## On The Farm In Parmer County

### PROPER HARVESTING ESSENTIAL FOR QUALITY COTTON

With so much emphasis at present on the production of quality cotton, farmers in Parmer County should examine closely their harvesting operations.

Listed below are key factors for a proper harvest:

1. Lint moisture should be down to about eight per cent. This point is reached when the relative humidity in the field is 60 per cent or below. Moisture can also be checked by collecting a few locks of cotton and squeezing them together in the palm of the hand. If the cotton balls up, it is too moist. If it fluffs out, it is dry enough for harvesting.
2. Strippers should be checked carefully to assure that they are properly adjusted and green boll separators should be operating efficiently.
3. Seed cotton should not be stored on trailers if the moisture level is above 12 per cent. Seed quality will also be reduced drastically if stored with a high amount of trash.
4. Seed cotton should be grouped or separated when any difference in quality is suspected. Grouping should be based on variety, irrigation or dry-land, disease or insect damage, hail damage, lint moisture and planting date.

All these items make for more orderly, efficient ginning as well. Such problems as mix-packs or two-sided bales, over-drying and ginning at improper moisture levels can thus be minimized. Ginners, thus far, have been doing a commendable job with the block ginning program.

### TOP AUTHORITIES TO CONDUCT FERTILIZER SHORT COURSE

Some of the top authorities in the field of education and research will discuss soil fertility and fertilizers at a Fertilizer Dealers Short Course to be conducted on the South Plains during November and December. Information on fertilizer

needs for the area and pertinent fertilizer research findings will be presented.

Featured speakers at the short course include Dr. Eugene A. Coleman, associate professor of agronomy, Texas Technological College; Dr. Arthur Onken, assistant professor of soils and fertility at the South Plains Research and Extension Center; and John Box and Jim Valentine, agronomist and area soil chemist, respectively, with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Coleman will discuss nitrogen's role in crop production while Onken's presentation will center around phosphorus response and the reactions of phosphate materials in West Texas soils.

Information on soil-plant-water relationships as they affect production and response from fertilizer will be provided by Box.

Valentine's comments will concern how to diagnose nutrient deficiencies and a rundown of the secondary and micronutrient situation.

Schedule for the series of two meetings is as follows for interested persons in the Parmer County area: Dimmitt, High School Cafeteria, November 13, 27.

Initial meetings at each location will begin at 7:30 p.m. with the second meeting starting at 6:30 p.m.

All fertilizer dealers, agency personnel, County Program Building Committee members, producers and other interested individuals are encouraged to attend the short course at the nearest location.

Registration fee is \$5, and will be collected at the first meeting. The fee includes a notebook of the proceedings and a dinner at the final meeting.

## Report From The Sheriff's Office

Mrs. Murzone is still in Parmer County Community Hospital where she was taken by her parents following the assault. Murzone has been charged with shooting with intent to kill and bound over to grand jury action.

Also in news from the sheriff's office, Leroy Teague has recently been returned to Parmer County from Dallas to face a grand jury indictment on a theft charge.

Joe Pat Anders, charged with burglary, was given a 12 year penitentiary sentence in district court last week. He has appealed the sentence to the state supreme court and is at liberty on a \$10,000 appeal bond.

Roy Blagg, James Blagg and Joe Burleson were assessed fines of \$25 each plus court costs on an assault charge recently in JP Court.

Sheriff Lovelace reports that his office is currently investigating an incident on the R. C. Davis farm at Lazbuddie in which sugar was poured into an irrigation well motor causing some \$300 in damage.

