# **Farwell stock show** to open up season

The 47th annual Farwell Junior Livestock Show will be held at the Farwell Community Center starting at 10 a.m., on Jan. 5.

A concession stand will be available.

Farwell ag teacher Sid Morris anticipates a large turnout of competitors with the full range of show animals -- barows, lambs, goats and steers.

Grand champions and reserve grand champions will receive belt buckles. Showmanship winners will receive bags.

The judge will be Jay Waller, of Ira, Texas.

A Friona Junior Livestock Show is scheduled for Jan. 13. Parmer County extension agent Benji Henderson is working on it.

The judge will be Chris Bishop, Terry County extension agent.

The Lazbuddie Junior Livestock Show will be held Jan. 18 at 11 a.m. at the Friona show barn.

Since the animals have been brought to Friona for the county show, it makes sense to use the same facility for the Lazbuddie show.

Grand champions and showmanship winners will received belt buckles, and reserve champions will be honored, too

The judge will be Lazbuddie High grad Kayle Jesko, who is pursuing a degree in ag education at West Texas A&M University.

The Parmer County Junior Livestock Show will be held Jan. 15, 16, 17 and 19. In the past, it was a three-day event. But a dairy heifer show has been added this year on a fourth day this year.

Judges will be Jay Lynn Blackburn, lambs and goats; Bill Binder, steers; Dale Schaffner, barrows and gilts; and Don Aisst, dairy heifers.

Here is the event schedule:

Jan. 15 -- 8 to 11 a.m. check-in for dairy heifers. The show is scheduled for 6 p.m.

Jan. 16 -- 1 to 5 p.m., weigh-in of all other animals; barrows and lambs will be classified as weighed; 5:30 p.m. classify steers.

Jan. 17 -- 8 a.m., goat show begins, followed by the lamb show; 11 a.m., steer show; gilt show, and 1 p.m., barrow show.

Jan. 19 -- 1 p.m., premium sale. Last year's champions were:

## State to offer Farwell, Bovina clinics same day

Farwell School nurse Lu Ann Fillpot has received an important message from the Texas Dept. of State Health Services:

The state will combine the clinics they offer in Farwell and Bovina.

Previously, the Farwell clinic was always held on the third Tuesday of most months.

Instead, the DSHS will have its clinic in Farwell at the Community Center on Jan. 14 from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m.

The same day, it will have its clinic in Bovina at the EMS building from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m.

State personnel said the number of clients they see has been declining and if it continues to go that way, they plan to cut back their visits.

But for now, the DSHS plans to hold its clinics in Farwell and Bovina throughout the year on the 2nd Monday of each month (including the summer).

Exhibitors must be enrolled in grades 3 through 12 in one of the four county public schools or must be a resident of the county attending a home/private school in grades 3

All exhibitors must be verified in the Quality **Countys Program.** 

Floor prices will not be set on any animals. All animals will be taken home by exhibitors after the show.

Validation tags will be used for ear tags in each species. Tags of other shows will not be allowed. Pens will be assigned by community.

Exhibitors may show four animals per specie (4 goats, 4 lambs, 4 steers, 4 barrows). However, exhibitors may only enter seven total. Each exhibitor Farwell -- Sid Morris, Carey Stancell, Bryan may only sell two animals at the premium auction. Showmanship rules:

Each show will have two age divisions -- junior 8-13 and senior 14 and up. Each species judge will select showmanship winners within their division. Showmanship classes will be held after completing Friona - Ben Osborn, Mark Osborn, Tracy Blount judging in each species and will be open to all exhibitors of that species, within each age division. All ages will be as of Jan. 1, 2013. Showmanship selection will be based on the exhibitor efforts within the classes as well as during showmanship competition class.

> The state mandated "no pass, no play" rules will apply. If an exhibitor is not scholastically eligible by UIL rules, then the exhibitor and his/her animals are not eligible to compete in this show.

> One hundred and forty animals will be sold at the Saturday sale. Only Grand and Reserve Grand will be presented. All other sale exhibitors will walk through the ring without their animals.

Premium on animals will be by the head.

The sale order will be lamb, steer, goat, barrow and dairy. Grand and Reserve Grand of each species will sell in the same order. Two percent of the selling price will be retained by the stock show board for repair and improvement of stock show facilities.

Lambs -- Classes will be finewool, finewool crossbreed, medium wool, southdowns and "decisions" (left to the classifier of the show). Lambs must weight 80 lbs. to show. Ewe lambs may be shown. Entry fee is \$15 per head.

Goats -- Only wether or doe goats are eligible. The show is open to any breed or crossbreed. Horns must be tipped. Goats may be shown with hair or may be slick horn, and must weigh between 60 lbs. and 115 lbs. A 3-lb. tolerance will be allowed. Exhibitors may use halters or collars in the show ring. Entry fee is \$15 per head.

Steers -- Breeds will be Crossbreds, American and British. Steers must weigh 900 lbs. to show. Any steer deemed wild or unruly will be barred from the show. Entry fee is \$15 per head.

Dairy heifers -- The show is open to any dairy breed os crossbred. All heifers must be calfhood vaccinated against brucellosis and all state animal health commission rules must be followed. Age verification will be by registration papers or dairy comp cow page. Entry fee is \$15 per head.

Gilts -- Gilts must be born between July 1 and Sept. 30, 2012. This will be a jackpot show with the payout being: 1st, 50 percent; 2nd, 30 percent, and 3rd, 20 percent. All breeds will show together. Gilts are not eligible for the sale. Entry fee is \$30 each.

Barrows -- Classes are york, chester white, crossbreed, berk, duroc, hamp, poland, spot and landrace. Barrows must weigh between 170 lbs. and 265 lbs. A 5-lb. tolerance will be allowed. Entry fee is \$15 a head.

There will be a prospect class for all barrows weighing less than the minimum required. All barrows of all breeds will compete together in the prospect class. Barrows exhibited in the prospect class will be eligible to qualify for the premium sale at the same percentage as all other classes. The winner of the prospect class will not compete for breed or reserve breed championships or grand championship.

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
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## A barking dog catches Swafford's attention
