Farwell updates student codes

The Farwell School Board on Thursday heard high school Principal Brian Patterson report on changes in the student code and handbook.

They included:

- -- Students who drive on campus are susceptible for drug testing, just like student athletes are.
- -- The District has the right to search student vehicles, lockers or desks if it has probable cause.
- -- The District can revoke the transfer of a non-resident student for violating the District code. -- Zeroes are to be given for students who cheat, plagiarize, etc., on assign-
- -- New students who want to attend Farwell and are undergoing disciplinary
- actions at another school will have those actions continued here. -- Corporal punishment can be used on students unless the parent or guardian provides a signed statement prohibiting their use.
 - -- Students who are involved with drugs will be placed in alternative educa-

The Lazbuddie School Board on July 12 unanimously approved a separation agreement with Supt. Charles Brantner.

Brantner was placed on paid administrative leave last month and high school principal Joanna Martinez was named interim superintendent.

The agreement with Brantner noted it was a "compromise" settlement with the district.

The board then hired Dr. Gary Bigham as an interim consultant to help with the search for a new superintendent.

Bigham helped the board last time it sought a superintendent. Certain state procedures must be followed before a superintendent is picked.

Bigham will share superintendent's responsibilities with Mrs. Martinez until a superintendent is named. Mrs. Martinez also will continue to be high school principal.

In other business, the board:

- -- Hired Willis of Texas as the fleet insurance carrier.
- -- Heard that Lazbuddie School again received a superior rating on the "First" financial integrity report.

Persons who would like to work as cooks there are asked to call Mrs. Porter at (575) 309-


Cooks would work weekdays from 7:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. Experience is preferred.






Folks enjoy lunch at the Farwell Senior Meal Site.

When the title is cleared, the council has directed City Attorney Ty Rutter to begin proceedings to foreclose on the property.

- Discussed a variance request by Sam Jenkins at 420 Garwood St. He has three lots and a house is on two of them. He has asked to put a trailer house on the third lot, but the door would face away from the

Live Cattle prices were hit hard last week and prices have shown no sign of change coming into this week Short term trends have turned down with cash trade aking place last week around \$111 down from \$115 the previous week. There is strong support around the \$109.80 level basis the August contract. A close below this level may lead to a push down into the \$107 level.

Feeder prices also came under pressure last week with another round of selling early this week. Feeders are also holding support around the \$1.35 level. If the market continues to move below last weeks low, then there could be another strong push to the downside. It seems as though once prices turn either off their high or low, the market moves in a big way similar the swings taking place in the grains.

Corn prices have moved up into a strong level of esistance around the \$6.85 level and have yet to break above it. Today is the fourth day in a row in which prices have tried to cross this level. There is short term support around \$6.65 which has also held declines. Weather across the Mid West is now hot like the rest of us. Seems like prices have tried to ignore this fact as Funds are reportedly liquidating positions.

Soybean prices have traded up to test levels which have stopped the advance on four occasions since last February. The \$14.10 area remains strong resistance and a close above this level could push the market higher, but unless there is some problem with production odds really don't favor sharply higher prices from these

Wheat prices tested their old lows around the \$7.15 evel basis the December KC contract last week and turned short term trends back higher. There is some fairly strong resistance around the \$8.07 level which has stopped the advance on several occasions. If prices cannot break above this level over the near term then there could be another test of the lows?

Cotton prices broke below long term support levels around the \$113 basis the December contract and have continued to move lower even which huge losses across the state of Texas. Prices have remained under pressure as Funds are rumored to be liquidating positions. There was a 2/3rds retracement level around the \$99.30 level which was taken out this week. This permit was previously issued under expired Permit No. WQ0010661001. TCEQ received this application on April 26, 2011. The permit application is available for viewing and copying at Farwell City Hall, 100 9th Avenue, Farwell, Texas.

ADDITIONAL NOTICE. TCEQ's Executive Director has determined the application is administratively complete and will conduct a technical review of the application. After technical review of the application is complete, the Executive Director may prepare a draft permit and will issue a preliminary decision on the application. Notice of the Application and Preliminary Decision will be published and mailed to those who are on the county-wide mailing list and to those who are on the mailing list for this application. That notice will contain the deadline for submitting public comments.

PUBLIC COMMENT/PUBLIC MEETING. You may submit public comments or request a public meeting on this application. 
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