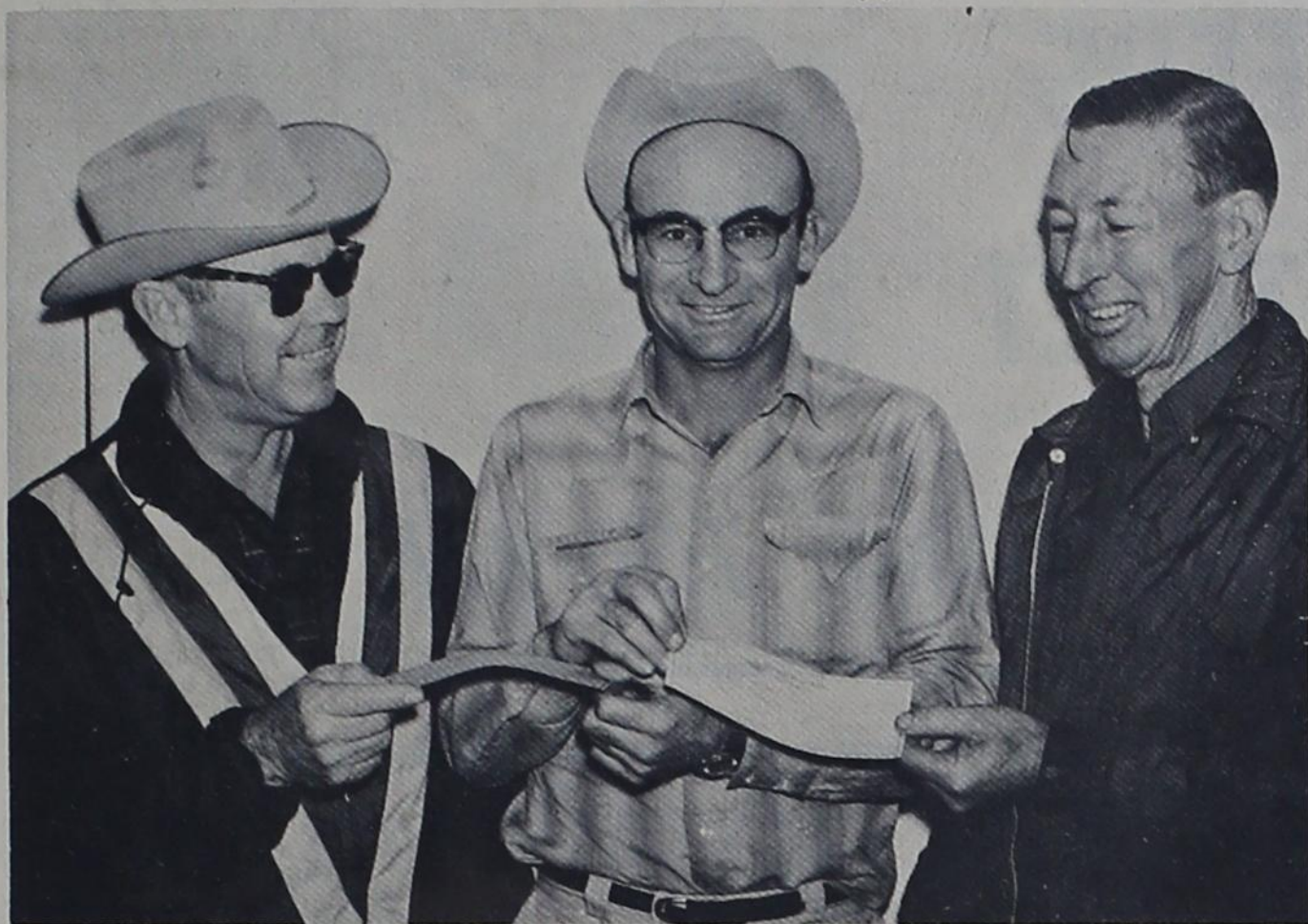
## 18 Students Represent School At FTA Convention

