The recent precipitation has provided much needed moisture to established crops and "planting moisture" to dryland fields in the path of the storms. Hail accompanied a few of the storms causing varying degrees of damage but was not wide spread.

Vietnamese boy will be a leader

Well here we are starting month 11. I can hardly believe this adventure is nearing an end.

This month I felt my heart break in a way I never have before. I have known for a while that my primary ministry will be to kids who are in difficult life situations. Who knew God would give me even more passion and drive for this ministry area?

Thien, 9, and Thang, 11, are two boys at the Vietnamese orphanage that we visited. They are the sweetest boys. The first day there I wrestled with the kids (I ended up with every kid in the room on the floor at one point ... yeah I can handle 20 Vietnamese kids at once).

Thien and Thang were particularly engaged in

this play. Thang would make all the other kids back away so we could wrestle one on one without the smaller ones getting hurt in the process. I would quickly pin him and then Thien would do the same.

When our group was finished, the father announced that we would be leaving and told the kids to say goodbye. From this point until I crossed the threshold of their home I had Thien attached to my waist. They both gave me at least 6 hugs before I could make it out the door.

Leaving that place the first time was so hard. I wanted nothing more than to stay with those kids and tell them about how loved they are. You see, the way a kid winds up in this particular orphanage is that their parents get remarried and decide they don't want remnants from their previous marriage and so drop the kid.

Realizing that these kids have literally been told that they are unwanted, disposable beings broke my heart. I wanted nothing more than for them to know how much their Father loves them, wants them and cherishes them.

I want them to feel that from the parents of the orphanage, I want them to feel that from me, I want them to feel that from God. In Vietnam it is very difficult to adopt. Because most people here barely make enough to support their own children and the law prohibits foreigners from adopting, orphanages

are packed full of children in need.

Kids are turned out of most places at age 16 so their bed can be filled by a smaller, more needy, child. Kids are fed on about 30 cents a day. There are often not actually beds for the kids to sleep in so they are spread out on the floor in their main play room. The place that I visited was run by a couple that are Christian and they teach all of their children about the hope that we have Christ. Most orphanages, though, are government run and therefore cannot say one word about Christ.

On my last visit to this orphanage we did the human knot. My favorite thing about this activity was getting to see Thang lead the group. He is the second oldest kid there and the oldest boy. He takes on his role as big brother so well.

It was so cool to see him helping younger kids understand the concept of the game, showing them the way through the maze and ultimately leading them into successful completion of the task. I know that in the coming years he will do this practically for these young people as they struggle through the emotional responses to their situations.

I look forward to hearing about the ways that he leads that generation into greatness in the Vietnamese church. I definitely learned to love these guys in a new way and pray that somehow we are able to see each other again.

NRCS helps prairie chickens

The Natural Resources Conservation Service in Texas has announced \$2 million available through a national initiative to help reduce the threat to lesser prairie-chicken (LPC) habitat in historic rangeland sites.

NRCS will accept applications through Aug. 1, 2010. "Landowners interested in the initiative for the LPC should inquire now for technical and financial assistance to help establish and improve the habitat," said the NRCS.

The WHIP program is a voluntary conservation program for people who want to develop and improve wildlife habitat on private lands. The program offers a continuous signup.

The initiative includes New Mexico, Colorado, Kansas and Oklahoma.

"Good LPC habitat equates to good rangeland that can improve or increase beef production if managed properly," said the NCRS.

number - 1,600.

When you talk about any military group, you include the number of front-line personnel and the support it needs, like cooks, administration clerks, motor pool folks, etc.

So we need to remove the support folks from that number. I would guess it leaves about 1,200 to patrol the border.

Of course, they would not work 24 hours a day. Assuming their shifts would be 8 hours a day, it means about 400 would be on active duty at a

time.

But don't forget vacations. And sick days. And training. My guess is that the total would be around 300 on duty at a given time.

Now, let's look at the border - the Pacific Ocean to the Gulf of Mexico, a span of about 1,500 miles.

That would put it at about one Guardsman for every 5 miles. Maybe not. I doubt a Guardsman would be sent out alone. They would put at least 4 or 5 together (or more) for safety purposes.

Thus, we will have

about 60 to 70 small groups covering that 1,500 miles. You do the math.

Hey, if I were a "coyote," that would scare the pants off me!

