




### Farwell PIPs take 1st place at Abilene







### Southwest Ag holds customer appreciation day





Live Cattle prices exploded to the upside on Friday out the market was coming back fairly strong at mid week. The boost came partially from higher cash trade at \$128 on Friday, but also from grain prices which ended sharply lower into Friday's close. Technically, the market should be turning higher, but it will take more than a good day or two off the bottom to turn this thing back higher. Next week will tell us more.

Feeder prices closed up their 300 point limit on Friday due mostly to corn prices closing down their limit. Higher cash fed cattle trade also helped to support Live Cattle prices and this also spilled over into the Feeder pit as well. Same as above, two days off the bottom does not make a bottom, but for those looking for higher prices, this was a very good start. This week should tell more about the strength in this market.

Soybean prices collapsed with the rest of the grain complex on Friday. It wasn't the acres report which shocked the grains, but the ending stocks which were raised across the board. The grains basically all fed on the negative stocks numbers and the whole complex basically fell apart. Technically, soybeans remain locked in a six month trading range and prices are still far above major support levels at this time.

Corn prices closed down their 40 cent limit on the nearby contracts on Friday. The USDA Planting Intention's report shocked most traders when the USDA raised ending stocks on all the grain. Acres came in right in line with pre report expectations at 97.3 million acres The shift in ending stocks shocked all the grains and it may take a few more days of trading to see if there will be any long term impact. Prices are expected to fall further, but corn usually drops each year after this report. Not too unexpected.


Wheat prices also dropped about 40 cents on Friday also due to a surprising increase in the ending stocks. It didn't seem to matter which part of the grain sector traders had been focused on as ending stocks saw a substantial increase across the board. It may take a few more days to digest and probably a few more days to really give the market direction. For now, both short and long term trends remain lower.

Cotton prices initially tried to rally before coming under a little pressure. This market has already hit a major resistance level around the \$88.80 area basis the December contract. This market will need to breakout above this level if prices are going to move higher. It really makes no difference whether prices breakout this week or next month. This level is has seen strong selling