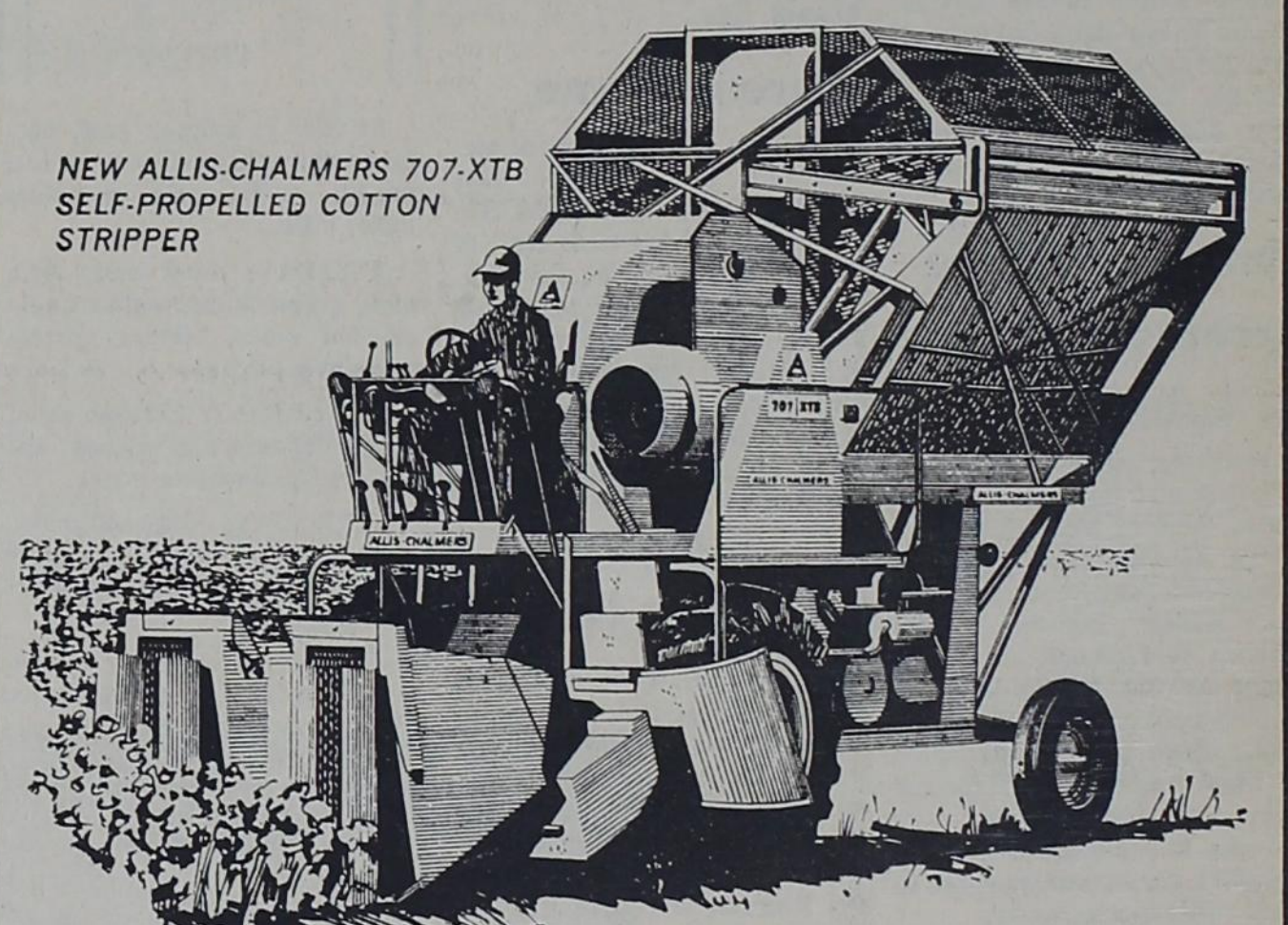

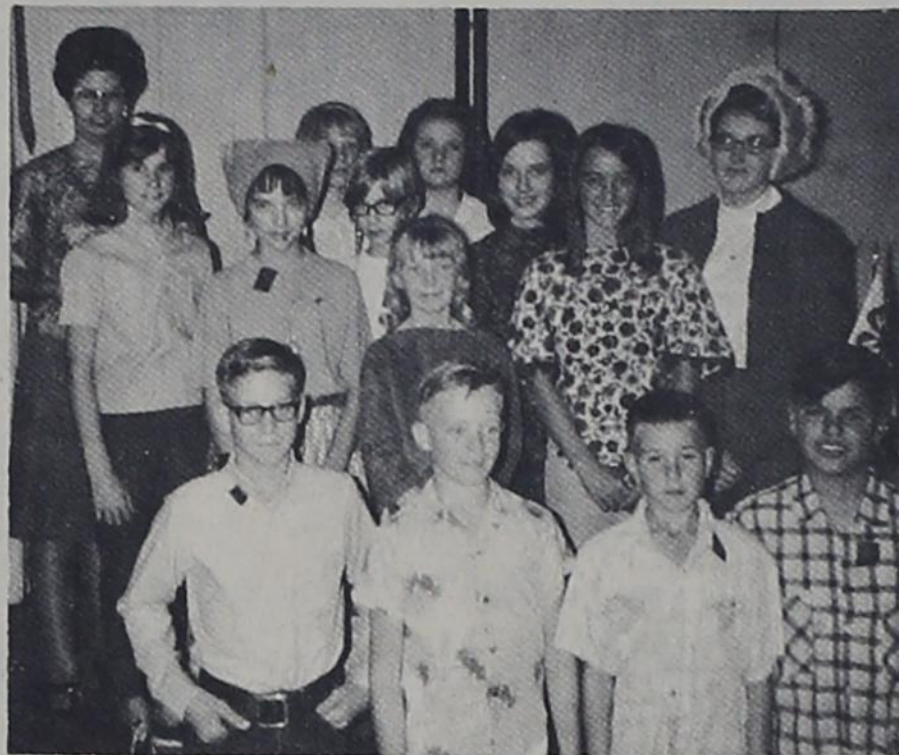