Propane Gas Grill Safety Tips

- Always use your grill outside in a well-ventilated area. Don't bring cylinders inside or into an enclosed space such as a garage.
- Before lighting your propane gas grill burner, use a leak-detection solution to make sure all connections are secure. Contact your local propane gas supplier to obtain the leak-detection solution and instructions on how to use it. Never use matches or lighters to check for leaks.
- Always use or store cylinders in an upright, vertical position. Store them outside and away from sources of ignition.
- When you have your cylinder refilled, ask your supplier to check for dents, damage, rust or leaks.
- After filling, take your cylinder home immediately. Keep your vehicle ventilated with the cylinder valve closed and plugged or capped (unless your cylinder type does not require plugs or caps). Never leave the cylinder in your car.
- Make sure the grill burner controls are turned off and keep the cylinder valve closed when not in use.
- Make sure the grill is shut off and cooled before covering.
- When your grill is not in use, cover disconnected hose-end fittings and burner air intakes with small plastic bags, or obtain protective fitting caps from your propane supplier to keep out dirt, insects and moisture.
- If there is a significant and uncontrollable release of gas or a fire, call the fire department immediately and move all people and pets away from the unit.

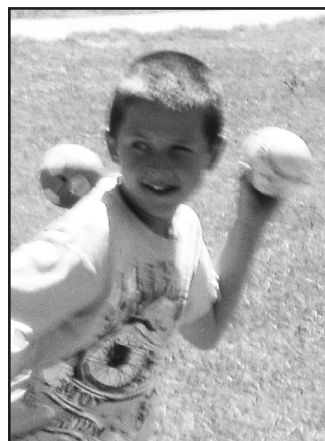

Rosettes will be given record book winners; and buckles for the grand and reserve champions -- singles and trios (pens of three).

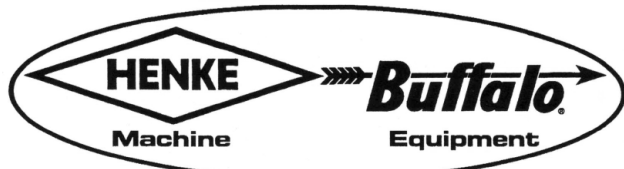

LIVE CATTLE: Live Cattle prices made an attempt to trade higher early in the week, but failed going into Friday's close. Pressure from lower cash trade and especially from a much weaker financial sector. The break on Friday was attributed to a downgrade of Spanish bonds which impacted markets across the board. The weaker world economy has continued to add pressure. Cycles are down into at least late June.

FEEDER CATTLE: Prices did not see the same pressure come into play late week as did the rest of the markets, but prices had already seen a fairly significant drop in just the last 3-4 weeks. The nearby August contract was able to hold some support around the \$107.30 area, but a close below this level should lead to another leg down from here. Prices have had three days to attempt a rally and so far, not much of a rally?

CORN: Corn prices took a huge hit on Friday based primarily on negative financial news coming out of Spain. Outside influenced continues to influence prices more than fundamentals pertaining directly to those specific markets as seen across the board last Friday. Prices made an attempt to rally for a couple of week, but turned all their trends back down on Friday. Support lies around the \$3.50 level basis the July contract.

SOYBEANS: Prices also attempted to rally for 3-4 days, but failed on Friday. The market really didn't take out any strong support levels, but prices closed near the low of the day which usually leads to lower prices into next week. All trends are still down in the beans. Weather has been optimal and another year of record production around the globe may continue to pressure this market.

WHEAT: Wheat prices have basically just followed the rest of the grain complex around with prices attempting to rally early in the week to only loose ground on Friday along with just about all the commodity prices. Not much positive from the fundamental side. Crop is reportedly in good shape with large world supplies still hanging overhead. New lows next week could lead to another hard leg down?

COTTON: Cotton prices have continued to trade inside a huge range since late last February. The market has made a couple of attempts to break out the upside, but so far, the support around \$79.25 basis the July contract has held this market together. After the hard break seen across the board on Friday, this market looks like it may test their long term support levels at some point in the near future?

