Octavio Chavez A young man with a great future

One of the most rewarding aspects of being a teacher is the opportunity to become acquainted with young people that many in our communities will never have the privilege of meeting or knowing.

One such young man is Octavio Chavez, a senior this year who came to live in Farwell with his family in August 2009, his junior year.

Octavio lived the first 17 years of his life in Cuauhtemoc, Chihuahua, a city in Mexico of 120,000, where his mother, Olga, and her family had always lived.

After Octavio's father, Rodolfo, came to work in the U.S., arrangements were made for the rest of the family to join him. To Octavio and his sisters, Andrea (10), and Adriana (8), coming to a small town like Farwell was quite a big change in many ways, the English language being one of them.

I asked, "Why Farwell?" and Octavio answered that his mother knew people here from her childhood.

Currently, Octavio is taking Art II and also spends extra time in the art building along with Victoria Pollard, another senior art student. I have enjoyed learning about Octavio's life before Farwell. Attending public school from 1st through 9th grade, Octavio made straight A's. After 9th grade, a test had to be passed to enter high school and many did not go on to secondary school.

Because of achieving a high percentage rate on the test, Octavio was able to decide on which high school to attend and chose one concentrating in computer technology along with math and other basic courses.

Due to his creativity with technology, Octavio recently generated a computer enhanced photo that was enlarged and painted by Farwell's art students and hung in the remodeled Education Department at Eastern New Mexico University in Portales.

At Farwell, interacting with the teachers and other students has been a challenge because of the English but the classes haven't seemed any more difficult to Octavio.

After only a short time, Octavio is speaking English easily and fluently. Teachers agree that academics have been very important to Octavio who is conscientious and working hard to succeed.

At the beginning of the school year in 2009, I remember thinking that the new art student from Mexico seemed like a very mannerly, humble, and respectful young man. Of course, with a height of six feet, two inches, I asked if he happened to play basketball and with an answer of yes, I knew that ought to make our coach happy.

Sports, especially basketball, became a part of Octavio's life starting in the 3rd grade. There was even a state basketball tournament which led to a national tournament on the elementary level. Octavio made the varsity basketball team his junior year at Farwell and his senior year he was an important contributor to the success of the team, always playing with intensity and desire.

Observing Octavio's passion for art and the opportunity to know him has been a joy for me. Those first few weeks of art in August 2009, Octavio listened

intently to instruction, worked with a great deal of focus, and completed excellent art projects easily. I was surprised to learn there had been no formal art instruction until Farwell. It didn't take me or the students long to realize that an artistically gifted student had enrolled.

Artistically, Octavio thinks in a different realm than most of us and the creativity as well as drawing ability of his work is exceptional. There is an appetite to create art that is never fulfilled in Octavio, who has learned to express himself well in a variety of mediums as well as styles of art from realism to abstract. He is continually working on several different art projects at home and at school.

Octavio visualizes ideas and even colors for art in his head and then attempts to create them. Changes come to his mind quickly as a drawing or painting evolves and a finished piece rarely resembles the way it began. It is always exciting and enjoyable for me to watch Octavio progress through an art project whether it be on paper, canvas, or clay.

Octavio plans on attending North Texas University in Denton and majoring in art, although he is undecided as to which area of concentration. As we were finishing our visit for this article, I asked Octavio what he thought about living in Farwell these past two years and he shared some personal and interesting reflections with me.

He is glad he came to Farwell and has wondered at times, "The world is so big and I think ... why here, why now, why this time?"

Because of students like Octavio, Farwell High School has been blessed and enhanced. I am thankful that others like myself have had the opportunity to appreciate Octavio's quiet but friendly personality, quick sense of humor, compassion and respect for others, and sincerity. Octavio does not take his abilities for granted but enjoys them with a passion and a humility that shows maturity beyond his 18 years.

One of my favorite memories of Octavio was one beautiful day this past winter. I was walking across the high school yard after lunch to the art building when I saw two people lying on the pavement in front of the art building, just enjoying the warm sun and looking up at the sky. I couldn't help but grin to myself and think, "Now, only true artists would be doing something like that!"

Sure enough, it was Octavio and his friend, Victoria.

Farwell restaurants offer new dishes

There are some unique new tastes offered in Farwell.

Cy Koehn at the Old Country Store said folks should look for the barrell out front. If it is on the side walk, he is open. Even late at night.

The Barbeque Shop has a new treat: a custard filled cornbread. It almost tastes like cake, and pitmaster Kelly Mimms says it needs just a bit of honey to make it perfect.

They also have pork buns and for those who like briscuit, try out the 'burnt ends' on the menu. It has a more intense flavor than the briscuit most folks are used to.

And all of these are in addition to the normal briscuit, sausage and ribs.

Over at the Old Country Store Bakery and Restaurant they have expanded the bakery to include cinnamon swirl orange slice bread, 7 grain bread, light rye, white and whole wheat, dinner rolls,cinnamon rolls and kolaches, poppies seed and banana nut muffins.

Early orders and special deliveries are welcomed. Plus they have weekly specials of lasagna, roast, meat loaf, baked chicken.

Some of their new deserts include angel food cake roll, apricot twist and maple nut twist.

Farwell's restaurants are only open part-time, with The Barbeque Shop being open Thursdays, and The Old Country Store Bakery and Restaurant being open Friday and Saturday for breakfast and lunch.

But both places might be open for more hours in the future.

The Barbeque Shop just purchased a second barbeque pit allowing them to double the amount of meat they can get ready, or possibly to be ready for Friday parties and special events.

Live Cattle prices were able to take out last weeks low early this week which technically should lead to another test of the \$110.65 level basis June contract. The market was able to rally off their low for about five days which is normal for a correction. New lows this week indicates weakness. The next strong test should lie around the March low. Trends are still pointing lower at this time. Feeder prices also dropped this week, but prices are still a couple of dollar off last weeks low which should provide some short term support. A close below this level should project another test of the March low made around the \$128.00 level basis the August contract. The feeder prices have actually remained a little stronger than the Live Cattle price, but both markets are still expected to run side by side.


Soybean prices were able to rebound last Friday after a severe break on Thursday and the market tested last weeks highs early this week. Last weeks high should provide some relatively short term resistance, but a close above this level could easily project a test of the March highs. Not much news in the market, but Funds appear to be driving prices at this time.

Corn prices have continued to drift lower over the last three weeks, but have yet to clearly indicate a trend. Prices look more like a sideways pattern while waiting to see if planting goes on without a hitch. There has also been an increase in volatility with prices trading down the 30 cent limit last Thursday followed by a limit up on Friday and almost another limit down on Monday? Like we said, volatile!

Wheat prices sold off their highs last week forming what looks like a potential double top. On the other hand, prices have traded back down into their April low and have yet to take this level out? These wide swings seem to be commonplace at this time with swings up and down \$1.00 per bushel taking place more often than seen in the past. Overall, trends are still flat with no clear direction.

Cotton prices were able to trade up into some short term resistance around the \$131.00 level basis the December contract before turning back down. The market closed lower on Monday, but has not sold off enough to change the short term direction of the market at this time. There are several markets which seem to be slowing down or moving lower at this time. Buyers are not nearly as aggressive?
