On The Farm In Parmer County By RONNY MCNUTT

County Agent

PROPER HARVESTING ESSENTIAL FOR QUALITY COTTON

With so much emphasis at present on the production of quality cotton, farmers in Parmer County should examine closely their harvesting operations.

for a proper harvest:

1. Lint moisture should be down to about eight per cent. This point is reached when the relative humidity in the field is 60 per cent or below. Moisture can also be checked by collecting a few locks of cotton and squeezing them together in the palm of the hand. If the cotton balls up, it is too moist. If it fluffs out, it is dry enough for harvesting.

- 2. Strippers should be checked carefully to assure that they are properly adjusted and green boll separators should be operating efficiently.
- 3. Seed cotton should not be stored on trailers if the moisture level is above 12 per cent. Seed quality will also be reduced drastically if trash.

4. Seed cotton should be grouped or separated when any difference in quality is suspect- 27. ed. Grouping should be based on variety, irrigation or dryland, disease or insect damage, hail damage, lint mois- 6:30 p.m. ture and planting date.

All these items make for more orderly, efficient ginning as well. Such problems as mixpacks or two-sided bales, overdrying and ginning at improper moisture levels can thus be minimized. Ginners, thus far, have been doing a commendable job with the block ginning pro-

The Editor

Following is a part of a letter written by Ben Smart in regard to the recent picture carried of students of the third, fourth and fifth grade in the Farwell school in 1927-28.