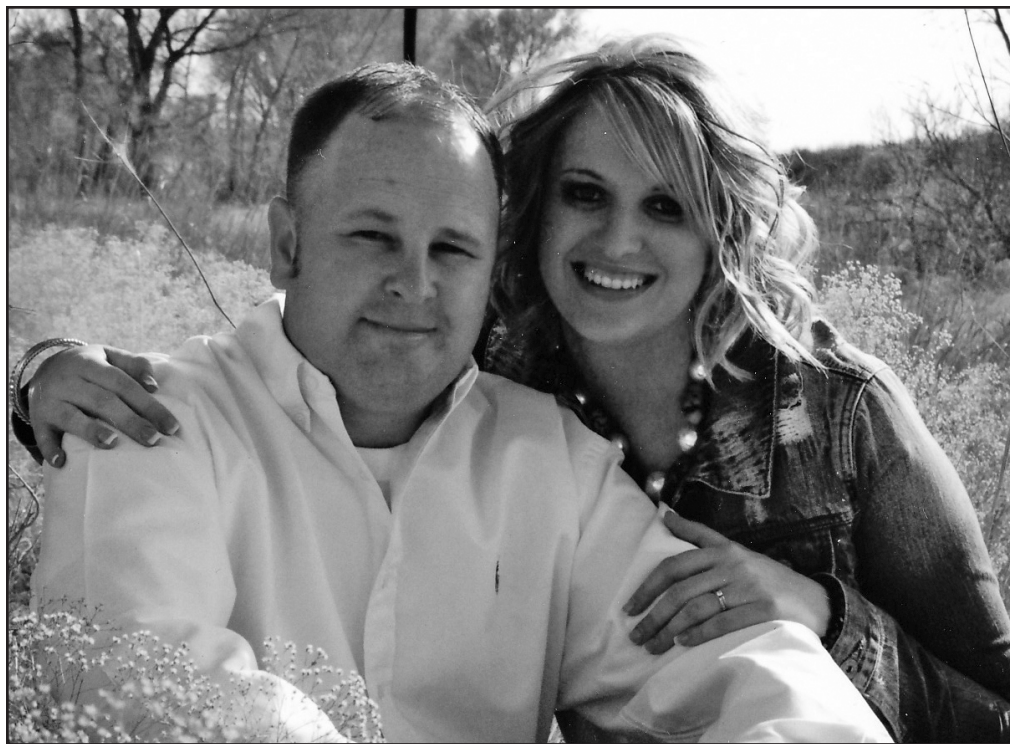

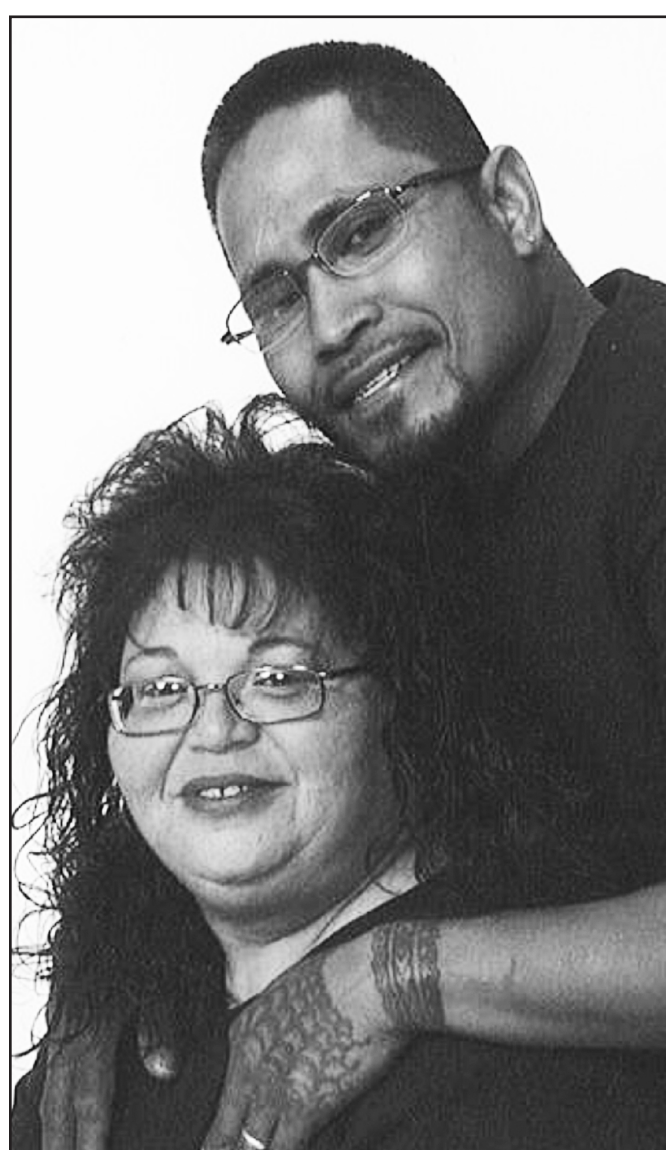

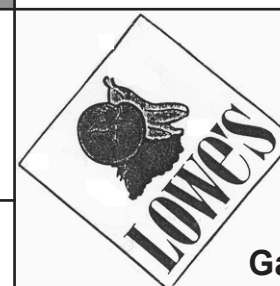
